### Factories and Shops Acts.

# DETERMINATION OF THE FURNITURE BOARD.

Note—This Determination on the 28th March, 1924, applies to the Metropolitan District as defined in the Factories and Shops Acts; the cities of Ballarut, Bendigo, Geolong, Sandringham and Warrnambool; the town of Geolong West; the boroughs of Eaglehawk, Newtown and Chilwell, and Schastopol.

IN accordance with the provisions of the Factories and Shops Acts, the Wages Board appointed to "determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to female workers employed as upholstresses, whether as carpet, hands, table hands, or drapery hands, or rates which may be paid to female workers employed as upholstresses, whether as carpet, hands, table hands, or drapery hands, or rates which may be paid to female workers employed as upholstresses, whether as carpet, hands, table hands, or drapery hands, also to male persons employed in planning and laying carpets or lineleums or floor cloths or fixing draperies," has made the following Determination, namely:—

(1) That on the 28th March, 1924, the last previous Determination shall be revoked and replaced by this Determination. ALL OTHER EMPLOYEES.

(3) Time of Beginning and Ending Work-

Time of Beginning. 7.30 a.m. 7.30 a.m.

Time of Ending.

1 p.m. on the day on which the half-holiday is observed, and

6 p.m. on the other working days of the week.

(4) OVERTIME.—The following rates shall be paid for all work done:—

(a) Outside the hours fixed as the times of beginning and ending work (b) Within the hours fixed as the time of beginning and ending work in excess of 48 hours in any week for males and 44 hours in any week for females

(5) Travelling Rates.—Any employee who works away from his employer's place of business shall for time occupied in travelling between the employer's place of business and work be paid pro rata at the following rates:—

. Time and a half.
. The rates fixed in Clause (2).

(a) Outside the hours fixed in Clause (3)(b) Within the hours fixed in Clause (3)

(6) Casual Labour.—Casual employees (i.e., persons employed during any week for not more than one-half the maximum number of hours fixed in this Determination as a week's work) shall be paid at the rate of time and a quarter.

Good Friday, Easter Saturday, Easter Monday, Eight Hours Day (21st April), Christmas Day, or Boxing Day, but if any other day be by Act of Parliament or Proclamation substituted for any of the above-named holidays, the special rates shall only be payable for work done on the day so substituted.
