Dairy Engineering Research Officer, Class "B," Department of Agriculture.

When residence, the erection of which has been approved, is provided at the School of Dairy Technology, Werribee, the appointee will be required to reside in it, and will be subject to a charge of 10 per cent. of salary for rent, fuel, light, power, and water.

Duties.—To undertake investigations into the design, operation, management, and servicing of milking machines and other dairy machinery; to carry out demonstrations and extension work in the care and operation of all kinds of dairy equipment, and to give instruction in Dairy Engineering to students at the School of Dairy Technology as directed.

Qualifications.—A degree in engineering, chemical engineering, or applied science. A knowledge of dairy machinery and some knowledge of bacteriology. Previous experience in the dairy industry is desirable. Applicants should furnish evidence of experience with the dairy and/or other industry.

Dairy Research Officer (Bio-Chemist), Class "B," Department of Agriculture.

Yearly Salary.—£592, minimum; £644, maximum.

When residence, the erection of which has been approved, is provided at the School of Dairy Technology, Werribee, the appointee will be required to reside in it and will be subject to a charge of 10 per cent. of salary for rent, fuel, light, power, and water.

Duties.—To conduct research into problems associated with dairying and give lectures and demonstrations at the School of Dairy Technology, Werribee.

Qualifications.—A degree in biochemistry or a degree in chemistry with biochemistry as a major subject. Applicants should furnish evidence of experience with the dairy and/or other industry.

Dairy Research Officer (Bacteriologist), Class "B," Department of Agriculture.

Yearly Salary.—£592, minimum; £644, maximum.

When residence, the erection of which has been approved, is provided at the School of Dairy Technology, Werribee, the appointee will be required to reside in it and will be subject to a charge of 10 per cent. of salary for rent, fuel, light, power, and water.

Duties.—To conduct research work into problems associated with the dairying industry; to give lectures and demonstrations at the School of Dairy Technology, Werribee, and to carry out surveys at dairy factories.

Qualifications.—A degree in science or agricultural science, with bacteriology as the major subject, or with extensive post-graduate experience in bacteriology. Applicants should furnish evidence of experience with the dairy and/or other industry.

Draughtsman, Class "C," Department of Public Works.

Yearly Salary.—£449, minimum; £501, maximum.

Duties.—To prepare, under direction, plans, specifications, and estimates of electrical installations and services in all types of public buildings.

Qualifications.—To have completed a technical school diploma course in electrical engineering, or a major part thereof, to have had a wide practical outside and drawing office experience in electric light and power, and to possess a good knowledge of the design and layout of electric light and power installations, including illumination design of all types, both office and industrial.

TECHNICAL AND GENERAL DIVISION.

Senior Dairy Supervisor, Department of Agriculture.

Yearly Salary.—£423, minimum; £462, maximum.

Duties.—To assist in the administration of the Milk and Dairy Supervision Act in an allotted area, and to control and co-ordinate the inspection and advisory work of dairy supervisors in that area.

Qualifications.—To be an experienced dairy supervisor; to have an intimate knowledge of the Milk and Dairy Supervision Act and the Regulation thereunder, and of modern dairy practice; to possess ability to direct staff and deliver lectures.

Orchard Supervisor, Grade II., Horticultural Division, Department of Agriculture.

Yearly Salary.—£319, minimum; £410, maximum.

Duties.—To inspect orchards, nurseries, and markets; to advise growers regarding treatment of diseases, mixing and applying of spray materials, pruning, cultivation, packing, manuring, draining, and all work necessary in the orchard; to direct irrigation as applied to fruit trees, scientific planning of orchards for growers, renovation of old orchards; to report on different phases of horticulture, and to carry out necessary duties under the Vegetation and Vine Diseases Act and the Fruit and Vegetables Acts.

Qualifications.—To have passed the Orchard Supervisor's examination; to have a thorough practical knowledge of fruit growing, and to have had experience in orchard supervision work.

Tomato Supervisor, Department of Agriculture. (Two vacancies.)

Yearly Salary.—£306, minimum; £410, maximum.

Duties.—To instruct tomato growers in the best methods of growing tomatoes under both natural rainfall and irrigation.

Qualifications.—To have a sound knowledge of commercial tomato production in the main producing areas of Victoria; to have a knowledge of commercial tomato varieties, and to be able to recognize and advise on control measures for the various tomato pests and diseases.

Warder, Penal and Gaols Branch, Department of Chief Secretary. (Two vacancies.)

Yearly Salary.—£305, minimum; £357, maximum.

Duties.—To perform duties as required in connexion with the control and supervision of male prisoners.

Qualifications.—As required by Regulation 29 of the Public Service (Public Service Board) Regulations.

Shorthand Writer and Typist (Male), Grade II., Department of Agriculture.

Yearly Salary.—£273, minimum; £351, maximum.

Duties.—To carry out shorthand writing and typing duties in the Live Stock Division and to assist generally.

Qualifications.—To be an efficient shorthand writer and typist, and to possess a good knowledge of English.

Machineman, Stamp Duties Office, Department of Treasurer.

Yearly Salary.—£284, minimum; £323, maximum.

Duties.—To assist in the embossing of instruments and to act as Embossing Examiner, when necessary.

Qualifications.—To be experienced in the working of embossing machines, and to have a knowledge of the various rates of stamp duty chargeable on bills of exchange and other instruments presenting for stamping.

Assistant Shoemaker, Mental Hospital, Mont Park, Department of Health.

Duties.—To manufacture and repair boots and shoes, and, in the absence of the Shoemaker, to take charge of the shop and the patients working there.

Qualifications.—To be a fully qualified shoemaker and repairer, and to be able to make footwear for patients with abnormal feet.

Gardener, Grade I., Botanic Gardens, Department of Lands and Survey.

Duties.—To take charge of a section of the Gardens; to attend to cultivation of same, and keep it in good order.

Qualifications.—A practical knowledge of the various processes and methods of gardening, including a knowledge of plants and their treatment. To have passed the prescribed examination as set out in Regulation 45 (b) of the Public Service (Public Service Board) Regulations.

Salary.—£233 a year, less deduction of £32 a year for quarters and rations.

Duties.—To supervise the preparation of meals for a staff of 70, and to relieve the cook when required in the preparation of meals for 300 children.

Qualifications.—To be competent and experienced in large-scale cooking.

TEACHING SERVICE (TEACHERS' TRIBUNAL) REGULATIONS.

REGULATION 1.

REVOKE clause 28 and substitute a new clause 28 as follows:—

"28. The Tribunal may authorize the payment of other special allowances under the following circumstances:—

- (a) Where a member of the teaching service is married and is compelled to live away from his home, an allowance not exceeding £1 per week;
- (b) Where the standard salary of an unmarried member of the teaching service does not exceed £234 a year, and he is appointed or transferred to a position outside the Cities of Melbourne, Ballarat, Bendigo, and Geelong, and is thereby required to live away from his home and to pay board and lodging in excess of 30s. a week, the Tribunal may authorize payment of an allowance of an amount equal to one-half of the excess over 30s., provided that in no case shall the weekly allowance exceed 10s.;
- (c) Where the standard salary of an unmarried member of the teaching service exceeds £234 a year but does not exceed £416 a year, and he is transferred or promoted to a position outside the Cities of Melbourne, Ballarat, Bendigo, and Geelong, and is thereby required to live away from his home and to pay board and lodging in excess of 40s. a week, the Tribunal may authorize payment of an amount equal to one-half of the excess over 40s. a week, provided that in no case shall the weekly allowance exceed 10s.;
- (d) Where, in the opinion of the Director, special circumstances exist for which provision is not made in the foregoing, the Teachers' Tribunal shall authorize such allowance as it deems reasonable."

VICTORIAN RAILWAYS.

THE VICTORIAN RAILWAYS COMMISSIONERS, in the exercise of the powers conferred upon them by the Railways Acts, do hereby make the following by-law, and do hereby repeal so much of the provisions of all previous by-laws as conflicts therewith:—

BY-LAW NO. 351.

PART I.—INTRODUCTORY.

Definitions.

1. In this By-law, except where otherwise clearly indicated—

- "appointed" means appointed by the Commissioners;
- "authorized" means authorized by the Commissioners to do the act in relation to which the expression is used;
- "booking station" means a station at which under the authority of the Commissioners tickets are issued to persons who desire to travel by railway;
- "by-law" includes this by-law, and all by-laws made by the Commissioners in the exercise of the power to make by-laws conferred upon them by the Railways Acts;
- "Commissioners" means The Victorian Railways Commissioners constituted as provided in the Railways Acts;
- "compartment" means a compartment of a vehicle which is appointed for the conveyance of passengers;
- "electric line" means any wire or cable or other device situate in the open air, and used by the Commissioners for the conveyance, transmission, or distribution of electricity, and it includes any means employed for supporting, suspending, enclosing, or insulating any such wire or cable or other device.
- "employee" includes all persons employed in the railway service;
- "freight stamp" means a stamp issued by the Commissioners for use in connexion with the prepayment of charges for the carriage of parcels;
- "level crossing" means a place where a road whether it be a public road or a private road crosses a railway on the level of the railway;
- "motor vehicle" means a vehicle propelled by steam or gas or oil or electricity or any mechanical power and used or intended for use on any public highway and includes a motor cycle;
- "overbridge" means a bridge over any line of railway;
- "passenger" includes a person who is upon or about any vehicle or premises of the Commissioners—
 - (i) with the intention of travelling by railway; or
 - (ii) after having completed a journey by railway;
- "prescribed" means prescribed by the Commissioners in a by-law;
- "railway" means a line of railway vested in the Commissioners;
- "road vehicle" means any vehicle used or intended for use on any public highway and includes a bicycle;
- "seat" means a seat in a vehicle;
- "smoking compartment" means a compartment which is appointed for the use of persons who desire to smoke tobacco or any other substance;
- "specified" means specified by the Commissioners by being published or announced on their premises in a reasonably efficient manner;
- "station" means a station on any line of railway vested in the Commissioners;
- "sub-way" means a carriage way or footway or any other way which is carried beneath a railway;
- "telegraph station" means a station at which telegraphic communication is provided;
- "ticket" means any ticket free pass symbol or evidence of a right to travel as a passenger upon a railway;
- "train" includes a vehicle which is in the process of being attached to or detached from a train;
- "vehicle" means a vehicle belonging to the Commissioners and used or intended for use on a railway and includes a tricycle or quadricycle.

Words importing the masculine gender shall include females words in the singular shall include the plural and words in the plural shall include the singular.

2. Where a penalty is set out at the foot of a section of this by-law it is the *maximum* penalty. penalty imposed by the Commissioners upon any person committing a breach of the section and may as provided in the *Railways Act 1923* be recovered in a summary manner before any Court of Petty Sessions.

3. The division of this by-law into parts shall not be construed so as to restrict in any way the application of the several sections hereof.

PART II.—PROVISIONS RELATING TO TICKETS.

4. A person shall not with the intent to evade the payment of his fare enter at a No ticket. booking station or travel therefrom in any vehicle unless he or some one on his behalf has previously obtained from the Commissioners or from some one acting under their authority a ticket which entitles him so to enter or travel.

Penalty: Twenty pounds.

5. Upon being requested so to do by an authorized employee a passenger unless Tickets to be prevented from so doing by a cause which does not involve an attempt to defraud or produced. prejudice the Commissioners shall—

- (i) produce to the employee a ticket showing as the circumstances of the case may require either—
 - (a) that he is entitled to travel by railway for the journey he is about to make or is in fact making; or
 - (b) that he was entitled to travel by railway for the journey he has made;
- (ii) permit the employee to inspect the ticket and mark the same;
- (iii) if the ticket is the forward half of a return ticket produce to the employee the other half of such ticket and allow him to inspect or mark it;
- (iv) if the ticket will not be available for further use deliver it to the employee.

Penalty: Five pounds.

- Expired tickets.** 6. A person who is in possession of a ticket the time for using which has expired shall upon being requested so to do by an authorized employee deliver the ticket to the employee.
Penalty: Five pounds.
- Re-booking.** 7. When the fare for a continuous journey from one station to another station is greater than the sum of the fares between the first station and an intermediate station and between the intermediate station and the second station a person shall not with intent to evade payment of the full fare payable for a continuous journey from the first station to the second station travel from the first station to the intermediate station obtain a ticket there and travel thence to the second station in the train by which he arrived at the intermediate station or in the train which is appointed to connect with it.
Penalty: Five pounds.
- Allighting short of destination stations.** 8. When the fare for a journey from one station to another station is greater than the fare between the first station and a station more distant from it than the second station a person shall not with intent to evade payment of the full fare payable for a journey from the first station to the second station take or use or attempt to use a ticket which authorizes him to travel from the first station to the more distant station.
Penalty: Five pounds.
- Tickets, use of.** 9. A person shall not with intent to evade payment of the fare lawfully payable by him in the circumstances use or attempt to use a ticket otherwise than—
(i) for a journey from the station firstly named thereon to the station secondly named thereon; or
(ii) subject to section 8 of this by-law for a journey from the station firstly named thereon to a station situate between that station and the station secondly named thereon; or
(iii) for a journey by a train by which the ticket is available.
Penalty: Five pounds.
- Tickets transferred, &c. to use a ticket—** 10. A person shall not with intent to evade the payment of his fare use or attempt to use a ticket—
(i) which has been obtained by him or another person on his behalf otherwise than from the Commissioners or from a person authorized by the Commissioners to sell or issue tickets; or
(ii) which has been obtained on behalf of another person for the purpose of enabling such other person to travel by railway; or
(iii) which has been in any respect materially altered or defaced; or
(iv) the time for using which has expired; or
(v) the time for using which has not arrived.
Penalty: Twenty Pounds.
- Break of Journey.** 11. Unless entitled so to do under the by-laws or authorized so to do by an employee empowered by the Commissioners to grant the authority a person shall not alight from a train and break his journey at a station situate between the stations named on his ticket and thereafter with intent to evade payment of the fare from the station at which the journey was broken to the station secondly named on his ticket use or attempt to use his ticket in order to travel by another train from the station at which the journey was broken towards or to the station secondly named on his ticket.
Penalty: Five pounds.
- First-class on second-class tickets.** 12. A person shall not with intent to evade payment of the fare lawfully payable by him in the circumstances take a seat or travel in a vehicle of a class superior to that for which he is provided with a ticket.
Penalty: Twenty pounds.
- Tickets not available for smoking cars.** 13. (i) A person who is provided with—
(a) a half-ticket of the type commonly issued to persons who have not attained the age of fourteen years; or with
(b) a ticket upon which the words "Not available for smoking compartment" are written printed stamped or impressed; or with
(c) a metal periodical ticket which pursuant to the by-laws regulating the issue of periodical tickets at reduced fares to students or to youths and females engaged in business or to females who are not engaged in business has been issued at a fare less than the full fare for the time being payable by an adult, shall not travel or attempt to travel in a smoking compartment.
Penalty: Two pounds.
(ii) Nothing in sub-section (i) of this section shall be deemed to prohibit a child who is apparently under the age of fourteen years from travelling in a smoking compartment when in the company and under the control of a person who is apparently above the age of twenty-one years and who is entitled to travel in such a compartment.
- Trains scheduled to set down only.** 14. A person shall not without being authorized in writing by an employee empowered by the Commissioners to grant such an authority for the purpose of travelling thereby enter or travel in a vehicle attached to a train which has not been stopped for the purpose of picking up passengers.
Penalty: Five pounds.
- Trains scheduled to pick up only.** 15. Unless provided with a reasonable excuse or the authority of an employee empowered to grant such an authority a passenger shall not with the intention of breaking or finishing his journey alight from a train which has not been stopped for the purpose of setting down passengers.
Penalty: Five pounds.
- Trains scheduled to pick up or set down.** 16. When a train is appointed solely for the conveyance of passengers to certain specified stations a person shall not unless he intends to travel and does in fact travel by the train to one of the stations specified enter or travel in a vehicle attached to the train, unless he or some one on his behalf shall have first obtained from an authorized employee authority in writing so to do.
Penalty: Five pounds.
- Vehicles reserved for specified passengers.** 17. When a vehicle attached to a train is appointed solely for the conveyance of passengers to certain specified stations a person shall not unless he intends to travel and does in fact travel therein to one of the stations specified occupy a seat in the vehicle.
Penalty: Five pounds.

18. A person shall not travel or attempt to travel in a train or vehicle which is appointed solely for the conveyance of passengers each of whom reserves the right to occupy a particular seat therein unless he or some one on his behalf has previously reserved such a right and has obtained from the Commissioners or from some one acting under their authority a ticket specifying the seat in respect of which the right has been reserved.

Penalty: Five pounds.

19. Except in a case in which an authority to the contrary is given by an authorized employee a person shall not travel or attempt to travel in a sleeping compartment or occupy or attempt to occupy a berth in a sleeping compartment unless he or some one on his behalf has previously reserved the right to travel in the compartment or to occupy the berth as the case may be and has obtained from the Commissioners or from some one acting under their authority a ticket specifying the compartment and berth in respect of which the right has been reserved.

Penalty: Five pounds.

PART III.—PROVISIONS REGULATING THE CONDUCT OF PERSONS WHEN UPON RAILWAY PREMISES.

20. A person shall not give or offer a gratuity to any employee.

Penalty: Five pounds.

21. A person other than an employee engaged in the execution of his duty shall not without reasonable excuse—

- (i) enter or attempt to enter join or attempt to join or leave or attempt to leave a vehicle while it is in motion; or
- (ii) enter or attempt to enter or leave or attempt to leave a vehicle otherwise than through a doorway which adjoins a platform or other means appointed for the use of persons who desire to enter or leave vehicles; or
- (iii) open on any vehicle a door which is locked; or
- (iv) lock on any vehicle a door which is unlocked; or
- (v) open or hold open on any vehicle which is in motion any door provided in such vehicle and so fitted therein as to open outwards therefrom; or
- (vi) mount or attempt to mount or travel or attempt to travel on a locomotive or on the roof or step or footboard of a vehicle or on or in any part of a vehicle other than a part appointed for the conveyance of passengers.

Penalty: Twenty pounds.

22. A person shall not without reasonable excuse protrude any portion of his person from the open door or window of a vehicle which is in motion or touch or attempt to touch any building structure or fixture or other object situate in the vicinity of the railway upon which the vehicle in which he is travelling is in motion.

Penalty: Five pounds.

23. A person shall not without reasonable excuse apply any brake fitted to a vehicle or make use of the means provided in a vehicle to enable the passengers travelling therein to communicate with the employees in charge of the train to which the vehicle is attached.

Penalty: Twenty pounds.

24. A person shall not—

- (i) cross or attempt to cross any line of railway elsewhere than at a place appointed as a crossing place; or
- (ii) when warned by an authorized employee to refrain from doing so cross or attempt to cross a line of railway at a place appointed as a crossing place.

Penalty: Ten pounds.

25. A person shall not throw or drop upon or from any premises of the Commissioners or from any vehicle any bottle glass stone or other article or thing of whatsoever nature which is by reason of its being thrown or dropped capable of causing injury or damage to or of endangering any person or property.

Penalty: Twenty pounds.

26. A person who is in a state of intoxication shall not be brought upon or conveyed to any station or premises of the Commissioners.

Penalty: Five pounds.

27. A person shall not drink any intoxicating liquor in or upon any vehicle or premises of the Commissioners except at a place specially provided for the purpose.

Penalty: Five pounds.

28. Unless expressly authorized so to do by the Commissioners a person who is suffering from an infectious or contagious disease or disorder shall not be brought upon or remain or be in or upon any vehicle or premises of the Commissioners or travel or attempt to travel on any railway.

Penalty: Twenty pounds.

29. A person shall not enter or attempt to enter or join or attempt to join a vehicle after having been requested by an authorized employee to refrain from so doing.

Penalty: Twenty pounds.

30. A person shall not unless he is in possession of a ticket which entitles him so to do be or remain in or upon any vehicle or premises of the Commissioners after being requested by an authorized employee to leave such vehicle or premises.

Penalty: Five pounds.

31. A person who is not a passenger shall not—

- (i) occupy a seat in a vehicle; or
- (ii) be or remain in a vehicle except for the purpose of rendering assistance to a passenger; or
- (iii) when in a vehicle for the purpose of rendering assistance to a passenger remain in the vehicle for a period of time in excess of that which is in the circumstances reasonably necessary.

Penalty: Five pounds.

- Remaining in any part of vehicles. 32. A person shall not after being requested by an authorized employee to refrain from so doing be or remain on a platform or in a doorway vestibule corridor or gangway of a vehicle.
Penalty: Five pounds.
- Dangerous articles 33. A person shall not convey or attempt to convey in any vehicle or bring or attempt to bring on to any premises of the Commissioners any dangerous article which is not packed in the manner from time to time prescribed.
Penalty: Twenty pounds.
- Loaded firearms. 34. A person other than an employee engaged in the execution of his duty shall not without the written authority of the Commissioners carry or attempt to carry or bring or attempt to bring or discharge or attempt to discharge any loaded firearm in or upon or from any premises of the Commissioners.
Penalty: Twenty pounds.
- Carcasses or bulky packages of passengers— 35. A person shall not convey or attempt to convey in a vehicle used for the carriage of passengers—
(i) the carcass or a portion of the carcass of any animal or bird unless it is packed in the manner prescribed; or
(ii) any article or package which by reason of its bulk shape or nature or by reason of the nature of its contents is calculated to be a source of annoyance or of discomfort to any other person or is capable of causing injury or damage to or of endangering any person or property.
Penalty: Five pounds.
- Seats temporarily vacated. 36. When a passenger who is in occupation of a seat temporarily vacates that seat for any purpose another person shall not while the seat is temporarily vacant appropriate it to his own use and refuse on being required so to do to yield it up again to the original occupier thereof.
Penalty: Five pounds.
- Unoccupied seats. 37. When a seat is in fact unoccupied and has not been personally appropriated by any person for his own use a person shall not by means of any act device or representation of any kind deceive or attempt to deceive another person into the belief that a third person has in fact personally appropriated the seat for his own use.
Penalty: Five pounds.
- Seats, appropriation of. 38. If a passenger who is in occupation of a seat vacates that seat and goes into occupation of another seat he shall not while he remains in occupation of the other seat by means of any act device or representation of any kind deceive or attempt to deceive another person into the belief that the vacant seat is not in fact vacant.
Penalty: Five pounds.
- Article on seats. 39. A person shall not without reasonable excuse place any article of any kind upon a seat which has not been appropriated by him for his personal use.
Penalty: Five pounds.
- Reserved seats. 40. A person shall not after being warned by an authorized employee to refrain from doing so occupy or attempt to occupy in any vehicle a seat the right to occupy which has been reserved by another person.
Penalty: Five pounds.
- Reserved compartments. 41. A person shall not after being warned by an authorized employee to refrain from doing so occupy or attempt to occupy a seat in a compartment the exclusive right to occupy a seat in which has already been reserved by the Commissioners in favour of some other person or persons.
Penalty: Five pounds.
- Gambling, offensive conduct &c. 42. A person shall not while he is in or upon any vehicle or premises of the Commissioners—
(i) gamble; or
(ii) make use of any abusive blasphemous indecent insulting obscene offensive profane or threatening language or gesture to the annoyance or hindrance of any other person; or
(iii) behave in a disorderly indecent offensive or riotous manner; or
(iv) unless authorized to do so distribute handbills to or solicit money from any other person.
Penalty: Twenty pounds.
- Persons on foot, how to proceed. 43. A person on foot shall not while he is upon any land or premises of the Commissioners proceed at a pace or in a manner which is likely to cause injury damage discomfort or inconvenience to or to endanger any person or property.
Penalty: Five pounds.
- Station entrances and exits. 44. A person shall not without reasonable excuse enter or leave any station platform or other premises of the Commissioners otherwise than by means of an entrance or exit provided thereat and appointed for the use of persons who desire to enter or leave such station platform or premises.
Penalty: Five pounds.
- Closed doors and gates. 45. A person shall not without reasonable excuse upon any station platform or other premises of the Commissioners open or otherwise interfere with any gate or door which has been locked or closed by an authorized employee or close or otherwise interfere with any gate or door which has been opened by any such employee.
Penalty: Five pounds.
- Lighting or extinguishing lamps. 46. A person shall not without reasonable excuse light or extinguish or otherwise interfere with any lamp which is fitted in any vehicle or which is situate upon or about any premises of the Commissioners.
Penalty: Twenty pounds.

47. A person shall not place his feet upon—
 (i) any seat cushion or armrest ; or
 (ii) upon any furniture or equipment ; or
 (iii) upon any upholstered or polished or plated portion,
 in or of any vehicle or premises of the Commissioners.
 Penalty : Five pounds. Feet on
seats, &c.
48. A person shall not spit—
 (i) upon the floor or upon any part other than a part set aside for the purpose of
 any vehicle which is used for the conveyance of passengers ; or
 (ii) upon the platform at any station ; or
 (iii) upon the floor side or wall of any hall office waiting room refreshment room
 or public room or public passage forming part of any premises of the
 Commissioners.
 Penalty : Five pounds. Spitting.
49. A person shall not write draw or affix any abusive blasphemous indecent insulting
 obscene offensive or profane word representation or character in or to any vehicle or
 premises of the Commissioners. Indecent, &c.
writing.
 Penalty : Twenty pounds.
50. A male person shall not knowingly be or remain in or in the immediate vicinity
 of any vehicle compartment of a vehicle room privy or lavatory set apart for the exclusive
 use of persons of the female sex. Accommoda-
tion for the
exclusive use
of females.
 Penalty : Twenty pounds.
51. A person who takes possession of or finds in or upon any vehicle or premises of
 the Commissioners any property which has apparently been lost by another person shall
 as soon as is practicable deliver up the property either to the guard of the train or to
 the officer or employee for the time being in charge of the station at or which is most
 convenient to the place at which the property was found. Lost property.
 Penalty : Five pounds.
52. A person other than an employee engaged in the execution of his duty shall not
 unless expressly authorized in writing by the Commissioners so to do in or upon any
 vehicle or premises of the Commissioners— Hawking and
looting.
 (i) hawk sell hire or offer or expose for sale or for hire any articles or goods of
 any description ; or
 (ii) tout ply for or solicit custom hire or employment of any description.
 Penalty : Twenty pounds.

PART IV.—PROVISIONS RELATING TO ROAD VEHICLES.

53. The person in charge of a road vehicle shall while he is upon or about any premises
 of the Commissioners obey the reasonable directions of any authorized employee or
 authorized member of the Police Force of Victoria. Directions to
drivers of road
vehicles.
 Penalty : Ten pounds.
54. A person shall not with any road vehicle of any kind ply for hire on any premises
 of the Commissioners unless he has obtained from the Commissioners a licence in writing
 authorizing him so to do. Plying for hire.
 Penalty : Twenty pounds.
55. The driver of a road vehicle drawn by an animal shall not leave or be away from
 the vehicle while it is upon or about any premises of the Commissioners unless one of
 the wheels of the vehicle is secured or fastened in such a way as will effectually prevent
 the rotation thereof. Drivers of
horse-drawn
vehicles.
 Penalty : Five pounds.
56. A person shall not while he is upon or about any premises of the Commissioners
 ride or drive any horse or other animal or any road vehicle or machine— Dangerous
driving.
 (i) in a manner which is calculated to cause injury or damage to or to endanger
 any person or property ; or
 (ii) upon or over or along any road path or way which is appointed for the exclusive
 use of pedestrians ; or
 (iii) at a speed exceeding the maximum permissible speed indicated by a notice
 board.
 Penalty : Ten pounds.
57. When he is proceeding towards or over a level crossing the driver of a road
 vehicle shall not drive that vehicle contrary to any instruction or signal given by an
 authorized employee or any notice in writing at or in the vicinity of the crossing. Vehicles
crossing level
crossings.
 Penalty : Ten pounds.
58. A person shall not drive or attempt to drive or convey or attempt to convey
 across any railway at a level crossing— Traction
engines or
heavy loads
crossing level
crossings.
 (i) any traction engine or road engine of any kind ; or
 (ii) any road vehicle the weight of which upon any one axle exceeds six tons ; or
 (iii) any road vehicle machine or contrivance which exceeds or upon which is carried
 a load which exceeds 14 feet in height when measured from the uppermost
 surface of a rail of the railway or 12 feet in breadth ; or
 (iv) any road vehicle which will cause or is calculated to cause an obstruction to
 the railway,
 unless he at least forty-eight hours before the time at which he proposes to drive or convey
 the engine vehicle machine or contrivance in question across the railway shall have given
 to the employee in charge of a railway station which is also a telegraph station or to the
 employee in charge of the station which is most convenient to the place at which the
 crossing is to be effected and is in charge of a male person a notice in writing setting out
 the time and place at which it is proposed to drive or convey the engine vehicle machine
 or contrivance across the railway and the name and postal address of the owner of the
 engine vehicle machine or contrivance and shall have made such provision as the Com-
 missioners may, notify him in their opinion necessary in order to prevent damage being
 done to the railway by reason of the engine vehicle machine or contrivance being driven
 or conveyed across it.
 Penalty : Twenty pounds.

Motor vehicles containing petrol, &c

59. A person shall not without the written authority of the Commissioners consign or attempt to consign a motor vehicle for carriage by railway or warehouse or attempt to warehouse a motor vehicle with the Commissioners unless—

- (i) every cylinder pipe carburettor burner tank or other receptacle forming part of or fitted to or contained in the motor vehicle has been completely emptied of any inflammable or explosive gas and of any inflammable or volatile liquid which may be contained therein;
- (ii) the connecting cables and wires of every electric battery fitted to the motor vehicle have been disconnected from the battery terminals;
- (iii) the battery terminals have been covered or otherwise protected in a way which will ensure that the said terminals cannot be inadvertently connected while the motor vehicle is in the custody or under the control of the Commissioners.

Penalty: Twenty pounds.

PART V.—PROVISIONS FOR THE PROTECTION OF THE PROPERTY OF THE COMMISSIONERS.

Damage or removal of railway property.

60. A person shall not without reasonable excuse—

- (i) destroy damage deface mutilate write upon or injure; or
- (ii) remove from the place in which for the time being it is;

any property whether real or personal of the Commissioners or any property or thing which is in or upon or is affixed to any vehicle or premises of the Commissioners.

Penalty: Twenty pounds.

Interference with railway equipment.

61. A person shall not without reasonable excuse—

- (i) operate or otherwise interfere with any signal brake points turn-table or switch or any other electrical or mechanical machinery or apparatus which is in or upon or is affixed to any vehicle or premises of the Commissioners;
- (ii) throw any object at or towards an electric line or at or towards any electrical apparatus belonging to the Commissioners;
- (iii) fly release or propel any kite balloon or other similar device into the air at or to a point within a distance of 300 yards of any boundary of a railway on which an electric line is situated.

Penalty: Twenty pounds.

Advertising on railway premises.

62. A person shall not except with the written authority of the Commissioners affix or draw or post or write any advertisement bill placard poster or notice of any kind to in or on any vehicle or premises of the Commissioners.

Penalty: Five pounds.

Sewage.

63. A person shall not cause or permit or suffer drainage or sewage to flow or to be emptied from any land or premises occupied by him on to or upon any land or premises of the Commissioners.

Penalty: Twenty pounds.

Pollution &c. of reservoirs and tanks.

64. A person shall not—

- (i) bathe in or pollute the water of any reservoir or tank vested in the Commissioners; or
- (ii) without first obtaining the consent in writing of the Commissioners fish in or shoot over or upon any such reservoir or tank.

Penalty: Ten pounds.

Poison.

65. A person shall not unless authorized by the Commissioners so to do place any poison or poisoned substance on or upon any lands or premises of the Commissioners.

Penalty: Five pounds.

Lighting fires or throwing burning substances.

66. A person other than an employee engaged in the execution of his duty shall not without reasonable excuse—

- (i) unless authorized so to do by an employee empowered by the Commissioners to grant such an authority light a fire on any land or premises or in any vehicle of the Commissioners;
- (ii) leave a fire which has been lit by him on any land or premises or in any vehicle of the Commissioners until the said fire is completely extinguished;
- (iii) in circumstances calculated to cause injury or damage to or to endanger any person or property—
 - (a) bring any burning substance into or upon any vehicle or premises of the Commissioners or by any act or omission cause it to happen that a burning substance is brought into or upon any such vehicle or premises;
 - (b) throw or drop any burning substance at or upon or from any vehicle or premises of the Commissioners or by any act or omission cause it to happen that a burning substance is thrown or dropped at or upon or from any such vehicle or premises.

Penalty: Twenty pounds.

PART VI.—PROVISIONS RELATING TO ANIMALS ON RAILWAY PREMISES.

Diseased animals.

67. A person shall not knowingly bring or cause or permit to be brought on to any premises of the Commissioners any animal or bird which is suffering from any disease or disorder whatsoever.

Penalty: Twenty pounds.

Animals crossing lines.

68. A person shall not ride or drive or attempt to ride or drive an animal across a railway at a level crossing—

- (i) when a train in motion is in sight and is approaching the level crossing at which such person proposes to ride or drive the animal across the railway; or
- (ii) when warned by means of a bell or flag or whistle or light or other warning medium or device of the approach of a train towards the level crossing; or
- (iii) when warned by an employee to refrain from so doing.

Penalty: Twenty pounds.

69. A person shall not except in circumstances which are authorized by a by-law drive any animal or bird on to or upon any land or premises of the Commissioners. Animals or birds driven on railway premises.
Penalty: Twenty pounds.

70. The owner or any person having in law the care custody or control of any animal or bird found straying upon any land or premises of the Commissioners shall be guilty of an offence unless he proves that he has taken reasonable precautions to prevent such animal or bird from so straying. Animal trespass.
Penalty: Twenty pounds.

71. A person shall not without the permission of an authorized employee bring or suffer or permit a dog by which he is accompanied to be brought on to or to be upon or about any station platform or other premises of the Commissioners unless the movements of the dog are directly and efficiently controlled by some person by means of some efficient apparatus. Dogs brought on railway premises.
Penalty: Five pounds.

72. A person shall not unless authorized by an employee empowered by the Commissioners to grant the authority convey or attempt to convey in a vehicle used for the carriage of passengers any dog or other animal whatever its species: Provided that the provisions of this section shall not operate to prevent a person from conveying in any such vehicle any bird the freight of which has been prepaid and which is contained in a receptacle which will ensure that the bird will not be a source of annoyance or of discomfort to any person. Dogs or birds in passenger vehicles.
Penalty: Five pounds.

PART VII.—PROVISIONS WHICH ARE PARTICULARLY APPLICABLE TO ELECTRIC STREET RAILWAYS.

73. A person shall not join or attempt to join or leave or attempt to leave a vehicle through a gangway which has been closed by means of a gate or barrier or other device. Closed gangways.
Penalty: Five pounds.

74. A person shall not with intent to evade the payment of his fare— Fares to be tendered.
(i) travel in a vehicle using an electric street railway; or
(ii) when travelling in a vehicle using an electric street railway by any act device or representation of any kind deceive or attempt to deceive the conductor in charge of the vehicle into the belief that he has paid his fare.

Penalty: Five pounds.

75. When a particular fare is specified as being the minimum fare payable for a journey by a vehicle using an electric street railway a person shall not with intent to evade payment of that minimum fare travel or attempt to travel by that vehicle. Minimum fare cars.

Penalty: Five pounds.

76. A person shall not while riding a bicycle or any similar machine in any street or road in or on which an electric street railway is situated without reasonable excuse cling to or otherwise attach himself or the bicycle or the machine which he is riding to any vehicle using the electric street railway. Cyclists clinging to cars.

Penalty: Five pounds.

PART VIII.—MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS.

77. A person shall not with a fraudulent intent— Fraudulent use of freight stamps.
(i) remove from a package or parcel consigned for carriage by railway any freight stamp affixed thereto or to any label attached to such package or parcel; or
(ii) remove from any freight stamp previously used any mark made thereon as an indication that the stamp has been cancelled; or
(iii) knowingly put off or use in connexion with the consignment of any package or parcel for carriage by railway any freight stamp or portion of a freight stamp which is obliterated defaced altered or mutilated.

Penalty: Twenty pounds.

78. A person shall not without first giving a receipt therefor to an authorized employee and paying the amount of any charges which may be due to the Commissioners in respect of the carriage care or warehousing of the same remove from any station or premises of the Commissioners any animal article package or thing which has been carried by railway to the station or premises in question. Removal of goods.

Penalty: Twenty pounds.

79. A person shall not without the authority of the owner thereof or of his authorized agent use for packing purposes or as a container for rabbits fish poultry or any other commodity carried or intended for carriage by railway any crate coop basket box or other container receptacle or contrivance for the time being upon or about any premises of the Commissioners at the order or on account of another person. Use of crates, coops etc.

Penalty: Five pounds.

80. A person shall not without reasonable excuse cause or endeavour to cause the employees who are in charge of a train which is in motion on a railway to stop the train. Stopping trains.

Penalty: Twenty pounds.

81. A person shall not with intent to evade payment of the fare of another person or to defraud or prejudice the Commissioners in connexion with a journey to be made by another person do or omit anything which if done or omitted by a person with the intent to evade payment of his own fare or to defraud or prejudice the Commissioners in connexion with a journey to be made by him, would be a breach of the provisions of any of the following sections of this by-law namely sections 4 to 12 inclusive and sections 74 and 75. Fraud to enable travel by another person.

Penalty: The penalty provided for a breach of the section of which the act or omission complained of would be a breach were it done or omitted by a person with intent to evade payment of his own fare or to defraud or prejudice the Commissioners in connexion with a journey to be made by him.

- Persons permitting children to infringe by-laws.** 82. A person shall not without reasonable excuse knowingly suffer or permit a child who is in his custody to do or omit anything which if done or omitted by the person himself would be a breach of any of the following sections of this by-law namely sections 21 to 25 inclusive section 31 sections 34 and 35 section 64 section 66 and section 73.
Penalty: Five pounds.
- Removal of offenders.** 83. A person who persists with a contravention of any of the provisions of this by-law after being warned by an authorized employee to desist may if he fails to leave any vehicle or premises of the Commissioners immediately upon being requested so to do by an authorized employee without prejudice to any penalty he may have incurred under this by-law be forthwith removed from the vehicle or premises by or under the direction of the employee.
Penalty: Twenty pounds.
- Names and addresses.** 84. Upon being required so to do a person—
(a) who is detected in a contravention of any provision of the Railways Acts or Railways by-laws or
(b) who has entered at a booking station or has travelled therefrom and for any cause whatsoever fails whilst on railway premises to produce on demand a ticket entitling him so to enter or travel
shall immediately furnish his correct name and address to an authorized employee.
Penalty: Two pounds.
- Fraudulent conveyance of animals.** 85. A person shall not with intent to evade payment of the charges lawfully payable for the carriage of the same convey or attempt to convey in any vehicle any dog or other animal whatever its species or any goods.
Penalty: Five pounds.
- Loitering.** 86. A person shall not loiter upon or about any land or premises of the Commissioners so as to create an obstruction or to be an annoyance or hindrance to any other person.
Penalty: Twenty pounds.
- Entering railway truck, &c.** 87. A person shall not unless expressly authorized to do so by an authorized employee—
(i) enter a railway truck which contains any goods; or
(ii) remove any goods from a railway truck.
Penalty: Twenty pounds.
- Rubbish, filth, &c.** 88. A person shall not except in circumstances in which the act or omission is authorized by a by-law throw or place or leave or deposit or by any act or omission cause it to happen that there shall be thrown or placed or left or deposited in or upon or about any vehicle or premises of the Commissioners—
(i) any rubbish or refuse or filth or any noisome offensive or putrid matter; or
(ii) any matter or thing likely to cause injury to any other person or damage to property; or
(iii) any matter or thing calculated to cause annoyance to any other person.
Penalty: Twenty pounds.
- Confetti.** 89. A person shall not throw or place or leave or deposit in or upon about any vehicle or premises of the Commissioners any confetti paper streamer rose leaves rice paper bag handbill or wastepaper of any kind.
Penalty: Five pounds.
- Examination of goods, &c.** 90. A person shall while upon premises of the Commissioners in a goods yard or other place at which goods are received for transport by rail or delivered after such transport upon being requested to do so by an authorized employee—
(i) permit the said employee to examine any goods in his care custody or control; and
(ii) where a pass-out docket has been issued produce the docket to the said employee.
Penalty: Five pounds.
- Refund on unused tickets.** 91. A person shall not with intent to defraud obtain or attempt to obtain a refund of the surrender value of an unused ticket to which he is not entitled.
Penalty: Twenty pounds.

IN pursuance of the powers conferred by the Seeds Act 1928 and 1935 and all other powers enabling him in that behalf, His Excellency the Governor of the State of Victoria by and with the advice of the Executive Council thereof, doth hereby repeal the Regulations made on the 11th February, 1936, and the 27th February, 1940, and in lieu thereof doth make the following Regulations (that is to say):—

1. "Foreign Ingredients" shall be substances of the character following:—

"Other Crop Seeds" are seeds of those plants listed in Group I. and Group II. of Schedule IV. hereto.

Weeds or seeds of weeds.

Non-germinable seeds.

Seeds other than those specified in the invoice.

"Inert Matter" includes all portions of seeds or fruits that are one-half or less than one-half the normal size, completely decorticated seeds of legumes, clusters of mangel, beet and sugar beet containing no seeds and clusters which pass through a 2-mm. slit sieve, stones, chaff, sand, grit, soil, fragments of roots, stems, leaves and flowers, empty glumes, single pales, sterile flowers of grasses, parts of insects, dead insects, scales and any other inert matter as for instance seeds containing larvae of parasitic insects (Foxtail seeds with larvae of *Oligotropus* sp.) and *Claviceps sclerotia* in grass seed.

2. The sale of seed containing any seed of the species named in Schedule I of these Regulations is prohibited, provided that all recognized cultivated varieties of those species imported for the purpose of cultivation shall be exempt from this Regulation.

3. In respect of seeds included in Schedule II. of these Regulations, the number of weed seeds which may be contained in any kind of seeds shall not exceed that prescribed opposite each weed named in the said schedule, subject to the conditions (a) and (b) set out at the head of the said schedule.

4. The weights of seeds to be taken as samples, for the purpose of examination, shall be not less than the weights set forth in the second column of Schedule III. of these Regulations.

5. The proportion or amount of "Foreign Ingredients" which may be contained in any kind of seed shall not exceed the proportion or amount set forth opposite the name of each kind of seed in Schedule IV. of these Regulations.

6. The fee for examination of each sample of seed made under the Act shall be two shillings and six pence.

7. On every parcel of seed of *Trifolium subterraneum* (Subterranean Clover) sold or exposed or offered for sale, or on a label securely attached thereto, there shall be clearly printed or written:—

(a) The words "Subterranean Clover."

(b) The flowering period and strain name in the following words:—

"First early flowering strain—Dwalganup," or "First early flowering strain—Mulwala," or "Early flowering strain—Bacchus Marsh," or "Late flowering strain—Tallarook,"

as the case may be.

(c) The words "Strain unknown" in cases where the flowering period and strain name are not known.

Where the strain name only is not known, the flowering period must be stated.

8. The penalty for any contravention of these Regulations shall be a sum not exceeding Ten pounds.

ADULT EDUCATION ACT 1946.

*At the Executive Council Chamber, Melbourne,
the first day of July, 1947.*

PRESENT:

His Excellency the Governor of Victoria.
Mr. Hayes | Mr. Fraser.

ADULT EDUCATION REGULATIONS.

PURSUANT to the powers conferred by the *Adult Education Act* 1946, His Excellency the Governor of the State of Victoria, by and with the advice of the Executive Council thereof, doth hereby make the following Regulations, that is to say:—

1. These Regulations may be cited as Adult Education Regulations.

2. In these Regulations, unless inconsistent with the context or subject-matter—

“Adult Education Officer” means officer of the Council directly engaged in the teaching and organization of adult education.

“Clerical Officer” means officer of the Council engaged in the performance of clerical work for the Council.

“Council” means Council of Adult Education.

“Director” means Director of Adult Education.

“Assistant Director” means Assistant Director of Adult Education.

“Executive” means Executive Committee of the Council of Adult Education.

“Metropolitan area” means the area lying within a distance of twenty miles from the post office at the corner of Elizabeth-street and Bourke-street, Melbourne.

“Minister” means Minister of Public Instruction.

3. The salary of the Director of Adult Education shall be £1,250 per annum.

4. (i) An Assistant Director of Adult Education may be appointed for a period of five years and shall be eligible for reappointment.

(ii) The Assistant Director of Adult Education shall receive an annual salary of not more than £900 per annum.

(iii) The Assistant Director shall perform such duties as are required by the Director and shall act as Director during the temporary absence or incapacity of the Director.

5. (i) Adult Education Officers may be appointed for terms not exceeding five years and shall be eligible for reappointment.

(ii) Adult Education Officers shall be responsible in the performance of their duties to the Director and shall carry out such duties as are determined by the Council.

(iii) The remuneration of Adult Education Officers shall be determined by the following scale, appointments to be made within the scale, according to qualifications and experience:—

Adult Education Officer, Grade I.—£650-850 per annum.

Adult Education Officer, Grade II.—£450-650 per annum.

Annual increments within the respective scales shall be payable to Adult Education Officers at the rate of £25 per annum.

6. There may be a Secretary-Accountant who shall perform such duties as are required by the Director.

(i) The Secretary-Accountant may be appointed for a period of five years and shall be eligible for reappointment.

(ii) The remuneration of the Secretary-Accountant shall be determined by the following scale, appointment to be made within the scale, according to qualifications and experience:—

Secretary-Accountant—£527-579 per annum.

(iii) Annual increment within the scale shall be payable to the Secretary-Accountant at the rate of £26 per annum.

7. Clerical Officers may be appointed by the Council on the recommendation of the Executive, to hold office for such periods as the Council may determine.

- (i) Clerical Officers shall be responsible in the performance of their duties to the Director.
- (ii) Clerical Officers may be appointed at the rate of remuneration set out in the following scale, appointments to be made within the scale, according to qualifications and experience:—

- (iii) Subject to satisfactory service, annual increments within the respective scales in 7 (ii) shall be payable at the rate of £25 per annum in the case of the Senior Clerk and at the rate of £13 per annum in all other cases.

8. A Librarian may be appointed by the Council on the recommendation of the Executive, to hold office for such period as the Council may determine.

- (i) The Librarian shall be responsible in the performance of the duties of the position to the Director.
- (ii) The salary of the Librarian shall be determined by the scale £300–400 per annum, appointment to be made within the scale according to qualifications and experience.
- (iii) Subject to satisfactory service, annual increment within the scale shall be payable at the rate of £25 per annum.

9. A Driver-Storeman may be appointed by the Council on the recommendation of the Executive, to hold office for such period as the Council may determine.

- (i) The Driver-Storeman shall be responsible in the performance of his duties to the Director.
- (ii) The salary of the Driver-Storeman shall be determined by the scale £312–364 per annum, appointment to be made within the scale according to qualifications and experience.

10. The salaries prescribed in these Regulations shall be subject to automatic adjustment in accordance with the variations in the cost of living on the same basis and method as may be prescribed from time to time by regulations under the *Public Service Act 1946*.

11. Except where otherwise provided in these Regulations, the conditions of the Regulations in force from time to time under the *Public Service Act 1946* with respect to—

- (a) hours of duty and times of attendance of officers and employees; and
- (b) leave of absence,

shall, with such adaptations as are necessary, apply to officers other than part-time officers appointed by the Council.

12. (i) Part-time Adult Education Officers may on the recommendation of the Executive be appointed by the Council for special duties at salaries not exceeding £300 per annum for periods not exceeding one year.

(ii) The fees to be paid to part-time lecturers or demonstrators employed by the Council shall be not less than £2 2s. and not more than £5 5s. per lecture or demonstration: Provided that a special fee of not more than £10 10s. may on the recommendation of the Council be paid to part-time lecturers or demonstrators for special lectures or demonstrations or courses of lectures or demonstrations.

(iii) The fee to be paid to part-time lecturers, demonstrators or other qualified persons for the preparation of original study or discussion material shall be not less than £1 1s. and not more than £3 3s. for each script accepted by the Director.

(iv) (a) Officers (including part-time Adult Education Officers) and part-time lecturers and demonstrators, when travelling in the performance of their duties, shall be entitled, in addition to being reimbursed the reasonable cost of conveyance, to receive reimbursement of personal expenses, at the rate of One pound for each full day and a proportionate amount of such sum for part of a day.

(b) Such rate of reimbursement is fixed to cover the expense of three meals a day and lodging and the reimbursement in respect of each meal and of bed shall be one-fourth of the daily rate.

13. (i) The fee to be paid by any person receiving adult education shall be Five shillings for each course of not more than twelve and not less than six lectures or demonstrations.

(ii) The fee to be paid for single lectures shall be One shilling.

(iii) The fee to be paid by persons enrolled in a Discussion or Study Course shall be Five shillings per person per course.

14. (i) A member of the Council during his absence in the performance of his duties beyond the metropolitan area, or in order to attend meetings of the Council and Executive when his place of residence is beyond the metropolitan area, shall be entitled, in addition to being reimbursed the reasonable cost of conveyance, to receive reimbursement of personal expenses at the rate of One pound for each full day and a proportionate amount of such sum for part of a day.

(ii) Such rate of reimbursement is fixed to cover the expense of three meals a day and lodging and the reimbursement in respect of each meal and of bed shall be one-fourth of the daily rate.

And the Honorable Francis Field, His Majesty's Minister of Public Instruction for the State of Victoria, shall give the necessary directions herein accordingly.

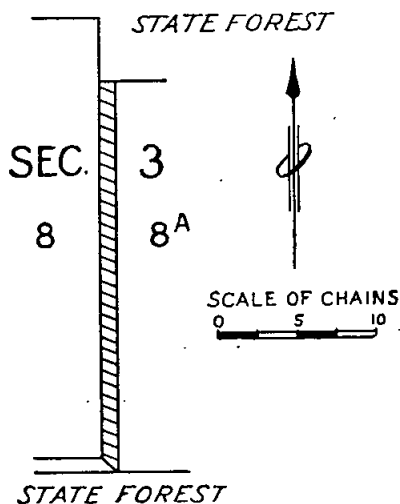

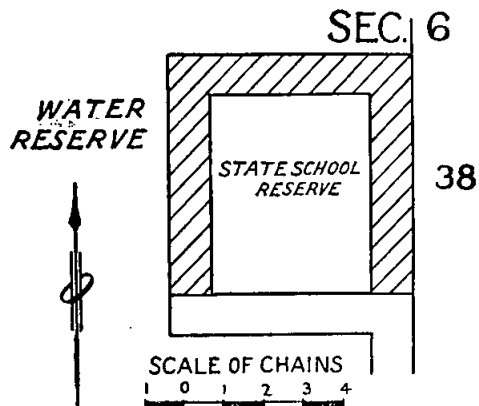

DECLARATION OF MAIN ROADS IN THE SHIRES OF ARAPILES, BASS, AND BELFAST, THE CITY OF BOX HILL, THE SHIRES OF GRENVILLE AND HEALESVILLE, THE TOWN OF HORSHAM, THE SHIRE OF KARKAROO, THE BOROUGH OF KOROIT, THE SHIRES OF KOWREE AND PORTLAND, THE BOROUGH OF RINGWOOD, THE SHIRE OF STAWELL, THE BOROUGH OF STAWELL, AND THE SHIRE OF WALFEUP.

WHEREAS by the Resolution set out below and dated the twenty-third day of June One thousand nine hundred and forty-seven the Country Roads Board incorporated under the *Country Roads Act 1928* (No. 3662), being of opinion that the highways in the State of Victoria set out or described in the Schedule to the same are of sufficient importance to be main roads and acting under the powers in that behalf conferred upon it by the said Act declared such highways to be main roads within the meaning and for the purposes of the Act aforesaid: And whereas the said Act amongst other things provides that the Governor in Council may by Order published in the *Government Gazette* confirm such Resolution whereupon any roads mentioned in such Resolution shall be main roads: And whereas it is deemed desirable to confirm the Resolution so made and passed by the said Country Roads Board: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor of the State of Victoria by and with the advice of the Executive Council thereof doth hereby confirm such Resolution and declare upon the publication of this Order in the *Government Gazette* the roads mentioned in the Schedule to such Resolution of the Country Roads Board main roads within the meaning and for the purposes of the *Country Roads Act 1928*.

*Resolution Declaring Main Roads under the
Country Roads Act.*

The Country Roads Board incorporated under the *Country Roads Act 1928* (No. 3662) at a meeting now holden being of opinion that the highways within the State of Victoria set out or described in the Schedule hereunder written are of sufficient importance to be main roads acting under the powers conferred upon it by the said Act doth by this Resolution hereby declare such highways to be main roads within the meaning and for the purposes of the said *Country Roads Act 1928*.

SCHEDULE.

Shire of Arapiles.

6. *Horsham-Noradjuha Road* (306).—Commencing at the bridge over Wimmera River, distant 24 deg. 0 min. 14 chains, more or less, from the northern angle of allotment 270, Parish of Vectis East, on the northern boundary of the shire; thence south-westerly, southerly, and south-westerly to the southern angle of the allotment last named; thence further south-westerly to its junction with the Natimuk-Hamilton road at the south-western angle of section 2, Township of Noradjuha, Parish of Darragan.

Shire of Bass.

10. *Dalyston-Glen Forbes Road* (810).—Commencing at the Glen Forbes Railway Station near the northern angle of allotment 166A, Parish of Corinella; thence north-easterly to and across the Bass River to the north-eastern angle of allotment 168 in the said parish; thence north-westerly to a point on the northern boundary of allotment 210 in the said parish, distant 287 deg. 12 min. 599 links and 276 deg. 42 min. 333.2 links from the north-eastern angle of that allotment; thence generally north-westerly through the said allotment and generally westerly along the northern boundary of allotment 210B to the north-western angle of that allotment (S.P. 712); thence north-westerly through Crown land to a point on the eastern boundary of allotment 213B, distant 356 deg. 58 min. 28.3 links from the south-eastern angle of that allotment; thence north-westerly through the said allotment to its junction with the Main Coast-road at a point distant 227 deg. 30 min. 2,254.6 links from the western angle of allotment 190, Parish of Corinella (S.P. 711).

NOTE.—This description supersedes the description for Glen Forbes-road, published in the *Government Gazette* dated 5th February, 1919, page 549.

13. *Loch-Kernot Road* (813).—Commencing at the Kernot Railway Station near the north-western angle of allotment 141B, Parish of Corinella; thence southerly and south-westerly to the north-western angle of allotment 141C; thence generally southerly, westerly, and southerly to the south-eastern angle of allotment 142C in the said parish; thence southerly along the eastern boundary of allotment 142B, Parish of Corinella, to its junction with Almurta-road at the south-eastern angle of the allotment last named.

7. *Koroit-Port Fairy Road* (1607).—Commencing at the western angle of portion 33, allotment 21, Parish of Koroit, on the eastern boundary of the shire; thence generally south-westerly and westerly to the north-western angle of allotment 25 of the said parish; thence south-westerly and south-easterly to the southern angle of the said allotment 25; thence southerly through allotment 15, Parish of Koroit, and further southerly and south-westerly to its junction with the Princes Highway at a point distant 227 deg. 30 min. 6 chains, more or less, from the southern angle of allotment 8 of the parish last named.

NOTE.—The route of the portion of this road between the Shire of Belfast and the Borough of Koroit is set out in the description of the route in the Borough of Koroit.

8. *Cape Clear-Rokewood Road* (6908).—Commencing at its junction with the Pitfield-road at the northern angle of allotment 1, section 1, Township of Cape Clear, Parish of Mindai; thence south-easterly and easterly to the north-eastern angle of allotment 26, Parish of Dereel, south-easterly to the north-western angle of allotment A13A, Parish of Commeralghip, and generally easterly to the western angle of allotment 24A of the said parish of Dereel; thence south-easterly and southerly to and across the bridge over Mount Misery Creek near the north-eastern angle of allotment A19 of the Parish of Commeralghip aforesaid, on the eastern boundary of the shire.

Shire of Healesville.

9. *Buxton-Marysville Road* (7309).—Commencing at its junction with Healesville-Alexandra road at a point on the north-eastern boundary of allotment 9, Parish of Buxton, distant 133 deg. 34 min. 210 links from the northern angle of that allotment; thence south-easterly to a point on the western boundary of allotment 42C of the said parish, distant 197 deg. 14 min. 210.3 links from the north-western angle thereof; thence south-easterly through allotments 42C and 36A, parish aforesaid, to a point on the south-western boundary of the allotment last named, distant 105 deg. 44 min. 140 links from the most western angle thereof (S.P. 4067); thence south-easterly to and across the bridge over Steavenson River near the northern angle of allotment 40, Parish of Granton; thence south-easterly to and across the bridge over Taggerty River, and south-westerly to the south-eastern angle of allotment 31, Township of Marysville, Parish of Steavenson; thence south-easterly to its junction with Marysville-road and Marysville-Wood's Point road (Tourists') at the bridge over Steavenson River near the north-western angle of allotment 2, section E, of the township last named.

Town of Horsham.

7. *Kalkee-road* (7607).—Commencing at its junction with the Western Highway on the eastern boundary of allotment 4, section 2, Parish of Horsham, at a point distant 180 deg. 0 min. 8 chains (approximately) from the south-eastern angle of the said allotment 4; thence northerly to the north-eastern angle of allotment 1, section 2, Parish of Horsham, on the northern boundary of the town; thence easterly, northerly, and easterly along the boundary

11. *Patchewollock-Sea Lake Road* (8211).—Commencing at a point on the northern boundary of allotment 19, Parish of Patchewollock, distant 71 deg. 25 min. 60 chains, more or less, from the north-western angle of that allotment; thence north-easterly and generally easterly to the south-eastern angle of allotment 36 (water reserve), Parish of Dering; thence generally south-easterly, easterly, and south-easterly to the eastern angle of allotment 16, Parish of Denning; thence north-easterly and generally easterly to a point on the southern boundary of allotment 2, Parish of Gorya, distant 270 deg. 21½ min. 740 links from the south-eastern angle thereof; thence north-easterly through the allotment last named (S.P. 3922) and across the railway to its junction with the Henty Highway at the northern boundary of Speed Railway Station ground.

Also, commencing at its junction with the Henty Highway at a point distant 269 deg. 59 min. 600 links from the south-western angle of allotment 10, section 1, Township of Speed, Parish of Gorya; thence easterly to the north-eastern angle of allotment 9 of the parish last named, on the eastern boundary of the shire.

10. *Berrwillock-Woomelang Road* (8210).—Commencing at a point on the western boundary of allotment 31, Parish of Willangie, distant 180 deg. 0 min. 370 links from the north-western angle of the said allotment, on the eastern boundary of the shire; thence southerly along the boundary between the Shires of Karkaroc and Wyche-proof to a point on the eastern boundary of allotment 1, Parish of Cronomby, distant 0 deg. 28 min. 322 links from the south-eastern angle of the allotment last named; thence south-westerly through that allotment (S.P. 4410) and westerly to its junction with the Hopetoun-Woomelang-Sea Lake road at the south-western angle of allotment 4 of the said Parish of Cronomby.

Borough of Koroit.

3. *Koroit-Port Fairy Road* (8603).—Commencing at its junction with the Koroit-Warrnambool road at the north-western angle of allotment 19, Parish of Koroit; thence southerly and south-westerly to the western angle of portion 27, allotment 21, of the said parish, on the western boundary of the borough, and further south-westerly, along the boundary between the Borough of Koroit and the Shire of Belfast, to the western angle of portion 33 of the said allotment 21, on the western boundary of the borough.

Shire of Kowree.

6. *Kaniva-Edenhope Road* (8806).—Commencing at its junction with the Edenhope-Goroke road near the south-eastern angle of allotment 19, Parish of Edenhope; thence generally north-westerly and north-easterly to the south-western angle of allotment 69, Parish of Awonga; thence northerly, north-westerly, and northerly to the north-western angle of allotment 86, Parish of Jallakin; thence northerly, north-westerly, and north-easterly to the southern angle of allotment 26, Parish of Morea; thence north-westerly and northerly to the northern angle of allotment 46A of the last named parish; thence north-westerly and northerly to the north-western angle of allotment 12B, Parish of Boorooopki; thence easterly to the north-eastern angle of the said allotment 12B, and northerly to its junction with the Boorooopki-Frances road at the north-eastern angle of allotment A, Lemon Springs, pre-emptive right, Parish of Boorooopki.

13. *Casterton-Edenhope Road* (8813).—Commencing at "Burke's" Bridge over Gleneig River near the south-western angle of allotment 22, Parish of Kadnook, on the southern boundary of the shire; thence generally north-westerly, northerly, and north-easterly through allotments 23, 24, 15, 8, and 7, all of the parish last named (including a shire deviation and S.P.'s 4580, 4581, and 4582) to a point on the eastern boundary of the allotment last named, distant 358 deg. 4 min. 671.9 links from the south-eastern angle of the said allotment 7; thence northerly and north-easterly to a point on the south-eastern boundary of allotment 1, Parish of Kadnook, distant 227 deg. 35 min. 437 links from the eastern angle of that allotment; thence north-easterly through allotments 1 and 35 of the said parish to the eastern boundary of the allotment last named (S.P. 4579); thence north-westerly and northerly to its junction with the Hamilton-Edenhope-Apsley road at the north-western angle of allotment 34B, Parish of Kadnook.

9. *Portland-Nelson Road* (13409).—Commencing at its junction with Heath-road at the south-eastern angle of allotment L, section 1, Parish of Portland; thence northerly, westerly, and northerly to the north-eastern angle of allotment F, section 1, of the aforesaid parish; thence north-westerly through the Parish of Gorae to the northern angle of allotment 4, section 2, of the said parish; thence north-westerly and westerly to the northern end of Heath-road at the north-eastern angle of allotment 9, section 9, Parish of Mouzie; thence generally north-westerly, northerly, westerly, and northerly to the north-eastern angle of allotment 4, section 7, of the said parish; thence generally north-westerly to an angle in the northern boundary of allotment 11, section 10, formed by the intersection of lines bearing 50 deg. 33 min. and 69 deg. 1 min.; thence north-westerly and south-westerly through a timber reserve in the section and parish last named to an angle in a Government road through that reserve formed by the intersection of lines bearing 57 deg. 32 min. and 143 deg. 52 min.; thence south-westerly by that road to Johnstone's Creek, distant 237 deg. 32 min. 9 chains approximately from the said road angle, north of allotment 2, section 1, Parish of Mouzie.

Also, commencing at its junction with the Portland-Casterton road at the north-western angle of allotment 1, section 26, Town and Parish of Digby; thence easterly, south-easterly, and generally easterly to the north-eastern angle of allotment 8c, section 11, Parish of Grassdale; thence north-easterly and easterly to the north-eastern angle of allotment B1, section 8, Parish of Grassdale, on the western boundary of the shire.

Borough of Ringwood.

4. *Canterbury-road* (14004).—Commencing at the south-western angle of allotment 2, Parish of Ringwood, on the western boundary of the borough; thence easterly and north-easterly to the south-eastern angle of allotment 41 of the said parish; thence south-easterly to the south-eastern angle of allotment 32B, Parish of Ringwood, on the eastern boundary of the borough.

Shire of Stawell.

12. *Stawell-Pomonal Road* (15612).—Commencing at the eastern angle of allotment 78B, Parish of Mokepilly, on the southern boundary of the Borough of Stawell; thence generally south-westerly to the south-western angle of allotment 87 of the said parish; thence south-westerly and westerly to the eastern angle of allotment 13, Parish of Bellellen; thence south-westerly across Mt. William Creek to the northern angle of allotment 102 of the parish last named, and southerly to the south-eastern angle of the said allotment 102, on the southern boundary of the shire.

Borough of Stawell.

7. *Stawell-Pomonal Road* (15707).—Commencing at its junction with the Western Highway at the north-eastern angle of section 5, Township and Parish of Stawell; thence south-westerly to the south-eastern angle of allotment 2, section 6, of the said township and parish, and further south-westerly across Pleasant Creek to the north-eastern angle of allotment 1, section 6A, of the township and parish aforesaid; thence southerly, south-easterly, and southerly to the south-eastern angle of the racecourse

reserve, Township and Parish of Stawell; thence westerly and south-westerly to the eastern angle of allotment 78B, Parish of Mokepilli, on the southern boundary of the borough.

Shire of Walpeup.

5. Ouyen—Manangatang Road (17305).

NOTE.—The route of the portion of this road between the Shires of Walpeup and Swan Hill is set out in the description of the road route in the Shire of Swan Hill.

VOTING BY POST AT MUNICIPAL ELECTIONS.

DIVISION 15 OF PART V. OF THE CONSTITUTION ACT AMENDMENT ACT 1928 (No. 3660), MADE APPLICABLE TO ELECTIONS OF COUNCILLORS UNDER THE PROVISIONS OF SECTION 149 OF THE LOCAL GOVERNMENT ACT 1946 (No. 5203).

HIS Excellency the Governor of the State of Victoria, by and with the advice of the Executive Council thereof, and pursuant to the petition of the Council of the municipality of the City of Heidelberg, doth by this Order, under provisions of section 149 of the *Local Government Act 1946* (No. 5203), direct that the provisions of Division 15 of Part V. of *The Constitution Act Amendment Act 1928* (No. 3660), applicable and severally hereinafter set out with alterations therein, such alterations being deemed necessary for the purpose of carrying into effect such provisions, shall apply to the election of councillors for the said municipality.

VOTING BY POST.

Obtaining of Forms of Application for Postal Ballot-papers.

274. (1) Any person entitled to vote at an election about to be held in any municipality who satisfies the returning officer—

- (a) that he resides at least 5 miles from the nearest polling place at which he is entitled to vote; or
- (b) that he has reason to believe that on the polling day during the hours of polling he will not be within 5 miles of the nearest polling place at which he is entitled to vote; or
- (c) that on account of ill health or infirmity he will be prevented from voting personally at any such polling place,

may before the polling day make application in the form B of the 25th Schedule or to the like effect to the returning officer for such municipality for a postal ballot-paper or postal ballot-papers enabling him to vote through the post at such election instead of attending personally to tender his vote thereat.

(2) In the case of an application on the ground that he has reason to believe that on the polling day, during the hours of polling, he will not be within 5 miles of the nearest polling place at which he is entitled to vote, the applicant shall state in his application the reason for such belief.

Application to be Signed in Presence of Authorized Witness.

(3) With respect to applications for postal ballot-papers the following provisions shall have effect:—

- (a) The following directions with respect to such applications shall be substantially observed:—
 - (i) When so much of the form of application as precedes the places for the signatures has been filled in and otherwise completed, the applicant shall exhibit his form of application to an authorized witness;
 - (ii) The applicant shall then, in the presence of the authorized witness, sign his name in his own handwriting on the form of application in the place provided for the signature of the applicant; and
 - (iii) The authorized witness shall then sign his name in his own handwriting in the place provided for the signature of the authorized witness, and shall add the title under which he acts as an authorized witness, his residence, and the date;

(b) An authorized witness shall not witness the signature of any applicant on any application for a postal ballot-paper or postal ballot-papers, unless the authorized witness—

- (i) has satisfied himself as to the identity of the applicant;
- (ii) has seen the applicant sign the application in his own handwriting; and
- (iii) knows that the statements contained in the application are true, or has satisfied himself (whether by inquiry from the applicant or otherwise) that the said statements are true.

Authorized Witness Not to Induce, &c., Persons to Apply for Postal Ballot-papers.

(c) An authorized witness shall not persuade or induce or associate himself with any person in persuading or inducing any person to make application for a postal ballot-paper or postal ballot-papers.

Authorized Witness Not to Visit Person to Witness Signature to Application except on Account of Ill Health or Infirmity.

(d) An authorized witness shall not—

- (i) visit any person for the purpose of witnessing the signature of such person to his application for a postal ballot-paper or postal ballot-papers; or
- (ii) witness the signature of any person to any such application in any place other than the ordinary residence or place of business of the authorized witness:

Provided that if any person desires to make application for a postal ballot-paper or postal ballot-papers and is unable on account of ill health or infirmity to present himself before an authorized witness, any member of the Police Force or other authorized witness, when so requested by any such person, in writing, may visit such person for the purpose of witnessing his signature to such application.

Penalty.

(e) Every authorized witness guilty of any contravention of or failure to observe any of the provisions of this sub-section as applied shall be liable to a penalty of not more than One hundred pounds, or to imprisonment for a term of not more than three months.

Posting of List of Applicants for Postal Ballot-Papers.

(f) A list containing the names of all applicants for postal ballot-papers, and the respective addresses to which they have been requested to be sent, shall be posted for public inspection outside the office of the returning officer of the district for which they are issued.

On Application, Returning Officer to Supply Postal Ballot-Paper or Postal Ballot-papers.

276. (1) (a) On receiving from any applicant an application for a postal ballot-paper or postal ballot-papers, the returning officer, having ascertained that the name of the applicant is upon the voters' roll to be used at the election for the municipality specified in the application, and that the applicant is not prohibited from voting, and if satisfied that the application is properly signed by the applicant and is properly witnessed, and that the applicant is entitled according to the statements contained in his application to a postal ballot-paper or postal ballot-papers, shall deliver to the applicant or post to him at the postal address named in the application a postal ballot-paper (with a counterfoil attached), or if such applicant appears by the voters' roll to be entitled to give more votes than one, then so many ballot-papers as may be equal to the number of votes not exceeding three which such applicant so appears to be entitled to give in the form or to the effect of the 26th Schedule, together with an envelope addressed to such returning officer at the polling place at which he intends to preside. Such envelope shall be marked "Postal Ballot-paper."

(b) If the returning officer is not satisfied that the application is properly signed by the applicant, or that the application is properly witnessed, or that the applicant is entitled to vote by post, he shall forthwith post to the applicant a notice in the form of the 28th Schedule or to the like effect.

Folding of Ballot-paper.

(2) Each ballot-paper before being enclosed shall be folded to the counterfoil.

Effect of Immaterial Error.

277. No application for a postal ballot-paper or postal ballot-papers shall, if properly signed by the applicant and properly witnessed, be deemed insufficient or invalid by reason only that in such application there is an omission or incorrect or insufficient description or misdescription in respect of any of the particulars required by law to be contained therein, if the returning officer is satisfied that the applicant is entitled to a postal ballot-paper or postal ballot-papers.

Initialling of Ballot-papers.

278. (1) The returning officer shall—

- (a) initial each postal ballot-paper issued; and
- (b) keep and number the applications therefor in consecutive order, writing the corresponding number on the counterfoil of the ballot-paper.

(2) On the counterfoil the returning officer shall also write the number on the voters' roll of the person to whom the postal ballot-paper is issued.

(3) Every postal ballot-paper issued by a returning officer after four o'clock in the afternoon of the day of nomination shall have printed or written thereon, in alphabetical order of surnames, the surnames and christian or other names of the candidates for election and, in the case of two or more candidates having the said surname and christian or other names, the residence and occupation of each such candidate: Provided that if no two candidates have the same surname, a postal ballot-paper so issued and upon which the candidates' names are written may have the surnames only of the candidates written thereon.

Record of Issue of Voting by Postal Ballot-paper or Postal Ballot-papers.

279. (1) The returning officer shall on the voters' roll to be used at the election for the municipality to which such postal ballot-paper or postal ballot-papers relate note opposite the applicant's name wherever it appears the fact that such postal ballot-paper has or postal ballot-papers have been issued to such applicant, and the date of such issue.

Notification to Presiding Officers.

(2) In case there is not time to note the fact of the issue of any postal ballot-paper or postal ballot-papers on every such roll on which such applicant's name appears which is to be used at the election, the returning officer shall in such manner as he thinks fit immediately notify such issue to the deputy returning officer at every polling place for such municipality at which a roll is to be used on which such applicant's name appears.

Mode of Voting by Means of Postal Ballot-papers.

280. The following directions for regulating voting by means of postal ballot-papers shall be substantially observed:—

(1) The voter shall exhibit his postal ballot-paper unmarked to an authorized witness.

(2) The voter shall in the presence of the authorized witness but so that the witness cannot see the vote—

(a) write on the ballot-paper the surnames of all the candidates (if the candidates' papers are not already printed or written thereon when the ballot-paper is issued to him); and

(b) indicate the order of his preference by placing the figures 1, 2, 3, 4 and so on opposite the candidates' names.

Provided that where there are only two candidates, the provisions of paragraphs (a) and (b) shall be deemed to be sufficiently complied with if the ballot-paper is inscribed or marked in any manner so as clearly to indicate for whom the voter votes.

(3) In the case of a ballot-paper upon which the candidates' names are not printed or written when issued to the voter the voter shall, if more candidates than one have the same surname, also insert in the ballot-paper the christian or other names of each such candidate, and if more candidates than one have the same surname and christian or other names the residence and occupation of each such candidate.

(4) If the voter's sight is so impaired that he is unable to vote without assistance, the authorized witness, at the request of the voter—

(a) shall mark his vote on the ballot-paper and shall (if the voter so desires) mark the same in the presence of another person; or

(b) shall permit some other person appointed by the voter to mark the ballot-paper for him.

(5) The voter shall then refold the ballot-paper and fasten the same.

(6) The voter shall then sign his name in his own handwriting on the counterfoil in the place provided for the signature of the voter.

(7) The authorized witness shall then sign his name in his own handwriting in the place provided for the signature of the witness, and shall add the title under which he acts as an authorized witness, his residence, and the date.

(8) The voter shall then place the ballot-paper with the counterfoil attached, or ballot-papers each with counterfoil attached, into the envelope addressed to the returning officer, fasten the envelope in the presence of the authorized witness, and post it.

Duty of Authorized Witness.

281. (1) The authorized witness shall—

(a) see that the foregoing directions are substantially complied with;

(b) refrain from looking at the vote given by the voter except where the voter cannot vote without assistance and the voter requests his assistance;

(c) not disclose any knowledge officially acquired by him touching the vote of the voter save in answer to some question which he is legally bound to answer or in compliance with the express provisions of the law relating to elections of councillors for municipalities.

Witnessing Signature to Postal Ballot-Paper or Counterfoil.

(2) An authorized witness shall not—

(a) visit any voter for the purpose of witnessing the signature of such voter to his postal ballot-paper or postal ballot-papers;

(b) witness the signature of any voter to his postal ballot-paper or postal ballot-papers at any place other than the ordinary residence or place of business of the authorized witness; or

(c) witness the signature of any voter to his postal ballot-paper or postal ballot-papers unless the authorized witness has satisfied himself as to the identity of the voter and has seen the voter sign the counterfoil or counterfoils in the voter's own handwriting.

Provided that if any voter has received a postal ballot-paper or postal ballot-papers, and is unable, on account of ill health or infirmity, to present himself before an authorized witness, any member of the Police Force or other authorized witness when so requested by any such voter, in writing, may visit such voter for the purpose of witnessing his signature to such postal ballot-paper or postal ballot-papers.

Penalty.

(3) Every authorized witness guilty of any contravention of any of the provisions of this section shall be liable to a penalty of not more than One hundred pounds, or to imprisonment, with or without hard labour, for a term of not more than three months.

Mistakes in Spelling Immaterial.

282. No postal ballot-paper shall be rejected because of any mistake in spelling the name of the candidate if the intention is clear.

Person who has Received Postal Ballot-paper or Postal Ballot-papers Not to Vote Personally Without Giving up Same.

283. (1) Except as provided in the next succeeding section, no person to whom a postal ballot-paper for any election has or postal ballot-papers have been sent shall be entitled to vote personally at any poll unless he previously gives up such postal ballot-paper or postal ballot-papers unmarked to the returning officer or deputy at the polling place at which he is entitled to vote.

(2) Such officer shall immediately cancel any such postal ballot-paper and retain it.

Provision when Person claims to vote, although Postal Ballot-paper already issued.

284. (1) If a person to whom a postal ballot-paper appears to have been sent states that he has not received such postal ballot-paper and claims to vote personally at any polling place within the municipality to which such postal ballot paper relates, the returning officer or deputy at such booth may take from such person a declaration in the form of the Twenty-ninth Schedule or to the like effect. Thereupon such person shall be entitled to vote personally at such poll and his vote shall be taken in the ordinary way.

(2) If such vote is received by the deputy returning officer he shall immediately advise the returning officer of the fact of such person having voted personally and shall forward the declaration to the returning officer with the ballot-papers, and if any postal ballot-paper purports to have been received from the same person such postal ballot-paper shall be rejected at the counting of the votes and the returning officer shall state thereon the reason of such rejection.

Additional Question to be put on Tender of Vote Personally.

285. (1) The returning officer or deputy shall before any person personally tendering his vote at any election for any municipality receives a ballot-paper or ballot-

papers (but not afterwards), put to such person the following question in addition to any others he may lawfully put:—

Have you received a postal ballot-paper or postal ballot-papers enabling you to vote at the election for a councillor or councillors (as the case may be) for the Ward of the to-day? (*In the case of an adjourned poll the day from which the poll was adjourned should also be named in the question.*)

Refusal, &c., to Answer.

(2) Every person having tendered his vote when such question is put as aforesaid who refuses or omits distinctly to answer the same, and every person who answers the question in the affirmative but does not deliver up his postal ballot-paper or postal ballot-papers, unmarked, shall be and be deemed prohibited from voting then and afterwards at such election, and shall be guilty of an offence and shall be liable to a penalty of not more than Twenty pounds or to imprisonment with or without hard labour for a term of not more than one month.

Penalty for False Answer.

(3) Every person who wilfully makes a false answer to such question put as aforesaid shall be guilty of an offence, and shall be liable to a penalty of not more than Fifty pounds or to imprisonment with or without hard labour for a term of not more than three months.

Inclusion of Votes through the Post at close of Poll.

286. When immediately upon the close of any poll the returning officer is proceeding to ascertain the number of votes for each candidate, the returning officer shall produce unopened all envelopes containing postal ballot-papers received by him through the post up to the close of the poll, and such envelopes shall be opened in the presence of the scrutineers present and poll clerk (if any) but of no other person, and shall be dealt with as follows, namely:—

- (a) The returning officer shall produce all applications for postal ballot-papers;
- (b) The returning officer, without unfolding each postal ballot-paper or allowing it to be inspected, shall compare the signature of the voter on the counterfoil with the signature to the application and allow the scrutineers to inspect the same, and the returning officer shall determine whether or not the signature on the postal ballot-paper is that of the applicant;
- (c) If the postal ballot-paper is allowed by the returning officer he shall tear off the counterfoil without seeing the names of the candidate or candidates voted for, and shall insert the folded postal ballot-paper in a ballot-box separate from that used during the polling, and when all such postal ballot-papers have been so inserted the counting of the votes recorded therein shall commence;
- (d) Any postal ballot-paper not witnessed as required by these provisions as applied shall be disallowed by the returning officer;
- (e) The returning officer shall attach all the counterfoils together;
- (f) The list of the number of votes received by each candidate shall show separately the votes tendered personally and the votes given by postal ballot-papers;
- (g) If the returning officer disallows a postal ballot-paper then such ballot-paper shall be included in a sealed parcel of ballot-papers which shall be set aside for separate custody and transmitted to the clerk of the municipality.

Applications and Counterfoils to be forwarded to the Clerk of the Municipality after Declaration of Poll and to be Open for Inspection.

288. Notwithstanding anything in the *Local Government Act 1928*—

- (a) All applications for postal ballot-papers and all counterfoils of postal ballot-papers received by a returning officer—
 - (i) shall not be made up or enclosed in the sealed parcels as required by sections 144 and 145 of the said Act, but shall be made up and enclosed in a special packet which shall be endorsed with a description of the contents and the name of the ward, the name of the municipality, and the date of the polling (which endorsement shall be signed by the returning officer), and forthwith after the declaration of the poll shall be forwarded by the returning officer to the clerk of the municipality;

Preservation of Applications and Counterfoils.

(ii) shall be safely kept by the clerk of the municipality for twelve months; and

Applications and Counterfoils Open to Public Inspection.

- (iii) after receipt thereof by the clerk of the municipality shall be open to public inspection at all convenient times during office hours at the office of the municipality until the expiration of the said period of twelve months; and
- (iv) after the period of twelve months referred to the applications for postal ballot-papers and counterfoils of ballot-papers shall be destroyed as provided by section 145 of the *Local Government Act*.

Clerk of the Municipality to give Receipt for Packet.

(b) the clerk of the municipality shall forthwith give or send to the returning officer a receipt under his hand for every such special packet received by him.

Production before Police Magistrate.

(c) the clerk of the municipality shall produce any such applications or counterfoils when required to do so by any police magistrate for the purposes of any recount of votes by such police magistrate.

Applications and Counterfoils to be Evidence.

(d) any application for a postal ballot-paper and any counterfoil of a postal ballot-paper taken from any such special packet and having written thereon respectively under the hand of the clerk of the municipality a certificate of the several particulars required by this section to be endorsed upon such packet, and that the same was taken from such packet shall be evidence in any Court or before any justice—

- (i) that the same was so taken;
- (ii) that the same, if an application was received by the returning officer (at the election to which such endorsement and writing relate), and that a postal ballot-paper the counterfoil of which bears the application number corresponding with the application number written on the application, was issued by the returning officer to the applicant whose name appears on the application; and
- (iii) that the same, if a counterfoil, was the counterfoil of a postal ballot-paper used at the said election.

Certain Offences to be Bribery.

289. The following persons shall be deemed guilty of bribery:—

- (a) Every person who directly or indirectly makes overtures to any person for the acquiring by gift or purchase or who acquires by gift or purchase from any person any postal ballot-paper; and
- (b) every person who directly or indirectly makes overtures to any other person for the giving away or parting with the possession of or selling any postal ballot-paper or who gives away any such paper or who sells or (except as in this Division as applied provided) parts with the possession of any postal ballot-paper.

Making False Application a Misdemeanour.

290. If in any application for a postal ballot-paper any person makes any false statement or if any person applies for a postal ballot-paper to which some other person is entitled he shall be guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be liable to imprisonment with or without hard labour for a term of not more than two years.

False Declaration Perjury.

291. Every person who wilfully makes and subscribes any declaration for the purposes of this Division as applied, the same being untrue or false in any particular, shall be liable to the penalties of perjury.

Inducing Disclosure of Vote by Post, &c., an Offence.

292. Every person who—

- (a) directly or indirectly requires, induces, or attempts to induce any person to show by producing his postal ballot-paper for whom he intends to vote at any election; or

(b) unless authorized by this Division as applied writes the name or names of any candidate or candidates or marks any vote in any postal ballot-paper not issued to such person; or
 (c) opens any envelope addressed to a returning officer not being duly authorized so to do by such returning officer—
 shall be guilty of an offence, and shall be liable to imprisonment with or without hard labour for a term of not more than one year.

Inducing Persons to Vote for any Particular Candidate by Bribery or Intimidation.

293. (1) Every person who requires, induces, or attempts to induce any person in his employment to obtain a postal ballot-paper with the intention of influencing such person by bribery or intimidation to record his vote in favour of any particular candidate shall be guilty of an offence, and shall be liable to a penalty of not more than Fifty pounds, to be recovered in a summary way before a court of petty sessions by any person who sues for the same.

(2) Bribery or intimidation shall for the purposes of this section include any promise or threat either expressed, implied, or understood of any benefit or disadvantage to accrue directly or indirectly to such person from such first-mentioned person.

Authorized Witnesses.

294. The following persons being resident in Victoria shall be authorized witnesses in and for Victoria within the meaning of this Division as applied:—

- (a) All returning officers and electoral registrars appointed under any Act relating to elections for the Legislative Council or the Legislative Assembly; all postmasters or postmistresses or persons in charge of post offices; all police magistrates; all justices; all commissioners for taking declarations and affidavits; all head teachers of State schools; all members of the Police Force; all clerks of petty sessions; all railway stationmasters; all councillors of and the clerk or secretary of any city, town, borough, or shire; all barristers and solicitors; and all legally qualified medical practitioners.
- (b) All persons or classes of persons employed in the Public Service of Victoria who are appointed by the Governor in Council to be authorized witnesses within the meaning of this Division as applied.

No person who is a candidate for any election shall be an authorized witness at or in connexion with that election.

The following persons being resident in Victoria are authorized witnesses in and for Victoria:—

- (a) All returning officers and electoral registrars appointed under any Act relating to elections for the Legislative Council or the Legislative Assembly; all postmasters or postmistresses or persons in charge of post offices; all police magistrates; all justices; all commissioners for taking declarations and affidavits; all head teachers of State schools; all members of the Police Force; all clerks of petty sessions; all railway stationmasters; all councillors of and the clerk or secretary of any city, town, borough, or shire; all barristers and solicitors; and all legally qualified medical practitioners.
- (b) All persons or classes of persons employed in the Public Service of Victoria who are appointed by the Governor in Council to be authorized witnesses.

No person who is a candidate at any election shall be an authorized witness at that election.

Instructions to Applicants and Authorized Witnesses.

(a) When so much of the form of application as precedes the places for the signatures has been filled in and otherwise completed the applicant shall exhibit his form of application to an authorized witness.

(b) The applicant shall then in the presence of the authorized witness sign his name in his own handwriting on the form of application in the place provided for the signature of the applicant.

(c) The authorized witness shall then sign his name in his own handwriting in the place provided for the signature of the authorized witness, and shall add the title under which he acts as an authorized witness, his residence, and the date.

Offences and Penalties.

(a) An authorized witness shall not witness the signature of any applicant on any application for a postal ballot-paper or postal ballot-papers unless the authorized witness—

(i) has satisfied himself as to the identity of the applicant;

(ii) has seen the applicant sign the application in his own handwriting; and

(iii) knows that the statements contained in the application are true or has satisfied himself (whether by inquiry from the applicant or otherwise) that the said statements are true.

(b) An authorized witness shall not persuade or induce or associate himself with any person in persuading or inducing any person to make application for a postal ballot-paper or postal ballot-papers.

(c) An authorized witness shall not—

(i) visit any person for the purpose of witnessing the signature of such person to his application for a postal ballot-paper or postal ballot-papers; or

(ii) witness the signature of any applicant to any such application in any place other than the ordinary residence or place of business of the authorized witness:

Provided that if any person desires to make application for a postal ballot-paper or postal ballot-papers, and is unable on account of ill health or infirmity to present himself before an authorized witness any member of the Police Force or other authorized witness when so requested by any such person in writing may visit such person for the purpose of witnessing his signature to such application.

Every authorized witness guilty of any of these offences is liable to a penalty of not more than One hundred pounds, or to imprisonment for a term of not more than three months.

(e) The voter shall then re-fold the ballot-paper and fasten the same.

(f) The voter shall then sign his name in his own handwriting on the counterfoil in the place provided for the signature of the voter.

(g) The authorized witness shall then sign his name in his own handwriting in the place provided for the signature of the witness, and shall add the title under which he acts as an authorized witness, his residence, and the date.

(h) The voter shall then place the ballot-paper, with the counterfoil attached, into the envelope addressed to the returning officer, fasten the envelope in the presence of the authorized witness, and post it.

(i) This ballot-paper cannot be counted in the election unless it is received by the returning officer before the closing of the poll.

Instructions to Authorized Witness.

PROVISIONS RELATING TO COMPULSORY VOTING.

HIS Excellency the Governor of the State of Victoria, by and with the advice of the Executive Council thereof, and pursuant to the petitions of the Councils of the Cities of Bendigo, Heidelberg, and Port Melbourne, doth by this Order, under the provisions of section 149 of the *Local Government Act 1946*, direct that the provisions of Division 20 of Part V. of *The Constitution Act Amendment Act 1928* applicable and severally hereinafter set out with alterations therein, such alterations being deemed necessary for the purpose of carrying into effect such provisions, shall apply to the election of councillors for the said municipalities, and doth hereby, in pursuance of the powers so conferred on him by the said section 149, prescribe the forms in the schedule hereto, which forms or forms to the like effect shall be used for the purpose of carrying into effect such provisions as so applied by this Order.

1. Every person whose name is inscribed upon the voters' roll shall record the number of votes set opposite his name on such roll at every election for a councillor for which he is entitled to vote.

2. The returning officer, at the close of the poll at every election, shall—

- (a) from every roll used at the election, and from the counterfoils of all postal ballot-papers received before the close of the poll at the election, indicate by a distinguishing mark on a fair copy of the roll used at the election (which copy is hereinafter referred to as the "marked roll") the names of the persons who have not recorded their votes at the election for which he is the returning officer;
- (b) certify the marked roll by statutory declaration under his hand in accordance with Form A. of the schedule hereto; and
- (c) forthwith forward such marked roll to the clerk of the municipality.

3. Within three months after the close of the poll at every election the clerk of the municipality—

- (a) shall send by post to each person whose name indicated as aforesaid appears on any such marked roll, at the address therein mentioned, a notice in accordance with Form B. of the schedule hereto, notifying him that he has failed to record his vote or votes (as the case may be) as required by these provisions at the election specified therein, and requiring him to state the true reason why he failed so to vote; and
- (b) before sending such notice, shall insert therein—
 - (i) the full name of the person as appearing on the roll, and his address as therein mentioned, and the names of the subdivisions (if any) in which he was entitled to vote but did not vote, and his number on the roll, or (as the case may be) his number on the roll of each such subdivision; and
 - (ii) a date (not being less than twenty-one days after the date of the posting of the notice) before or on which the form at the foot of the notice, duly filled up and signed by the person, is to be in the hands of the clerk of the municipality.

4. (1) Every person to whom such a notice has been sent shall—

- (a) fill up the Form C. at the foot of the notice by stating in it the true reason why he failed so to record his vote or votes (as the case may be);
- (b) sign the form; and
- (c) post or deliver the same so as to reach the clerk of the municipality not later than the date inserted in the notice.

(2) If the person is unable, by reason of absence from his residence or physical incapacity, to fill up, sign, and post or deliver the form within the time allowed pursuant to these provisions—

- (a) any other person over the age of twenty-one years, and who has personal knowledge of the facts, may fill up, sign, and post or deliver within that time the form, duly witnessed by another person over the age of twenty-one years; and
- (b) such filling up, signing, and delivery or posting of the form may be treated as compliance by the first-mentioned person with the provisions of this clause.

(3) Upon receipt within the time allowed, pursuant to these provisions, of any such form properly filled up and signed and witnessed (if so required) the clerk of the municipality shall—

- (a) make on the marked roll or rolls opposite the name of the person to whom the form refers a note to that effect; and
- (b) indicate in writing on the marked roll or rolls opposite the name of the person his opinion whether or not the reason contained in the form is a valid and sufficient reason for the failure of the person to record his vote or votes at the election.

(4) If in the case of any person to whom a notice as aforesaid has been sent such form is not received by the clerk of the municipality within the time allowed pursuant to these provisions, the clerk of the municipality shall make on the marked roll or rolls opposite the name of such person a note to that effect.

(5) Where the reply of any person states for his failure to record his vote or votes a reason which, in the opinion of the clerk of the municipality, is not a valid and sufficient reason for that failure, the clerk of the municipality shall notify such person in accordance with Form D. of the schedule hereto of his opinion, and inform him that he has the option of having the matter dealt with by the municipal council or by a Court of Petty Sessions. Before sending such notice, the clerk of the municipality shall insert therein a date (not being less than twenty-one days after the date of the posting of the notice (before or on which the form at the foot of the notice duly filled up and signed by the person and witnessed is, to be in the hands of the clerk of the municipality).

5. The marked roll or rolls indicating—

- (a) the names of persons who did not vote at the election;
- (b) the names of persons from whom or on whose behalf the clerk of the municipality received within the time allowed pursuant to these provisions forms properly filled up and signed;

 - (b) at the conclusion of the said examination and marking shall replace such rolls in the parcels from which they were taken and re-seal the same and then comply with the provisions of section One hundred and forty-five of the *Local Government Act 1946*.

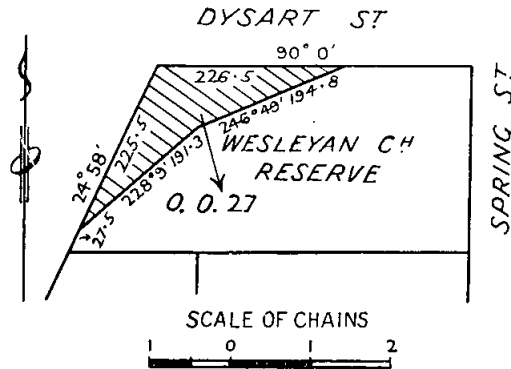

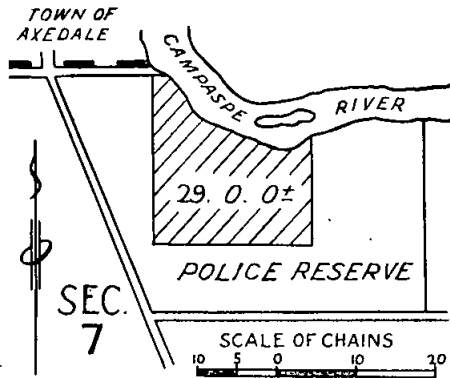

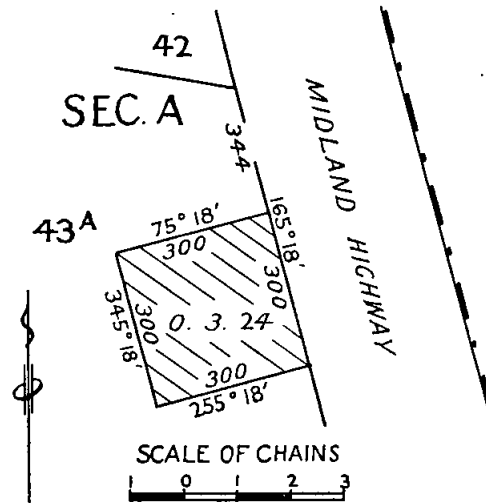

BY-LAW No. 139.

A By-law of the City of Brunswick, numbered 139, to amend or add to By-law No. 108.

THE Council of the City of Brunswick doth hereby, in pursuance of the powers conferred by the *Local Government Act 1946*, order as follows:—

1. This By-law shall be read and construed as one with By-law No. 108, as amended by By-law No. 115, for regulating traffic and processions and suppressing nuisances.

Local Rules.

2. No driver of a vehicle (other than a tram car) shall leave or allow such vehicle to remain (whether attended or not) standing—

- (1) On the south side of that section of Moreland-road, West Brunswick, which lies between Cameron-street, Brunswick, and the railway gates of the Melbourne-Coburg railway line.
- (2) On the south side of that section of Moreland-road, West Brunswick, which lies between Sydney-road, Brunswick, and Cameron-street, Brunswick, except for the purpose of putting down or taking up passengers, or for loading or unloading goods, or in obedience to the direction or signal of a member of the Police Force or officer of the Council.

The owner or person apparently in control of any motor car or other vehicle left standing (whether unattended or not) in any street or road shall, when requested by any officer of the Council, give to such officer information with respect to any person (other than the said owner or person apparently in control of such motor car or vehicle) who is or was the driver of such motor car or vehicle which may lead to the identification of any person who is leaving or has left such motor car or vehicle so standing in contravention of any By-law.

Factories and Shops Acts.

DETERMINATION OF THE HOTEL AND RESTAURANT BOARD.

NOTE.—This Determination applies to the whole of the State of Victoria.

NOTE.—On the 6th May, 1940, the following trade was proclaimed an Apprenticeship Trade as carried on in the Metropolitan District.

Cooking in hotels, clubs, restaurants, eating houses, coffee palaces in which three or more adults are permanently employed in the kitchen.

Full particulars of the Apprenticeship Regulations for this trade may be obtained on application to the Secretary, Apprenticeship Commission, 103 Russell Street, Melbourne.

IN accordance with the provisions of the Factories and Shops Acts, the Wages Board which now has had the power to determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any person or persons or classes of persons—

- (a) employed in a restaurant, coffee palace, hotel, eating-house, or any premises for which an Australian wine licence or billiard table licence is in force or which are occupied as a club, but not including persons subject to the jurisdiction of any other Board heretofore appointed;
- (b) employed in the business of a caterer;
- (c) employed in connexion with the sale of aerated waters, fruit juice drinks, cordials, coffee, chocolate, coconuts, milk, or any other non-intoxicating beverage whatsoever consumed on the premises;
- (d) employed whole or part time selling confectionery, or pastry in any place in which the business of a restaurant is carried on—

has made the following Determination, namely:—

1. That as from the beginning of the first pay period to commence in March, 1947, the last previous Determination of this Board shall be revoked and replaced by this Determination.

Under the provisions of Section 7 of the Factories and Shops Act 1936 (No. 4461) every employer of any employee in any hotel is required to keep a time-book in the prescribed form wherein each employee shall enter daily a record of the hours worked.

OVERTIME.

3. The following rates shall be paid for overtime:—

(a) Persons employed in the bar—

For all work done outside a period of 11 hours per day from the time of their beginning to the time of their ending work or in excess of 9 hours in any one day	Time and a half	} Calculated on the rates fixed without board and lodging.

TERMS OF EMPLOYMENT.

4. All employees (other than casual employees) shall be engaged by the week and shall be paid weekly. Except in the case of misconduct by an employee forty-eight hours' notice shall be given by the employer or employee to terminate employment, or in lieu of such notice, two days' wages shall be paid by the employer or forfeited by the employee. When notice of termination of service has been given, employees shall be paid within 24 hours from the expiry of such notice.

CASUAL LABOUR.

5. Casual employee shall mean and be deemed to be any employee engaged for less period than the working week of 44 hours on the class of employment for which the casual is employed. This clause shall not apply to employees engaged by the week. Casual employees shall be paid—

Males Time and a half with a minimum of 6s. per day for any engagement.
 Females 2s. 3d. per hour with a minimum of 4s. 6d. each engagement.

Casual employees shall be entitled to all fares exceeding 3d. per day necessarily incurred.

LIVING IN ALLOWANCE.

6. No employee shall be compelled to board on the premises where he or she is employed. If the employer desires the employee to board on the premises where he or she is employed, then meals and accommodation shall be provided by the employer without any deduction in wages. If the employer and employee mutually agree that meals and accommodation shall be provided the amounts to be deducted shall be those set out in clause 2.

HOLIDAYS AND LEAVE OF ABSENCE.

7. (a) All employees shall have a full day off in each week. In addition to such full day any person whether an adult or an improver employed as a cellarman, assistant cellarman, barman, barmaid, or a steward shall have a half holiday on one day in each week, between Monday and Saturday, to commence not later than 1 p.m. on such day, until the following morning.

(b) All work performed by employees on New Year's Day, Australia Day, Union Picnic Day, Good Friday, Easter Monday, Anzac Day, King's Birthday, Labour Day, Christmas Day and Boxing Day shall be paid at the rate of time and a half.

(c) Employees shall receive two weeks' leave of absence on full pay on completion of twelve calendar months' service. Such leave of absence may be applied for and shall commence at any time within two months after the date of holidays becoming due. A *pro rata* leave of absence on full pay shall be granted to any employee who has worked three months or over.

SICK LEAVE.

8. Any employee, other than a casual, who has been in the service of the same employer continuously, shall be allowed one week's sick leave on full pay annually. Such sick leave shall be inoperative for the first three months of employment. On completion of three months and up to six months of employment three days' sick leave on full pay shall be allowed. After six months' service the full period of one week on full pay shall be operative; Provided that not more than one week shall be allowed for each year of service.

Provided further that any claim made for sick leave shall be supported by evidence satisfactory to the employer that the employee is unable to work because of personal ill-health; but in the event of a continuous period of six days' sick leave being required, a medical certificate shall be furnished, the cost of such certificate to be borne by the employer.

"Any employer taking over a business shall be responsible for all sick leave covered by the period of employment of each employee who was employed by a predecessor in the business."

This clause shall be deemed to have come into effect on the 1st July, 1946.

DEFINITIONS.

9. (a) "Barman" or "Barmaid" shall mean and be deemed to be a person usually employed for more than two hours in any one day or night, in the sale of liquor, over the bar, either wholesale or retail, in any hotel or other licensed premises.

(b) "Cellarman" is an employee in charge of, responsible for and substantially engaged in looking after the contents of the cellar of an hotel.

(c) "Assistant Cellarman" shall mean and be deemed to be a person who is substantially engaged in working in the cellar of an hotel.

NOTE.—Attention is drawn (subject to the provisions of the Factories and Shops Acts) to the employment of females as barmaids in hotels pursuant to National Security (Employment of Women) Regulations.

The Women's Employment Board on 8th September, 1942, on the application of the United Licensed Victuallers Association (Victorian Branch) approved and laid down the conditions in respect to the employment of females not under 35 years of age as barmaids in hotels.

Extracts of the decisions of the Board are given herein:—

That females may be employed on the said work.

That the hours during which females may be employed on such work shall be 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. six days per week but in no event shall the total hours per week exceed 44.

That there shall be no period of probation.

That this decision shall bind the applicant and the Federated Liquor and Allied Trades Employees' Union and its members.

That the period of employment of extra females in bars (excluding those at present employed and registered with the State Government) shall be for the duration of the war.

That these employees shall be paid the same rate of wage as men, and this condition shall apply to present registered barmaids as it would be impracticable to differentiate.

That in order to prevent any replacement of existing bar personnel, whether male or female, by the prospective new female employees, there shall be established a Committee comprising an equal number of representatives of employers and employees. The decision of this Committee as to whether an employer may be permitted to engage new female labour shall be final, so far as this Order is made.

All female personnel to be engaged, whether permanently or for casual work, shall before commencing employment become members of the Federated Liquor and Allied Trades Employees' Union.

† SUBJECT TO:—(a) A maximum deduction as for two meals a day being made where an employee commences work at 9 a.m. or later and finishes at 4 p.m. or earlier on the same day or where he or she commences for the day between 1 p.m. and 4 p.m.; and (b) a maximum deduction as for one meal a day being made where an employee commences work at or after 4 p.m., the minimum wage shall (except in the case of an apprentice, an improver, a midday waitress, a midday kitchenmaid or pantrymaid, or a casual employee) be, where the employer—

- (i) boards the employee and provides three meals per day, one of which shall be a substantial meal, 14s. 10d. per week less
- (ii) boards the employee and provides three meals per day where substantial meals are not provided, 9s. 4d. per week less;
- (iii) provides only two meals per day for an employee who is employed between 6 a.m. and 3 p.m. or between 11.30 a.m. and 11.45 p.m., 9s. 4d. per week less; or
- (iv) boards and lodges the employee, 20s. 1d. per week less.

Notwithstanding any condition in this clause no deduction for meals shall be made for a public holiday when the employee is not required to work on such public holiday.

In computing the amount to be deducted for meals where an employee works for less than six days a week or who is provided with less meals than those provided for in (i), (ii), and (iii) hereof the amount to be allowed as a deduction for each meal shall be one-seventeenth of the amount herein provided for a weekly deduction.

TERMS OF EMPLOYMENT.

11. Employees (other than casual employees, midday waitresses and midday kitchenmaids or pantrymaids) who in any week work for less than 44 hours shall for such week be paid as follows:—

- (1) (a) For work done during a week in which any of the public holidays mentioned in clause 15 occurs:—
 - (i) Time and a third for all work done on days other than the public holiday
 - (ii) The rate fixed in clause 15 for work done on the public holiday
 Provided that the earnings of an employee in any such week shall not exceed ordinary wages rates for an ordinary week's work plus such amount of the special rate fixed in clause 15 as is greater than ordinary time.

(b) For work done during any other week.—Time and a third up to but not exceeding ordinary wages rates for an ordinary week's work.

(c) Any employee subject to this clause absent from work on any day without the permission of the employer shall only be entitled to receive for such week a *pro rata* payment based on the hours actually worked and the rate provided in clause 10 for a week of 44 hours.

(2) All employees (other than casual employees) whose services are not required on any holiday mentioned in clause 15 shall be entitled to a such holiday without deduction of pay. Such employees shall not be required to make up time lost through such holiday which shall be deemed to be of 8 hours and any employees who are required to work:—

- (a) In excess of 28 hours in any week in which two holidays occur } shall be paid for such excess at
- (b) In excess of 36 hours in any week in which one holiday occurs } the rate of time and a half.

TRAVELLING.

14. The special rate to be paid to employees who work away from their employer's place of business for time occupied in travelling between the employer's place of business and work, or between the employee's residence and work shall be 2s. per hour.

SPECIAL RATES.

15. The special rates payable to persons for work done on New Year's Day, Australia Day, Good Friday, Easter Monday, Labour Day, Anzac Day, King's Birthday, Melbourne Cup Day, Christmas Day, and Boxing Day shall be time and a half, calculated on the rates fixed without board and lodging; but if any other day be by Act of Parliament or Proclamation substituted for any of the above-named holidays, the special rate shall only be payable for work done on the day so substituted.

UNIFORMS.

16. Where any female employee is required by the employer to wear a uniform (other than a black uniform) such uniform shall be provided and laundered by the employer free of cost to the employee.

ANNUAL HOLIDAYS.

17. The annual holidays for employees covered by this Determination shall be in accordance with the provisions, as may be amended from time to time, of the *Factories and Shops (Annual Holidays) Act 1946*.

SICK LEAVE.

18. (a) Any employee who has been in the employment of the same employer for a period of not less than six months and who does not attend for duty shall lose his or her pay for the actual time lost unless such employee produces or forwards within 24 hours of the commencement of such absence evidence satisfactory to the employer that his or her non-attendance was due to personal ill-health or accident necessitating such absence, but such employee shall not be entitled to payment for non-attendance on the ground of personal ill-health or accident for more than 44 hours of working time in each year of service or a proportionately less time during any shorter period of employment.

(b) Notwithstanding the provisions of sub-clause (a) hereof, if the full period of sick leave as prescribed above is not taken in any year, such portion as is not taken shall be cumulative from year to year up to a period not exceeding 132 hours of working time, which shall be the maximum amount of leave to which an employee shall be entitled in any year of service without deduction of pay.

For the purposes of this sub-clause, service prior to the 4th July, 1946, shall be disregarded.

DEFINITIONS.

- 19. (a) "Sweets Cook" shall include any person manufacturing cakes or pastry for meals supplied by the employer.
- (b) "Substantial Meal."—A substantial meal shall consist of food comprising soup, entrée, or joint, vegetables and sweets, and on Fridays, a choice of fish.
- (c) "Full Pay" shall mean the rate prescribed in the Determination for the class of work performed, without any deductions whatever.
- (d) Storeman shall mean an employee continuously engaged in storing, checking, tallying, or handling stores.
- (e) Linen maid or seamstress shall mean a female employee who makes and/or repairs linen, uniforms, or furnishings for use in the club concerned.

UNION OFFICIALS RIGHT OF ENTRY.

20. Any official of the Federated Liquor and Allied Trades Employees Trades Union of Australasia authorized in writing by the Secretary for Labour shall have the right to enter any establishments or premises covered by this Determination in order to inspect time-sheets and to interview employees on any matter connected with their employment. Such accredited official before entering such establishment or premises shall produce the authority in writing mentioned on a demand by an employer or his representative for such production.

TERMINATION OF EMPLOYMENT.

21. NOTE.—A copy of this Determination shall be displayed at or near the entrance of every establishment where the Determination of this Wages Board applies.

Under the provisions of Section 7 of the Factories and Shops Act 1936 (No. 4461) every employer of any employee in any restaurant is required to keep a time-book in the prescribed form wherein each employee shall enter daily a correct record of the hours worked. Any employer or employee who commits a breach of this section is liable to a penalty not exceeding £2.

†SUBJECT TO—(a) A maximum deduction as for two meals a day being made where an employee commences work at 9 a.m. or later and finishes at 4 p.m. or earlier on the same day, or he or she commences work for the day between 1 p.m. and 4 p.m.; and (b) A maximum deduction as for one meal a day being made where an employee commences work for the day at or after 4 p.m., the minimum wage shall (except in the cases of barmaids or of employees working for an employer who carries on the business of a Restaurant, Dining Room, Eating House, or Cafeteria in connexion with a Departmental Store or Emporium, and of an apprentice, an improver, a midday waitress, a midday kitchenmaid or pantrymaid, or a casual employee, working in other places) be, where the employer—

- (i) boards the employee and provides three meals per day, one of which shall be a substantial meal, 13s. 6d. per week less;
- (ii) boards the employee and provides three meals per day, where substantial meals are not provided, 9s. per week less;
- (iii) provides only two meals per day for an employee who is employed between 6 a.m. and 3 p.m. or between 11.30 a.m. and 11.45 p.m., 9s. per week less; or
- (iv) boards and lodges the employee, 18s. 8d. per week less.

Notwithstanding any condition in this clause no deduction for meals shall be made for a public holiday when the employee is not required to work on such public holiday.

In computing the amount to be deducted for meals where an employee works for less than six days a week or who is provided with less meals than those provided for in sub-clauses (i), (ii), and (iii) hereof the amount to be allowed as a deduction for each meal shall be one-seventeenth of the amount herein provided for a weekly deduction.

TERMS OF EMPLOYMENT.

23. Employees (other than casual employees, midday waitresses, and midday kitchenmaids or pantrymaids), who in any week work for less than 44 hours shall for such week be paid as follows:—

- (1) (a) For work done during a week in which any of the public holidays mentioned in clause 29 occurs:—
 - (i) Time and a third for all work done on days other than the public holiday
 - (ii) The rate fixed in clause 29 for work done on the public holiday
 } Provided that the earnings of an employee in any such week shall not exceed ordinary wages rates for an ordinary week's work plus such amount of the special rate fixed in clause 29 as is greater than ordinary time.

(b) For work done during any other week:—Time and a third up to but not exceeding ordinary wages rates for an ordinary week's work.

(c) Any employee subject to this clause absent from work on any day without the permission of the employer shall only be entitled to receive for such week a *pro rata* payment based on the hours actually worked and the rate provided in clause 22 for a week of 44 hours.

(2) All employees (other than casual employees) whose services are not required on any holiday mentioned in clause 29 shall be entitled to such holiday without deduction of pay. Such employees shall not be required to make up time lost through such holiday which shall be deemed to be of 8 hours, and any employees who are required to work:—

- (a) In excess of 28 hours in any week in which two holidays occur
 - (b) In excess of 36 hours in any week in which one holiday occurs
- } Shall be paid for such excess at the rate of time and a half.

OVERTIME.

24. The following rates shall be paid for overtime:—

- (a) Persons employed in wine saloons—
 - For all work done on any day (other than the day locally observed by ordinary shopkeepers as a late trading day) in excess of 10 hours
 - For all work done outside a period of 11 hours per day from the time of their beginning to the time of their ending work
 - For all work done in any week (within a period of 11 hours per day from the time of their beginning to the time of their ending work) in excess of the maximum number of hours fixed as a week's work

25. Any female required to resume work at 10 p.m. or later after having been stood down earlier in such day (except for a meal interval not exceeding 40 minutes) shall be paid for all work done between 8 p.m. and midnight at the rate of 2s. per hour.

FEMALES EMPLOYED AFTER MIDNIGHT.

26. Females (other than casuals) required to do any work between midnight and 5 a.m. shall be paid for such work at the rate of double time.

(c) Notwithstanding any provision in sub-clauses (a) and (b) hereof the minimum payment for employees who work only during a theatre interval, viz., between 8.45 p.m. and 10.15 p.m. for a period not exceeding one hour shall be 3s. for each day.

TRAVELLING.

28. The special rate to be paid to employees who work away from their employer's place of business for time occupied in travelling between the employer's place of business and work, or between the employee's residence and work, shall be 2s. per hour.

SPECIAL RATES.

29. The special rate to be paid to casual workers employed in the business of a caterer for work done on Sunday, Good Friday, or Christmas Day shall be double time, and the special rate to be paid to all other employees for work done on New Year's Day, Australia Day, Good Friday, Easter Monday, Labour Day, Anzac Day, King's Birthday, Melbourne Cup Day, Christmas Day, and Boxing Day shall be time and a half, calculated on the rates fixed without board and lodging; but if any other day be by Act of Parliament or Proclamation substituted for any of the above-named holidays the special rate shall only be payable for work done on the day so substituted.

UNIFORMS.

30. Where any female employee is required by the employer to wear a uniform (other than a black uniform) such uniform shall be provided and laundered by the employer free of cost to the employee.

ANNUAL HOLIDAYS.

31. The annual holidays for employees covered by this Determination shall be in accordance with the provisions, as may be amended from time to time, of the *Factories and Shops (Annual Holidays) Act 1946*.

SICK LEAVE.

32. (a) Any employee who has been in the employment of the same employer for a period of not less than six months and who does not attend for duty shall lose his or her pay for the actual time lost unless such employee produces or forwards within 24 hours of the commencement of such absence evidence satisfactory to the employer that his or her non-attendance was due to personal ill-health or accident necessitating such absence, but such employee shall not be entitled to payment for non-attendance on the ground of personal ill-health or accident for more than 44 hours of working time in each year of service or a proportionately less time during any shorter period of employment.

(b) Notwithstanding the provisions of sub-clause (a) hereof, if the full period of sick leave as prescribed above is not taken in any year, such portion as is not taken shall be cumulative from year to year up to a period not exceeding 132 hours of working time, which shall be the maximum amount of leave to which an employee shall be entitled in any year of service without deduction of pay.

For the purposes of this sub-clause, service prior to the 4th July, 1946, shall be disregarded.

DEFINITIONS.

- 33. (a) "Sweets cook" shall include any person manufacturing cakes or pastry for meals supplied by the employer.
- (b) "Substantial meal" shall consist of food comprising soup, entrée, or joint, vegetables and sweets, and on Fridays, a choice of fish.
- (c) Full pay shall mean the rate prescribed in the Determination for the class of work performed without any deductions whatever.
- (d) Departmental store or emporium shall mean an establishment where more than one class of business is carried on, and where under section 83 of the Factories and Shops Acts such establishment is required to close at the hours prescribed by such section.
- (e) Linen maid or seamstress shall mean a female employee who makes and/or repairs linen, uniforms, or furnishings for use in connexion with a business covered by this Determination.
- (f) Fruit juice, flavour, or soda fountain hand shall mean a female employee who as required prepares fruit juices and/or flavours.
- (g) Storeman or storewoman shall mean an employee continuously engaged in storing, checking, tallying, or handling stores.

TERMINATION OF EMPLOYMENT.

34. Employees (other than casual employees) shall except in a case of misconduct by either employer or employee, give or receive two days' notice of termination of employment, or in lieu of such two days' notice one third of the weekly rate fixed for the class of work performed by the employee shall be paid by the employer or forfeited by the employee, but such notice shall not be required from an employee who terminates employment because of his or her illness or injury.

UNION OFFICIALS RIGHT OF ENTRY.

35. Any official of the Federated Liquor and Allied Trades Employees Trades Union of Australasia authorized in writing by the Secretary for Labour shall have the right to enter any establishments or premises covered by this Determination in order to inspect time-sheets and to interview employees on any matter connected with their employment. Such accredited official before entering such establishment or premises shall produce the authority in writing mentioned on a demand by the employer or his representative for such production.

ACCOMMODATION.

36. Adequate accommodation apart from rooms to which the public have access shall be provided for dressing, and reasonable accommodation shall be provided for employees to have their meals.

PERIODICAL ADJUSTMENT OF WAGES.

37. The wages rates for adult males and barmaids set out in clause 2, and for adult males set out in clauses 10 and 22 (b) are based upon the following basic wage rates and pursuant to the provisions of section 21 of the Factories and Shops Act 1934, shall be automatically adjusted as prescribed by clause 38. Provided that the rates of £1 16s. 6d. or more for female employees shall be increased or decreased by half the amount of such increase or decrease in the basic wage.

Provided further that the amounts of the rates of male improvers or juniors and at rates of less than £1 16s. 6d. for female employees shall be adjusted proportionately to adjustments of the basic wage calculated to the nearest 6d., any broken part of 6d. in the result not exceeding 3d. to be disregarded.

ADJUSTMENT OF BASIC WAGE.

38. (a) For the purposes of this Determination the expression "Commonwealth Statistician's 'all items' retail price index numbers" or any like expression means the numbers stated to be such index numbers in any document purporting, and not proved to be wrongly so purporting, to be printed by the Commonwealth Government Printer or to be signed by or on behalf of the Commonwealth Statistician.

(b) Until the beginning of the first pay period to commence in May, 1947, the amounts of the basic wage shall be as prescribed in clause 37.

(c) During each future successive period beginning with the first pay period to commence in a May, an August, a November or a February, the amount of the needs basic wage shall be adjusted by the following method, namely, by multiplying the last published Commonwealth Statistician's "all items" retail price index number by the factor .087 taken to one place of decimals, the resultant whole number being the amount of the basic wage expressed in shillings but should the decimal number reach .5 or more the basic wage shall be taken to the next higher shilling.

Factories and Shops Acts.

DETERMINATION OF THE FACTORY ENGINE DRIVERS BOARD.

NOTES.—(A) This Determination applies to the whole of the State of Victoria.

(B) On the 22nd June, 1914, and 17th August, 1920, respectively, the powers of the Factory Engine Drivers Board were extended to enable it to "fix the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any person employed in the occupation of—

- (a) a boiler cleaner;
- (b) an engine-driver or attendant in connexion with the use of internal combustion engines or electrical engines other than internal combustion engines or electrical engines connected with mines."

(C) On the 16th April, 1935, the Board was deprived of the power to determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any person employed in the occupation of—

- (a) a fireman, boiler attendant, boiler cleaner, or engine-driver in connexion with steam engines or steam boilers in or about plants for crushing metalliferous ores;
- (b) an engine-driver or attendant in connexion with the use of internal combustion engines or electrical engines in or about plant for crushing metalliferous ores—

and such power was conferred exclusively on the Mining Engine Drivers Board.

IN accordance with the provisions of the Factories and Shops Acts, the Wages Board appointed to "determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any person or persons or classes of persons whosoever employed in the occupation of a fireman, boiler attendant, or engine-driver, in connexion with the use of steam-boilers or steam-engines other than steam-boilers or steam-engines connected with mines," has made the following Determination, namely:—

1. That as from the beginning of the first pay period to commence after the 2nd April, 1947, the last previous Determination of this Board shall be revoked and replaced by this Determination.

2. EMPLOYEES—OTHER THAN JUNIORS PROVIDED FOR IN CLAUSE 4.

REPAIRS TO WAR DAMAGED SHIPS—SPECIAL RATES.

3. (a) Crane drivers who are engaged upon the work and working under the conditions specified in paragraphs (i), (ii), and (iii) hereof and who are operating cranes which have been erected on a vessel under repair and on which employees are engaged in the cutting and removal of torn, twisted, and displaced structural materials from vessels which have been damaged by bomb, mine, shell, or torpedo shall be paid extra rates as follows :—

- (i) Where such damaged structural materials are covered in oil residue and/or other unusually obnoxious substances, and where there is a risk of such materials falling, or there are difficulties in the way of securing a safe foothold for working—2d. per hour extra.
- (ii) Where the work is carried out in the presence of explosives or combustible materials under conditions under which there is a risk of fire or explosion—4d. per hour extra.
- (iii) Where as well as working under the conditions specified in paragraph (i) hereof an employee works under those specified in paragraph (ii) hereof—6d. per hour extra.

The question of whether the conditions specified in paragraphs (i) or (ii) hereof or both of them exist in any particular case shall be settled by agreement between the foreman and the workman concerned provided that in cases of disagreement between the foreman and workman, the workman or shop steward on his behalf shall be entitled, within 24 hours, to ask for a decision on the workman's claim by the employer's industrial officer (if there be one), or otherwise by the employer or the executive officer responsible for the management or superintendence of the plant concerned. In such a case a decision shall be given on the workman's claim within 48 hours of its being asked for (unless that time expires on a non-working day, in which case it shall be given during the next working day), or else the said allowance shall be paid.

In any case where an organization alleges that an employer or his representative is persistently unreasonable or capricious in relation to such claims, it shall have the right to bring such case before the Wages Board.

In any case in which it is agreed or decided that the specified conditions exist the extra rate prescribed shall be paid for the whole of the time crane drivers are working under such conditions.

The extra rates payable under this clause shall not be regarded as part of the crane driver's ordinary wage for the purposes of this Determination.

JUNIOR LABOUR.

4. (a) The minimum rates of wage to be paid to juniors working as greasers or as cleaners or as motor drivers or attendants where the motor does not exceed 50 horse-power in all shall be :—

(b) If a cleaner or greaser sometimes under the supervision of an engine-driver, stops or starts an engine, he shall be paid 6s. per week extra.

CASUAL LABOUR.

5. A casual employee (as defined) shall be paid per hour an amount equal to 1 1/10th of the weekly rate prescribed by this Determination for the work performed by him divided by forty-four.

CONTRACT OF EMPLOYMENT.

6. (a) Except as provided by clause 5 hereof, employment shall be by the week. An employee, to become entitled to payment on a weekly basis, shall, except as provided by clause 15 hereof, perform such work as the management shall from time to time require on the days and during the hours usually worked by the class of employees affected.

(b) Employment for the first two weeks of service shall be from day to day at the weekly rate fixed. Provided that any employee who has once served a probationary period of two weeks with any employer shall not be subject to be employed for a second probationary period with the same employer, except when his re-engagement takes place at least one month after the termination of his employment. Provided further that an employee shall be paid for any holiday or holidays which occur during any period he is employed on probation pursuant to this clause.

(c) An employee not attending for duty shall, except as provided by sub-clause (cc) hereof, lose his pay for the actual time of such non-attendance.

(cc) (1.) An employee on weekly hiring, who is absent from his work on account of personal illness, or on account of injury by accident arising out of and in the course of his employment, shall be entitled to leave of absence, without deduction of pay, to the same extent and subject to the same conditions as are prescribed by award, determination, or agreement (Commonwealth or State) for the general body of employees in the industry in which he is employed: Provided—

(i) that he shall, in any case, be entitled to qualify (subject to the aforesaid conditions) for not less than the equivalent of four days' paid leave in any year;

(ii) that where any such award, determination, or agreement contains (for purposes of sick leave) a definition of the word "year", necessary adjustments and proportions shall be applied to employees under this Determination until the commencement of the next year in accordance with such definition, account being taken of any paid sick leave which an employee may have had during his year which is current when this paragraph comes into operation.

(2.) An employee on weekly hiring, who is not entitled to paid sick leave under the preceding paragraph but who is absent from work on account of personal illness or injury, as therein referred to, shall be entitled to leave of absence, without deduction of pay, subject to the following conditions and limitations—

(i) he shall not be entitled to paid leave of absence for any period in respect of which he is entitled to workers' compensation;

(ii) he shall prove to the satisfaction of his employer (or, in the event of dispute, of the Wages Board) that he was unable, on account of such illness or injury, to attend for duty on the day or days for which sick leave is claimed;

(iii) he shall not be entitled in any year (whether in the employ of one employer or of several) to leave in excess of the equivalent of four days of working time.

(3.) For the purposes of administering paragraphs (1) and (2) of this sub-clause, an employer may within two weeks of the employee entering his employment, require him to make a sworn declaration or other written statement as to what paid leave of absence he has had from any employer during the then current year, and upon such statement the employer shall be entitled to rely and act.

(d) Employment shall be terminated by a week's notice on either side, such notice to be given at any time during the week. This shall not affect the right of the management to dismiss any employee without notice for malingering, inefficiency, neglect of duty or misconduct, and in such case wages shall be paid up to the time of dismissal only, or to deduct payment for any day the employee cannot be usefully employed because of any strike by the Federated Engine-drivers and Firemen's Association of Australasia or any other Union or through any breakdown of machinery or any stoppage of work by any cause for which the employer cannot reasonably be held responsible. Provided that, where an employer orders employees not to work on any day because of the state of the weather, such order shall not deprive the employees of their claim for payment under their weekly engagements, but if such employees cease work on any day because of the state of the weather without being ordered to do so, they shall not be entitled to payment for time so lost.

HOURS.

7. (a) For an employee not working on shift the ordinary working hours per week and per day respectively shall be of the same number as those worked in the particular workshop, factory, or working place at which such employee works by the majority of the employees not working on shift who are engaged therein in connexion with the operation for which is used the power or steam supplied with the aid of such employees.

Provided that if the number of hours worked by such majority exceeds 44 per week, the ordinary working hours for such employee shall not exceed 44 per week nor 8 in any one day if a six-day week be worked, nor 8 hours 48 minutes in any one day if a five-day week be worked.

(b) Time occupied in raising steam or closing down engines or banking fires shall be regarded as time worked.

(c) For employees not working on shift a regular starting and finishing time shall be fixed, which shall not be changed except after notice of at least a week to the employee concerned.

(d) For employees working on shift the ordinary working hours shall be as provided in clause 13 hereof.

(e) In country and bush sawmills, each engine-driver or fireman when so engaged shall be allowed 1½ hours per day at ordinary rates for preparing and/or closing down engines and/or for raising steam and/or banking fires on boilers.

MEAL INTERVAL.

8. Except on shift work, provision shall as far as practicable be made by the employer to enable an employee to have a midday meal interval of not less than 40 minutes nor more than one hour on all working days except Saturday. Such meal interval shall not be deemed to be time worked, and the time of ceasing work shall be extended by time equal to the duration of the meal interval.

For all work done during such meal interval and thereafter until a meal break is allowed, payment shall be made at the rate of time and a half.

MEAL INTERVAL DURING OVERTIME.

9. (a) Until further order, employees shall be allowed the same conditions as to the meals and meal intervals to be allowed while working overtime as are prescribed by award or determination—Commonwealth or State—for the general body of employees of the industry in which they are employed.

(b) In any case to which sub-clause (a) hereof does not apply, an employee required to work overtime for more than two hours without being notified the day before that he will be so required to work shall either be supplied with a meal by the employer or paid 1s. 6d. : or if work extends into a second meal hour, 2s. 6d. for the two meals, but such payment need not be made to employees living in the same locality as their workshop who can reasonably return home for meals.

If an employee pursuant to notice has provided a meal or meals, and is not required to work overtime, he shall be paid for each meal so provided.

OVERTIME.

10. (a) For all time worked on week days outside the hours prescribed in clause 7 hereof, overtime shall be paid at the rate of time and a half for the first four hours and double time thereafter.

(b) An employee recalled after leaving his place of work to work overtime shall be paid for a minimum of three hours' work at the appropriate rate.

(c) An employee occasionally required to hold himself in readiness, either at his home, his place of work or elsewhere, to work after ordinary hours or on a Sunday or holiday, shall be paid standing-by time at his ordinary rate of wage for the time from which he is to hold himself in readiness until released.

(d) When an employee working overtime finishes work at a time when reasonable means of transport are not available, the employer shall provide him with a conveyance to his home or pay him at his ordinary rate of wage for the time occupied in reaching his home.

(e) When an employee is required to work overtime after his usual ceasing time so long as not to permit him having at least eight consecutive hours for rest between the time of his ceasing to work such overtime and the ordinary time for commencing his next shift, he shall be entitled to absent himself from work until he has had eight consecutive hours off duty, but shall not be paid for such period of absence.

HOLIDAYS.

11. All employees shall be entitled to the same holidays as are observed by the general body of employees of the industry in which they are employed.

SUNDAY AND HOLIDAY RATE.

12. In the case of continuous or recurring work necessarily done in the ordinary course directly for the establishment's usual production or service upon Sundays or holidays as well as upon other days of the week, ordinary time or shift worked on a Sunday or holiday shall be paid for at the rate of time and a half, but in all other cases all time on duty on Sundays or holidays shall be paid for at the rate of double time. Provided the time worked on Sundays or holidays shall be paid for at the rate of time and a half for the first eight hours and double time thereafter whenever repairs to, maintenance, or renewals of engines, boilers or other machinery in any undertaking have necessarily to be done on Sundays or holidays to allow work to proceed properly next day.

SHIFT WORK.

13. (a) The ordinary working hours of employees on shift work shall not exceed an average of 44 per week spread over a period of one, two, three or four weeks, to be worked in shifts of eight hours, including such time as by mutual arrangement may be taken for meals.

(b) There shall be a roster of shifts which shall—

- (i) Provide for rotation unless all the employees concerned desire otherwise;
- (ii) Provide for not more than eight shifts to be worked in any nine consecutive days; and
- (iii) Not be changed until after four weeks' notice.

So far as employees present themselves for work in accordance therewith, shifts shall be worked according to the roster.

(c) Notwithstanding the preceding sub-clauses (a) and (b), where in any particular workshop, factory or working place at which an employee working on shift is engaged the majority of the employees working on shift therein in connexion with the operations for which is used the power or steam supplied with the aid of such employees work shifts not in accordance with sub-clauses (a) and (b) hereof, such employee shall for his ordinary hours of work work shifts similar in length, roster conditions and crib-times to those of such majority, but this sub-clause shall not apply when such shifts exceed in the aggregate 176 hours in any period of four consecutive weeks, in which case the preceding sub-clauses (a) and (b) shall apply.

(d) For work done by a shift worker outside the ordinary hours of his shift double time shall be paid. But this shall not apply to arrangements between employees themselves or in cases due to rotation of shift or when the relief does not come on duty at the proper time. Provided that where not less than eight hours' notice has been given to the employer by the employee that he will be absent from work and the employee whom he should relieve is not relieved, such unrelieved employee shall be paid time and a half for all time of duty after he has finished his ordinary shift.

(e) (1.) Employees working afternoon or night shifts shall be paid shift premiums at the same rates and subject to the same conditions as are prescribed by the award, determination, or agreement (Commonwealth or State) for the general body of employees in the industry in which they are employed: Provided that in any case, they shall be entitled to be paid for such shifts not less than 5 per cent. more than ordinary rates.

(2.) Employees working afternoon or night shifts, who are not covered by paragraph (1) hereof, shall be paid shift premiums for such shifts, as follows:—

- (i) If such shifts continue for more than one month—5 per cent. more than ordinary rates;
- (ii) If such shifts continue for less than one month, but for more than five afternoons or nights—10 per cent. more than ordinary rates;
- (iii) If such shifts do not continue for more than five afternoons or nights—overtime rates shall be paid.
- (iv) A shift-worker who, during a period or engagement on shift work, works only on night shift and without some regular rotation with some other shift or with day work, shall be paid at the rate of time and a quarter for all time worked during his ordinary working hours.

For the purpose of this paragraph (2) "night shift" means any shift finishing subsequent to midnight and at or before 8 a.m. and "afternoon shift" means any shift (not being a night shift) which starts before 8 a.m. or after 10 a.m.

(f) Where in any particular workshop, factory or working place at which an employee working on shift is engaged the majority of the employees working on shift therein in connexion with operations for which is used the power or steam supplied with the aid of such employee receive compensation by way of annual leave or otherwise for working Saturday afternoon, holiday and/or Sunday shifts, such employee shall be given similar compensation for working such shifts.

ANNUAL LEAVE.

14. (a) Employees shall be entitled to and shall be allowed annual leave to the same extent and subject to the same conditions as are prescribed by statute award or determination—Commonwealth or State—for the general body of employees in the industry in which they are employed.

Employees who are not entitled to leave under the preceding paragraph shall be allowed annual leave subject to the following conditions:—

Period of Leave.

(b) A period of fourteen consecutive days' leave shall be allowed annually to an employee after twelve months' continuous service (less the period of annual leave) as an employee on weekly hiring in any one or more of the occupations to which this Determination applies.

Seven-day Shift Workers.

(c) In addition to the leave hereinbefore prescribed seven-day shift workers, that is shift workers who are rostered to work regularly on Sundays and holidays shall be allowed seven consecutive days' leave including non-working days.

Where an employee with twelve months' continuous service is engaged for part of the twelve-monthly period as a seven-day shift worker, he shall be entitled to have the period of fourteen consecutive days' annual leave prescribed in sub-clause (b) hereof increased by half a day for each month he is continuously engaged as aforesaid.

Annual Leave Exclusive of Public Holidays.

(d) Subject to this sub-clause the annual leave prescribed by this clause shall be exclusive of any of the holidays prescribed by clause 11 of this Determination, and if any such holiday falls within an employee's period of annual leave and is observed on a day which in the case of that employee would have been an ordinary working day, there shall be added to the period of annual leave time equivalent to the ordinary time which the employee would have worked if such day had not been a holiday.

Where a holiday falls as aforesaid and the employee fails without reasonable cause proof whereof shall be upon him to attend for work at his ordinary starting time on the working day immediately following the last day of the period of his annual leave, he shall not be entitled to be paid for any such holiday.

Broken Leave.

(e) The annual leave shall be given and taken in a continuous period or, if the employee and the employer so agree, in two separate periods and not otherwise.

Calculation of Continuous Service.

(f) For the purposes of this clause service shall be deemed to be continuous notwithstanding—

- (i) any interruption or termination of the employment by the employer if such interruption or termination has been made merely with the intention of avoiding obligations hereunder in respect of leave of absence;
- (ii) any absence from work on account of personal sickness or accident or on account of leave lawfully granted by the employer; or
- (iii) any absence with reasonable cause proof whereof shall be upon the employee.

In cases of personal sickness or accident or absence with reasonable cause the employee to become entitled to the benefit of this sub-clause shall inform the employer in writing if practicable within 24 hours of the commencement of such absence of his inability to attend for duty and as far as practicable the nature of the illness injury or cause and the estimated duration of his absence.

Any absence from work by reason or any cause not being a cause specified in this sub-clause shall not be deemed to break the continuity of service for the purposes of this clause unless the employer during the absence or within fourteen days of the termination of the absence notifies the employee in writing that such absence will be regarded as having broken the continuity of service.

In cases of individual absenteeism such notice shall be given in writing to the employee concerned, but in cases of concerted or collective absenteeism notice may be given to employees by the posting up of a notification in the plant, in the manner in which general notifications to employees are usually made in that plant and by posting to each union whose members have participated in such concerted or collective absenteeism a copy of same not later than the day it is posted up in the plant.

A notice to an individual employee may be given by delivering same to him personally or by posting it to his last recorded address, in which case it shall be deemed to have reached him in due course of post.

In calculating the period of twelve months' continuous service any such absence as aforesaid shall not, except to the extent of not more than fourteen days in a twelve-monthly period in the case of sickness or accident, be taken into account in calculating the period of twelve months' continuous service.

Calculation of Service.

(g) Service before the date of operation of this Determination shall be taken into consideration for the purpose of calculating annual leave, but an employee shall not be entitled to leave or payment in lieu thereof for any period in respect of which leave or a payment in lieu thereof has been allowed or made under the clause hereby revoked. Provided however, that in respect of service before the 1st January, 1946, the annual leave shall be allowed at the rate of 3½ hours for each completed one month of continuous service and in respect of service after that date at the rate of 7½ hours for each completed one month of continuous service. Any broken part of a month served before the 1st January, 1946, shall for the purposes of this clause be deemed to be service after the 1st January, 1946. The period of annual leave to be allowed under this sub-clause shall be calculated to the nearest day any broken part of a day in the result not exceeding half a day to be disregarded.

Where the employer is a successor or assignee or transferee of a business if an employee was in the employment of the employer's predecessor at the time when he became such successor or assignee or transferee the employee in respect of the period during which he was in the service of the predecessor shall for the purpose of this clause be deemed to be in the service of the employer.

Calculation of Month.

(h) For the purpose of this clause a month shall be reckoned as commencing with the beginning of the first day of the employment or period of employment in question and as ending at the beginning of the day which in the latest month in question has the same date number as that which the commencing day had in its month and if there be no such day in such subsequent month shall be reckoned as ending at the end of such subsequent month.

Leave to be Taken.

(i) The annual leave provided for by this clause shall be allowed and shall be taken and except as provided by sub-clauses (m) and (n) hereof payment shall not be made or accepted in lieu of annual leave.

Time of Taking Leave.

(j) Annual leave shall be given at a time fixed by the employer within a period not exceeding six months from the date when the right to annual leave accrued and after not less than two weeks' notice to the employee.

Leave Allowed Before Due Date.

(k) An employer may allow annual leave to an employee before the right thereto has accrued due, but where leave is taken in such a case a further period of annual leave shall not commence to accrue until after the expiration of the twelve months in respect of which annual leave had been taken before it accrued.

Where leave has been granted to an employee pursuant to this sub-clause before the right thereto has accrued due and the employee subsequently leaves or is discharged from the service of the employer before completing the twelve months' continuous service in respect of which the leave was granted the employer may for each one complete month of the qualifying period of twelve months not served by the employee deduct from whatever remuneration is payable upon the termination of the employment one-twelfth of the amount of wage paid on account of the annual leave, which amount shall not include any sums paid for any of the holidays prescribed by clause 11 of this Determination.

Payment for Period of Leave.

(l) Each employee before going on leave shall be paid two weeks' wages, except a shift worker or an employee taking his leave pursuant to sub-clause (e) of this clause either of whom shall be paid the amount of wage he would have received in respect of the ordinary time which he would have worked had he not been on leave during the relevant periods. For the purposes of this sub-clause and sub-clause (m) hereof, wages shall be at the rate prescribed by clauses 2 and 4 of this Determination for the occupation in which the employee was ordinarily employed immediately prior to the commencement of his leave or the termination of his employment, as the case may be. Payment in the case of employees employed on piece or bonus work or any other system of payment by results shall be at time rates.

Proportionate Leave on Dismissal.

(m) If after one month's continuous service in any qualifying twelve-monthly period an employee lawfully leaves his employment or his employment is terminated by the employer through no fault of the employee, the employee shall be paid at his ordinary rate of wage for 3½ hours in respect of each completed one month of continuous service before the 1st January, 1946, and for 7½ hours at the same rate in respect of each completed month of continuous service after that date, the service in each case being service in respect of which leave has not been granted hereunder.

Annual Close Down.

(n) Where an employer closes down his plant, or a section or sections thereof, for the purposes of allowing annual leave to all or the bulk of the employees in the plant, or section or sections concerned, the following provisions shall apply—

- (i) He may by giving not less than one month's notice of his intention so to do stand off for the duration of the close down all employees in the plant or section or sections concerned, and allow to those who are not then qualified for two full weeks' leave paid leave on a proportionate basis of one-sixth of a week's leave for each completed month of continuous service.
- (ii) An employee who has then qualified for two full weeks' leave, and has also completed a further month or more of continuous service shall be allowed his leave, and shall subject to sub-clause (g) hereof also be paid one-sixth of a week's wages in respect of each completed month of continuous service performed since the close of his last twelve-monthly qualifying period.

(iii) The next twelve-monthly qualifying period for each employee affected by such close down shall commence from the day on which the plant, or section or sections concerned is re-opened for work.

Provided that at all time during which an employee is stood off without pay for the purposes of this sub-clause shall be deemed to be time of service in the next twelve-monthly qualifying period.

- (iv) If in the first year of his service with an employer an employee is allowed proportionate annual leave under paragraph (i) hereof, and subsequently within such year lawfully leaves his employment or his employment is terminated by the employer through no fault of the employee, he shall be entitled to the benefit of sub-clause (m) of this clause subject to adjustment for any proportionate leave which he may have been allowed as aforesaid.

(o) Nothing in this clause shall affect the operations of clause 13 (f) hereof and any annual leave required to be given under that sub-clause shall be given in addition to the annual leave prescribed by this clause.

(p) This clause shall operate as to persons at present employed from the 1st January, 1946, and shall apply as from the beginning of the first pay period to commence on or after the 17th July, 1946.

MIXED FUNCTIONS.

15. (a) Where the employment or work involves functions of a mixed character, the minimum wages to be paid to the employee for the day or part of a day he is so employed shall be calculated as if he performed such only of the said functions as involve the highest rate of wages under this Determination. If so employed for any part of a day he shall be paid at the highest rate for the whole of such day.

(b) Engine drivers, whilst in charge of their engines, shall only be required to perform such work as may be within the scope of or incidental to engine driving and the generation, use and application of engine power. Provided that engine drivers in charge of engines supplying power to any intermittent process involving regular stoppages, may during such stoppages be required to perform any work necessary or incidental to such intermittent process.

EXTRA RATES NOT CUMULATIVE.

16. Extra rates herein prescribed are not cumulative so as to exceed the maximum of double the ordinary rates.

TRAVELLING AND CAMPING ALLOWANCES.

17. Employees shall be allowed the same conditions as to fares, travelling time, travelling allowances, country work, camping allowances as are prescribed by award or determination—Commonwealth or State—for the general body of employees of the industry in which they are employed.

RIGHT OF ENTRY OF UNION OFFICIALS.

18. A duly accredited representative of the Federated Engine-drivers and Firemen's Association of Australasia not more than once a fortnight shall have the right to enter during the midday meal hour the portion of an employer's establishment in which any employees engaged upon any class of work to which this Determination applies are employed for the purpose of interviewing such employees on legitimate Union business.

If any employer alleges that a representative is unduly interfering with or is creating disaffection amongst his employees or is offensive in his methods, such employer may refuse the right of entry.

Provided, however, that no employer or person apparently acting on his behalf shall refuse to allow such representative as aforesaid to enter an establishment upon the ground only that it is not then the midday meal interval, unless he shall upon such refusal give the representative full and accurate particulars of the meal hours or crib times of each of the employees engaged upon work to which this Determination applies. An employer shall be deemed to have committed a breach of this Determination if he or the person apparently acting on his behalf omits, being obliged to do so, to give such particulars as aforesaid.

TIME AND WAGES BOOK.

19. (a) Each employer shall keep a time and wages book at his workshop, factory or mill or other place of work or at an office convenient thereto showing the name of each employee, his classification under this Determination, his time of starting and finishing work each day and the amount of overtime worked, and all amounts paid to him by way of wages, special rates and allowances.

(b) Any time occupied by an employee in filling in any time book or card, or in the making of records, shall be treated as time of duty.

(c) An employer may provide a mechanical clock for the purpose of recording the time of each employee, in which case each employee shall at the end of the week enter such other particulars as may be necessary to comply with sub-clause (a) hereof on some card or document used in connexion with such clock, and such card or document shall be deemed to be the time and wages book.

(d) Such time and wages book shall on demand be produced at reasonable times by the employer for inspection to an official of the Federated Engine-drivers and Firemen's Association of Australasia duly authorized in writing by the president and secretary of the local branch or sub-branch of such Association at the place where the time and wages book is kept pursuant to sub-clause (a) hereof.

The official making such inspection shall be permitted to make and retain a copy of any entry in such time and wages book relating to any matter in respect of which he suspects a breach of this Determination has been committed. He shall, if required to do so, produce for inspection by the employer or his representative any such copy as aforesaid.

SHOP STEWARDS.

20. A shop steward appointed by the employees in each workshop or place of work shall be allowed the necessary time during working hours to interview the employer or his representative on matters affecting employees whom he represents.

Provided that this clause shall not apply in any case in which at the one place an employer employs five or less employees to whom this Determination applies.

RADIATORS.

21. Each crane cabin shall, unless otherwise heated, be equipped with a radiator, which the employer shall install and maintain in good order and condition.

APPLICATION OF DETERMINATION.

22. This Determination shall not apply to—

- (i) The driving of any internal combustion engine of 30 or less b.h.p. or any engine or electric motor or any pump, air compressor, pneumatic, or small hoist on which no engine-driver or fireman or greaser is employed as such, but the starting and stopping of and attention to which is done by an employee the greater part of whose time is taken up with other work; or
- (ii) The operation of pneumatic and small hoists and two-motion electric man-power cranes; or
- (iii) The driving of footpath rollers of 30 cwt. and under.

DEFINITIONS.

23. In this Determination, except where otherwise clearly intended—

(a) "Attendant" means a person who attends to an electric motor or motors of thirty horse-power or more in the aggregate, and performs any duties of oiling or cleaning or attending to commutators, brushes, fuses, or switches.

(b) "Casual employee" means an employee competent to do the work he is engaged to do who is dismissed or refused work without any fault of his own before the expiration of six days from the date he starts work, but does not include an employee usually engaged in another capacity by the employer concerned, and who is called upon to do work coming under the terms of this Determination.

(c) "Engine-driver" means any person who operates or drives any engine or engines, the motive power of which is either steam, gas, oil, water, compressed air, or electricity, and includes any greaser who is called upon in the ordinary course of his duty to do engine-driver's work other than simply stopping or starting an engine under the supervision of an engine-driver.

(d) "Engine-driver in charge of plant" means—

(i) When two or more drivers are employed at the plant at one time, the engine-driver who is invested with the superintendence and responsibility or who has to accept the responsibility and superintendence; or

(ii) When he is the only person of his class employed on the plant, the engine-driver who does the general repair work of the plant in addition to the work of engine-driving, but not when he merely assists a fitter or engineer to do such work.

(e) "Fireman—first-class" means a fireman who attends to two or more boilers or two or more suction gas generators or one or more boilers or one or more generators developing 1,000 i.h.p. in the aggregate, and includes the fireman of a steam navy or excavator.

(f) "Greaser—first-class" means a greaser who under the supervision of an engine-driver stops or starts an engine or engines, but does not include any greaser who does so only in cases of necessity or emergency.

- (g) "Leading fireman—first-class" means—
 - (i) The fireman employed at a plant where three or more firemen are employed at the same time who is invested with the responsibility and superintendence or who has to accept the responsibility and superintendence; or
 - (ii) The fireman employed at a plant where three or more firemen are employed at the same time whose duty it is to attend to the water of boilers that are fired by two or more of the other firemen.
- (h) "Leading fireman—second-class" means—
 - (i) The fireman employed at a plant where two firemen are employed at the same time who is invested with the responsibility and superintendence; or
 - (ii) The fireman employed at a plant where two firemen are employed at the same time and whose duty it is to attend to the water of boilers that are fired by the other fireman.
- (i) "Lofty crane—first-class" means a lofty crane on a building in the course of erection or demolition where the driving platform is more than 100 feet above the ground.
- (j) "Lofty crane—second-class" means a lofty crane on a building in the course of erection or demolition where the driving platform is from 20 to 100 feet above the ground.
- (k) "Lofty crane—third-class" means a lofty crane outside buildings not in the course of erection where the driving platform is more than 20 feet from the level of the ground.
- (l) "Steam-engine—first-class" means a turbine or an engine or engines having a single cylinder with a bore of 12 inches in diameter or over, or having singly or together two or more cylinders the sum of the area of whose bores equals or exceeds the area of a circle 12 inches in diameter.
- (m) "Steam-engine—second-class" means an engine or engines having a single cylinder with a bore less than 12 inches in diameter or having singly or together two or more cylinders the sum of the area of whose bores is less than the area of a circle 12 inches in diameter.

PERIODICAL ADJUSTMENT OF ADULT WAGES.

24. The wages rates set out in clause 2 (a) are based upon the following basic wage rates, and, pursuant to the provisions of Section 21 of the *Factories and Shops Act 1934*, the Board hereby determines that such rates shall be automatically adjusted as prescribed by clause 25.

ADJUSTMENT OF BASIC WAGE.

25. (a) For the purposes of this Determination, the expression "Commonwealth Statistician's 'all items' retail price index numbers" or any like expression means the numbers stated to be such index numbers in any document purporting, and not proved to be wrongly so purporting, to be printed by the Commonwealth Government Printer or to be signed by or on behalf of the Commonwealth Statistician.

(b) Until the beginning of the first pay period to commence in August, 1947, the amounts of the Basic Wage shall be as prescribed in clause 24.

(c) During each future successive period beginning with the first pay period to commence in an August, a November a February, or a May, the amount of the needs basic wage shall be adjusted by the following method, namely, by multiplying the last published Commonwealth Statistician's "all items" retail price index number by the factor .087 taken to one place of decimals, the resultant whole number being the amount of the basic wage expressed in shillings, but should the decimal number reach .5 or more the basic wage shall be taken to the next higher shilling.

PERIODICAL ADJUSTMENT OF JUNIOR WAGES.

26. (a) The amounts of the weekly rates for juniors in clause 4 are based upon those set out in sub-clause (b) hereof which have been fixed upon a needs basic wage of 77s. per week, and such rates shall be adjusted proportionately to the average of the needs basic wage for Sydney, Melbourne, Adelaide and Hobart calculated to the nearest 6d., any broken part of 6d. in the result not exceeding 3d. to be disregarded, and shall accord with the rates payable from time to time under the appropriate award of the Commonwealth Court of Conciliation and Arbitration.

DETERMINATION OF THE SHOPS BOARD No. 13 (FUEL AND FODDER—COUNTRY).

NOTE.—This Determination applies to the whole of the State **outside and excepting** the following parts of Victoria, namely:—The Metropolitan District as defined in the Factories and Shops Acts and the Orders in Council thereunder; the cities of Ballarat, Bendigo, Geelong, Geelong West, and Warrnambool; the town of Newtown and Chilwell; and the boroughs of Eaglehawk and Sebastopol.

IN accordance with the provisions of the Factories and Shops Acts the Wages Board which since 24th December, 1940, has had the power "to determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any person or persons or classes of persons—

- (a) employed in the business of a hay, corn, or chaff dealer;
- (b) employed carting, cutting, or otherwise preparing firewood for sale or for use in some process, trade, business, or occupation;
- (c) employed in connexion with the sale or distribution of wood, coal, or coke;
- (d) employed in the process, trade, business or occupation of burning, grinding, grading, or distributing charcoal"—

has made the following Determination, namely:—

1. That as from the beginning of the first pay period to commence on or after the 1st July, 1947, the last previous Determination of this Board shall be revoked and replaced by this Determination.

NOTE.—The Board determines that no person shall be employed as an apprentice.

CONDITIONS OF EMPLOYMENT.

3. (i) Except as in this Determination otherwise provided, the ordinary weekly total of hours shall be 44 in number, all to be worked on days other than Sunday.

(ii) Such ordinary weekly total, at the option of the employer, may be spread over five or six days and shall be worked in one period occurring between 7.30 a.m. and 12.30 p.m. on Saturday and between 7.30 a.m. and 5.15 p.m. on other days, subject to the recognized meal hours or intervals and smoke-oh of ten minutes each morning and afternoon, but no other breaks imposed by the employer.

(iii) If a five-day week is worked the ordinary daily total of working hours shall be 8 4/5ths, and if a six-day week is worked such total shall be four on Saturday and eight on any other day.

(iv) Smoke-ohs shall be counted as part of time worked.

OVERTIME, ETC.

4. (a) Except as in this Determination otherwise provided, all time worked in excess of the ordinary weekly or daily hours of work shall be paid at one and a half times the ordinary prescribed rate for the first four hours, and at double the ordinary prescribed rate for the time thereafter.

(b) Horse drivers who, in excess of such weekly or daily total hours of work, are required to spend time in taking charge of teams at the yard, camp, or stable, or in returning teams thereto, shall be paid for such time at the ordinary rate.

(c) If an employee is required by his employer to be for any time anywhere only for the purposes of the employer in respect of the business in which the employee is employed, the employee shall be deemed to be on duty for the employer during such time and shall be paid at the appropriate prescribed rate (if any) for so much of such time as is spent in work, and at the ordinary minimum rate for so much of such time as is not so spent.

Provided that this clause shall not apply to any time spent by an employee in the course of going to or coming from any yard, camp, stable, depot or picking-up place of the employer, or in the course of going to a place of the employer, or in the course of going to a place of work for the purpose of starting work, or in the course of coming therefrom after ceasing work.

(d) Employees recalled to work after the expiration of their customary working time for the day, and after they have left work for the day, shall be paid at the least as for working two hours at one and a half times the prescribed rate.

TERMS OF ENGAGEMENT.

5. (a) Subject to exceptions and limitations hereinafter contained any employer shall have the option of engaging any employee either by the week or casually.

(b) (i) If the engagement is by the week it shall be for a continuous period of at least eight weeks, and thereafter shall be terminable on either side by a week's notice which may be made to expire at any time during a week of the employment. Provided that this clause shall not affect the employer's right to dismiss forthwith at any time an employee because of the latter's incompetence or misconduct, in which case the employee shall be entitled in respect of wages for the then current week's employment only to payment proportionate to the aggregate of time worked by him, and of such other previous time (if any) in that week as to which under this Determination no deduction from his week's wages is allowable.

(ii) An engagement shall be deemed to be and to continue casual unless the employer, at the commencement of the engagement or before any change by him of a casual engagement of the employee to one by the week, expressly notifies the employee that he is to be engaged by the week.

Employees on casual engagement shall be paid at the rate of time and a quarter.

(iii) The employer shall have the right to deduct payment for any day upon which the employee cannot be employed usefully because of any strike, or through any breakdown of machinery, or any stoppage of work, or any cause for which the employer cannot reasonably be held responsible.

(iv) No deduction shall be made from the wages of any employee, other than a pieceworker, unavoidably absent through illness for not more than 44 working hours in each year, i.e., 11 hours for each three months' service, commencing 1st December, 1942, provided he has submitted, within 48 hours of the commencement of such absence, satisfactory evidence to the employer or his representative that same was not the result of his own misconduct.

Provided that where, under any scheme of insurance or an accident relief or provident fund to secure the benefit of which the employer has paid the necessary premium, or under any Workers' Compensation Act, compensation becomes payable for any of such days of absence, the employer shall not be bound to pay more of such wage than is sufficient, with such compensation, to make up the full pay for any such days.

(c) Notwithstanding the provisions of sub-clause (b) (iv) hereof if the full period of sick leave as prescribed is not taken in any year, such portion as is not taken shall be cumulative from year to year up to a period not exceeding 88 working hours, which shall be the maximum amount of leave to which an employee may be entitled in any year of service without deduction of pay.

For the purposes of this sub-clause service prior to 6th April, 1946, shall be disregarded.

TIME WAGES.

6. Any person employed in a factory or shop on time wages for less than the number of hours fixed for an ordinary week's work shall be paid, for time worked up to one-half the number of hours fixed, at the ordinary wages rate with an addition of thirty-three and a third per centum. For time worked beyond the 22 hours aforesaid, he shall be paid the ordinary wages rate up to, but not exceeding the rate prescribed by this Determination for an ordinary week's work.

CONTRACT WORK.

7. No person shall contract or enter into an agreement with any other person or persons to perform any work connected with the preparation of firewood for sale or for use in any trade or business at a lower rate or price than the appropriate wages rate or piecework price prescribed by this Determination.

SUNDAYS AND HOLIDAYS.

8. (a) Except as herein provided otherwise, if an employee is required to work on a holiday or on a Sunday, he shall be paid at double the ordinary prescribed rate.

(b) If a casual employee desires to work on a holiday and with the consent of the employer does so work, he shall be paid therefor at the ordinary prescribed rate.

(c) In the case of any other employee, other than a pieceworker, engaged by the week no deduction shall be made from his wages for the week because of his not working on a holiday.

(d) The expression "holiday" means any of the following days:—Australia Day, New Year's Day, Good Friday, Easter Saturday, Easter Monday, Anzac Day, King's Birthday, Labour Day, Christmas Day, and Boxing Day.

ANNUAL HOLIDAY.

9. The annual holiday shall be as prescribed by the provisions of the *Factories and Shops (Annual Holidays) Act 1946* (No. 5111), and any amendments which may be made thereto from time to time.

(In his or her own interests each employer of labour should obtain a copy of the above Act which may be purchased from the Government Printer, Melbourne, at a cost of 9d., plus postage.)

ALLOWANCES.

10. (a) An employee shall have the right to elect whether he shall travel each day to and from the job, or camp at such job. Having so elected, he shall be entitled to the special allowance where applicable, as provided in sub-clauses (b) and (c) hereof.

(b) Employees who, in order to be available for their work, have to live in a camp established either by the employer or employees for the purpose of enabling employees to be so available by living therein, shall be paid a camping allowance of 1s. for each day on which they are required to hold themselves, and do hold themselves available in the camp throughout the said day to serve the employer's purpose on that or any other day, whether or not work is done on the said day, but this clause shall not apply to any Sunday, unless the employee is required to work on that Sunday.

(c) An employee who finds it necessary to travel five miles or over to his place of employment shall, unless transport is provided by the employer free of cost to the employee, be paid a travelling allowance of 1s. per day.

TIME RECORD.

11. (a) The employer shall keep a record of the names of the employees of such employer, and in respect of each such employee, a record from week to week of the periods, times, and class of work done, and the rates of wage and amounts of wages paid, and shall obtain from week to week the signature of each employee to such record.

(b) The secretary or duly accredited representative of the Federated Fodder and Fuel Trades' Industrial Union authorized in writing to that effect by such secretary shall be allowed, on any day coming two days after a pay day between 10 a.m. and noon, or at such other times as may be agreed upon, to inspect such records so far as may be reasonably necessary to obtain information therefrom relating to any member or members of the said union.

WET WEATHER PROVISIONS.

12. (i) (a) In the event of rain being sufficiently heavy to justify a temporary cessation of work, such work shall cease forthwith and during the cessation of work employees shall hold themselves in readiness for work during ordinary working hours, and shall be paid for the actual time of waiting at ordinary time wages rates of pay.

(b) When weather conditions are suitable employees shall resume work immediately.

(ii) If the employer's representative considers the weather justifying the cessation of work is likely to continue for a lengthy period the payment, as set forth in sub-clause (i), may be discontinued, and employees shall not be bound to hold themselves in readiness for a resumption of work.

Provided that, for any day on which an employee is ready and willing to commence work, he shall be entitled to payment as though he had worked for a minimum of four hours.

(iii) The employer shall provide adequate and suitable shelter from the rain for the employee.

(iv) The employer shall provide adequate facilities for the employee to dry off his wet clothes.

SPECIAL TREATMENT OF INJURED.

13. The employer, as soon as reasonably possible, shall supply means free of charge to convey to the nearest hospital or doctor any employee so seriously injured that it is not reasonably possible for such employee to travel independently of such conveyance.

FIRST-AID AND MEDICAL OUTFIT.

14. The employer shall provide at every main place of employment a first-aid outfit. Such outfit shall consist of at least the following:—Boracic acid, iodine, picric acid (bottle solution), 1-in bandages, lint, cotton, triangle bandages, lysol, permanganate of potash, snake-bite scarifier, splints capable of being used in 12-in lengths, and one pair of scissors.

ACCOMPANYING SICK OR INJURED EMPLOYEES.

15. No employee suffering from illness or injury sustained on the job shall be permitted to leave the job unless accompanied or assisted by a sufficient number of employees, except in the case of his removal by ambulance, to his home or nearest hospital. All expenses incurred in such patient's removal shall be paid by the employer, and no employee assisting or accompanying an injured or sick person shall lose any wages by so doing.

PIECE-WORK.

16. A schedule of piece-work prices (as shown hereunder) to be paid to any person for doing certain kinds of work has been fixed by the Board, and in addition to these prices, when required to do so, pieceworkers shall be paid three pence per ton extra to stack tops, or four pence per ton extra to stack and burn tops.

Provided that where, under any scheme of insurance or an accident relief or provident fund to secure the benefit of which the employer has paid the necessary premium, or under any Workers' Compensation Act, compensation becomes payable for any of such days of absence, the employer shall not be bound to pay more of such wage than is sufficient, with such compensation, to make up the full pay for any such days.

(c) Notwithstanding the provisions of sub-clause (b) (iv) hereof if the full period of sick leave as prescribed is not taken in any year, such portion as is not taken shall be cumulative from year to year up to a period not exceeding 88 working hours which shall be the maximum amount of leave to which an employee may be entitled in any year of service without deduction of pay.

For the purposes of this sub-clause service prior to 6th April, 1946, shall be disregarded.

SUNDAYS AND HOLIDAYS.

21. (a) Except as herein provided otherwise, if an employee is required to work on a holiday or on a Sunday, he shall be paid at double the ordinary prescribed rate.

(b) If a casual employee desires to work on a holiday and with the consent of the employer does so work, he shall be paid therefor at the ordinary prescribed rate.

(c) In the case of any other employee engaged by the week no deduction shall be made from his wages for the week because of his not working on a holiday.

(d) The expression "holiday" means any of the following days:—Australia Day, New Year's Day, Good Friday, Easter Saturday, Easter Monday, Anzac Day, King's Birthday, Labour Day, Christmas Day and Boxing Day.

ANNUAL HOLIDAY.

22. The annual holiday shall be as prescribed by the provisions of the *Factories and Shops (Annual Holidays) Act 1946* (No. 5111), and any amendments which may be made thereto from time to time.

(In his or her own interests each employer of labour should obtain a copy of the above Act which may be purchased from the Government Printer, Melbourne, at a cost of 9d., plus postage.)

ALLOWANCES.

23. Employees who, in order to be available for their work, have to live in a camp established either by the employer or employees for the purpose of enabling employees to be so available by living therein, shall be paid a camping allowance of 1s. for each day on which they are required to hold themselves, and do hold themselves available in the camp throughout the said day to serve the employer's purpose on that or any other day, whether or not work is done on the said day, but this clause shall not apply to any Sunday, unless the employee is required to work on that Sunday.

WASHING FACILITIES.

24. Each employer shall provide for all the employees suitable washing troughs or other conveniences, which shall be approved by the Secretary for Labour or his Inspector.

TIME RECORD.

25. (a) The employer shall keep a record of the names of the employees of such employer, and in respect of each such employee, a record from week to week of the periods, times and class of work done, and the rates of wage and amounts of wages paid, and shall obtain from week to week the signature to such record.

(b) The secretary or duly accredited representative of the Federated Fodder and Fuel Trades' Industrial Union authorized in writing to that effect by such secretary shall be allowed, on any day coming two days after a pay day between 10 a.m. and noon, or at such other times as may be agreed upon, to inspect such records so far as may be reasonably necessary to obtain information therefrom relating to any member or members of the said union.

WET WEATHER PROVISIONS.

26. (i) (a) In the event of rain being sufficiently heavy to justify a temporary cessation of work, such work shall cease forthwith, and during the cessation of work employees shall hold themselves in readiness for work during ordinary working hours, and shall be paid for the actual time of waiting at ordinary time wages rates of pay.

(b) When weather conditions are suitable employees shall resume work immediately.

(ii) If the employer's representative considers the weather justifying the cessation of work is likely to continue for a lengthy period the payment, as set forth in sub-clause (i), may be discontinued, and employees shall not be bound to hold themselves in readiness for a resumption of work.

Provided that, for any day on which an employee is ready and willing to commence work, he shall be entitled to payment as though he had worked for a minimum of four hours.

(iii) The employer shall provide adequate and suitable shelter from the rain for the employee.

(iv) The employer shall provide adequate facilities for the employee to dry off his wet clothes.

SPECIAL TREATMENT OF INJURED.

27. The employer, as soon as reasonably possible, shall supply means free of charge to convey to the nearest hospital or doctor any employee so seriously injured that it is not reasonably possible for such employee to travel independently of such conveyance.

FIRST-AID AND MEDICAL OUTFIT.

28. The employer shall provide at every main place of employment a first-aid outfit. Such outfit shall consist of at least the following:—Boracic acid, iodine picric acid (bottle solution), 1-in. bandages, lint, cotton, triangle bandages, lysol, permanganate of potash, snake-bite scarifier, splints capable of being used in 12-in. lengths, and one pair of scissors.

SHELTER.

29. The employer shall provide adequate and suitable shelter, with seating accommodation for employees.

SANITATION.

30. In every camp where the pan system is not in use, the employer shall instal sanitary conveniences, and provide attention thereto. Where no camp is established, practicable and reasonable temporary provision shall be made by the employer.

ACCOMPANYING SICK OR INJURED EMPLOYEES.

31. No employee suffering from illness or injury sustained on the job shall be permitted to leave the job unless accompanied or assisted by a sufficient number of employees, except in the case of his removal by ambulance, to his home or nearest hospital. All expenses incurred in such patient's removal shall be paid by the employer, and no employee assisting or accompanying an injured or sick person shall lose any wages by so doing.

CHARCOAL BURNING.

32. (i) The lowest prices to be paid to any person employed burning charcoal from wood which has to be transported not more than half a mile to the retort or kiln in which it is to be burned shall be those prescribed in the following schedule, viz. :—

The above prices shall include all necessary cutting, cartage to the retort or kiln, filling and sewing of bags, and the adequate provision by the employee of food for any horse which is being used in connexion with the work.

(ii) If the wood to be burned is situated more than half a mile from the retort or kiln, 2s. 6d. extra per ton of charcoal shall be paid for each extra half mile or portion thereof.

(iii) The employer shall supply, free of charge, all tools, vehicles, and equipment necessary.

Part 3.—All persons to whom this Determination applies.

PERIODICAL ADJUSTMENT OF WAGES.

33. The wages rates set out in clauses 2 and 17 are based upon the following basic wage rates and, pursuant to the provisions of section 21 of the *Factories and Shops Act 1934*, the Board hereby determines that such rates and the weekly earnings of pieceworkers shall be automatically adjusted as prescribed by clause 34.

Provided that, where a pieceworker works less than 44 hours in any week, the sum to be added to or subtracted from his earnings shall be varied proportionately.

ADJUSTMENT OF BASIC WAGE.

34. (a) For the purposes of this Determination, the expression "Commonwealth Statistician's 'all items' retail price index numbers" or any like expression means the numbers stated to be such index numbers in any document purporting, and not proved to be wrongly so purporting, to be printed by the Commonwealth Government Printer or to be signed by or on behalf of the Commonwealth Statistician.

(b) Until the beginning of the first pay period to commence in August, 1947, the amounts of the Basic Wage shall be as prescribed in clause 33.

(c) During each future successive period beginning with the first pay period to commence in an August, a November, a February, or a May, the amount of the needs basic wage shall be adjusted by the following method, namely, by multiplying the last published Commonwealth Statistician's "all items" retail price index number by the factor .087 taken to one place of decimals, the resultant whole number being the amount of the basic wage expressed in shillings, but should the decimal number reach .5 or more the basic wage shall be taken to the next higher shilling.

Factories and Shops Acts.

DETERMINATION OF THE CARRIAGE BOARD.

NOTE.—This Determination applies to the whole of the State of Victoria.

IN accordance with the provisions of the Factories and Shops Acts the Wages Board which since the 17th October, 1932, has had power to determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any person or persons or classes of persons employed either inside or outside a factory or work-room in the process, trade or business connected with or incidental to the manufacturing, making or repairing of—(a) carriages, carts and other vehicles (other than perambulators) or any part or parts thereof, such as the ironwork or bodies, hoods, cushions, springs, axles, wheels, tires, rims, hubs, or spokes; (b) motor car bodies, or any part or parts thereof such as the hoods or cushions; (c) tram cars or any part or parts thereof, such as the ironwork or bodies, cushions, springs, axles, wheels, tires, rims, hubs, or spokes; (d) motor cycle side-car bodies, or any part or parts thereof, such as the hoods or cushions, (e) aircraft; has made the following Determination, viz. :—

1. That as from the beginning of the first pay period to commence on or after the 14th May, 1947, the last previous Determination of this Board shall be revoked and replaced by this Determination.

APPRENTICES.

(A form of Indenture prescribed by the Board was approved on 30th November, 1936.)

4. (i) Minors may be taken as indentured apprentices to one or more of the trades of—

- (a) Body-making, seat-making, wheel-making and wheelwrighting in wood and/or metal.
- (b) Smithing, including coachsmithing, spring-making and spring fitting, wheelwright smithing and general smithing.
- (c) Painting (coach).
- (d) Trimming.
- (e) Axle-making.
- (f) Wood-turning and woodwork machining.
- (g) Panel-working, including panel beating, sheet metal working and welding.
- (h) Saw doctoring.

(ii) "Minors other than indentured apprentices shall not be employed in the following occupations":—

- (a) Electrical fitting.
- (b) Electrical mechanic.
- (c) Electroplating (1st class).
- (d) Fitting and/or turning.
- (e) First class metal machinist.
- (f) Patternmaking.
- (g) Welder (1st class only).

(iii) The proportion of apprentices that may be taken by any employer shall be one to three or fraction of three tradesmen in each section of the industry. (See XV. below.)

The number of tradesmen shall be deemed to be the average number working during the immediately preceding six months, and in ascertaining such proportion an employer actually working in any workshop shall be deemed to be a tradesman.

(iv) The periods of apprenticeship shall be as follows:—

If the apprentice when articulated is under the age of 17, five years; if over the age of 17, four or five years at the option of the contracting parties.

(v) Minors may be taken on probation for three months, and if apprenticed such three months shall count as part of their period of apprenticeship.

(vi) Until further order any contract of apprenticeship hereafter made may contain the following provision:—

If through lack of orders or through financial difficulties the employer is unable at any time to find employment and training for an apprentice, and if a transfer to another employer cannot be arranged, the obligations and duties imposed by the indenture may with the concurrence of the apprentice and his guardian be suspended for a period agreed upon, or if no such agreement is arrived at may be cancelled by the employer. The onus of proof of circumstances justifying such cancellation shall be on the employer.

(a) Notwithstanding anything elsewhere in this Determination contained, where an apprentice is under the age of 21 years on the expiry of his apprenticeship, he shall be paid four-fifths of the tradesman's time wage until reaching the age of 21 years.

(b) All wages shall be paid without deduction for specified holidays or for unavoidable absences through sickness certified as in clause 17 (c) to the number of four days per annum.

(viii) The ordinary hours of employment of apprentices shall be the same in each workshop as those of journeymen.

(ix) Where practicable, no apprentice under the age of 18 years shall be required to work overtime.

(x) No apprentice shall work under any system of payment by results.

(xi) Any apprentice who cannot complete his full term of apprenticeship before reaching his twenty-second birthday may, by agreement with his employer, serve as an apprentice until he reaches the age of 23 years.

(xii) The apprentice at the end of the calendar period of any year in which he has actually given service to the employer upon less than the ordinary working days prescribed in this Determination, or in which he has unlawfully absented himself without the employer's consent shall, for every day short of the said number of working days, and for every day of such absence, serve one day, and the calendar period of the succeeding year of his service shall not be deemed to begin until the said additional day or days shall have been served.

(xiii) No employer shall, either directly or indirectly, or by any pretence or advice, receive from any person or require or permit any person to pay or give any consideration in the nature of a premium or bonus for the taking or binding of any probationer or apprentice.

(xiv) Apprentices attending technical colleges or schools and presenting reports of satisfactory conduct shall be reimbursed all fees paid by them.

(xv) A person who is for a term not exceeding two years taking practical training in a workshop in continuance of a course of training for professional work shall not be taken into account in calculating the proportion of apprentices to journeymen.

MALE JUNIOR WORKERS.

5. (a) For the duration of the present war, the system of calculating the wages of male junior workers on the basis of age plus experience shall be suspended. At the conclusion of the war, that system shall be reverted to, but without prejudice to the right of the Unions, or any of them, to seek alterations thereto.

(b) Unapprenticed male junior workers may be employed in any occupation covered by this Determination.

(c) Subject to the exceptions hereinafter provided, the minimum rates of wage for unapprenticed male juniors shall be the following—

Provided that the rate payable to any employee shall not be less than 20s.

(d) An unapprenticed male junior, who at the date upon which this clause comes into effect is entitled to a rate higher than that hereby prescribed for an employee of his age, shall be paid not less than the rate to which he is so entitled until the rate prescribed by this clause exceeds his existing rate.

(e) Unapprenticed male juniors under 18 years of age assisting at furnaces shall be paid 3s. per week in addition to the above rates.

(f) Changed rates shall be payable as from the beginning of the first pay period to commence after the birthday of the employee concerned.

(g) Employees shall furnish proof of age by means of birth certificate or sworn declaration by parent or guardian, upon which the employer shall be entitled to rely.

(h) The proportion of male juniors that may be employed by any employer shall be one junior (whether he be an indentured apprentice, a trainee apprentice, or an unapprenticed male junior) to every three male adults employed in the shop or factory.

SPECIAL RATES.

6. In addition to the wages prescribed in clauses 2, 3, 4, and 5 of this Determination hereof the following special rates and allowances shall be paid to employees, including apprentices and unapprenticed juniors :—

Confined Spaces.

(a) Employees other than those working on vehicles or parts of vehicles working in a confined space, i.e., a compartment or space access to which is through a manhole or similar opening on a place the dimensions of which necessitate an employee working in a stooped or otherwise cramped position or without proper ventilation 3d. per hour extra.

Dirty Work.

(b) Work which the employer's industrial officer, if there be one, or otherwise the employer or the executive officer responsible for the management and/or superintendence of the plant concerned shall agree is of an unusually dirty or offensive nature shall carry such extra rate as shall be agreed upon.

In any case where an organization alleges that an employer or his representative is persistently unreasonable or capricious in relation to such claims, it shall have the right to bring such case before the Secretary for Labour.

Special Rates not Cumulative.

(c) Where more than one of the disabilities referred to in sub-clause (a) and (b) hereof entitling a workman to extra rates exist on the same job the employer shall be bound to pay only one rate, namely the highest for the disabilities so prevailing.

Rates not Subject to Penalty Additions.

(d) The special rates herein prescribed shall be paid irrespective of the times at which the work is performed and shall not be subject to any premium or penalty additions.

First Aid Work.

(e) An employee holding a first aid certificate and who is instructed by his employer to perform first aid work (other than Air Raid Precaution emergency work) in the factory during his or her shift shall be paid 1s. per shift extra.

HOURS OF EMPLOYMENT.

7. (a) With the exceptions herein set out, the ordinary hours of employment shall be 44 per week, to be worked in five days of eight hours each and one day (Saturday) of four hours, or five days of 8 hours 48 minutes each, continuously except for meal hour breaks at the discretion of the employer between 7 a.m. and 5.30 p.m. on Monday to Friday inclusive and 7 a.m. to noon on Saturday; provided that the spread of hours herein prescribed may be altered by mutual agreement between any employer and his employees.

(b) By agreement between any employer and his employees ordinary hours may be worked on the basis of 88 per fortnight with one week of 40 and one of 48 hours.

(c) It shall be optional for the employer to work either the 5 or the 5½ days' week provided that the option once exercised shall only be altered by a week's notice.

(d) For the purpose of performing work which is preparatory to the daily operations of a plant, employees engaged on such preparatory work may be required to commence their ordinary hours of employment at or after 5.30 a.m. on any day other than Sunday.

SHIFT WORK.

A.—Continuous Work Shifts.

8. (a) For the purposes of this clause the expression "continuous work" means work carried on with consecutive shifts of men throughout the 24 hours of each of at least six consecutive days without interruption except during breakdowns or meal breaks (if any).

(b) Employees working on continuous work shifts shall work thereon such number of shifts up to six per week as may be required; no such shift to exceed eight hours inclusive of meal breaks (if any) nor to be discontinuous except for meal breaks (if any).

(bb) The ordinary hours of actual work or duty exclusive of meal breaks off duty (if any of employees working on continuous work shifts) shall not exceed—

- (i) eight in any one day; nor
- (ii) 48 in any one week; nor
- (iii) an average of 44 per week during the period of employment upon such shifts; nor
- (iv) such average reduced to 43 hours 5 minutes if such shifts include Sunday shifts; nor
- (v) a total of 176 hours during any four weeks of the period of employment upon such shifts; nor
- (vi) such total reduced to 172 hours 20 minutes during any such four weeks if such shifts include Sunday shifts.

Provided that such average and total shall not be so reduced to 43 hours 5 minutes and 172 hours 20 minutes if the employees on such shifts are for each ordinary hour worked thereon by them paid in the case of weekly employees at the rate of one-fourth ($\frac{1}{4}$) of the prescribed weekly wage and in the case of hourly employees at the rate of forty-four-hundredths ($\frac{11}{25}$) of the prescribed rate for such employees which payments the employer shall have the option of making: nor shall they be so reduced if, in addition to other holidays (if any) to be given under this Determination to such employees, such employees are given in each year one week's holiday on full pay, which week's holiday the employer shall have the option of giving.

(c) For all time of duty outside the limits of the ordinary hours prescribed in sub-clause (bb) hereof an employee on continuous work shift shall be paid at double rates. But this shall not apply to arrangements between employees themselves or in cases due to rotation of shift or when the relief does not come on duty at the proper time: Provided that where not less than eight hours' notice has been given to the employer by the employee that he will be absent from work and the employee whom he should relieve is not relieved, such unrelieved employee shall be paid time and a half for all time of duty after he has finished his ordinary shift.

(d) Employees on continuous work shifts working afternoon and night shifts shall be paid $7\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. more than ordinary rates for such shifts.

(e) Employees on continuous work shifts working any Sunday or holiday shift shall be paid at the rate of time and a half for such shift.

B. In Other than Continuous Work.

(f) In shift work not upon continuous work as herein defined any afternoon or night shift which does not continue for five successive working nights or more in a five-day workshop or six successive working nights or more in a six-day workshop shall be paid for at the rate of time and a half.

(g) For working on any afternoon or night shift which has been in operation for five afternoons or nights or more an employee shall be entitled to the following additional rates:—

- (i) 25 per cent. for working on night shift only;
- (ii) 10 per cent. for working on alternating night and afternoon shifts;
- (iii) 10 per cent. for the night shift for working on alternating day and night shifts;
- (iv) 10 per cent. for working on afternoon shift only; and
- (v) $7\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. for the afternoon shift for working on alternating day and afternoon shifts.

(h) The extra rates specified in paragraphs (ii), (iii), and (iv) of sub-clause (g) hereof shall be payable only where shifts are changed at least once in every three weeks.

(i) "Afternoon shift" shall mean a shift commencing not later than 6 p.m. on any day.

"Night shift" shall mean a shift commencing at any time after 6 p.m. on any day.

(j) Shift workers shall be paid overtime at the rate of time and a half for the first four hours and double time thereafter for all time worked in excess of shift hours.

(k) (i) Except as hereinafter provided, female employees shall not be required or permitted to work on afternoon or night shift.

(ii) By agreement between the employer and the Union or Unions concerned, female employees may be worked on afternoon and/or night shifts on munitions work.

(iii) Failing agreement as aforesaid, the Secretary for Labour shall have the power to allow the employment of females on afternoon and/or night shifts on munitions work, upon such terms and conditions as he may specify.

(l) A male employee under the age of 16 years shall not be required or permitted to work on afternoon or night shift.

MIXED FUNCTIONS.

9. An employee engaged for more than half of one day or shift on duties carrying a higher rate than his ordinary classification shall be paid the higher rate for such day or shift. If for less than half of one day or shift he shall be paid the higher rate for the time so worked.

OVERTIME.

10. (a) For all work done outside ordinary hours the rates of pay shall be time and a half for the first four hours and double time thereafter, such double time to continue until the completion of the overtime work. Provided that in the case of an apprentice or a junior the rate for overtime shall be not less than the rate herein prescribed or 1s. 6d. per hour whichever is the higher.

(b) An employee, other than a casual employee, after the completion of overtime work performed after his usual ceasing time shall be entitled to be absent until he has had eight consecutive hours off duty, without deduction of pay for ordinary time of duty occurring during such absence.

If on the instructions of his employer any employee resumes work without having had such eight hours off duty he shall be paid at double rates until he is relieved from duty to take such rest period and he shall then be entitled to be absent until he has had eight consecutive hours off duty without deduction of pay for ordinary time of duty occurring during such absence.

(c) Except as otherwise provided in sub-clauses (a) and (b) hereof, in computing overtime each day's work shall stand alone.

(d) An employee recalled to work overtime after leaving his employer's business premises shall be paid for a minimum of three hours' work at the appropriate rate for each time he is so recalled; Provided that, except in the case of unforeseen circumstances arising, the employee shall not be required to work the full three hours if the job he was recalled to perform is completed within a shorter period.

(e) Subject to any custom now prevailing under which an employee is required regularly to hold himself in readiness for a call back, an employee required to hold himself in readiness to work after ordinary hours shall until released be paid standing-by time at ordinary rates from the time from which he is so to hold himself in readiness.

(f) For work done during meal hours and thereafter until a meal-hour break is allowed time and a half rates shall be paid. An employee shall not be compelled to work for more than six hours without a break for a meal.

(g) An employee working overtime shall be allowed a crib time of twenty minutes without deduction of pay after each four hours of overtime work, if the employee continues work after such crib time.

(h) Before starting overtime after working ordinary hours a meal break of at least fifteen minutes shall be allowed, unless the period of overtime is less than one and a half hours. An employer and employee may agree to any variation of this provision to meet the circumstances of the work in hand.

(i) An employee required to work overtime for more than two hours without being notified the day before that he will be so required to work, shall either be supplied with a meal by the employer or paid 2s. and 1s. 3d. for each subsequent meal, but such payment need not be paid to employees living in the same locality as their workshop who can reasonably return home for meals.

If an employee pursuant to notice has provided a meal or meals and is not required to work overtime he shall be paid as above prescribed for meals so provided.

(j) Subject to the provisions of the second part of sub-clause (f) hereof an employee employed as a regular maintenance man shall work during meal breaks at the ordinary rates herein prescribed whenever instructed to do so for the purpose of making good breakdowns of plant or upon routine maintenance of plant which can only be done while such plant is idle.

(k) When an employee working overtime or a shift for which he has not been regularly rostered finishes work at a time when reasonable means of transport is not available, the employer shall provide him with a conveyance or pay him his current wage for the time occupied in reaching his home.

(l) Where overtime is worked on account of a breakdown of plant and/or machinery or where the employee concerned is engaged in connexion with carting and driving, all overtime shall be paid for at the rate of time and a half.

SUNDAY AND HOLIDAY RATES.

11. (a) Where an employee works on a Sunday, the work done shall be paid for at the rate of double ordinary time.
- (b) Where an employee works on union picnic day, the work done shall be paid for at the rate of double ordinary time.
- (c) Where an employee works on any of the holidays (including overtime) specified in clause 12 (b) of this Determination, the work done shall be paid for at the rate of double ordinary time, in addition to the allowance to which the employee on hourly hiring is entitled under clause 17 (d) of this Determination.

HOLIDAYS.

12. (a) The day on which the Vehicle Builders' Federation trade union picnic is held shall be a local holiday (without pay if such day is a day other than one mentioned in sub-clause (b) of this clause) in any city or town.

(b) Employees shall be entitled to the following public holidays (without pay except as herein provided):—The days observed as New Year's Day, Australia Day, Good Friday, Easter Saturday, Easter Monday, King's Birthday, Labour Day, Anzac Day, Christmas Day, and Boxing Day, or such other day as is generally observed in the locality as a substitute for any of the said days respectively.

(c) If the contract of employment is for hourly hiring, an allowance calculated as set out hereunder shall be paid to employees in addition to the rates set out in clause (2), (3), and (5) of this Determination in respect of the time lost by employees on the ten holidays mentioned in sub-clause (b) of this clause and on account of unavoidable absences from work through sickness (to the number of four days' sickness in each year). Such allowance shall be calculated in the following manner:—The total weekly wage rate shall be divided by forty-four (44) and the resultant multiplied by 14 times 8 (14 × 8) and divided by fifty-two (52), the answer to be calculated to the nearest penny.

ANNUAL LEAVE.

Period of Leave.

13. (a) Except as hereinafter provided a period of fourteen consecutive days' leave shall be allowed annually to an employee after twelve months' continuous service (less the period of annual leave) as an employee in any one or more of the occupations to which this Determination applies.

Seven-day Shift Workers.

(b) In addition to the leave hereinbefore prescribed seven-day shift workers, that is shift workers who are rostered to work regularly on Sundays and holidays shall be allowed seven consecutive days' leave including non-working days.

Where an employee with twelve months' continuous service is engaged for part of the twelve-monthly period as a seven-day shift worker, he shall be entitled to have the period of fourteen consecutive days' annual leave prescribed in sub-clause (a) hereof increased by half a day for each month he is continuously engaged as aforesaid.

Annual Leave Exclusive of Public Holidays.

(c) Subject to this sub-clause the annual leave prescribed by this clause shall be exclusive of any of the holidays prescribed by clause 12 of this Determination, and if any such holiday falls within an employee's period of annual leave and is observed on a day which in the case of that employee would have been an ordinary working day, there shall be added to that period one day for each such holiday falling as aforesaid. In the case of employees on hourly hiring such extra day shall be without pay.

Where a holiday falls as aforesaid and the employee fails without reasonable cause proof whereof shall be upon him to attend for work at his ordinary starting time on the working day immediately following the last day of the period of his annual leave he shall not be entitled to be paid for any such holiday.

Broken Leave.

(d) The annual leave shall be given and taken in a continuous period or, if the employer and the employee so agree, in two separate periods and not otherwise.

Calculation of Continuous Service.

(e) For the purposes of this clause service shall be deemed to be continuous notwithstanding—

- (i) any interruption or termination of the employment by the employer if such interruption or termination has been made merely with the intention of avoiding obligations hereunder in respect of leave of absence;
- (ii) any absence from work on account of personal sickness or accident or on account of leave lawfully granted by the employer; or
- (iii) any absence with reasonable cause proof whereof shall be upon the employee.

In cases of personal sickness or accident or absence with reasonable cause the employee to become entitled to the benefit of this sub-clause shall inform the employer in writing if practicable within 24 hours of the commencement of such absence of his inability to attend for duty and as far as practicable the nature of the illness injury or cause and the estimated duration of his absence.

Any absence from work by reason of any cause not being a cause specified in this sub-clause shall not be deemed to break the continuity of service for the purpose of this clause unless the employer during the absence or within fourteen days of the termination of the absence notifies the employee in writing that such absence will be regarded as having broken the continuity of service.

In cases of individual absenteeism such notice shall be given in writing to the employee concerned, but in cases of concerted or collective absenteeism notice may be given to employees by the posting up of a notification in the plant, in the manner in which general notifications to employees are usually made in that plant and by posting a copy to each union whose members have participated in such concerted or collective absenteeism not later than the day it is posted up in the plant.

A notice to an individual employee may be given by delivering same to him personally or by posting it to his last recorded address, in which case it shall be deemed to have reached him in due course of post.

In calculating the period of twelve months' continuous service any such absence as aforesaid shall not, except to the extent of not more than fourteen days in a twelve-monthly period in the case of sickness or accident, be taken into account in calculating the period of twelve months' continuous service.

Calculation of Service.

(f) Service before the date of operation of this Determination shall be taken into consideration for the purpose of calculating annual leave, but an employee shall not be entitled to leave or payment in lieu thereof for any period in respect of which leave or a payment in lieu thereof has been allowed or made under the clause hereby revoked. Provided however, that in respect of service before the 1st January, 1946, the annual leave shall be allowed at the rate of 3½ hours for each completed one month of continuous service and in respect of service after that date at the rate of 7½ hours for each completed one month of continuous service. Any broken part of a month served before the 1st January, 1946, shall for the purposes of this clause be deemed to be service after the 1st January, 1946. The period of annual leave to be allowed under this sub-clause shall be calculated to the nearest day any broken part of a day in the result not exceeding half a day to be disregarded.

Where the employer is a successor or assignee or transferee of a business if an employee was in the employment of the employer's predecessor at the time when he became such successor or assignee or transferee the employee in respect of the period during which he was in the service of the predecessor shall for the purpose of this clause be deemed to be in the service of the employer.

Calculation of Month.

(g) For the purpose of this clause a month shall be reckoned as commencing with the beginning of the first day of the employment or period of employment in question and as ending at the beginning of the day which in the latest month in question has the same date number as that which the commencing day had in its month and if there be no such day in such subsequent month shall be reckoned as ending at the end of such subsequent month.

Leave to be Taken.

(h) The annual leave provided for by this clause shall be allowed and shall be taken, and except as provided by sub-clause (i) hereof payment shall not be made or accepted in lieu of annual leave.

Time of Taking Leave.

(i) Annual leave shall be given at a time fixed by the employer within a period not exceeding six months from the date when the right to annual leave accrued and after not less than two weeks' notice to the employee.

Leave Allowed Before Due Date.

(j) An employer may allow annual leave to an employee before the right thereto has accrued due, but where leave is taken in such a case a further period of annual leave shall not commence to accrue until after the expiration of the twelve months in respect of which annual leave had been taken before it accrued.

Where leave has been granted to an employee pursuant to this sub-clause before the right thereto has accrued due and the employee subsequently leaves or is discharged from the service of the employer before completing the twelve months' continuous service in respect of which the leave was granted the employer may for each one complete month of the qualifying period of twelve months not served by the employee deduct from whatever remuneration is payable upon the termination of the employment one-twelfth of the amount of wage paid on account of the annual leave, which amount shall not include any sums paid for any of the holidays prescribed by clause 12 of this Determination.

Payment for Period of Leave.

(k) Each employee before going on leave shall be paid two weeks' wages, except a seven-days shift worker who shall be paid the amount of wage he would have received in respect of the ordinary time which he would have worked had he not been on leave during the relevant period. For the purposes of this sub-clause and sub-clause (l) hereof, wages shall be at the rate prescribed by clauses 2, 3, 4, and 5 of this Determination for the occupation in which the employee was ordinarily employed immediately prior to the commencement of his leave or the termination of his employment, as the case may be. Payment in the case of employees employed on piece or bonus work or any other system of payment by results shall be at time rates.

Proportionate Leave on Dismissal.

(l) If after one month's continuous service in any qualifying twelve-monthly period an employee lawfully leaves his employment or his employment is terminated by the employer through no fault of the employee the employee shall be paid at his ordinary rate of wage for $3\frac{1}{2}$ hours in respect of each completed one month of continuous service before the 1st January, 1946, and for $7\frac{1}{2}$ hours at the same rate in respect of each completed month of continuous service after that date, the service in each case being service in respect of which leave has not been granted hereunder.

Annual Close Down.

(m) Where an employer closes down his plant, or a section or sections thereof, for the purposes of allowing annual leave to all or the bulk of the employees in the plant, or section or sections concerned, the following provisions shall apply—

- (i) He may by giving to the employees concerned not less than one month's notice of his intention so to do stand off for the duration of the close down all employees in the plant or section or sections concerned, and allow to those who are not then qualified for two full weeks' leave paid leave on a proportionate basis of one-sixth of a week's leave for each completed month of continuous service.
- (ii) An employee who has then qualified for two full weeks' leave, and has also completed a further month or more of continuous service shall be allowed his leave, and shall also be paid one-sixth of a week's wages in respect of each completed month of continuous service performed since the close of his last twelve-monthly qualifying period.
- (iii) The next twelve-monthly qualifying period for each employee affected by such close down shall commence from the day on which the plant, or section or sections concerned is re-opened for work.
- (iv) If in the first year of his service with an employer an employee is allowed proportionate annual leave under paragraph (i) hereof, and subsequently within such year lawfully leaves his employment or his employment is terminated by the employer through no fault of the employee, he shall be entitled to the benefit of sub-clause (l) hereof, subject to adjustment for any proportionate leave which he may have been allowed as aforesaid.

PIECEWORK RATES.

14. Subject to the minimum wages herein prescribed an employer may remunerate any of his employees under system of payment by results based on rates which will enable workers of average capacity to earn at least 10 per cent. in excess of their hourly or weekly rate.

PAY-DAY.

15. Employers shall pay all moneys due at least once in each week, and not later than Friday in each week, except where it has been the practice to pay fortnightly. All wages shall be paid in employer's time.

PAYMENT FOR PART WORK.

16. An employee, working any portion of a week, shall be paid, on ceasing work, for all time worked during that week.

CONTRACT OF EMPLOYMENT.

17. (a) With the exceptions hereinafter stated employment may be by the week or by the hour. Unless otherwise specifically agreed, the employment shall be deemed an hourly engagement. If by the week it shall be terminable on either side by one week's notice given on any day or (if the employer terminate it without such notice) by payment of one week's wages.

This last provision shall not affect the right of the employer to deduct payment for any day the employee cannot be usefully employed because of any strike, or through any breakdown in machinery, or any stoppage of work by any cause for which the employer cannot reasonably be held responsible.

(b) A contract for weekly employment may be terminated by any employer, without liability to pay for more than time actually worked, for misconduct, or for absence from work without reasonable excuse.

(c) If an employee engaged by the week absents himself from duty, except on the holidays mentioned in clause 12 (b) of this Determination or for days for which he produces a certificate from a medical practitioner or other proof satisfactory to his employer of sickness (aggregating four days' sickness in each year) a sum proportionate to his time of absence may be deducted from his pay, i.e., two-elevenths of the weekly wage for each day of absence, excluding Saturdays in shops working six days and one-fifth in shops working five days per week: Provided that only time actually lost shall be deducted when an employee is absent on a Saturday.

(d) (i) If the contract of employment is for hourly hiring, a weekly allowance calculated as set out in clause 12 (c) of this Determination shall be paid in addition to the total amount of the rates prescribed by clause 2 of this Determination, but such allowance shall not be taken into account in computing any wage rate such as overtime, shift premium, Sunday or holiday rates.

(ii) Such allowance shall be paid irrespective of the time worked by an employee in any one week, except as provided in sub-clause (e) of this clause.

(iii) An allowance calculated as set out in clause 12 (c) of this Determination shall also be paid in addition to the rates prescribed by clauses 3 and 5 of this Determination for female workers and male junior workers.

(e) An employee engaged on hourly hiring shall be entitled to a minimum of four consecutive hours' work or to four hours' pay for the job—such hours may be deemed to be consecutive if worked in ordinary hours at the end of the day and the beginning of the next succeeding day. But such employee shall not be entitled to the allowance mentioned in sub-clause (d) of this clause unless the period of employment exceeds four hours.

(f) Notwithstanding anything contained in sub-clauses (c), (d), and (e) hereof an employee suffering injury through an accident arising out of and in the course of his employment (not being an injury in respect of which he is entitled to workers' compensation) necessitating his attendance during working hours on a doctor, chemist or trained nurse, or at a hospital, shall not suffer any deduction from his pay for the time (not exceeding four hours) so occupied on the day of the accident, and shall be reimbursed by the employer all expenses reasonably incurred in connexion with such attendance, but in no case shall such expenses exceed 10s. 6d.

TIME AND WAGES BOOK.

18. (a) Each employer shall keep a time and wages book showing the name of each employee and his occupation, the hours worked each day, and the wages and allowances paid each week.

(b) The time occupied by an employee in filling in any time books or cards or in the making of records shall be treated as time of duty, but this does not apply to checking in or out at the beginning or end of duty.

LEADING HANDS.

19. Leading hands in charge of 5, but not exceeding 15 employees, shall be paid at the rate of 1s. per day extra. From 16 to 25 employees, 1s. 6d. per day extra; from 26 to 35 employees, 2s. per day extra; and over 36 employees, 2s. 6d. per day extra.

AIRCRAFT MAKING.

20. Employees engaged in aircraft making (in wood, metal, or other materials) in occupations which are similar to those for which classifications are provided in this Determination, shall be paid the rates prescribed for such classifications.

TRAVELLING TIME.

21. In the event of an employee being sent during working hours to any place other than his usual place of employment, he shall be allowed travelling time and excess expenses. Such time to be part of the ordinary day's work.

GRINDING TOOLS.

22. (a) Where a woodworker using his own tools has been in employment for more than one week, the employer shall allow him one hour, with payment therefor on termination of his employment, to enable him to pack and sharpen his tools.

(b) The employee shall be permitted to use the employer's emery wheel or grindstone to sharpen his own tools used in the course of his employment.

WATERPROOF CLOTHING.

23. Men engaged in transferring trams to or from the factory to the various depots shall be provided with suitable clothing for wet weather.

SPRAY PAINTERS.

24. Where spray painters are employed, adequate protection for their health shall be provided for them by the employer.

TOOLS TO BE PROVIDED BY EMPLOYER.

25. Woodworkers and wycemen shall be supplied where required with bench, bench-vyce, cramps above 4 inches, files (including saw files), rasps, hand-drills, hacksaws, frames and blades, bits and parallel shank-drills up to $\frac{1}{4}$ inch, and snips, such tools to remain the property of the employer.

MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS.

26. (a) Employees engaged in working with acids shall be supplied with rubber gloves.

(b) Employees engaged in wet rubbing shall be provided with rubber aprons and rubber boots.

(c) Suitable coloured glasses shall be provided by employers for the protection of electric arc and oxy-acetylene operators and their assistants, and suitable mica or other goggles for emery wheel operators.

(d) Suitable canvas or leather gloves shall be provided by employers for the operators of pneumatic hammers.

(e) Tramway pitmen shall be provided free with one suit of overalls as required.

RIGHT OF ENTRY OF UNION OFFICIALS.

27. (1) A duly accredited representative of the Australian Vehicle Builders Employees Federation and of the Amalgamated Engineering Union shall have the right to enter employers' workshops during the mid-day meal hour for the purpose of interviewing employees on legitimate union business, on the following conditions:—

(a) That he produces his authority to the gatekeeper or such other person as may be appointed by the employer.

(b) That he interviews employees only at the places where they are taking their meal.

(c) That not more than one representative be in any workshop at any one time.

(d) That no one representative visit a workshop more than once in each week.

(e) That if any employer alleges that a representative is unduly interfering with his workshop or is creating dissatisfaction amongst his employees, or is offensive in his methods or is committing a breach of any of the previous conditions, such employer may refuse the right of entry.

(ii) For the purpose of investigating complaints concerning the application of this Determination a duly accredited union representative shall be afforded reasonable facilities for entering an employer's workshop or plant during working hours, subject to the following conditions:—

(a) That he discloses to the employer or his representative the complaints which he desires to investigate.

(b) That he makes his investigations in the presence of the employer or his representative (if the employer so desires).

(c) That he does not interfere with work proceeding in the workshop or plant.

(d) That he conducts himself properly.

(iii) Where employees are working under a system of shiftwork which precludes a representative from interviewing them during the mid-day meal hour the representative shall have the right to enter the employer's premises for the purpose of interviewing such employees at such time and under such conditions as to notice as may be mutually arranged by the representative and the employer.

SHOP STEWARDS.

28. An employee appointed as shop steward in the shop or department in which he is employed shall upon notification thereof to his employer be recognized as the accredited representative of the Union to which he belongs and he shall be allowed the necessary time during working hours to interview his employer or his representatives on matters affecting employees whom he represents.

LIMITATION OF EMPLOYER'S LIABILITY.

29. When an employer has made a payment to an employee, which payment purports to be a payment of the wages payable to the employee for any period, such employer shall not be liable to pay to the employee any further sums in respect of any services rendered to such employer during such period, unless within a period of nine calendar months after the last day of such period a demand in writing of such further sum claimed has been given to the employer by the employee himself, or by some person on his behalf.

DEFINITIONS.

30. (a) "Tradesman" means an adult workman who, in the course of his employment, works from drawings or prints required to be scaled, and/or measured from drawings or prints, or makes precision measurements, or applies general trade experience, and includes locksmith and first-class machinist.

(b) "Precision measurements" means measurements of a finer accuracy than is possible with the naked eye from caliper measuring scale or rule.

(c) "Patternmaker" means a tradesman engaged in the making of both patterns and templates in wood. "Template maker" means a tradesman engaged in the making of templates only.

(d) "Jig-maker" means a tradesman engaged in the making of jigs in wood or metal.

(e) "Toolmaker" means a tradesman making and/or repairing any precision tool, gauge, die or mould to be affixed to any machine, who designs or lays out his work and is responsible for its proper completion.

(f) "Machinist (metal)—1st class" means a tradesman who is partly or wholly engaged in setting up and operating the following machines:—Lathe, boring machine, milling machine, planing machine, shaping machine, slotting machine, precision grinding machine and a drilling machine where the operator uses the same precision tools as fitters or turners.

(g) "Machinist (metal)—2nd class" means an adult employee not engaged as a tradesman who is not required to work from drawings or prints or to do precision work, but who is engaged in operating or in setting up and operating all machines, other than a drilling machine, enumerated in the definition of 1st class machinist.

- (h) "Machinist (metal)—3rd class" means an adult employee other than a process worker who operates any power-driven machine for which a rate is not elsewhere proscribed in this Determination and without limiting the scope of the foregoing includes such an employee operating any of the following:—nut, bolt, rivet or dog spike making machines, tapping machines and drilling machines on work other than that specified in the definition of machinist—1st class.
- (i) "First-class wood machinist" (in wood) means a machinist who in the course of his employment is called upon to grind and set knives only or to braze, set, and sharpen band or jig saws and to set and sharpen circular saws or to set up machines operated by other machinists or to grind knives for and to set up and operate one or more of the following machines:—Shapers, spindles, linderman machines, routers, tenoners, still hinge and other gainer machines and band saws.
- (j) "Second-class wood machinist" (in wood) means any machinist called on to set up and operate any other machines, or any circular saw or dimension saw.
- (k) "Process worker" means an employee engaged on—
- (i) Repetition work on any automatic, semi-automatic or single-purpose machine or any machine fitted with jigs, gauges or other tools rendering operations mechanical (and in connexion with which the worker is not responsible for the setting up of the machine nor for the dimensions of the products other than by checking with gauges which gauges shall be either unadjustable or, if adjustable, shall not be set by the operator); or
 - (ii) In assembling processes not requiring the use of hand tools (except hammers and/or screwdrivers and/or spanners).
- (l) "Electrical fitter" means a tradesman fitter mainly engaged in making, fitting or repairing electrical machines, instruments or appliances, who in the course of his work applies electrical knowledge.
- (m) "Electrical mechanic" means an adult employee mainly engaged outside a workshop on any class of installation work, or in the repairing thereof, or in wiring, and who, when employed inside a workshop, is engaged on repairs to installation.
- (n) "Jobbing moulder" means a metal moulder engaged in floor moulding, loam moulding, strickle moulding, or moulding from loose patterns, and/or finishing off bath moulds by a machine process.
- (o) "Jobbing coremaker" means a moulder engaged in making cores for metal moulds by the use of loam or strickle boards, or by loose boxes, other than loose boxes used for repetition production of cores requiring little or no skill to produce.
- (p) "Plate and machine moulder" means an adult employee engaged in moulding on the plate system, or by machines where the pattern is either a fixture to the plate or the spray system is used.
- (q) "Machine coremaker" means an adult employee making cores by machines where the core box is a fixture to or part of such machine, or making repetition cores requiring little or no skill to produce.
- (r) "First-class body maker" means a tradesman engaged on the building of bodies without the aid of jigs.
- (s) "Second-class body maker" means an employee engaged on the building of bodies with the aid of jigs.
- (t) "First-class panel beater" means an employee who makes panels or mudguards from the sheet by hand or partly by hand and partly with the aid of machines.
- (u) "Second-class panel beater" means an employee who is engaged in dent knocking (by hand) or who makes panels from the sheet entirely with the aid of machines or who is engaged solely on a panel beating machine.
- (v) "Other panel machinists" means employees engaged solely on wheeling and stretching or other machines in the panel section not otherwise provided for.
- (w) "Metal panel worker" means an employee engaged in the preparation of material for the making of panels other than machinists and others for whom specific rates are provided.
- (x) "Sectional trimmer" means any workman (unless specific margins have been herein prescribed) who was so classed on the 1st day of October, 1935, and all future workmen doing the same classes of work.
- (y) "Smith" includes coach smith, wheelwright smith, angle iron smith, and motor smith.
- (z) "Saw doctor" means an employee exclusively engaged in brazing, hammering, straightening and sharpening saws.
- (aa) "On the line" means sectionalized body building and assembling in which bodies in course of building are moved on from one operative or group of operatives to another operative or group of operatives.
- (bb) "Painter's labourer" means an employee assisting in painting, graining, lining and decorating who does not use brush or sprayer.
- (cc) "Timber stacker" means an employee who stacks timber for seasoning by the process of stripping.
- (dd) "Diemaker" means a tradesman making any die to be affixed to any machine who designs or lays out his work.
- (ee) "Garnish mould finisher" means an employee engaged on any of the following classes of work, viz.:—Clamping metal garnish moulds to jigs and scribing and cutting same; re-working and filing metal garnish moulds, after welding; re-working and filing metal windscreen garnish moulds; working and filing recesses in rear quarter garnish moulds, after welding; finally working and checking metal garnish moulds, after welding; and/or fabricating metal windscreen garnish moulds and re-working and filing same.
- (ff) "Spring service worker" means an employee who is employed on the removal and/or replacement of springs, luggage carriers and/or bumper bars, and/or the dismantling and/or re-assembling of finished parts of motor car and truck chassis (not being a chassis assembler and/or wirer).
- (gg) "Aero engine assembler" means an adult employee who assembles components into sub-assemblies, and makes any necessary adjustments to assembly.
- (hh) "Body maker," second class, means an employee engaged on the building of bodies with the aid of jigs.
- (ii) "Drier" means an adult employee using air hose to dry off after acid wash.
- (jj) "Material chaser" means an adult employee having the supervision of the delivery according to schedule, of material between departments or sections.
- (kk) "Packer" means an adult employee who is responsible for the selection of parts or accessories according to requisitions or for the packing and methods of packing of same for despatch.
- (ll) "Rigger" means an adult employee who is responsible for the erection of tackle, and who is, amongst other duties required to splice wire rope.
- (mm) "Tester" means an adult employee engaged in testing products for leaks or faults by immersion in liquid.
- (nn) "Timber orderman" means an employee who is responsible for the selection, allotment and measuring of orders for delivery and/or for the execution of orders for delivery. The word "order" in this definition means the demand of a customer or of the employer, or some one on his behalf to the orderman for an expressed size and class, or expressed sizes and classes of timber.
- (oo) "Welder," first class, means an adult employee using electric arc or acetylene blowpipe or coal gas cutting plant on work other than filling castings, cutting scrap metal, using jigs or doing work covered by definitions of second and third class welder, and includes re-welding by hand processes.
- (pp) "Welder," second class, means an adult employee not required to do first-class welding, but engaged in filling castings or in welding sheet metal or welding with the aid of jigs, or re-welding except by hand processes, or operating automatic welding machines for the setting up of which he is not responsible.
- (qq) "Welder," third class, means an adult employee using electric spot or butt welding machine on work other than cutting scrap with oxy-acetylene blowpipe.
- (rr) "Welder," fourth class, means an adult employee cutting scrap with oxy-acetylene blowpipe.
- (ss) "Welder" "A" Grade, means a tradesman employed as a first-class welder on repair and/or production work, including aircraft, but not including production work on any other class of vehicle.
- (tt) "Welder," "B" Grade, means an adult employee welding aircraft tanks and/or sheet metal manifolds for aircraft.

PERIODICAL ADJUSTMENT OF WAGES.

31 The wages rates set out in clause 2 are based upon the following basic wages rates, and pursuant to the provisions of Section 21 of the *Factories and Shops Act 1934*, the Board hereby determines that such rates shall be automatically adjusted as prescribed by clause 32.

ADJUSTMENT OF BASIC WAGE.

32. (a) For the purposes of this Determination, the expression "Commonwealth Statistician's 'all items' retail price index numbers" or any like expression means the numbers stated to be such index numbers in any document purporting, and not proved to be wrongly so purporting, to be printed by the Commonwealth Government Printer or to be signed by or on behalf of the Commonwealth Statistician.

(b) Until the beginning of the first pay period to commence in August, 1947, the amounts of the Basic Wage shall be as prescribed in clause 31.

(c) During each future successive period beginning with the first pay period to commence in an August, a November, a February, or a May, the amount of the needs basic wage shall be adjusted by the following method, namely, by multiplying the last published Commonwealth Statistician's "all items" retail price index number by the factor .087 taken to one place of decimals, the resultant whole number being the amount of the basic wage expressed in shillings, but should the decimal number reach .5 or more the basic wage shall be taken to the next higher shilling.

(d) The wage rates prescribed at £1 14s. or more for females shall be adjusted on the same basis as the basic wage in the same place, but by 6d. for every 1s. of change in the amount of that basis.

(e) The amounts of wages for all apprentices whose rate of wages is herein stated at 25s. or more per week and of all rates for females prescribed at less than £1 14s., shall be adjusted proportionately to the basic wage in the same place calculated to the nearest 6d., every change of amount not exceeding 3d. to be disregarded.

The amounts of the adjustable rates are fixed on a needs basic wage of £3 6s. and such adjustments are to be made upon the following rates:—

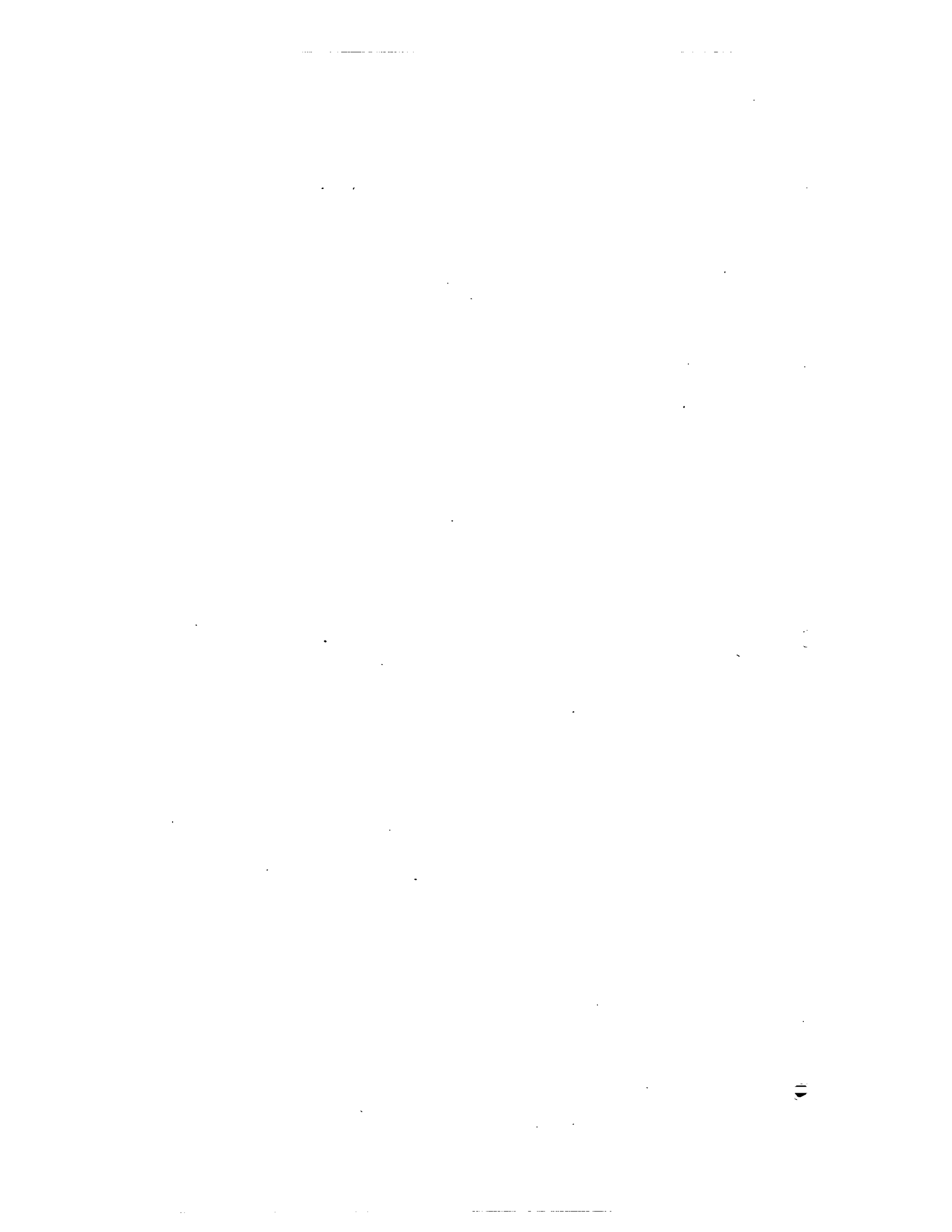

Factories and Shops Acts.

DETERMINATION OF THE BAG MAKERS BOARD.

NOTE.—This Determination applies to the whole of the State of Victoria.

IN accordance with the provisions of the Factories and Shops Acts, the Wages Board which since the 18th December, 1934, has had the power to determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to persons employed in making or repairing jute, hessian, or cotton bags, or in making or repairing wool packs, has made the following Determination, namely:—

1. That as from the beginning of the first pay period to commence on or after the 2nd July, 1947, the last previous Determination of this Board shall be revoked and replaced by this Determination.

OVERTIME.

4. For all work done—
- Outside the hours fixed as the times of beginning and ending work,
 - Within the hours so fixed in excess of nine hours on Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday, Friday, and four hours on Saturday,
 - Within the hours so fixed in excess of the number of hours fixed for a week's work, excluding that provided for under (b),
- a time-worker shall be paid at the rate of time and a half and a piece-worker at the rate of rate and a half.

TIME WAGES.

5. Any person employed on time wages for less than the number of hours fixed for an ordinary week's work shall for each hour worked up to 22 hours be paid—

- in any week in which two or more public holidays occur At the ordinary wages rate, with an addition of fifty per centum;
- in any other week At the ordinary wages rate, with an addition of thirty-three and one-third per centum,

and for each hour worked beyond the 22 hours aforesaid shall be paid at the ordinary wages rate up to but not exceeding ordinary wages rates for an ordinary week's work.

SUNDAYS AND PUBLIC HOLIDAYS.

6. That double time shall be paid for all work done on Sundays, New Year's Day, Australia Day, Good Friday, Easter Saturday, Easter Monday, Labour Day, King's Birthday, Christmas Day and Boxing Day; but if any other day be by Act of Parliament or Proclamation substituted for any of the above-named holidays, the special rate shall only be payable for work done on the day so substituted.

HOLIDAYS.

7. (a) All employees shall be entitled to the following holidays without any deduction in pay:—New Year's Day, Australia Day, Good Friday, Easter Saturday, Easter Monday, Labour Day, King's Birthday, Anzac Day, Christmas Day, Boxing Day, and Fuel and Fodder Picnic Day (only those employed within the Metropolitan District as defined in the Factories and Shops Act and Order in Council thereunder). Provided that Melbourne Cup Day may be substituted for King's Birthday at the election of the employer.

Provided further, that in any industry or establishment in which a Picnic Day is observed for the majority of the employees on a working day, such day shall be regarded as the holiday in lieu of the above-mentioned Picnic Day.

(b) PIECE-WORKERS.—All piece-workers shall be entitled to the same holidays as are granted to time-workers and they shall be paid for such holidays the amount for each holiday based on time wages as set out in this Determination.

ANNUAL HOLIDAY.

8. The annual holiday shall be as prescribed by the provisions of the *Factories and Shops (Annual Holidays) Act 1946*, and any amendments which may be made thereto from time to time.

SICK LEAVE.

9. (a) No deduction shall be made from the wages of any employee who has had not less than six months' continuous service with the same employer and who is unavoidably absent through illness for not more than forty-four hours of working time in any year of service, provided he or she has submitted within 24 hours of the commencement of such absence evidence satisfactory to the employer that the same is not the result of his or her own misconduct. Provided, further, that pieceworkers shall be paid at the same rate as time workers for any such day or days that they are unavoidably absent on account of illness.

(b) Notwithstanding the provisions of sub-clause (a) hereof, if the full period of sick leave as prescribed is not taken in any year, such portion as is not taken shall be cumulative from year to year up to a period not exceeding 88 hours of working time which shall be the maximum amount of leave to which an employee may be entitled in any year of service without deduction of pay. For the purposes of this sub-clause service prior to 23rd December, 1944, shall be disregarded.

REST PERIOD FOR FEMALES.

10. A rest period of ten minutes, between 9.30 a.m. and 10.30 a.m., and between 2.30 p.m. and 3.30 p.m. each day shall be given to all female employees, without deduction of pay.

TERMINATION OF EMPLOYMENT.

11. Employment shall be terminated by a week's notice on either side given at any time during the week or by the payment or forfeiture of a week's wages as the case may be. This shall not affect the right of the employer to dismiss any employees without notice for malingering, inefficiency, neglect of duty or misconduct, and in such cases the wages shall be paid up to the time of dismissal only or to deduct payment for any day the employee cannot be usefully employed because of any strike or through any breakdown in machinery or any stoppage of work by any cause for which the employer cannot reasonably be held responsible.

RIGHT OF ENTRY OF UNION OFFICIAL.

12. The Secretary of the Federated Fodder and Fuel Trades' Industrial Union shall have the right to enter, during the mid-day meal hour, the portion of any employer's establishment in which any of the classes of labour covered by this Determination are done, for the purpose of interviewing employees on legitimate Union business.

PIECE-WORK.

13. The lowest piece-work rates to be paid to any person for doing work of the description referred to in the following Schedule shall be—

PIECE-WORK WHICH MAY BE FIXED BY AN EMPLOYER.

14. The Board determines that any employer may fix and pay piece-work rates to any person employed at repairing by machine (employer to provide twine) or by hand (employee to provide twine) bags other than those for which the Board has fixed a piece-work rate, provided that such piece-worker shall be paid in any week, at least the amount payable to a time-worker performing the same class of work for the same number of hours as such piece-worker.

WAITING TIME.

15. All piece-workers kept waiting for work, or any materials, or for repair of machines shall be paid the hourly rate of the corresponding time-worker for such waiting time.

PERIODICAL ADJUSTMENT OF WAGES.

16. The wages rates set out in clause 2 are based upon the following basic wage rates and, pursuant to the provisions of Section 21 of the *Factories and Shops Act 1934*, the Board hereby determines that such rates shall be automatically adjusted as prescribed by clause 17. Provided that the wages of improvers, juveniles, and females shall be adjusted proportionately to adjustments of the basic wage, such adjustments to be to the nearest 3d., half or less than half of 3d. to be disregarded.

Provided further that the piece-work prices shall be subject to adjustment according to the fluctuations in the basic wage on the following basis:—The percentage difference between 83s. (such amount being the rate provided for a Repairer by Machine—Male—in the Determination which came into force on the 2nd September, 1938), and the amount payable to a Repairer by Machine—Male—after adjustment as hereinbefore provided.

ADJUSTMENT OF BASIC WAGE.

17. (a) For the purposes of this Determination the expression "Commonwealth Statistician's 'all items' retail price index numbers" or any like expression means the numbers stated to be such index numbers in any document purporting, and not proved to be wrongly so purporting, to be printed by the Commonwealth Government Printer or to be signed by or on behalf of the Commonwealth Statistician.

(b) Until the beginning of the first pay period to commence in August, 1947, the amounts of the basic wage shall be as prescribed in clause 16.

(c) During each future successive period beginning with the first pay period to commence in an August, a November, a February, or a May, the amount of the needs basic wage shall be adjusted by the following method, namely, by multiplying the last published Commonwealth Statistician's 'all items' retail price index number by the factor .087 taken to one place of decimals, the resultant whole number being the amount of the basic wage expressed in shillings, but should the decimal number reach .5 or more the basic wage shall be taken to the next higher shilling.
