IN accordance with the provisions of the Factories and Shops Act 1928 (No. 3677), the Wages Board which since the 20th April, 1926, has had the power to "determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any person employed—

(c) as an assembler, collector, or checker of goods in course of receipt or despatch,

(4) Overtime.—The following rates shall be paid for all work done:

Between midnight and 7 a.m.

At any other time outside the times of beginning and ending work as herein fixed
Within the times of beginning and ending work, in excess of the maximum number of hours
fixed as a week's work in any week

(5) Special Research

(5) Special Rates for Sundays and Public Holldays.—Double time shall be the rate for all work done on Sunday, New Year's Day, Foundation Day (26th January), Good-Friday, Easter Monday, Eight Hours Day (21st April), Anzac Day (in industries named in the second schedule to the Anzac Day Act 1928), King's Birthday (3rd June), Christmas Day, or Boxing Day, but if any other day be by Act of Parliament or Proclamation substituted for any of the above-named holidays, the special rate shall only be payable for work done on the days so substituted.

(6) Time Rate.—Any person (other than those in potato or onion stores, on wharfs, or in wharf sheds, customs railways sheds or furnigating sheds) employed on time wages for less than the number of hours fixed for an ordinary week's work shall for each hour worked up to one-half the maximum number of hours fixed in this determination be paid at the ordinary wages rate with an addition of fifty per centum.

(7) RESTRICTION AS TO FEMALES LIETING HEAVY WEIGHTS.—The maximum weight to be lifted by any female over 18 years of age, employed in an Egg Store, shall be thirty pounds.

(8) TERMINATION OF EMPLOYMENT.—Seven days' notice of termination of employment shall be given by either employer or

(9) PIECE-WORK.—The Board determines under the provisions of sub-sections (1) and (2) of section 150 of the Factories and Shops Act 1928 (No. 3677), that any employer may fix and pay piece-work prices for wholly or partly packing or sorting any articles for which wages rates are fixed, provided that such employer shall base such piece-work prices on the earnings of an average worker working under like conditions, and such piece-work prices shall be fixed so that an average worker can earn not less than the wages rate fixed by the Board for such work.

DETERMINATION OF THE TENTMAKERS BOARD.

This Determination on the 18th July, 1931, applied to the whole of the State of Victoria.

IN accordance with the provisions of the Factories and Shops Act 1928 (No. 3677), the Wages Board, which since the 13th September, 1927, has had the power to "determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any person or persons or classes of persons employed in the trade of manufacturing—

- (a) articles made of canvas or a substitute for canvas such as-
 - Sails, tents, marquees, ships' gear, wings of aeroplanes, horse rugs, cow rugs, water bags, outside blinds (except Venetian blinds), filters, mail bags, tarpaulins;
- (b) any other kind of canvas goods except those subject to the jurisdiction of any of the following Boards:-
 - Agricultural Implements Board, Country Agricultural Implements Board, Boot Board, Carriage Board, Catriage Board, and Rubber Trade Board;
- (c) flags;"
- has made the following Determination, namely :-
- (1) That on the 18th July, 1931, the last previous Determination of this Board shall be revoked and replaced by this Determination.

- (5) SPECIAL RATES.—That double time shall be paid for all work done on Sundays, New Year's Day, 26th January (Foundation Day), Good Friday, Easter Saturday, Easter Monday, 21st April (Eight Hours Day), Christmas Day, and Boxing Day; but if any other day be by Act of Parliament or Proclamation substituted for any of the above-named holidays, the special rate shall only be payable for work done on the day so substituted.
- (6) Time Wages.—Any person employed on time wages for less than the number of hours fixed for an ordinary week's work shall for each hour worked up to one-half the number of hours fixed be paid at the ordinary wages rate with an addition of thirty-three and a third per centum.
- (7) PIECE-WORK.—The Board determines, under the provisions of Section 150 of the Factories and Shops Act 1928, that any employer may fix and pay piece-work prices to any person or persons or classes of persons employed at any work for which the Board has fixed the minimum wage, provided that such employer shall base such piece-work prices on the earnings of an average worker working under like conditions, and such piece-work prices shall be fixed so that an average worker can earn not less than the wages that are fixed by the Board for such work.
