Factories and Shops Acts.

DETERMINATION OF THE BAG MAKERS BOARD.

NOTE.—This Determination on the 14th January, 1937, applied to the following parts of Victoria, namely:—The Metropolitan District as defined in the Factories and Shops Acts and the Order in Council thereunder, and such portions of the city of Sandringham as are not included within the said district; the cities of Ballarat, Bendigo, Geelong, Geelong West, and Warrnambool; the town of Newtown and Chilwell; and the boroughs of Eaglehawk and Sebastopol.

IN accordance with the provisions of the Factories and Shops Acts, the Wages Board which since the 18th December, 1934, has had the power to determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to persons employed in making or repairing jute, hessian, or cotton bags, or in making or repairing wool packs, has made the following Determination, namely:—

(1) That on the 14th January, 1937, the last previous Determination of this Board shall be revoked and replaced by this Determination.

(3) TIME OF BEGINNING AND ENDING WORK.—

Time of beginning—	Time of ending—
7.30 a.m.	12.30 p.m. on the day on which the half-holiday is observed locally.
7.30 a.m.	6 p.m. on the other five working days of the week.

(4) OVERTIME.—The rate of time and a half shall be paid for all time worked—

- (a) Outside the hours fixed as the times of beginning and ending work.
- (b) Within the hours so fixed in excess of nine hours on Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday, Friday, and four hours on Saturday.
- (c) Within the hours so fixed in excess of the number of hours fixed for a week's work, excluding that provided for under (b).

(5) TIME WAGES.—Any person employed on time wages for less than the number of hours fixed for an ordinary week's work shall for each hour worked up to one-half the number of hours fixed be paid :—

- (a) in any week in which two or more public holidays occur At the ordinary wages rate, with an addition of fifty per centum.
- (b) in any other week At the ordinary wages rate, with an addition of thirty-three and one-third per centum.

(6) SUNDAYS AND PUBLIC HOLIDAYS.—That double time shall be paid for all work done on Sundays, New Year's Day, 26th January (Australia Day), Good Friday, Easter Saturday, Easter Monday, 21st April (Labour Day), King's Birthday, Christmas Day, and Boxing Day; but if any other day be by Act of Parliament or Proclamation substituted for any of the above-named holidays, the special rate shall only be payable for work done on the day so substituted.

(7) PIECE-WORK.—The lowest piece-work prices to be paid to any person for doing work of the description referred to in the following Schedule shall be—

Machine repairing wool packs (employer to provide twine)	2d. each	
Machine repairing first selection washed sugar bags, by darning only (employer to provide twine)	4d. per dozen, with 10% added.	
Machine repairing washed sugar bags (employer to provide twine)	5d. "	} with 12% added
Machine repairing ordinary bags (employer to provide twine)	3½d. "	
Machine repairing mill, coal, lime, or hide bags (employer to provide twine)	9½d. "	
Machine repairers on piece-work shall also be paid 9½d. per hour for any time occupied in cleaning machines or cutting patches.		
Hand repairing ordinary bags (employee to provide twine)	8½d. per dozen

Hand repairing wool packs (employee to provide twine)	4d. each	

(8) PIECE-WORK WHICH MAY BE FIXED BY AN EMPLOYER.—The Board determines, under the provisions of Section 150 of the *Factories and Shops Act 1928* (No. 3677), that any employer may fix and pay piece-work prices to any person employed at repairing by machine bags other than those for which the Board has fixed a piece-work price (employer to provide twine), provided that any such employer shall base such piece-work prices on the earnings of an average worker working under like conditions, and such piece-work prices shall be fixed so that an average worker can earn not less than the wages rates that are fixed by the Board for such work.

DETERMINATION OF THE PROCESS ENGRAVERS BOARD.

NOTE.—This Determination on the 4th January, 1937, applied to the following parts of Victoria, namely:—The Metropolitan District as defined in the Factories and Shops Acts and the Order in Council thereunder, and such portions of the city of Sandringham as are not included in the said District; the cities of Ballarat, Bendigo, Geelong, Geelong West, and Warrnambool; the town of Newtown and Chilwell; and the boroughs of Eaglehawk and Sebastopol.

IN accordance with the provisions of the Factories and Shops Acts, the Special Board appointed to "determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any person or persons or classes of persons employed in the process, trade, or business of a Process Engraver," has made the following Determination, namely:—

(1) That on the 4th January, 1937, the last previous Determination of this Board shall be revoked and replaced by this Determination.

2. Outside the Metropolitan District one apprentice to every three or fraction of three workers receiving not less than 102s. per week.			

(3) ADJUSTMENT OF BASIC WAGE AND OF ADULT MINIMUM WAGE.

Pursuant to the provisions of Section 21 of the Factories and Shops Act of 1934, the wage rates for adult males shall be automatically increased or decreased by the same amount, and at the same time, as the basic wage shown hereunder is adjusted in accordance with the following provisions of this clause:—

(a) For work done before the beginning of the first pay period to commence in June, 1937, the amount of the basic wage shall be 69s.

(b) For work done during each future successive period beginning with the first pay period to commence in June or December, the amount of the basic wage shall be adjusted by the following method according to the position and fluctuations (if any) of the Commonwealth Statisticians "All Items" retail price index numbers.

For the purposes of this Determination the expression "Commonwealth Statisticians' retail price index numbers" or any like expression means the numbers stated to be such index numbers in any document purporting, and not proved to be wrongly so purporting, to be printed by the Commonwealth Government Printer or to be signed by or on behalf of the Commonwealth Statistician.

1. Adjustment is to be based upon the equating of index number 1,000 with a wage of 81s., the amount assessed upon that number of the declared ordinary basic wage per week of the Commonwealth Court of Conciliation and Arbitration.

2. The index number to be applied is that assigned to Melbourne.

3. The index number for the six months ending March and September next preceding the half-year for which the adjustment is made is to be ascertained.

4. The amount assigned in the following table (or in any extension thereof) to the index number division comprising that number is to be ascertained.

5. The basic wage shall be of that assigned amount during such half-year.

Provided, however, that if that assigned amount of the basic wage be different by less than 2s. from the last current amount of the basic wage, then that last current amount of all rates shall continue unchanged during such period.

The index number divisions in this table are based upon the equating of the index number 1,000 with a basic wage of 81s. per week, and any necessary extension may be made by reference to the Table of Wages containing 1s. divisions authorized by the Commonwealth Court of Conciliation and Arbitration.

The minimum rates of wages to be paid to persons working on a day shift shall be determined in the following manner.

ADULT MALES.

Where the work is performed by an adult male in the area to which this Determination applies the employee shall be paid the sum (being the "basic" wage) mentioned in the second column of Table B, and where the employee is performing the work usually performed by any class of employee mentioned in Table C, he shall be paid the sum (being the marginal difference) prescribed in the said Table C, applicable to such class of work.

(4) DEFINITION.—A juvenile worker is any person under 17 years of age (other than an apprentice or improver) who may be employed for not more than one year in cleaning, attending on operator, rooking baths, mounting, or proving

(5) HOURS.—The number of hours for an ordinary week's work shall be:—

Day shift	44 hours
Night shift (excluding persons engaged in daily newspaper offices)	35 ..

(6) TIMES OF BEGINNING AND ENDING WORK.—For all persons other than those engaged in daily newspaper offices:—

(7) OVERTIME—

(a) In daily newspaper offices any employee who works for any time in excess of 8 hours in any one day or in excess of 44 hours in any week shall be paid for such extra time at the rate of time and a half.

(b) In all other places overtime calculated on the ordinary rates shall be paid for as follows:—

(8) WORK DONE AFTER MIDNIGHT.—Work done after midnight (except in daily newspaper offices) shall be paid for at double rates calculated on the ordinary rates.

(9) SPECIAL RATE.—All work done (except in daily newspaper offices) on night shift between the hours of 6 p.m. and 11 p.m. shall be paid for at 1s. per hour in addition to the ordinary rate.

(10) PUBLIC HOLIDAYS.—Double time shall be paid for all work done (except in daily newspaper offices) on Sundays, New Year's Day, 26th January (Australia Day), Good Friday, Easter Monday, 21st April (Labour Day), Christmas Day, and Boxing Day; but if any other day be by Act of Parliament or Proclamation substituted for any of the above-named holidays, the special rate shall only be payable for work done on the day so substituted.

(11) HOLIDAY PAY (employees in daily newspaper offices excepted)—

(a) Every employee (including every apprentice) who has been in continuous employment in any one factory for a period of not less than the last six months preceding Christmas Day in any year and who is not required to work on the days between Christmas Day and New Year's Day (inclusive) shall receive a sum of one-half of his ordinary wage for each usual working day in that period.

(b) Every employee (including every apprentice) who was employed on any one of the six working days immediately preceding any of the following days:—Australia Day, Labour Day, Anzac Day, Good Friday, Easter Monday, King's Birthday, and Melbourne Cup Day, and who is not required to work on these days shall receive a sum of one-half of his ordinary wage for each such day.

(12) MEAL TIME.—Each person employed on night shift shall receive a meal time of not less than one hour.

(13) NOTICE OF INTENTION TO WORK OVERTIME.—In every case where practicable an employer shall give 24 hours' notice to each employee of his intention to work such employee overtime. In each case where such notice has not been given and the employee is required to work overtime for not less than one hour he shall receive one shilling as tea money, in addition to any other special payments provided.

(14) EMPLOYEE RECALLED TO WORK (employees in daily newspaper offices excepted).—Any employee having ceased work for the day and who after a period of not less than one hour has been recalled to work shall receive at least the equivalent of three hours' pay for the class of work done.

(15) TRANSPORT.—Where an employee is required to work so late that the ordinary transport services are not available for his conveyance home special means shall be provided by the employer.
