Factories and Shops Acts.

DETERMINATION OF THE STOREMEN, PACKERS, AND SORTERS BOARD.

This Determination on the 22nd October. 1926, applied to the following parts of Victoria, namely:—The Metropolitan District as defined in the Factories and Shops Acts; the cities of Ballarat, Bendigo, Geelong, Sandringham, and Warrnambool; the towns of Geelong West and Newtown and Chilwell; and the boroughs of Eaglehawk and Sebastopol.

N accordance with the provisions of the Factories and Shops Acts, the Wages Board which since the 20th April, 1926, has had the power to "determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any person employed—

APPRENTICES. One apprentice to every three or fraction of three workers of the same sex receiving not less than the minimum wage.

MALE IMPROVERS.

One male improver to every four or fraction of four male workers receiving 94s. 6d. per week.

FEMALE IMPROVERS. Two female improvers to each female worker receiving 53s. 3d. per week.

Apprentices and Improvers shall be subject to the same number of hours per week as fixed for their respective sections. An indenture of apprenticeship prescribed was approved on 24th May, 1923.

(3) TIMES OF BEGINNING AND ENDING WORK-

On the ordinary working days of the week
On Saturday, or the day on which the weekly
half-holiday is observed 7 a.m.

6 p.m.

(4) OVERTIME. -- The following rates shall be paid for all work done :-Detween mininght and 7 a.m.

At any other time outside the times of beginning and ending work as herein fixed.

Within the times of beginning and ending work, in excess of the maximum number of hours fixed as a week's work in any week.

(5) Special Rates for Sundays and Public Holidays.—Double time shall be the rate for all work done on Sunday, New Year's Day, Foundation Day (26th January), Good Friday, Easter Monday, Eight Hours Day (21st April), King's Birthday (3rd June), Christmas Day, or Boxing Day, but if any other day be by Act of Parliament or Proclamation substituted for any of the above-named holidays, the special rate shall only be payable for work done on the days so substituted.

(6) Time Rate.—Any person (other than those in potato or onion stores, on wharfs, or in wharf sheds, customs railway sheds, or fumigating sheds) employed on time wages for less than the number of hours fixed for an ordinary week's work shall for each hour worked up to one-half the maximum number of hours fixed in this determination be paid at the ordinary wages rate with an addition of fifty per centum.

(7) TERMINATION OF EMPLOYMENT.—Seven days' notice of termination of employment shall be given by either employer or worker.

(8) PIECE-WORK.—The Board determines under the provisions of sub-sections (1) and (2) of section 144 of the Factories and Shops Act 1915, No. 2650, that any employer may fix and pay piece-work prices for wholly or partly packing or sorting any articles for which wages rates are fixed, provided that such employer shall base such piece-work prices on the earnings of an average worker working under like conditions, and such piece-work prices shall be fixed so that an average worker can earn not less than the wages rate fixed by the Board
