Prices Regulation Act 1948.

PRICES REGULATION ORDER No. 20.

LEATHER.

IN pursuance of the powers conferred upon me by the *Prices Regulation Act 1948*, I, John Francis Waldron, Prices Decontrol Commissioner, hereby make the following Order:—

Citation.

1. This Order may be cited as Prices Regulation Order No. 20.

Revocation.

2. Prices Regulation Order No. 654 as amended by Prices Regulation Orders Nos. 2751 and 3247 made under Commonwealth National Security (Prices) Regulations is hereby revoked.

Definition.

3. In this Order "prevailing price" means, in relation to the sale of leather of any class or kind by any person, the price whether wholesale or retail at which that person sold leather of that class or kind on 31st August, 1939, or, if no sale were made on that date, on the last preceding date on which such sale was made, at the same place and on the same terms and conditions.

Maximum Prices.

4. I fix and declare the maximum price at which the class or kind of leather specified in the first column of the Schedule contained hereunder may be sold by any person to be the prevailing price plus the percentage of that price set out in the second column of the said Schedule opposite such class or kind.

Fixation of Maximum Prices by Notice.

5. Notwithstanding anything contained in this Order, I declare the maximum price at which any leather specified in a Notice in pursuance of this paragraph may be sold by any person to whom such notice is given to be such price as is fixed by the Commissioner by Notice in writing to that person.

PRICES REGULATION ORDER NO. 21.

CARTAGE RATES—PRIMARY PRODUCE AND FERTILIZERS.

IN pursuance of the powers conferred upon me by the *Prices Regulation Act 1948*, I, John Francis Waldron, Prices Decontrol Commissioner, hereby make the following Order:—

Citation.

1. This Order may be cited as Prices Regulation Order No. 21.

Application.

2. This Order shall apply to the State of Victoria, except to the area within a radius of twenty-five miles from the General Post Office, Melbourne.

Maximum Rates.

3. I fix and declare the maximum rate at which the service of transporting, including loading and unloading, any of the following goods, that is, wheat, rice, oats, maize or other grain or cereals or potatoes, chaff, baled lucerne, superphosphates or other inorganic fertilizers, for the distances specified in the Schedule to this Order, to be the rates set out in the Schedule opposite each such distance. Provided that if the person to whom such service is supplied assists or supplies assistance in the loading of those goods, the maximum rates fixed by the provisions of this paragraph shall be reduced by an amount calculated at 1s. per ton.

Variation of Maximum Rates by Notice.

4. Notwithstanding the foregoing provisions of this Order, I declare the maximum rates at which any service of transporting wheat, rice, oats, maize or other grain or cereals or potatoes, chaff, baled lucerne, superphosphates or other inorganic fertilizers, or loading or unloading, specified in a Notice in pursuance of this paragraph, may be supplied by any person to whom such Notice is given to be such rate as is fixed by the Commissioner by Notice in writing to that person.

5. Nothing in this Order shall operate to nullify any provisions in respect to sales of whole, crusted or gristed wheat fixed by Prices Regulation Order No. 13.

PRICES REGULATION ORDER No. 22.

BRICKS.

IN pursuance of the powers conferred upon me by the *Prices Regulation Act 1948, I, John Francis Waldron, Prices Decontrol Commissioner, hereby make the following Order:—*

Citation.

1. This Order may be cited as Prices Regulation Order No. 22.

Revocation.

2. Prices Regulation Order No. 2498 made under Commonwealth National Security (Prices) Regulations is hereby revoked.

Definitions.

3. In this Order, unless the contrary intention appears—"Melbourne Metropolitan Area" means all that area comprised within a radius of twenty-five miles from the principal post office, Melbourne. "Prevailing rate" means, in relation to the cartage of bricks, the rate at which the said service was carried on on 16th day of September, 1948, on substantially the same terms and conditions, or if the said service was not supplied or carried on on that date, the last preceding date on which the said service was supplied or carried on on substantially the same terms and conditions.

Maximum Prices.

4. I fix and declare the maximum prices at which bricks may be sold ex kiln in Victoria to be the prices specified in the Schedule to this Order.

5. I fix and declare the maximum rate which may be charged for the cartage of bricks from any kiln to the place of delivery to be the prevailing rate.

Fixation of Maximum Prices by Notice in Writing.

6. (1) Notwithstanding the foregoing provisions of this Order I declare the maximum prices at which bricks specified in a Notice in pursuance of this paragraph may be sold by any person to whom such Notice is given to be such price as is fixed by the Commissioner by Notice in writing to that person.

(2) Nothing in this Order shall operate to nullify the provisions of any Notice in writing given in pursuance of any Prices Regulation Order which is in force at the date of commencement of this Order which fixes a lower maximum price for the sale of bricks by any person.
