Factories and Shops Act 1928 (No. 3677).

DETERMINATION OF THE CEMENT ARTICLES BOARD.

NOTE .- This Determination on the 24th April, 1931, applied to the whole of the State of Victoria.

IN accordance with the provisions of the Factories and Shaps Act 1928 (No. 3677) the Wages Board appointed to "determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any persons (other than persons under the jurisdiction of the Fibrous Plasterers Board) employed in the trade of making portable articles of cement or concrete," has made the following Determination, namely:—

(1) That on the 24th April, 1931, the previous Determination of this Board shall be revoked and replaced by this Determination.

(3) ALLOWANCES.—The following allowances shall be paid to persons employed on work away from their employers' place of business

The fares, exceeding 3d. per day, necessarily expended in going from and to the employee's residence to and from his work.
 For work done at a distance from the employer's place of business if the employee is unable to return to his home the same night, 6s. per day extra for the first seven days, and thereafter 30s. per week extra.
 Time of Bedinking and Exding Work—

Time of Beginning. Time of Ending.

1 p.m. on Saturdays, or the day on which the half-holiday is locally observed.

5.30 p.m. on each of the other five working days of the week. 7 a.m. 7 a.m.

(5) OVERTIME.—The following rates shall be paid for all work done:—

(a) Outside the hours fixed as the times of beginning and ending work.
 (b) Within the hours fixed as the times of beginning and ending work in excess of the maximum Time and a half.

(6) Time Rate.—Any person employed on time wages for less than the number of hours fixed for an ordinary week's work shall for each hour worked up to 24 hours be paid at the ordinary wages rate with an addition of thirty-three and one-third per centum.

(7) Special Rates.—Double time shall be the rate payable for all work done on Sundays, New Year's Day, 26th January (Foundation Day), Good Friday, Easter Monday, 21st April (Eight Hours Day), 3rd June (King's Birthday), Christmas Day, or Boxing Day, but if any other day be by Act of Parliament or Proclamation substituted for any of the above-named holidays, the special rate shall be payable only for work done on the day so substituted.
