Gaols Act 1928.

PARTIAL REVOCATION OF PROCLAMATION OF
DUNOLLY GAOL.

WHEREAS by a Proclamation issued by the Governor in Council on the twenty-fifth day of April, 1864, and published in the *Government Gazette* of the third day of May, 1864, it was proclaimed, declared and notified that the buildings, erections, houses and premises situate in certain places were public gaols, prisons and houses of correction within the meaning and in accordance with the provisions of certain Acts:

And whereas by a further Proclamation issued by the Governor in Council on the fifth day of February, 1930, and published in the *Government Gazette* of the twelfth day of February, 1930, the first-mentioned Proclamation was revoked in so far as it referred to a portion of the Dunolly Gaol, namely, allotment 18 of section 29, Town of Dunolly, Parish of Dunolly, County of Gladstone:

Now I, the Governor of the State of Victoria, in the Commonwealth of Australia, by and with the advice of the Executive Council of the said State, and in pursuance of the provisions of the *Gaols Act 1928* and all other powers me thereunto enabling, do by this my Proclamation revoke the aforesaid Proclamation issued on the twenty-fifth day of April, 1864, and published in the *Government Gazette* of the third day of May, 1864, in so far as it refers to the following portion of the Dunolly Gaol, that is to say:—

Allotment 15 of section 29, Town of Dunolly, Parish of Dunolly, County of Gladstone.

EXTENSION OF PROHIBITED PERIOD.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Governor of the State of Victoria and its Dependencies in the Commonwealth of Australia, &c., &c., &c.

IN pursuance of the provisions of Section 3 of the *Forests Act, 1928, I*, the Governor of the State of Victoria in the Commonwealth of Australia, by and with the advice of the Executive Council of the said State, do by this my Proclamation declare the thirty-first day of March, 1950, to be the end of the prohibited period in the year One thousand nine hundred and fifty with respect to any fire protected area other than a State forest or national park in such parts of Victoria as are specified in the Schedule hereto:—

DISCHARGED SOLDIERS SETTLEMENT ACT 1917.

PROCLAMATION PARTLY REVOKED

By His Excellency the Governor of the State of Victoria and its Dependencies in the Commonwealth of Australia, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by section 6 of the *Discharged Soldiers Settlement Act 1917* (8 Geo. V., No. 2916) it was amongst other things enacted that the Governor in Council may, by Order published in the *Government Gazette*, set apart any area of Crown land for the purpose of being disposed of under the said Act to discharged soldiers in the manner set out in the said Act and may amend or revoke such Order: Now therefore, I, the Governor of the State of Victoria, by and with the advice of the Executive Council of the said State in pursuance of the power hereinbefore recited and all other power thereby enabling do, by this Order, revoke the Order dated the 19th August, 1919, and published in the *Government Gazette* of 27th August, 1919, setting apart land under section 6 of the aforesaid Act, in so far as the Order relates to allotment 29, area 837 acres 3 roods 31 perches in the Parish of Kulwin.

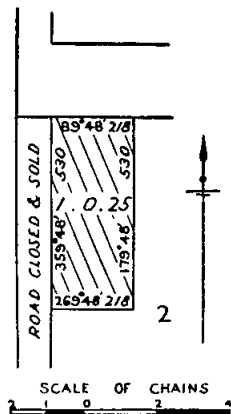

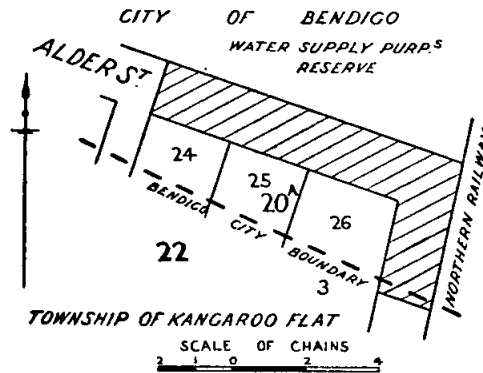

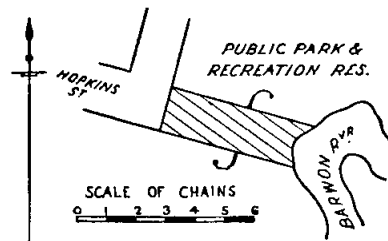

THE APOLLO BAY ELECTRIC LIGHTING ORDER
No. 242, 1940.—AMENDMENT TO TARIFF.

supply electricity within an area contained within a circle having its centre at the Post Office at Apollo Bay and a radius of 1½ mile, for a period of fifteen years commencing on the 16th July, 1940: And whereas on the 24th September, 1946, the Governor in Council approved of a method of charging for electricity supplied to any consumer for normal residential use for lighting, cooking, heating, or power: And whereas the said undertakers have made application to vary the rates set forth therein: Now therefore, His Excellency the Governor of the State of Victoria, by and with the advice of the Executive Council thereof, acting pursuant to the provisions of section 13 of the *Electric Light and Power Act 1928*, doth hereby vary the maximum rates set forth in the above-mentioned Order of 24th September, 1946, in the following manner, that is to say:—

A service charge of 1s. 6d. per month for every assessable room which does not exceed 350 square feet in floor area, plus 1s. 6d. per month for every 350 square feet of floor area or odd fraction thereof of every assessable room in such premises, the floor area of which exceeds 350 square feet (but the service charge in respect of any one room shall not exceed 3s. per month), and, in addition, for any amount of electricity supplied, 6d. per unit; but (subject to the minimum monthly charge provided for in section 3 of the Fourth Schedule) the amount chargeable to any consumer under this method shall not be higher than a sum calculated at the rate of 1s. 6d. per unit used in any month.

Provided that if the production of any dairy farmer in such month has been affected by circumstances of an abnormal character the Board after inquiry at the request of such dairy farmer may fix as his average daily quantity for the purpose of the apportionment of the supply such quantity as the Board may deem fair and reasonable to offset such circumstances.

Provided further that if a dairy farmer has not been the holder of a contract during the previous twelve months the Board may, at the request of such dairy farmer or of the owner of the milk depot concerned, approve of a contract for the supply of such quantity of milk as the Board may deem fair and reasonable.

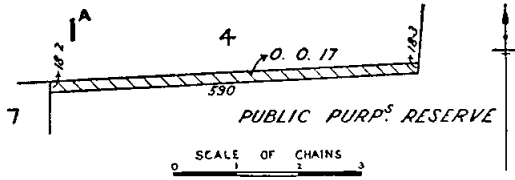

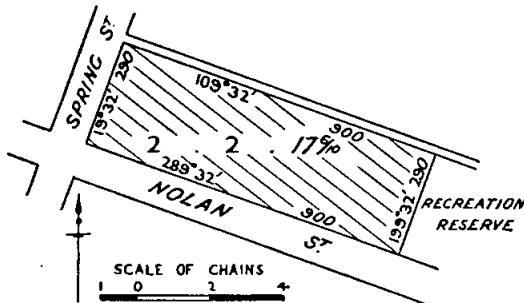

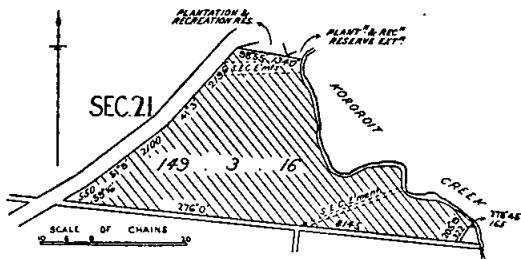

3. (a) Youths entering the trade of a stonemason shall be indentured (if between 15 and 17 years of age) for a period of 5 years; if over 17 years of age, for a period of 4 years.

(b) Youths may be taken on probation for a period not exceeding three months before being apprenticed, and the period of probation shall be treated as part of their term of apprenticeship.

(c) If any employer is unable to fulfil his obligation to an apprentice, he may, with the consent of the Wages Board, transfer the apprentice to another employer, who may take and employ him as an apprentice.

(d) Every apprentice may during the term of his apprenticeship attend at night the classes in masonry or similar subjects (chosen by the employer) provided at a Technical College or School, and the fees actually paid per term shall be refunded by the employer on production of a certificate from the instructor that the apprentice has satisfactorily attended the classes during the school term.

(e) The proportion of apprentices to be employed shall not exceed one apprentice to every three journeymen stonemasons or fraction of three stonemasons receiving not less than the rate for masons.
