## DETERMINATION OF THE SLAUGHTERING FOR EXPORT BOARD.

NOTE.—This Determination applies to the whole of the State of Victoria.

IN accordance with the provisions of the Factories and Shops Acts the Wages Board which since the 13th October, 1941, has had the power to "determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any person or classes of persons (other than persons subject to the provisions of any Wages Board heretofore appointed) employed in the meat export trade

- (a) slaughterers or dressers of sheep, lambs, cattle, pigs, or calves;  
 (b) boners, trimmers, or labourers;  
 (c) drovers, stockmen, or penners-up;  
 (d) skin store workers;"

has made the following Determination, namely:—

1. That on the 16th October, 1944, the last previous Determination of this Board shall be revoked and replaced by this Determination.

### SECTION A.

#### SHEEP AND LAMBS.

2.

(a) Rates of Pay—

(i) Chain System as hereinafter described—

To slaughtermen employed in Group A, 4s. 3½d. plus 1½d. war loading (total 4s. 4½d.)	} Rams double rates.
per 100 sheep or lambs slaughtered	
To slaughtermen employed in Group B, 4s. 2½d. plus 1½d. war loading (total 4s. 3½d.)	}
per 100 sheep or lambs slaughtered	

To learners—

For the first 21 days of employment—

From Monday to Friday inclusive .. .. .	23s. 6d. plus 1s. 1d. war loading (total 24s. 7d.) per day.
Saturday .. .. .	11s. 9d. plus 7d. war loading (total 12s. 4d.).

Thereafter until considered competent by the employer—

From Monday to Friday inclusive .. .. .	28s. 11d. plus 1s. 1d. war loading (total 30s.) per day.
Saturday .. .. .	14s. 5d. plus 7d. war loading (total 15s.).

The amount to be paid to learners in each team shall be deducted from the total earnings of such team and the balance shall be divided equally between the remainder of such team.

No person under the age of 18 years shall be employed as a learner.

When one team only is employed, the composite rate of 49s. 5½d. plus 1s. 3d. war loading (total 50s. 8½d.) per 100 sheep or lambs slaughtered shall be divided equally between the members of Groups A and B.

When two or more teams are employed, men employed in Group A shall divide 4s. 3½d. plus 1½d. war loading (total 4s. 4½d.) per 100 sheep or lambs slaughtered equally between them, and men employed in Group B shall divide 4s. 2½d. plus 1½d. war loading (total 4s. 3½d.) per 100 sheep or lambs slaughtered equally between them.

The following employees shall not be included as members of the team and shall be paid as hereunder:—

To men employed as pointsmen, washers, wipers, and stringers—

Such men shall be paid by the employer at the rate hereinafter prescribed for other labourers, and juvenile wipers, washers, and stringers shall be paid at the rate hereinafter prescribed for juvenile workers.

Employees engaged as trimmers either on the chain or ring shall be paid at "Other Labourers" rate for the first 2,000 sheep or lambs handled daily per employee and thereafter an additional daily rate of 6d. per 100 sheep or lambs.

Employees engaged as pushers—in to chain or ring, i.e., feeding from the bleeding rail to the legging table, shall be paid at "Other Labourers" rate for the first 2,000 sheep or lambs handled daily per employee and thereafter an additional daily rate of 9d. per 100 sheep or lambs.

Employees engaged inserting spreader on the chain shall be paid at "Other Labourers" rate for the first 2,000 sheep or lambs handled daily per employee and thereafter an additional daily rate of 6d. per 100 sheep or lambs.

Employees engaged inserting spreader on the ring shall be paid at "Other Labourers" rate for the first 2,000 sheep or lambs handled daily per employee and thereafter an additional daily rate of 6d. per 100 sheep or lambs.

Employees engaged changing from long hook to gambrel and slide on the chain shall be paid at "Other Labourers" rate for the first 2,000 sheep or lambs handled daily per employee and thereafter an additional daily rate of 1s. per 100 sheep or lambs.

Employees engaged changing over on the ring shall be paid at "Other Labourers" rate for the first 4,000 sheep or lambs handled daily per employee and thereafter an additional daily rate of 6d. per 100 sheep or lambs.

In the event of more than one employee being engaged on one of the before-mentioned tasks, the additional daily rate above 2,000 or 4,000 per employee as the case may be shall be divided between those so employed on such task.

For the purpose of calculating payment in each instance 15 or over in each multiple of 25 sheep or lambs to be paid for as at 25 and under 15 to be disregarded.

(ii) Solo System as hereinafter described—

To slaughtermen employed on the solo system 49s. 5½d. plus 1s. 3d. war loading (total 50s. 8½d.) per 100 sheep or lambs slaughtered. Rams—double rates.

(b) Duties of Slaughtermen—

Men employed slaughtering sheep or lambs may be employed upon either the chain system or the solo system.

(i) Chain System.—Slaughtermen slaughtering sheep or lambs upon the chain system shall be organized into a team or teams. Each team shall be divided into the following groups:—

Group A.—Men employed in catching, sticking, shackling.

Group B.—Men employed in skinning hind legs and removing hind trotters, placing long hooks and removing shackle, skinning fore legs, removing tongue and sweetbread, tying weasand, punching briskets, removing spreader, splitting skins, removing front trotters, flanking and thumbing up, clearing tail and rectum gut, punching off skins, scalping and removing heads, gutting, removing pluck, splitting down briskets.

(ii) Solo System.—A slaughterman may be employed in individually performing the complete process of slaughtering, trimming and dressing sheep or lambs. Such slaughterman shall perform, in addition to trimming, such of the duties referred to in the preceding paragraph as are applicable to a solo slaughterman.

(c) Daggy, Maggoty, Diseased Sheep and Lambs and Full Wool Sheep:—

(i) Daggy and/or maggoty sheep and old lambs shall be treated before being stuck.

(ii) Double rates shall be paid for diseased sheep and/or lambs which are condemned by the Veterinary Officer or Chief Meat Inspector for diseases contagious to human beings.

(iii) Full wool sheep shall be paid for at rate and a half after 1st September.

3.

CATTLE.

(a) Rate of Pay to Slaughtermen.—2s. 9½d. plus 1d. war loading (total 2s. 10½d.) per head of cattle slaughtered.

Bulls, 500 lb. to 600 lb., freezer weight—rate and a half. Over 600 lb., freezer weight—double rates.

Downer cattle, i.e. cattle which are carted to the killing pen—double rates.

(b) Duties of Slaughtermen—

Men slaughtering cattle shall be divided into the following classes—

Class A.—Men employed grounding, backing off, skinning tail.

Class B.—Men employed knocking down, shackling, hoisting to bleeding rail, sticking, cutting off heads, placing heads on slide or table, sawing horns, lowering, footing off, pritching, cutting brisket and sitch, lowering weasand, freeing heart fat, saving sweetbreads, removing caul fat, sawing brisket and sitch, placing rollers, hoisting, wiping, landing, necking off, dropping hide down chute, fronting out, chopping or machine sawing.

Class C.—Men employed spining, wiping hindquarters, washing chine bone, scrubbing ribs and brisket, wiping forequarters.

(c) Organization—

(i) Team System.—An employer may organize a team of employees consisting of not less than seven men in the proportion of 2 Class A, 4 Class B, 1 Class C or any multiple thereof. The total earnings shall be divided among the members of such team as follows:—Class A three ninths, Class B five ninths, Class C one ninth. The amount allotted to each class shall be divided equally among the members of such class.

(ii) Gang System.—An employer may permit any number of men, not exceeding six, to form themselves into a gang. The total earnings of such gang shall be divided between the members of such gang in such proportion as shall be mutually agreed upon between the employer and all of the members of such gang.

CALVES.

Rates of pay to men slaughtering calves on the chain system or by the solo system—

Calves 100 lb. and under, skin on .. .. . 45s. 10½d. plus 1s. 3d. war loading (total 47s. 1½d.) per 100 calves.

Calves 100 lb. and under, skin off, mechanically removed .. .. . 54s. 1d. plus 1s. 3d. war loading (total 55s. 4d.) per 100 calves.

Calves, 101 lb. to 150 lb., skin on .. .. . 59s. 2½d. plus 1s. 3d. war loading (total 60s. 5½d.) per 100 calves.

Calves, 101 lb. to 150 lb., skin off, mechanically removed .. .. . 69s. 6d. plus 1s. 3d. war loading (total 70s. 9d.) per 100 calves.

Calves, 151 lb. to 200 lb., skin on .. .. . 71s. 6½d. plus 1s. 3d. war loading (total 72s. 9½d.) per 100 calves.

Calves, 151 lb. to 200 lb., skin off, mechanically removed .. .. . 86s. 11½d. plus 1s. 3d. war loading (total 88s. 2½d.) per 100 calves.

Calf skimmers engaged skinning cold calves—

Monday to Friday inclusive .. .. . 24s. 7d. plus 1s. war loading (total 25s. 7d.) per day.

Saturday .. .. . 12s. 3d. plus 1s. war loading (total 13s. 3d.).

The weights referred to above are as stated, either including the weight of skin where the rate is quoted with skin on or excluding the weight of skin where the rate is quoted with skin off.

(a) Rates of pay to men slaughtering pigs—

Machine dehaired—

If pigs are put through singeing machine 6d. per head shall be added to the above rates.

(b) Duties of slaughtermen slaughtering pigs.—Knocking down or stunning, shackling and hoisting to bleeding rail, sticking, handling into and in scald tank, handling out of scald tank into machine, handling out of machine, scraping, shaving and thoroughly cleaning, opening up and removing viscera, washing and hanging off, chopping or sawing down, washing and tucking up.

RATES OF PAY TO BONERS.

6. Boners may be employed at the daily rates as prescribed in clause 8 hereof or at the following piece-work prices which, in respect of beef or mutton, shall not apply until the following daily quota has been completed:—

(a) (1) When a 5½-day week is worked the quota shall be:—

for an ordinary day (Monday to Friday inclusive)—

(i) beef—8½ bodies.

(ii) mutton—61 carcasses.

for a Saturday—

(i) beef—3½ bodies,

(ii) mutton—20 carcasses.

(2) When a five day week is worked the quota shall be :—

- (i) beef—9½ bodies,
- (ii) mutton—65 carcasses.

(b) Piece-work prices referred to above are :—

(i) Mutton :—6d. for each additional carcass in excess of the daily quota.  
Rams shall be paid for at double rates whenever done and in addition an employee shall be paid 1½d. for each carcass ribbed and bird caged.

For the purposes of this sub-clause—  
Two flying foxes shall equal one carcass.  
Three trunks shall equal two carcasses.  
Three pairs of legs shall equal one carcass.  
Three pairs of loins shall equal one carcass.  
Three pairs of hindquarters shall equal two carcasses.

(ii) Beef :—3s. and 9d. respectively for each additional body or quarter of beef (all-in-weights) in excess of the daily quota.

Bulls shall be paid for at double rates whenever done.

For the purposes of this sub-clause—  
Five briskets shall equal one quarter of beef.  
Two rumps and loins shall equal one quarter of beef.  
Four clods and stickings shall equal one quarter of beef.  
Fifteen shins shall equal one quarter of beef.  
Two necks and blades shall equal one quarter of beef.  
Two ribs and two briskets shall equal one quarter of beef.  
Three crops shall equal two quarters of beef.  
Three shoulders shall equal two quarters of beef.  
Three chucks and blades shall equal two quarters of beef.  
Three horses' heads shall equal two quarters of beef.  
Five butts shall equal two quarters of beef.

Surplus Fore-quarters i.e., those fore-quarters which have been purchased or acquired under the Acquisition Plan and being additional fore-quarters to the full bodies being treated.

Three pairs of hindquarters of veal shall equal two carcasses.

(d) Pork.—At the rate of 1s. 6d. per 100 lb. bone-in-weight. The work to be done on pork shall be as follows :—  
Meat to be boned out, rinded and defatted to the satisfaction of the employer.

**Boners on piece-work shall work 44 hours per week and the standard of boning shall be carried out to the entire satisfaction of the employer.**

RATES OF PAY TO SLICERS AND TRIMMERS.

7. Slicers and trimmers may be employed at the daily rates as prescribed in clause 8 hereof or at the following piece-work prices which shall not apply until the following daily quota has been completed :—

(a) When a five and a half day week is worked the quota shall be :—

(1) for an ordinary day (Monday to Friday inclusive)—

(i) beef—thirteen bodies, provided that when work is done on surplus fore-quarters as defined in clause 6 (b) (ii) the quota shall be :—

OVERTIME.

- 10. When a six-day week is worked—
- From Monday to Friday inclusive—
- Outside the times of beginning and ending work, or in excess of 8 hours 10 minutes work, time and a half or rate and a half.
- Saturday—
- Outside the times of beginning and ending work, or in excess of 3 hours 10 minutes work, time and a half or rate and a half.
- When a five-day week is worked—
- All time worked in excess of 8 hours 48 minutes on Monday to Friday inclusive and all time worked on Saturday, time and a half or rate and a half.

NOTE.—Overtime and penalty rates shall be calculated on ordinary rates of pay, excluding war loadings.

DEFINITION.

11. A juvenile worker shall mean a person under 21 years of age employed only in performing one or more of the following tasks, viz.:—Washing, wiping, stringing, picking sweetbreads and crown fat, packing kidneys and livers, tying on tags and strings, pinning tails, picking up wool pieces, veining, sweeping, carrying gambrels, slides and spreaders, washing and packing hearts, stamp-marking carcasses, feeding grade elevator, working in the beef house for the purpose of learning the trade.

WAITING TIME.

12. (a) If any employee covered by the team slaughtering clause comes to work at an hour specified by the employer, or if he comes to work at the usual hour without being notified previously that he shall not be required, he shall (except in the case hereinafter mentioned) be paid as from that hour at the rate of 3s. per hour until he be started work on that day, or until one hour after notice that he shall not be required on that day. The excepted case is that of his being started at work within 15 minutes after the hour specified or usual time, as the case may be.

(b) When slaughtermen, at the request of employers, have to wait the arrival of stock, or have interrupted killings during the day for causes other than a break down of machinery, they shall be entitled to payment after the first fifteen minutes at the rate of 3s. per hour for such delay.

(c) When the minimum period in either section of this clause is exceeded, the payment for waiting time shall commence from the beginning of the period.

## MEAL TIME.

13. (a) Stickers shall be allowed one hour for a meal between 11.45 a.m. and 12.45 p.m.  
 (b) Team slaughtermen shall be allowed one hour for a meal between 12 noon and 1.15 p.m.  
 (c) All other employees shall be allowed one hour for a meal between 12 noon and 1.30 p.m.

## SMOKOS.

14. All employees shall be allowed fifteen minutes smoko between 9 a.m. and 10 a.m., and fifteen minutes smoko between 3 p.m. and 4 p.m.; provided that stickers shall commence their smokos fifteen minutes earlier than the team slaughtermen.

## GRINDSTONES.

15. An employer shall provide grindstones in the proportion of one grindstone to every 20 slaughtermen employed by him.

## WATERPROOF CLOTHING.

16. Waterproof boots and waterproof aprons shall be provided by the employer free of charge to employees engaged as washers and scrubbers. Such boots and aprons shall remain the property of the employer.

## SPECIAL RATES.

17. Slaughtermen shall be paid double rate and all other employees shall be paid double time for all work done on Sundays, Christmas Day, Boxing Day, New Year's Day, Australia Day, Labour Day, Good Friday, Easter Monday, Cup Day, and Butchers' Picnic Day; but if any other day be by Act of Parliament or Proclamation substituted for any of the above-named holidays, the special rate shall only be payable for work done on the day so substituted.

## HOLIDAYS.

18. All employees (other than slaughtermen) shall be entitled to the ten holidays hereinafter mentioned at ordinary daily rates of pay, provided that such employee has been employed during any portion of the working week in which any one or more of such holidays is observed, viz.:—Christmas Day, Boxing Day, New Year's Day, Australia Day, Labour Day, Anzac Day, Good Friday, Easter Monday, Cup Day, and Butchers' Picnic Day; but if any other day be by Act of Parliament or Proclamation substituted for any of the above-mentioned holidays in any place, all employees in that place shall be entitled to such day in lieu of the holiday for which it was substituted.

## ANNUAL LEAVE OF ABSENCE.

19. Any employee on the completion of twelve months' service with an employer may at a time, arranged with the employer, take one week's leave of absence.

NOTE.—For the purpose of this clause, Annual Leave and Sick Leave is progressively paid for by the addition of an added rate as the case may be to the hourly, daily, and/or piece-work rates of pay.

## WEIGHTS.

20. All weights referred to shall mean the frozen weights of animals slaughtered.

## SKINS.

21. Skins and hides shall be taken off free from cuts and tears.

## TALLY BOARD.

22. Each employer using the team system of slaughtering shall cause to be hung in a conspicuous place a blackboard, on which shall be recorded the daily tally and the number of men on each chain.

## PAY DAY.

23. Wages shall be paid weekly and not later than Friday, provided that where killing has ceased for the working week wages shall be paid on the day in which such cessation occurs.

## MEAL ALLOWANCE.

24. Employees required to work overtime for more than one and a half hours on any day without having been notified on the preceding day that they would be required so to work shall be paid the amount of 2s. in addition to any overtime payment to which they may be entitled.

## KNIVES TO BE SUPPLIED.

25. Knives which shall remain the property of the employer shall be supplied under the following conditions to labourers when necessary for the performance of their duties:—

- (i) They shall be returned to the employer on termination of the employment or at the end of the season.  
 (ii) If such knives are not returned the employer shall be entitled to deduct their cost from any money owing to the employee.

## RIGHT OF ENTRY.

26. A duly accredited representative of the Australasian Meat Industry Employees Union shall have the right to enter employers' premises during the meal hour for the purpose of interviewing employees on legitimate Union business on the following conditions:—

- (a) that he produces his authority to the manager or such other person as may be appointed by the employer;  
 (b) that he interviews employees only at the place where they are taking their meal;  
 (c) that not more than one representative visits the premises at any one time;  
 (d) that not more than one representative visits the same premises more than once in a week; and  
 (e) that if any employer alleges that a representative is unduly interfering with his business or is creating disaffection amongst his employees or is offensive in his methods or is committing a breach of any of the previous conditions such employer may refuse the right of entry.

## SECTION B.

## DROVERS, STOCKMEN, OR PENNERS-UP.

## 27. ADULT WORKERS.

- Men picking up stock at Newmarket Sale Yards—22s. plus 6d. war loading (total, 22s. 6d.), per day.

**EXPENSES.**

32. The employer shall pay all out-of-pocket expenses reasonably and necessarily incurred by the employee whilst on trips to the country for the purpose of lifting stock.

**ALLOWANCE FOR DOGS.**

33. An amount of one shilling per day shall be paid by the employer to each drover, stockman or penner-up towards the maintenance of the dog or dogs (irrespective of the number) used by each such drover, stockman or penner-up in the course of his carrying out the job or service required by that employer.

**PERIODICAL ADJUSTMENT OF WAGES.**

34. The wages rates for males set out in clauses 2 to 8, 27, and 28 are based upon the following basic wage, and pursuant to and in accordance with the provisions of section 21 of the *Factories and Shops Act 1934*, the Board hereby determines that such rates shall be automatically increased or decreased in proportion to the increase or decrease in the basic wage.

## DETERMINATION OF THE PLUMBERS BOARD.

NOTES.—(1) This Determination applies to the whole of the State of Victoria.

(2) Plumbing and Gasfitting were proclaimed on the 10th October, 1928, as Apprenticeship Trades under the *Apprenticeship Act 1928*, for the Metropolitan District, and on the 23rd March, 1938, for the City of Ballarat and the borough of Sebastopol, and the cities of Geelong and Geelong West, the town of Newtown and Chilwell, and the Moorpanyal riding of the shire of Corio.

Full particulars of the *Apprenticeship Regulations* for these trades may be obtained on application to the Secretary, *Apprenticeship Commission, Gisborne-street, Melbourne, C.2.*

IN accordance with the provisions of the Factories and Shops Acts, the Wages Board, which, since the 24th April, 1939, has had the power to "determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any person or persons or classes of persons wheresoever employed in any plumbing work (including electrical or gasfitting) or employed in fixing any material used instead of metal for pipes, guttering, or roof covering (other than slates or tiles) in connexion with the erection or repair of buildings"—

has made the following determination, namely:—

1. That as from the beginning of the first pay period to commence on or after the 7th November, 1944, the last previous Determination of this Board shall be revoked and replaced by this Determination.

- ALLOWANCES.**  
 6. The following allowances in addition to wages rates shall be paid :—  
 (a) To a person employed on work away from the centre—

- (i) An amount equal to the fares payable by the most convenient public conveyance to go from and to the centre to and from his work.  
 The provisions of this sub-clause shall not apply to the Metropolitan Gas Company or where the employer provides a convenient conveyance.  
 (ii) For time necessarily occupied in travelling from and to the centre to and from his work—

 7. Where an employee is required to work overtime in excess of one hour, and has not been given notice of same on the previous working day, he shall be allowed an amount of 1s. 6d. for a meal.

**EMPLOYEE ATTENDING FOR DUTY.**

When an employee in accordance with directions given by an employer or his responsible representative, attends for duty at the place so directed, but his services are not required, such employee shall be paid 5s. and an amount equal to the fares to and from such place: Provided that where on any day work is commenced and is stopped before noon owing to wet or inclement weather, the employee shall be paid up to noon and then released from further attendance on that day. Where owing to wet or inclement weather work is stopped after noon, the employee shall be paid up to the time at which work usually ends.

**TOOLS AND APPLIANCES.**  
 9. That if any employee is required to provide any or all of the following tools or appliances :—  
 Caulking-irons, drilling frame and chain, tap key, chain wrenches, files, grips or tongs of over 12 inches in length, hacksaw frame or blades, mandrils, dummies, metal pots, pipe cutters, plumbing irons, ratchets, stocks, dies, drills for stone, taps and drills for brass or iron threads, or vyces—  
 1s. per hour in addition to the ordinary rates fixed by this Determination shall be paid by the employer.

**CASUAL LABOUR.**  
 10. Casual employees (i.e., persons employed during the week for not more than one-half the maximum number of hours fixed in this Determination as a week's work) shall be paid at the ordinary hourly rate with an addition of 10 per centum.

**TERMINATION OF EMPLOYMENT.**  
 11. One hour's notice of termination of employment shall be given by either employer or employee, or one hour's pay shall be paid or forfeited in lieu thereof. Such hour shall be allowed the employee to gather, clean, pack, and transport his tools.

**SHIP WORK.**  
 12. (i) All work done on a ship of any class—  
 (a) whilst it is under way; or  
 (b) in wet places or confined spaces; or  
 (c) in a ship which has done one trip or more, in oil fuel tanks, in bilges under engine-room or stokehold or on soil pipes—  
 shall be paid for at the rate of 8d. per hour in addition to the ordinary wage.

(ii) For the purposes of this paragraph—  
 "Wet Place" means one in which the clothing of the workman necessarily is wetted to an uncomfortable degree, or one in which water accumulates underfoot to a depth exceeding two inches.  
 "Confined Space" means one of which the dimensions are such that the workman must work in a stooped or cramped position, or without adequate ventilation, or where confinement within a limited space is productive of unusual discomfort to him.

(iii) Should the employer and the workman be unable to agree whether or not any work done by the latter is such as entitles him to the additional wage provided by this paragraph, the question is to be submitted to a Referee, chosen by the parties, whose decision will be binding on both of them. In the event of the parties being unable to agree on a Referee, application is to be made to the Secretary of the Department of Labour of the State of Victoria to appoint an Inspector to determine the matter in dispute, and the decision of such Inspector will be binding on both of them.

DAY FOR PAYMENT OF WAGES.

13. Wages, allowances and other moneys due shall be paid not later than 5 p.m. on Thursday of each working week. On termination of employment by the employer, all wages, allowances and other moneys shall be paid at the time of dismissal. The employee shall not be deemed to have ceased employment until he has been paid.

The provisions of this clause shall not apply in respect to persons employed by the Metropolitan Gas Company.

ANNUAL LEAVE.

14. (a) Except as hereinafter provided a period of seven consecutive days' leave shall be allowed annually to all employees after twelve months' continuous service (less the period of annual leave).

(b) Annual leave shall be given at a time fixed by the employer within a period not exceeding three months from the date when the right to annual leave accrued and after not less than one week's notice to the employee concerned.

(c) An employer may allow annual leave to an employee before the right thereto has accrued due, but where leave is taken in such a case a further period of annual leave shall not commence to accrue until after the expiration of the twelve months in respect to which annual leave had been taken before it accrued.

(d) If after six months' continuous service in any qualifying twelve-monthly period an employee leaves his employment or his employment is terminated by the employer through no fault of the employee the employee shall be paid one-sixth of a week's wage in respect of each completed two months of continuous service in respect of which leave has not been granted hereunder.

(e) Each employee before going on leave shall be paid a week's wage. For the purpose of this sub-clause and sub-clause (d) hereof the week's wage shall be at the rate prescribed by clause 2 of this Determination for the occupation in which the employee was ordinarily employed immediately prior to the commencement of his leave or the termination of the employment as the case may be.

(f) The annual leave provided for by this clause shall be allowed and shall be taken and except as provided by sub-clause (d) hereof payment shall not be made or accepted in lieu of annual leave.

(g) Notwithstanding anything herein provided an employer who gives to an employee leave of absence without loss of pay throughout the interval of time—

(i) between the days observed hereunder as the Christmas Day holiday and the New Year's Day holiday; or

(ii) between the day immediately preceding the Good Friday holiday and the Monday next after the Easter Monday holiday shall be deemed thereby to fulfil all obligations to that employee under this clause in respect of the period of twelve months' service referred to in sub-clause (a) hereof. The provisions of sub-clause (c) hereof shall apply to this sub-clause.

(h) Where leave has been granted to an employee pursuant to sub-clause (c) or (g) hereof before the right thereto has accrued due and the employee subsequently leaves or is discharged from the service of the employer before completing the twelve months' continuous service in respect of which the leave was granted the employer may for each two complete months of the qualifying period of twelve months not served by the employee deduct from whatever remuneration is payable upon the termination of the employment one-sixth of the amount of wage paid on account of the annual leave, which amount shall not include any sums paid for any of the holidays prescribed in clause 5 of this Determination.

(i) For the purposes of this clause service shall be deemed to be continuous notwithstanding—

(i) any interruption or determination of the employment by the employer if such interruption or determination has been made merely with the intention of avoiding obligations hereunder in respect of leave of absence;

(ii) any absence from work on account of sickness or accident or military service and in calculating the period of twelve months' continuous service absence on account of sickness or accident to the extent of fourteen days in any twelve months shall be deemed to be part of the period of continuous service; or

(iii) any termination of the employment by the employee if such termination has been made merely with the intention of preventing the operation of sub-clause (g) hereof.

(j) For the purpose of this clause a month shall be reckoned as commencing with the beginning of the first day of the employment or period of employment in question and as ending at the beginning of the day which in the latest month in question has the same date number as that which the commencing day had in its month and if there be no such day in such subsequent month shall be reckoned as ending at the end of such subsequent month.

(k) Where the employer is a successor or assignee or transferee of a business if an employee was in the employment of the employer's predecessor at the time when he became such successor or assignee or transferee the employee in respect of the period during which he was in the services of the predecessor shall for the purpose of this clause be deemed to be in the service of the employer.

PERIODICAL ADJUSTMENT OF WAGES.

15. The wages rates set out in clause 2 are based upon the following basic wage and pursuant to the provisions of section 21 of the *Factories and Shops Act 1934*, shall be automatically increased or decreased by the same amount, and at the same time, as such basic wage.

The basic wage shall be adjusted as prescribed in clause 16.

One female apprentice to every three or fraction of three female workers receiving not less than 63s. 6d. per week of 44 hours.

## Improvers.

## MALES.

Two male improvers to every male worker receiving not less than 106s. per week of 44 hours.

## FEMALES.

Four female improvers to every female worker receiving not less than 63s. 6d. per week of 44 hours.

## TERMS OF ENGAGEMENT.

3. Employees who work less than 44 hours in any week may be paid *pro rata* according to the number of hours worked.

## OVERTIME.

4.—

- (a) Places in which the week's work is performed in 5½ days—  
 Time worked in excess of 8 hours on any one day, Monday to Friday (inclusive) .. Time and a half.  
 Time worked in excess of 4 hours on Saturday .. .. . Time and a half.
- (b) Places in which the week's work is performed in 5 days—  
 Time worked in excess of 8 hours 48 minutes on any one day, Monday to Friday (inclusive) Time and a half.
- (c) Any time worked in excess of 44 hours in any week .. .. . Time and a half.

## TEA MONEY.

5. An allowance of 1s. 6d. for tea money shall be paid to all employees when work extends for more than two hours beyond the usual time of ending work.

## ALLOWANCES.

6. Employees who are required to wear, when at work, overalls, the laundering of which is not paid for by the employer, shall be paid the following allowance in addition to their ordinary weekly wage:—

Males aged 19 years and over .. .. .	2s. per week extra.
Males under 19 years .. .. .	1s. 6d. per week extra.
All females .. .. .	2s. per week extra.

## TIME BOOK OR OTHER RECORD.

7. The correct times of beginning and ending work shall be recorded daily in a book, time card, or by mechanical means to be furnished by the employer; such record to be open for inspection by the permanent Secretary-Treasurer of the Victorian Branch of the Biscuit Makers' Union of Australia.

## MEAL TIME.

8. A meal period of not less than 30 minutes and not more than one hour shall be allowed after a period of five hours' continuous work. Such meal period shall not be calculated as time worked.

## NIGHT WORK.

9.—

- (i) All employees working on night work between the hours of 9 p.m. and 6.30 a.m. shall receive the rate of 5s. per night additional to the usual wage rate: Provided that when the employee works for less than half of the normal shift such payment in addition to the usual wage shall be 2s. 6d.
- (ii) No female of any age shall be employed between the hours of 9 p.m. and 6.30 a.m.

## SHIFT WORK.

10. Each employee engaged on shift work shall have a break of 10 hours between shifts.

## SUNDAY WORK.

11. For all work done on Sunday, double time shall be paid with a minimum of 10s.

## PAYMENT FOR HOLIDAYS.

12. Employees shall be granted the following holidays without deduction of pay:—New Year's Day, Australia Day (26th January), Union Picnic Day, Good Friday, Easter Monday, Anzac Day, Labour Day, King's Birthday, Melbourne Cup Day, Christmas Day, and Boxing Day; or any other day substituted for the above days by Act of Parliament or Proclamation.

Double time shall be the rate for all work done on Sunday, New Year's Day, Australia Day (26th January), Good Friday, Easter Monday, Labour Day, King's Birthday, Melbourne Cup Day, Christmas Day, and Boxing Day, but if any other day be by Act of Parliament or Proclamation substituted for any of the above-named holidays, the special rate shall only be payable for work done on the day so substituted.

## ANNUAL LEAVE.

13. (a) Employers shall in each year give their employees continuously employed as herein defined seven consecutive days' leave.

(b) "Continuously employed" for the purpose of this clause means employed excepting breaks arising from sickness of work which shall be disregarded, for the six months immediately preceding the 25th day of each December. Any employee dismissed during the three weeks immediately preceding the 25th day of December shall be entitled to payment of one week's wage in lieu of annual leave.

(c) Employees who are not continuously employed for the six months immediately preceding the 25th day of December shall receive in lieu of annual leave one half day's wage for each complete month's service in that year or since their last annual leave, whichever is the shorter period.

(d) Annual leave shall be given at a time fixed by the employer within a period not exceeding three months from the date when the right to annual leave accrues and after not less than one week's notice to the employer: Provided that the giving of annual leave may, with the consent of the Secretary for Labour, be postponed for a period to be specified in cases where the exigencies of war render it impracticable to give it within the said period of three months.

(e) The employer may allow annual leave to an employee before the right thereto has accrued due but where leave is taken in such a case a further period of annual leave shall not commence to accrue until the expiration of the year in respect of which such annual leave has been taken.

(f) Each employee before going on leave shall be paid a week's wage or the proportionate amount under sub-clause (c) hereof. Payment in the case of employees on piecework shall be at the time rates prescribed for the respective classes of work.

## SICK PAY.

14.—

- (i) Any employee not attending for duty shall lose his or her pay for the actual time lost unless he or she produces or forwards within 24 hours of the commencement of such absence evidence satisfactory to the employer that his or her non-attendance was due to accident arising in the course of his or her employment or to personal ill-health, but such employee shall not be entitled to payment for non-attendance on the ground of such accident or personal ill-health for more than five days in any one year: Provided that during the first year of service with an employer he or she shall not be entitled to more than one day's sick pay for the first three months; two days' sick pay for the first six months; three days' sick pay for the first nine months. For the purposes of this clause "year" shall mean a period of twelve months commencing on 27th day of May in each year.
- (ii) Any employee on piecework not attending for duty on the ground of personal ill-health shall be paid at the corresponding timeworker's wage for the period of ill-health in all respects as if, during such period, he or she had been a weekly timeworker employed on such days and during such hours as are usually worked by timeworkers upon any day shift, and he or she shall comply with and be subject to the conditions for timeworkers prescribed in paragraph (i) of this clause.

## REST PERIOD.

15. Female employees shall be allowed a period of ten minutes in the morning and ten minutes in the afternoon at a time to be mutually arranged between the employer and the Secretary-Treasurer of the Biscuit Maker's Union, such time to count as time worked. Reasonable facilities shall be provided by the employer for female employees to make tea during such interval if they so desire: provided that:—

- (i) Such period shall not be allowed within one hour of commencing or finishing work for the day or one hour before or after a meal break; and
- (ii) Employees shall conform to such arrangement as the employer may make to ensure the continuity of operations.

## - PIECEWORK.

16. The Board determines, under the provisions of section 150 of the *Factories and Shops Act 1928*, that any employer may fix and pay piecework prices to any person or persons or classes of persons employed at any work for which the Board has fixed the minimum wage, provided that any such employer shall base such piecework prices on the earnings of an average worker working under like conditions, and such piecework prices shall be fixed so that an average worker can earn not less than the wages that are fixed by the Board for such work.

## AUTHORIZED PERSON MAY ENTER FACTORY.

17. The permanent Secretary-Treasurer of the Biscuit Makers' Union of Australia, Victorian Branch, shall have the right to enter and inspect, during working hours, any part of a biscuit factory or workshop in which any work is being carried on. The Secretary-Treasurer of the Biscuit Makers' Union shall have the right to interview employees in regard to conditions of employment.

## PERIODICAL ADJUSTMENT OF WAGES.

18. The wages rates for males set out in clause 2 are based upon the following basic wage and, pursuant to and in accordance with the provisions of section 21 of the *Factories and Shops Act 1934*, the Board hereby determines that such rates shall be automatically increased or decreased by the same amount, and at the same time as such basic wage. Provided that the wages of adult females, apprentices, and improvers, shall be adjusted proportionately to adjustments of the basic wage, such adjustments to be to the nearest 3d., half or less than half of 3d. to be disregarded.

The basic wage shown hereunder shall be adjusted as prescribed in clause 19.

## ADJUSTMENT OF BASIC WAGE.

19. (a) Until the beginning of the first pay period to commence in February, 1945, the amount of the basic wage shall be as prescribed in clause 18.

(b) During each future successive period beginning with the first pay period to commence in a February, a May, an August, or a November, the amount of the basic wage shall be adjusted by the following method according to the position and fluctuations (if any) of the Commonwealth Statistician's "All Items" retail price index numbers.

For the purposes of this Determination the expression "Commonwealth Statistician's retail price index numbers" or any like expression means the numbers stated to be such index numbers in any document purporting, and not proved to be wrongly so purporting, to be printed by the Commonwealth Government Printer or to be signed by or on behalf of the Commonwealth Statistician:—

- (1) The index number set to be applied is that assigned to Melbourne.
- (2) The index number for the calendar quarter next preceding the period of or near a quarter for which the adjustment is made is to be ascertained.
- (3) The amount assigned in the following table (or in any extension thereof) to the index number division comprising that number is to be ascertained.
- (4) The basic wage shall be of that assigned amount during such successive period.

## DETERMINATION OF THE BRUSHMAKERS BOARD.

NOTE.—This Determination applies to the following parts of Victoria, namely:—The Metropolitan District as defined in the Factories and Shops Acts and the Order in Council thereunder, and such portions of the city of Sandringham as are not included within the said District; the cities of Ballarat, Bendigo, Geelong, Geelong West, and Warrnambool; the town of Newtown and Chilwell; and the boroughs of Eaglehawk and Sebastopol.

IN accordance with the provisions of the Factories and Shops Acts the Wages Board appointed to "determine the lowest price or rates which may be paid to any person or persons or classes of persons employed in the process, trade, or business of a brushmaker" has made the following Determination, namely:—

1. That as from the beginning of the first pay period to commence on or after 13th November, 1944, the last previous Determination of this Board shall be revoked and replaced by this Determination.

## FEMALE TO BE PAID ADULT MALE RATE.

3. Females (adults or juniors) employed on any work for which a classification is provided for adult males shall be paid the adult male rate for such work.

## ORDINARY WEEK'S WORK.

4. Forty-four hours shall constitute a week's work, to be worked between 7.30 a.m. and 5.45 p.m. on Mondays to Fridays inclusive and between 7.30 a.m. and 12 noon on Saturdays if worked. Provided that the fixed starting and finishing times shall not be altered unless by seven days' notice to the employees.

## OVERTIME.

5. For all work done in excess of 44 hours in any week, payment shall be made as follows:—

Time workers .. .. . Time and a half.

Pieceworkers:—

Males .. .. . 1s. per hour in addition to piecework earnings.

Females .. .. . 6d. per hour in addition to piecework earnings.

All time lost by an employee during ordinary working hours in any week because of holidays or of the employer's establishment being closed shall, for the purpose of calculating overtime, be deemed to have been time actually worked.

## SPECIAL RATES.

6. Double time shall be the special rate for all work done on Sunday, New Year's Day, Australia Day, Labour Day, Good Friday, Easter Monday, Anzac Day, King's Birthday, Melbourne Cup Day, Christmas Day, and Boxing Day, but if any other day be by Act of Parliament or Proclamation substituted for any of the above-named public holidays, the special rate shall only be payable for work done on the day so substituted.

## HOLIDAYS.

7. (a) All employees shall be entitled to the following holidays, with payment at ordinary rates therefor:—The days observed as New Year's Day, Australia Day, Labour Day, Good Friday, Easter Monday, Anzac Day, King's Birthday, Melbourne Cup Day, Christmas Day, and Boxing Day.

(b) An employer shall not terminate the employment of an employee for the purpose of evading payment for the holidays prescribed in sub-clause (a) of this clause.

(c) Where an employee is dismissed within 7 days prior to any such holiday, the re-engagement of such employee within 14 days after such holiday shall be prima facie evidence that the employment was terminated for the purpose of evading payment for such holiday.

## ANNUAL LEAVE.

8. Any employee who has been in the service of an employer for a period of not less than twelve months shall be granted seven working day's holiday (exclusive of the holidays mentioned in clause 7) in each year on full pay.

## SICK LEAVE.

9. Any employee who, having had not less than six months' service with the same employer, is absent from duty as a result of personal ill-health or accident shall be entitled to sick pay at the ordinary rate for forty four hours of working time in each year, provided that evidence satisfactory to the employer is produced to prove that such absence was due to personal ill-health or accident.

## MID-DAY MEAL.

10. An interval of not less than 30 minutes shall be allowed for the mid-day meal between the hours of 12 noon and 2 p.m.

## TEA MONEY.

11. Male employees under sixteen years of age and female employees of any age required to work overtime in excess of one hour beyond the usual time of ceasing duty shall be paid 1s. for tea money.

## PIECE-WORK PRICES.

12. That the lowest piece-work prices payable to any person engaged in the following kinds of work shall be:—

HAIR PAN WORK, which includes any or all of the following operations, namely:—Setting, boring (except in the case of setting wings in punched brooms) and/or finishing.

Section A. 1s. 7½d. per 100 knots—

Brooms and banisters made of kitool, union or double-drafted fibre.

Section B. 1s. 9½d. per 100 knots—

Ordinary, all hair and all bristle brooms up to 15 inches in length.

Ordinary, all hair and all bristle banisters.

Brooms and banisters made entirely or in part of single-drafted or rough fibre.

All brooms and banisters made of fibre in the inside and of any other material on the outside.

Flat-faced wall brooms (H.G. & Co. Pat.).

Baker's brushes (Banister Pat.).

## DETERMINATION OF THE ANIMAL MANURE BOARD.

NOTES.—(A) This Determination applies to the whole of the State of Victoria.

(B) On 25th May, 1914, the powers of the Animal Manure Board were extended to enable it to fix the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any persons employed in the process, trade, or business of the extraction of tallow.

IN accordance with the provisions of the Factories and Shops Acts, the Wages Board appointed to "determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any persons employed in the process, trade, or business of the manufacture of manure from animal matter," has made the following Determination, namely:—

1. That as from the beginning of the first pay period to commence on or after 16th November, 1944, the last previous Determination of this Board, shall be revoked and replaced by this Determination.

PROPORTION (by any Employer).

### Apprentices.

One apprentice to every three or fraction of three workers receiving not less than 123s. per week.

An indenture of apprenticeship has been prescribed by the Board.

### Improvers.

One improver to every four workers receiving not less than 123s. per week.

\* Note.—The War Loading shall not be taken into account in the calculation of overtime and other penalty rates prescribed by this Determination.

### HEAT ALLOWANCE.

3. Any employee required to work in the dry rendering section artificially heated to more than 18 degrees Fahr. above the outside temperature shall be paid a heat allowance of 3d. per hour: Provided that no heat allowance shall be payable if the outside temperature does not exceed 87 degrees Fahr.

Notwithstanding anything herein contained where eight or more melting pots are in operation the allowance of 3d. per hour shall be paid for the whole shift.

### CASUAL EMPLOYEE.

4. A "casual employee" shall be paid the ordinary rate with the addition of 12½ per centum. For the purpose of this clause a "casual employee" shall mean a person who works less than three full days in any one week.

### HOURS OF WORK.

5. The maximum number of hours to be worked, without payment for overtime, shall be—

(a) Day work.—(i) 44 hours per week:

(ii) 8 hours per day on Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday between the hours of 7 a.m. and 5.30 p.m., and 4 hours on Saturday between the hours of 7 a.m. and 12 noon.

(b) Shift work.—(i) 44 hours per week or by mutual agreement between any employer and his employees 88 hours per fortnight, with a maximum of 48 hours in any one week;

(ii) 8 hours per day on Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday, Friday, Saturday, and Sunday.

OVERTIME.

6. All time worked in excess of the number of hours prescribed in clause 5 shall be paid for at the rate of time and a half.

HOLIDAYS.

7. All weekly wage employees shall be granted the following holidays without deduction of pay:—New Year's Day, Australia Day, Good Friday, Easter Monday, Labour Day, Anzac Day, Melbourne Cup Day, Christmas Day, Boxing Day, and Butchers' Picnic Day, but if any other day be by Act of Parliament or Proclamation substituted for any of the abovenamed holidays in any place, all employees in that place shall be entitled to such day in lieu of the holiday for which it was substituted.

ANNUAL LEAVE.

8. Any employee who has been in the service of the same employer for a period of not less than twelve months shall be granted one week's holiday on full pay in each year.

If the employee leaves or is dismissed before the expiration of twelve months in any year, then such employee shall be given or paid for one-half day's holiday for each completed month's service.

SICK LEAVE.

9. (a) Any employee, provided he has had at least three months' continuous service with the same employer and whose conditions of employment is on a weekly basis as provided for in clause 10 of this Determination, shall lose his pay for the actual time of such non-attendance unless he produces or forwards within 24 hours of the commencement of such absence evidence satisfactory to his employer that his non-attendance was due to personal accident arising out of and in the course of his employment or to personal ill-health necessitating such absence.

(b) Provided that an employee shall not be entitled to payment for non-attendance on the ground of personal accident or personal ill-health or both for more than six (6) days in each year of employment.

(c) If the full period of sick leave as prescribed above is not taken in any year, such portion as is not taken shall be cumulative from year to year up to a period not exceeding twelve days, which shall be the maximum amount of leave to which an employee may be entitled in any year without deduction of pay.

For the purposes of this sub-clause service prior to the 3rd June, 1943 shall be disregarded.

TERMS OF ENGAGEMENT.

10. Employment shall be by the week and any employee (other than casual employees as provided for in clause 4) willing and available to work shall in respect of each week of his employment be paid the full weekly wage fixed by this Determination; provided that such employee not attending for duty shall, except as provided by clause 9 of this Determination, lose his pay for the actual time of such non-attendance; provided further that this does not interfere with the right of the employer to dismiss an employee at any time without giving reasons and that such employee shall be paid up to the time of dismissal only.

TEA MONEY.

11. Employees required to work overtime for more than one and a half hours on any one day without having been notified on the preceding day that they would be required so to work shall be paid the amount of two (2) shillings in addition to any overtime payment to which they may be entitled.

KNIVES TO BE SUPPLIED.

12. Knives, which shall remain the property of the employer, shall be supplied under the following conditions to carcass skimmers when necessary for the performance of their duties:—

(1) They shall be returned to the employer on termination of the employment.

(2) If such knives are not returned the employer shall be entitled to deduct their cost from any money owing to the employee.

SPECIAL RATES.

13. Double time shall be paid for all work done on Sundays and holidays specified in clause 7.

PERIODICAL ADJUSTMENT OF WAGES.

14. The wages rates set out in clause 2 are based upon the following basic wage and pursuant to and in accordance with the provisions of section 21 of the *Factories and Shops Act 1934*, the Board hereby determines that such rates shall be automatically increased or decreased by the same amount, and at the same time as such basic wage. Provided that the wages of apprentices and improvers shall be adjusted proportionately to adjustments of the basic wage, such adjustments to be to the nearest 1d., half or less than half of a 1d. to be disregarded.

The basic wage shown hereunder shall be adjusted as prescribed in clause 15.

## PROHIBITION OF EMPLOYMENT.

3. The Board determines that no person under the age of 21 years shall be employed except as a "juvenile worker" as defined by Clause 4.

## DEFINITION.

4. A juvenile worker shall mean a person under 21 years of age employed only in performing one or more of the following tasks, viz.:—Dry gut work, turning middles and bungs, blowing and tying weasands and bladders, measuring, selecting, salting, working behind scraping machines, splitting beef runners.

## MEAL TIME.

6. (a) Persons employed as pullers-off and strippers at Abattoirs or Freezing Works (export trade or local trade) shall be allowed a meal period of not less than one hour between 12 noon and 1.15 p.m.

(b) All other employees shall be allowed a meal period of not less than 45 minutes between 12 noon and 1 p.m.

(c) The meal periods provided for in sub-clauses (a) and (b) hereof shall not be calculated as time worked.

## OVERTIME.

7. All time worked outside the times of beginning and ending work each day shall be paid for at the rate of time and a half for the first four hours and double time thereafter.

## SPECIAL RATES.

8. Double time shall be paid for all work done on Sundays, Christmas Day, Boxing Day, New Year's Day, Australia Day, Labour Day, Good Friday, Easter Monday, Cup Day, and Butchers' Picnic Day; but if any other day be by Act of Parliament or Proclamation substituted for any of the above-named holidays, the special rate shall only be payable for work done on the day so substituted.

## HOLIDAYS.

9. (a) All employees shall be entitled to the ten holidays hereinafter mentioned without any deduction from the weekly or daily rate of pay (as the case may be), provided that any such employee has been employed during any portion of the working week, viz.:—Christmas Day, Boxing Day, New Year's Day, Australia Day, Labour Day, Anzac Day, Good Friday, Easter Monday, Cup Day, and Butchers' Picnic Day.

(b) In the event of an employee being required to work on a public holiday, he shall, except excused by the employer, do so at the rate prescribed or shall not be entitled to payment for such holiday.

## TERMS OF ENGAGEMENT.

10. Employment shall be by the week and any employee (other than a casual employee and one employed in Export and Freezing Works) willing and available to work shall in respect of each week of his employment be paid the full weekly wage fixed by this Determination; provided that such employee not attending for duty shall, except as provided by clause 12 of this Determination, lose his pay for the actual time of such non-attendance; provided further that this does not interfere with the right of the employer to dismiss an employee at any time without giving reasons and that such employee shall be paid up to the time of dismissal only.

## ANNUAL LEAVE.

11. Any employee who has been in the service of the same employer continuously for a period of not less than twelve months shall be granted one week's holiday (exclusive of the holidays mentioned in clause 9) on full pay in respect to each year of employment: Provided that if any of the holidays as prescribed in clause 9 falls within an employee's period of annual leave there shall be added to that period one day for each such holiday falling as aforesaid.

If the employee leaves or is dismissed before the expiration of twelve months in any such year, then such employee shall be given or paid for one-half day's holiday for each completed month's service.

## SICK LEAVE.

12. (a) Any employee not attending for duty shall lose his pay for the actual time of such non-attendance, unless he produces or forwards within 24 hours of the commencement of such absence evidence satisfactory to his employer that his non-attendance was due to personal accident arising out of and in the course of his employment or to personal ill-health necessitating such absence.

Provided that an employee shall not be entitled to payment for non-attendance on the ground of personal accident or personal ill-health or both for more than six days in each year.

(b) If the full period of sick leave as prescribed in sub-clause (a) hereof is not taken in any year, such portion as is not taken shall be cumulative from year to year up to a period not exceeding twelve days, which shall be the maximum amount of leave to which any employee shall be entitled in any year without deduction of pay.

For the purposes of this sub-clause service prior to 8th June, 1943, shall be disregarded.

## TEA MONEY.

13. Employees required to work overtime for more than one and a half hours on any one day without having been notified on the preceding day that they would be required so to work shall be paid the amount of two (2) shillings in addition to any overtime payment to which they may be entitled.

## FIRST AID KIT.

14. A first aid kit shall be available at all times and be under the care of a responsible person who shall attend to all cases requiring attention.

## APRONS AND LEGGINGS.

15. Aprons and materials for leggings for employees employed in cleaning sheds and abattoirs shall be provided free of charge by the employer.

## PERIODICAL ADJUSTMENT OF WAGES.

16. The wages rates for adult weekly paid employees, set out in clause 2, are based upon the following basic wage and pursuant to and in accordance with the provisions of the *Factories and Shops Act 1934*, the Board hereby determines that such rates shall be automatically increased or decreased by the same amount, and at the same time as such basic wage. Provided that adjustments to the rates for adult daily paid employees and juvenile workers shall be made at the same time as follows :—

(a) The wages per day payable to adult daily paid employees shall be increased or decreased by an amount of 2d. for every 1s. increase or decrease respectively in the basic wage.



(b) The wages of juvenile workers shall be adjusted proportionately to adjustments of the basic wage, such adjustments to be to the nearest 3d., half or less than half of 3d. to be disregarded, and to be made upon the rates prescribed in the Determination which came into force on the 1st December, 1939.

The basic wage shown hereunder shall be adjusted as prescribed in clause 17.

ADJUSTMENT OF BASIC WAGE.

17. (a) Until the beginning of the first pay period to commence in February, 1945, the amount of the basic wage shall be as prescribed in clause 16.

(b) During each future successive period beginning with the first pay period to commence in a February, a May, an August, or a November, the amount of the basic wage shall be adjusted by the following method according to the position and fluctuations (if any) of the Commonwealth Statistician's "All Items" retail price index numbers.

For the purposes of this Determination the expression "Commonwealth Statistician's retail price index numbers" or any like expression means the numbers stated to be such index numbers in any document purporting, and not proved to be wrongly so purporting, to be printed by the Commonwealth Government Printer or to be signed by or on behalf of the Commonwealth Statistician :—

- (1) The index number set to be applied is that assigned to Melbourne.
- (2) The index number for the calendar quarter next preceding the period of or near a quarter for which the adjustment is made is to be ascertained.
- (3) The amount assigned in the following table (or in any extension thereof) to the index number division comprising that number is to be ascertained.
- (4) The basic wage shall be of that assigned amount during such successive period.

THE Yarra Junction Waterworks Trust, in pursuance and exercise of the powers conferred by the Water Acts, doth hereby make a rate for the supply of water for domestic purposes of One shilling and eight pence in the pound on the annual municipal valuation of lands and tenements within the Yarra Junction Urban District.

Provided that in no case shall the amount of rate payable per annum in respect of any tenement (other than land on which there is no building) be less than Twenty-six shillings and eight pence, and in respect of land on which there is no building less than Ten shillings.

Such rate is made for the year commencing the 1st of January, 1945, and shall be payable on the 1st day of March, 1945, at the office of the said Trust.

Such person or persons as the Trust may appoint for the purpose are hereby authorized to demand, receive, collect, and recover the said rates and charges.

## REGULATIONS REGARDING THE STORAGE, MIXING, MANIPULATION OR USE IN FACTORIES OF RADIO-ACTIVE PAINTS.

**W**HETHERAS by the Factories and Shops Acts, it is enacted that the Governor in Council may, by Order published in the *Government Gazette*, from time to time, make, alter, and revoke Regulations for the purposes therein mentioned, and generally for carrying into effect the provisions of the said Acts: And whereas it is amongst other things enacted that the Governor in Council, if the Minister has certified that any manufacture, plant, process, or labour used in factories is dangerous to life or limb generally, may make such Regulations as may be deemed necessary and reasonably practicable to decrease or prevent danger from such manufacture, plant, process, or labour: And whereas the Honorable Thomas Tuke Hollway, His Majesty's Minister of Labour for the State of Victoria, has certified that the manufacture, plant, process, or labour connected with the storage, mixing, manipulation, or use in factories of radio-active paints is dangerous to life or limb generally: Now therefore His Excellency the Lieutenant-

Governor of the State of Victoria, by and with the advice of the Executive Council thereof, under the powers hereinbefore recited, as well as under all other powers by the said Acts him enabling in that behalf, doth make the following Regulations regarding such dangerous manufacture, plant, process, or labour, that is to say:—

These Regulations shall apply to all factories in which radio-active paints are stored, mixed, manipulated, or used. It shall be the duty of the occupiers of all such factories to take such steps as may be necessary to comply with the following requirements, and persons employed in such factories shall comply with such provisions hereof as apply to them—

1. All reserves of radio-active materials in their unopened phials shall be stored in a box completely lined with lead at least 1.5 c.m. in thickness, and this box shall be stored at least 8 feet from the permanent working position of any worker.

2. A special cubicle shall be provided in which the opening of phials, the mixing of materials, and the process of painting shall be carried out. The cubicle shall be fitted with a door which can be locked to exclude unauthorized persons. The floor of the cubicle shall be covered with some material which will prevent dust accumulating in floor crevices. Working tables shall be of some polished, easily cleaned material such as enamel, or be covered with glass.

Except in cases where the Chief Inspector approves, in writing, of some other suitable arrangement, the cubicle shall be fitted to provide for—

- (a) a station for opening containers and mixing paints;
- (b) a station for painting operations;
- (c) a station for articles of work coming to or leaving the painter.

3. The station for opening containers and mixing paints shall consist of a cabinet with a glass roof, and with openings in the walls for the hands only. It shall be connected by ducts to the external air.

The lower edge of the openings for the hands shall be not less than 2 inches above the level of the floor of the cabinet.

The cabinet shall be provided with internal illumination, and the floor thereof shall be covered with smooth material, preferably glass, to prevent the accumulation of dust in crevices.

4. The station for painting operations shall consist of a table fitted with an exhaust hood having an inclined glass roof. The front edge of the glass roof shall be not less than 4 inches nor more than 6 inches above the level of the table, and not more than 3 inches from the vertical plane of the front edge of the table.

The hood shall be connected by ducts to the external air. Internal daylight type illumination shall be provided, and the surface of the table shall be of smooth easily-cleaned material, preferably glass.

5. The station for articles of work coming to or leaving the painter shall consist of—

- (a) a receptacle so placed that the person who brings the unpainted articles to the station for painting does not need to approach the painting and mixing stations;
- (b) a drying cabinet connected by ducts to the external air.

6. A system of mechanical ventilation by means of an exhaust fan shall be installed, and each of the three stations referred to in clause 2 shall be connected thereto by means of ducts.

7. The fan capacity of the exhaust system shall be such as to change the air in the cubicle between 10 and 15 times per hour. The air velocity through the openings to the cabinets shall be not less than 100 lineal feet per minute.

8. Every cubicle shall be fitted with a wash basin supplied with hot and cold running water, and with sufficient soap and towels.

9. Every cubicle shall also include a small dark room equipped with an argon or mercury lamp fitted with a screen opaque to visible light. Clothing required by these Regulations to be worn and washed hands shall be inspected in such dark room for the presence of zinc sulphide particles, which will fluoresce.

10. No person shall engage in operations subject to these Regulations until he is medically examined, as provided herein, and every such person shall be re-examined at intervals not exceeding six months. The medical examinations shall include blood examination for haemoglobin, red and white cell counts, and differential counts. Unless pronounced medically fit after such examination no person shall enter upon nor continue to be engaged upon any such operations.

11. The occupier of the factory shall provide gowns, gloves, and overalls for the use of persons required by these Regulations to wear them.

12. All material soiled with radio-active paint, including empty phials, varnish bottles, painting tools, paper coverings from benches, armlets, gloves, and the like shall be kept in closed containers which shall be cleared away daily. Provision shall be made for the destruction by burning of the contents of the containers, and for the burying of the residue. The

disposal of such materials shall be carried out in such a way that there is no danger of any person becoming affected thereby.

13. Racks shall be provided for the rigid holding of tools when not in use, and when not in use tools shall be returned by the worker to such racks.

14. Containers for radio-active paint shall be mounted in a holder so that it shall not be necessary for the worker to hold the containers in his hand, and no worker shall hold any such containers in his hand.

15. Every cubicle shall be cleaned daily by a moist method.

16. No person shall perform painting work, nor touch any paint material, unless he is wearing a gown reserved for use only within the cubicle, detachable washable sleeves, and rubber gloves. These coverings shall be removed and left within the cubicle should the worker leave it for any purpose. The worker shall put on clean sleeves and gloves each time he enters the cubicle.

17. Every worker shall, before removing the gloves, wash the gloved hands thoroughly, and afterwards wash the bare hands and arms and scrub the fingernails at the basin provided within the cubicle. He shall then inspect his hands in the dark room for presence of fluorescing particles.

18. No person shall open any phial or container of radio-active materials, nor mix paint, except in the cabinet provided for the purpose, and no person shall place any opened container, nor any painting appliances or materials, when not in use, elsewhere than in the said cabinet.

19. No person shall apply radio-active paint except under the exhaust ventilation hood prescribed, and in such a manner that the face of the worker is screened from the work by the glass front of the hood.

20. No person shall apply radio-active paint except with a wooden or glass stylus or with a pen.

21. No person shall use a painting tool if radio-active paint extends so far along the length thereof that the fingers of such person are likely to come in contact with the paint.

22. No person employed at work exposing him to contact with radio-active materials shall eat or smoke while working, nor shall any person bring eating or drinking utensils, food, or smoking materials into a cubicle.

23. No person employed at work exposing him to contact with radio-active material shall place his fingers, or any painting tools, appliances, or containers near his face or his clothing.

24. Any operative whose glove becomes visibly contaminated with paint or radio-active material shall immediately wash within the cubicle the external surface of such glove.

25. The supply of fresh articles on which work is to be done shall be brought to the appropriate station by an assistant, who shall not touch nor allow his clothing to come in contact with any section of the cubicle where radio-active paint or material is stored or spilled. A bell or other means shall be provided to enable the painting operative to summon the assistant when he is required.

26. All tools shall be cleaned by wiping on a cloth moistened with the solvent used in making the paint.

27. The occupier shall arrange that at intervals not exceeding six months breath samples with respect to every operative subject to these Regulations shall be submitted to the Chief Health Officer, Department of Health.

28. The occupier shall arrange that at intervals not exceeding six months room air samples from the cubicles shall be submitted to the Chief Health Officer, Department of Health.

29. The Chief Health Officer, Department of Health, shall transmit to the Chief Inspector forthwith a copy of any adverse report dealing with the examination of samples submitted in accordance with clauses 27 and 28 of these Regulations.

30. The occupier shall not employ at operations subject to these Regulations any person found to be addicted to the habit of biting his finger nails or of sucking his fingers.

31. The occupier shall post a copy of these Regulations conspicuously in every cubicle where work is at any time performed which is subject to these Regulations, and the occupier shall draw attention of every worker who at any time is required to enter such cubicle to the provisions of the Regulations, and to the danger to health involved in the operations subject thereto.

32. Any person who does not do anything directed to be done, or does anything forbidden to be done by or under these Regulations, shall be guilty of a breach of these Regulations.

And the Honorable Thomas Tuke Hollway, His Majesty's Minister of Labour for the State of Victoria, shall give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

DECLARATION OF THE PRINCES HIGHWAY IN THE SHIRES OF AVON, BAIRNSDALE, BULN BULN, BOROUGH OF COLAC, SHIRES OF DANDENONG, HAMPDEN, NARRACAN, ORBOST, ROSEDALE, TOWN OF SALE, SHIRES OF SOUTH BARWON, TAMBO, TRARALGON, WARRAGUL, CITY OF WARRNAMBOOL, SHIRES OF WERRIBEE AND WINCHELSEA.

WHEREAS by the Resolution set out below and dated the fourth day of December One thousand nine hundred and forty-four the Country Roads Board incorporated under the *Country Roads Act 1928* (No. 3662) being of opinion that the highway in the State of Victoria set out or described in the Schedule to the same is of sufficient importance to be a State Highway and acting under the powers in that behalf conferred upon it by the said Act declared such highway to be a State Highway within the meaning and for the purposes of the Act aforesaid: And whereas the said Act amongst other things provides that the Governor in Council may by Order published in the *Government Gazette* confirm such Resolution whereupon any road mentioned in such Resolution shall be a State Highway: And whereas it is deemed desirable to confirm the Resolution so made and passed by the said Country Roads Board: Now therefore His Excellency the Lieutenant-Governor of the State of Victoria by and with the advice of the Executive Council thereof doth hereby confirm such Resolution and declare upon the publication of this Order in the *Government Gazette* the road mentioned in the Schedule to such Resolution of the Country Roads Board a State Highway within the meaning and for the purposes of the *Country Roads Act 1928*.

*Resolution for the Declaration of a State Highway under the  
Country Roads Act.*

The Country Roads Board incorporated by the *Country Roads Act 1928* (No. 3662) at a meeting now holden being of opinion that the highway within the State of Victoria set out or described in the Schedule hereunder written is of sufficient importance to be a State Highway acting under the powers in that behalf conferred upon it by the said Act doth by this Resolution hereby declare such highway to be a State Highway within the meaning and for the purposes of the said *Country Roads Act 1928*.

*Shire of Avon.*

1. *Princes Highway*.—Commencing at a point on the western boundary of allotment 1, section 1, Town of Stratford, Parish of Stratford, distant 179 deg. 53 min. 100 links from the north-western angle of the said allotment; thence north-easterly through the said allotment to the northern boundary thereof (S.P.1596); thence easterly and northerly to the north-western angle of allotment 10, section 6, of the said town; thence easterly to the railway crossing near the north-eastern angle of allotment 2, section 18, Town of Stratford.

8. Notwithstanding anything contained in this regulation an allowance for maintenance up to £20 per annum may be granted on behalf of a pupil taking an approved secondary school course at a State secondary or registered secondary school provided—

- (a) that no allowance shall be granted to any pupil who has not obtained the Merit Certificate or an approved equivalent, or who does not show aptitude and promise;

- (b) that it is necessary for the pupil to reside away from home in order to attend school;
- (c) that the pupil is attending the nearest school providing the required standard of education; and
- (d) that there is no school bus service or suitable transport available for the conveyance of the pupil to the nearest school providing the required standard of education.

Sub-clauses (e), (f), and (g) of clause 13 shall be known in future as sub-clauses (d), (c), and (f).

In clause 34 for the words "one hundred and thirty-five" there shall be substituted the words "two hundred and thirty-five," and to the end of the clause a new paragraph shall be added as follows:—

- (c) One hundred shall be awarded to boys who have successfully completed the course for the Intermediate Technical Certificate or an approved equivalent course and shall be tenable for the first year of an approved Diploma course in Science, Engineering, or Architecture, and shall entitle the holders to free tuition and to an allowance of £30 per annum.

In sub-clause (a) and in sub-clause (b) of clause 57 for the words "under clause 2, 17, 23, or 28" there shall be substituted in each case the words "under clause 2, 17, 23, 28, or 34 (e)."

To clause 57 there shall be added a new sub-clause as follows:—

- (d) Notwithstanding anything contained in this regulation the Minister may grant an allowance for maintenance up to £20 per annum to the holder of a scholarship or free place under clause 2, 17, 23, or 28 above provided—

- (i) that it is necessary for the holder to reside away from home in order to attend school;
- (ii) that the holder is attending the nearest approved school; and
- (iii) that there is no school bus service or suitable transport service available for the conveyance of the holder to the nearest approved school."

NOTE.—The expressions "Association," and "Organization" wheresoever appearing in this Determination refer to the Federated Process Engravers, Photo-lithographers, and Photogravure Employees' Association.

DEFINITION.

4. A juvenile worker is any person under seventeen years of age (other than an apprentice or improver) who may be employed for not more than six months in cleaning or attending on operator, etcher, or proofer.

HOURS.

5. The number of hours for an ordinary week's work shall be:—

6. For all persons other than those engaged in daily newspaper offices:—

OVERTIME.

7. (1) In daily newspaper offices—Any employee who works for any time in excess of eight hours in any one day or in excess of 44 hours in any week shall be paid for such extra time at the rate of time and a half.

(2) In all other places—Provided that all work done between midnight and 6 a.m. shall be paid for at double rates calculated on the ordinary rates, overtime shall be paid for as follows:—

(a) For work done outside the times of beginning, and ending work, or in excess of 9 hours on any day .. .. .	..	..	..	..	..	..	..	Time and a half.
(b) For work done in excess of 44 hours per week if day shift, or 35 hours per week if night shift .. .. .	..	..	..	..	..	..	..	Time and a half for the first 12 hours, and double time thereafter.

EMPLOYMENT FOR LESS THAN A FULL WEEK.

8. Any person who works in any week for less than the number of hours fixed for a week's work, shall be paid for such work at the rate of time and a half, up to, but not exceeding, the ordinary wage rate for an ordinary week's work. Provided that this shall not apply in the case of an employee who works less than the number of hours fixed for a week's work at his own volition. Such an employee shall only be entitled to be paid pro-rata according to the number of hours worked based on the ordinary rate provided for an ordinary week's work.

WORK DONE ON SATURDAYS AND SUNDAYS.

(Work done in daily newspaper offices excepted.)

9. All work done on Saturdays, and Sundays, shall be paid for at the rate of double time.

Provided that any employee required to work on these days shall be given a minimum of two hours' work for the day, or be paid a minimum of two hours' pay.

SPECIAL RATE.

10. All work done (except in daily newspaper offices) on night shift between the hours of 6 p.m. and 11 p.m. shall be paid for at 1s. per hour in addition to the ordinary rate.

PUBLIC HOLIDAYS.

11. (a) Double time shall be paid for all work done (except in daily newspaper offices) on New Year's Day, Australia Day, Good Friday, Easter Monday, Labour Day, Anzac Day, King's Birthday, Melbourne Cup Day (Metropolitan District only), Christmas Day, and Boxing Day; but if any other day be by Act of Parliament or Proclamation substituted for any of the abovenamed holidays, the special rate shall only be payable for work done on the day so substituted.

Provided that any employee required to work on these days shall be given a minimum of four hours' work for the day, or be paid a minimum of four hours' pay.

(b) Any employee (including any apprentice) who was employed on any one of the six working days immediately preceding any of the holidays mentioned in sub-clause (a) hereof and who is not required to work on any such holiday shall be entitled to be absent from work without deduction of pay.

ANNUAL LEAVE.

12. (a) In addition to the holidays provided for by clause 11 hereof, an employee who remains in the service of the same employer for a period of at least a year, shall, if the employment has not been terminated, be entitled to seven consecutive working days' leave of absence on full pay during each year of service. For the purpose of this clause Saturdays, Sundays, and holidays named in clause 11 hereof shall not be regarded as working days.

(b) Should the services of an employee be brought to a termination after the expiration of six calendar months, but before the expiration of twelve calendar months from the date upon which employment commenced, he shall be granted a proportionate number of days' leave or payment in lieu thereof.

(c) Where the employer is a successor or assignee or transmittee of a business if an employee was in the employment of the employer's predecessor at the time when he became such successor or assignee or transmittee, the employee in respect of the period during which he was in the service of the predecessor, shall for the purpose of this clause, be deemed to be in the service of the employer.

SICK LEAVE.

13. (a) Any employee not attending for duty, who has had not less than six months' service with the same employer, shall be paid for the actual time lost if such employee produces or forwards, within 24 hours of the commencement of such absence, evidence satisfactory to the employer that his or her non-attendance was due to personal ill-health or accident necessitating such absence, but such employee shall not be entitled to payment for non-attendance on the grounds of personal ill-health or accident for more than 44 hours of working time in each year. For the purposes of this clause, a year shall be deemed to commence on the first day of January in each year.

(b) Notwithstanding anything contained in sub-clause (a) hereof, if the full period of sick leave as prescribed above is not taken in any year, such portion as is not taken shall be cumulative from year to year up to a period not exceeding 132 hours of working time which shall be the maximum amount of leave to which an employee may be entitled in any year without deduction of pay.

(c) Where the employer is a successor or assignee or transmittee of a business if an employee was in the employment of the employer's predecessor at the time when he became such successor or assignee or transmittee, the employee in respect of the period during which he was in the service of the predecessor, shall for the purpose of this clause, be deemed to be in the service of the employer.

TERMINATION OF EMPLOYMENT.

14. Except when the conduct of an employee justifies instant dismissal, or the conduct of the employer justifies an employee ceasing work without giving notice, seven days' notice of termination of employment shall be given by either employee or employer, and any employee or employer failing to give such notice shall be liable to forfeit or pay respectively one week's pay in lieu thereof.

This clause shall not apply to any employee who is employed for less than two consecutive weeks.

MEAL PERIOD.

15. (a) The minimum time allowance for meals shall be three-quarters of an hour, and the maximum allowance one hour. Provided that an employer and the employee concerned may agree to a reduced period, but not less than half an hour.

(b) No employee shall be compelled to break shift except for meals, and no shift shall exceed five hours without a break for meals.

MEAL ALLOWANCE.

16. An employee required to work any overtime in excess of one hour beyond the usual time of ceasing duty shall be paid a meal allowance of 2s. Such allowance shall be paid on the day upon which the overtime is worked and shall be in addition to any payment due for such overtime.

EMPLOYEE RECALLED TO WORK.

(Employees in daily newspaper offices excepted.)

17. Any employee having ceased work for the day and who after a period of not less than one hour has been recalled to work shall receive at least the equivalent of three hours' pay for the class of work done.

OVERTIME TO BE CONTINUOUS.

18. Where overtime after the usual time of ceasing work is worked it shall with the exception of a break of not more than one hour for a meal, be continuous, provided that this clause shall not operate in the case of an employee recalled to work as provided in clause 17.

TRANSPORT.

19. Where an employee is required to work so late that the ordinary transport services are not available for his conveyance home, special means shall be provided by the employer.

SEATING ACCOMMODATION.

20. An employee whose work requires him to be seated, shall be provided with a reasonably comfortable seat.

FIRST-AID OUTFIT.

21. Each employer shall cause a first-aid ambulance chest to be kept in some accessible place upon the premises, and such chest shall be equipped and supplied with the following articles :—

SHOP STEWARDS.

22. An employee appointed shop steward by and from the employees in the shop or department in which he is employed shall, upon notification thereof to his employer, be recognized as the accredited representative of the association to which he belongs, and he shall be allowed the necessary time during working hours to interview the employer or his representative on matters affecting employees whom he represents.

RIGHT OF ENTRY OF ASSOCIATION OFFICIALS.

23. For the purpose of interviewing employees on legitimate association business, a duly accredited association representative shall have the right to enter employers' premises during the midday meal break on the following conditions :—

- (i) That he produces his authority to the employer or such other person as may be appointed by the employer.
- (ii) That he interviews employees only at places where they are taking their meal.
- (iii) That not more than one representative of the organization be on the premises at any one time.
- (iv) That no one representative visit the premises more than once in each week.
- (v) That if any employer alleges that a representative is unduly interfering with his work or is creating dissatisfaction amongst his employees, or is offensive in his methods, or is committing a breach of any of the previous conditions such employer may refuse the right of entry, but the representative shall have the right to bring such refusal before the Secretary for Labour.

Provided that where certain employees are working under a system of shift work which precludes a representative from interviewing them during the midday meal break the representative shall have the right to enter the employer's premises for the purpose of interviewing such employees at such time and under such conditions as to notice as may be mutually arranged by the representative and the employer or, failing agreement, at such times and under such conditions as the Secretary for Labour may decide.

TIME AND WAGES BOOK.

24. (a) Each employer shall keep a record from which can be readily ascertained the name of each employee and his occupation, the hours worked each day, and the wages and allowances paid each week.

(b) The time occupied by an employee in filling in any time record or cards or in the making of records shall be treated as time of duty, but this does not apply to checking in or out when entering or leaving the employer's premises.

(c) The time and wages record shall be open for inspection to a duly accredited representative of the employees' organization during the usual office hours at the employer's office or other convenient place: Provided that an inspection shall not be demanded unless the secretary of the organization suspects that a breach of the Determination has been committed: Provided also that only one demand for such inspection shall be made in one fortnight at the same establishment.

(d) The official making such inspection shall be entitled to take a copy of entries in a time and wages record relating to the suspected breach of the Determination.

TIME BOOK OR OTHER RECORD.

25. Every employee shall indelibly record daily his or her correct times of beginning and ending each working period in a book, or on time cards, or by a mechanical contrivance, which shall be furnished by the employer.

HEALTH PROVISIONS.

26. Notices containing advice for the preservation of health and protection of employees shall, if provided by the Association, be kept prominently displayed and posted in all workrooms by the employer.

PERIODICAL ADJUSTMENT OF WAGES.

27. Pursuant to the provisions of section 21 of the *Factories and Shops Act 1934*, the wage rates for adults (other than females employed as retouchers of negatives or positives in connexion with photogravure or rotogravure work, or as negative opaques, retouchers, and/or plate workers in connexion with photolithography or process engraving work) shall be automatically increased or decreased by the same amount, and at the same time, as the needs basic wage shown in Table B hereunder is adjusted in accordance with the following provisions of this clause:—

(a) For work done before the beginning of the first pay period to commence in May, 1945, the amount of the needs basic wage shall be 92s.

(b) For work done during each future successive period beginning with the first pay period to commence in May or November, the amount of the needs basic wage shall be adjusted by the following method according to the position and fluctuations (if any) of the Commonwealth Statistician's "All Items" retail price index numbers.

For the purposes of this Determination the expression "Commonwealth Statistician's retail price index numbers" or any like expression means the numbers stated to be such index numbers in any document purporting, and not proved to be wrongly so purporting, to be printed by the Commonwealth Government Printer or to be signed by or on behalf of the Commonwealth Statistician:—

(i) Adjustment is to be based upon the equating of index number 1,000 with a wage of 81s.

(ii) The index number to be applied is that assigned to Melbourne.

(iii) The index number for the six months ending March and September next preceding the half-year for which the adjustment is made is to be ascertained.

(iv) The amount assigned in the following Table A (or in any extension thereof) to the index number division comprising that number is to be ascertained.

(v) The basic wage shall be of that assigned amount during such half-year.

Provided, however, that if that assigned amount of the needs basic wage be different by less than 1s. from the last current amount of the needs basic wage, then that last current amount of all rates shall continue unchanged during such period.

The wages of adult females and all juniors employed as retouchers of negatives or positives in connexion with photogravure or rotogravure work, or as negative opaques, retouchers, and/or plate workers in connexion with photolithography or process engraving work shall be adjusted proportionately to adjustments of the needs basic wage, such adjustments to be to the nearest 3d., half or less than half of 3d. to be disregarded.

The minimum rates of wages to be paid to persons working on a day shift shall be determined in the following manner.

Where the work is performed by an adult in the area to which this Determination applies, the employee shall be paid the sum (being the "total basic" wage) mentioned in Table B, and where the employee is performing the work usually performed by any class of employee mentioned in Table C, he shall be paid the sum (being the marginal difference) prescribed in the said Table C, applicable to such class of work.
