## DETERMINATION OF THE POTTERY BOARD.

Note.—This Determination applies to the whole of the State of Victoria.

IN accordance with the provisions of the Factories and Shops Acts, the Wages Board which since the 27th day of November, 1939, has had the power "to determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any person or persons or classes of persons employed in the process, trade, or business of:—

- (a) making pottery, tiles or pipes, except where such work is subject to the Determination of any Wages Board heretofore appointed.
- (b) digging clay, except where such work is subject to the Determination of any Wages Board heretofore appointed" has made the following Determination, namely:—
- (1) That on the 21st February, 1940, the last previous Determination of this Board shall be revoked and replaced by this Determination.

One female apprentice to every two or fraction of two female workers receiving not less than the minimum wage.

An amended indenture of Apprenticeship prescribed by the Board was approved on 31st May, 1926.

### Improvers.

Three male improvers to every four or fraction of four male workers receiving not less than the minimum wage. Three female improvers to every female worker receiving not less than the minimum wage.

(6) Holidays.—(a) All employees shall be entitled to the eight holidays hereinafter mentioned without deduction of pay:—New Year's Day, Australia Day, Labour Day, Good Friday, Easter Monday, King's Birthday, Christmas Day, and Boxing Day.

(b) Terminating employment in relation to a holiday. Where the employer terminates the employer within a period of fourteen days of a day on which a holiday occurs, and such employee is re-employed by the same employer within a period of fourteen days after such holiday, the employee shall be paid for such holiday or holidays prescribed by this determination, provided that such employee has been employed by the same employer for a period of at least one month immediately prior to the termination of employment.

(7) Tea Money.—An allowance of 1s. 6d. for tea money shall be made where work extends for more than two hours beyond the usual time of ending work provided the employer has not given notice the day before of intention to work overtime.

(8) BURNERS.—A burner shall be paid for the full number of hours of the shift worked.
