Factories and Shops Acts.

DETERMINATION OF THE UNDERTAKERS BOARD:

Note.—This Determination on 18th August, 1928, applied to the whole of the State of Victoria.

IN accordance with the provisions of the Factories and Shops Acts, the Wages Board appointed to "determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any person or persons or classes of persons wheresoever employed in the business or occupation of an undertaker," has made the following Determination, viz.:—

(1) That on the 18th August, 1928, the last provious Determination of this Board shall be revoked and replaced by this Determination.

- (3) Time of Beginning and Ending Wobk .-
 - (a) For workers engaged in conducting funerals, making, trimming, or polishing coffins—
 Time of Beginning.

 7.30 a.m. 5.30 p.m. on six days in the week.
 - (b) For all other workers—
 7 a.m. 6 p.m. on six days in the week.
- (4) OVERTIME.

- (5) Casual Labour.—Casual employees, i.e., persons who are employed during any week for not more than one-half the maximum number of hours fixed in this Determination as a week's work, shall be paid at the rate of time and a quarter, with a minimum of 12s. 6d. per day.
- (6) Annual Holiday.—Any employee who has been in the service of an employer for a period of not less than twelve months shall be granted one week's holiday in each year on full pay.
- (7) PAYMENT FOR HOLIDAYS.—All employes shall be entitled to the following holidays without deduction of pay:—New Year's Day, Foundation Day, Good Friday, Easter Monday, Eight Hours Day, Christmas Day, and Boxing Day.
- (8) Pionic Day.—Double time shall be paid for all work done on the day observed in the trade for the annual picnic, provided that this clause shall apply to the Metropolitan District only.
- (9) SPECIAL RATES.—Double time shall be paid for all work done on Sundays, New Year's Day, 26th January (Foundation Day) Good Friday, Easter Monday, Eight Hours Day (26th April), Christmas Day, and Boxing Day; but if any other day be by Act of Parliament or proclamation substituted for any of the above-named holidays, the special rate shall only be payable for work done on the day so substituted. Provided that persons employed at cleaning out stables, feeding, grooming, and bedding-down horses shall be paid for the first two hours' work at the ordinary rate.
