Factories and Shops Acts.

## DETERMINATION OF THE MUSICAL INSTRUMENTS BOARD.

Note.—This Determination on the 14th February, 1924, applied to the whole of the State of Victoria.

In accordance with the provisions of the Factories and Shops Acts the Wages Board appointed "to determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any persons employed in manufacturing any musical instrument of which wood forms a part" has made the following Determination, namely:—

(1) That on the 14th February, 1924, the previous Determination of this Board shall be revoked and replaced by this Determination.

- (3) OVERTIME.—Any person employed in excess of the maximum number of hours fixed as a week's work shall be paid for such extra time at the rate of time and a half.
- (4) The Wages.—Any person employed on time wages for less than the number of hours fixed for an ordinary week's work shall for each hour worked up to one-half the number of hours fixed be paid at the ordinary wages rate with an addition of thirty-three and a third per centum.
- (5) Special Rates.—Double time shall be the rate for all work done on Sundays, New Year's Day, 26th January (Foundation Day), Good Friday, Easter Monday, Eight Hours Day (21st April), Christmas Day, or Boxing Day; but if any other day be by Act of Parliament or proclamation substituted for any of the above-named holidays, the special rates shall only be payable for work done on the day so substituted.
- (6) PIECE-WORK.—The Board determines under the provisions of section 144 of the Factories and Shops Act 1915 that any employer may fix and pay piece-work prices to any person employed in manufacturing or repairing pianos or in manufacturing gramophones provided that any such employer shall base such piece-work prices on the earnings of an average worker working under like conditions, and such piece-work prices shall be fixed so that an average worker can earn not less than the wages that are fixed by the Board for such work.
