
· PROCLAMATION ·

By His Excellency the Governor of the State of Victoria and its Dependencies in the Commonwealth of Australia, &c., &c., &c.

I, THE Governor of the State of Victoria, in the Commonwealth of Australia, by and with the advice of the Executive Council of the said State, and in pursuance of the provisions of the Game Acts and all other powers me enabling in that behalf, do by this my Proclamation direct that the part of Victoria hereunder described shall be a locality in which, from the first day of January to the thirty-first day of December (both days inclusive) in each year, it shall be unlawful for any person to kill or destroy any native game included in the Third Schedule to the Game Act 1928.



No person shall camp on or use a camping area, except during the period covered by a permission, in writing, of the Committee of Management through its authorized officer and on the payment of such fees as are fixed by such Committee, and subject to conditions deemed reasonable by such Committee.
- 7. Any person erecting a tent, marquee, or other shelter,
- 7. Any person erecting a tent, marquee, or other shelter, or parking a caravan in any camping area, shall abide by such directions as may be given by the Committee of Management or its duly appointed officer.

 8. Any permission issued by the Committee of Management or its authorized officer to a person for use of a camping area may be cancelled or withdrawn, but upon such cancellation or withdrawal a proportionate amount of any fees or charges paid in advance shall be refunded, and such Committee or its authorized officer, at its or his discretion, may deduct and retain from any such proportionate amount a sum as it or he determines will be necessary to clear up and put in order the site vacated.

 9. No person shall put in the Beserve any eattle bevere.
- 9. No person shall put in the Reserve any cattle, horses, pigs, goats, or other animals without the permission of the Committee of Management first obtained.
 - 10. No person shall-
 - (a) Enter or remain in the Reserve who may offend against decency as regards dress, language, or conduct, or who may behave in a disorderly, unseemly, or offensive manner, or create or take part in any disturbance.
 - (b) Enter or remain in the Reserve whilst in a state of intoxication.
 (c) Use indecent or offensive language in the Reserve.
 - (d) Bring any intoxicating liquor on to the Reserve without the consent of the Committee of Management first obtained.
 - (e) Obstruct, hinder, or interfere with any person under authority from the Committee of Manage-ment or employed by it at the Reserve in the execution of his lawful duties.
 - (f) Hawk, or offer for sale any goods or articles, or bring in, erect, or set up any vehicle, booth,

- tent, gallery, stand, or other structure for exhibition purposes, or for conducting any game of skill or chance, or for the purpose of offering for sale any article in the Reserve without the permission, in writing, of the Committee of-Management first obtained.
- (g) Wilfully interfere with or disturb any entertainment, performance, sport, game, pastime, or amusement to the annoyance, detriment, or discomfort of any person or persons engaged in such entertainment, performance, sport, game, pastime, or amusement.
- (h) Permit rubbish or other material to be deposited in the Reserve, except in the area set aside for that purpose.

And any person committing any of such offences shall, together with any animals, poultry, vehicles, goods, or chattels in his possession or care, be liable to be removed from the Reserve.

- 11. No person shall remove any wood or timber from the Reserve, unless with the consent of the Committee of Management first obtained.
- 12. No person shall light a fire in the Reserve, except at such places as are set apart for that purpose by the Committee of Management.
- 13. No person shall carry or discharge firearms in the Reserve without the consent of the Committee of Management first obtained.

PART II.—PROMOTIONS AND TRANSFERS. TECHNICAL AND GENERAL DIVISION.

General.—Shorthand Writers and Typists (Female).

Sub-regulation (1) of Regulation 55 is deleted and the following sub-regulation inserted in lieu thereof:—

- (1) Any Shorthand Writer and Typist (Female), Grade I., who satisfies the Board, by test, of her ability to write shorthand at the rate of 100 words a minute, shall—
 - (a) if an adult, be eligible, from the date of passing such test—
 - (i) to receive an allowance at the rate of £26 a year, provided that her total emolument shall not exceed the maximum rate of standard salary prescribed for the office of Shorthand Writer and Typist (Female), Grade II.; and
 - (ii) on completion of twelve months' service in the office of Shorthand Writer and Typist (Female), Grade I., to be promoted to the office of Shorthand Writer and Typist (Female), Grade II.; or
 - (b) if a minor, be eligible, from the date of passing such test—
 - (i) to receive a total emolument equal to the rate of standard salary appropriate to one year in advance of her own age; and

"Play Leader" shall mean the person appointed by the Council from time to time to be in charge of all or any of the Children's Playgrounds; words in the singular shall include the plural, words in the plural shall include the singular, and words the plural shall include the singular, and words importing the masculine gender shall include females.

- 3. Except on Good Friday, Christmas Day, and Anzac Day, the Children's Playgrounds shall be open to the public daily from 9.30 a.m. until sunset, save on Sundays when they shall be open to the public from Midday until 6 p.m., and any person found therein except during such hours shall be guilty of a breach of this By-law.
- 4. Although the Children's Playgrounds are provided for use of children only, parents and attendants shall be at liberty to be present to watch over children, subject as hereinafter mentioned.
- 5. No person above the age of fourteen years shall be allowed to use any of the swings or other appliances erected in the Children's Playgrounds. Such swings or

other appliances shall not be used by the same child for period than five minutes at any time if any other child is waiting to use them.

- 6. No male person above the age of twelve years shall be in the vicinity of the swings or other appliances set apart for female children.
- 7. No person shall ride or drive any vehicle, bicycle, or tricycle in any part of the Children's Playgrounds, or bring any animal into the same.
- 8. No child shall use any of the swings or other appliances in the Children's Playgrounds except in the ordinary
- 9. No cricket or football shall be played in the Children's Playgrounds, except in the presence of and with the permission of the Play Leader or a member of the Committee
- 10. All persons in the Children's Playgrounds shall place all paper, fruit peel, or other litter in the bins provided by the Council for that purpose.
- 11. All persons in the Children's Playgrounds shall obey the directions of the Play Leader, or in the absence of the Play Leader of any member of the Committee of Control or officer or employee of the Council.
- 12. The Council shall not be responsible for any accident suffered by any person or for any damage to any property whilst in the Children's Playgrounds, whether such accident or damage arises from the use of the Children's Playgrounds or of any appliance therein.
- 13. Any person who commits a breach of this By-law or who wilfully damages any of the swings or other appliances or any property in the Children's Playgrounds (in addition to any other penalty under this By-law) shall be liable to be removed or excluded from the Children's Playgrounds.

- 4. Vehicles when stopped in streets shall be as near as possible to footway on left side, and shall not be stopped on portions of streets reserved for special purposes.
- 5. Unauthorized persons shall not regulate, direct, or interfere with traffic.
- 6. Vehicles shall be parked parallel to left margin, except in High-street, Rutherglen, where vehicles shall be parked at an angle of 45 degrees with the street, no portion of any vehicle being more than 17 feet from kerb. Angle parking shall not apply to omnibuses. Provided that the Council may indicate by lines painted on street surface or by notices the manner and position in which vehicles shall be parked. be parked.
- 7. Omnibuses, taxi-cabs, &c., shall be parked only in positions reserved for such vehicles, and no other vehicles shall be parked in such positions.
- 8. Vehicles loaded with animals or live stock shall not stop in Main-street, Rutherglen, or Foord-street, Wahgunyah, except for a period of less than ten minutes.
- 9. Persons shall not obstruct any streets or footway by 9. IN THE MATTER of the Determination of the Dairy Farm Workers Board dated the 16th August, 1951, and published in the Victoria Government Gazette No. 938 on the 6th September, 1951.

AND

IN THE MATTER of Appeals by the Victorian Employers' Federation, The Victorian Dairy Farmers' Association and the Graziers' Association of Victoria.

(Before His Honour Judge Gamble, K. H. Boykett, Esq., and J. V. Stout, Esq.)

Thursday, the 18th day of October, 1951.

These Appeals coming on for hearing by this Court on the 1st, 2nd and 3rd days of October, 1951, and Subsequently on this day for judgment.

This Court DOTH ORDER AND DETERMINE:-

1. That, as from the beginning of the first pay period commencing in November, 1951, the above-mentioned Determination of the Dairy Farm Workers Board shall be revoked and replaced by this Determination as to "the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any person or persons or classes of persons employed at farm work connected with the production of milk or cream for trade or sale".

The wages of adult females shall be 75 per cent. of the appropriate rate prescribed above for a male calculated to the nearest 6d. half or less than half of 6d. in a result to be disregarded.

Hours of Work.

^{3.} The ordinary hours of work shall not exceed eight on any day or 48 in any week to be worked in six days (Sunday to Saturday inclusive). The spread of hours shall not exceed twelve hours on any day.

Provided that the employer and employee may, by agreement, substitute eight hours a day for a twelve day fortnight, in which case the days off shall be consecutive.

OVERTIME.

4. All work done in excess of eight hours on any day or outside the spread of hours, shall be paid at the rate of time and a quarter for the first hour and time and a half thereafter.

5. An employee required to work on his day off shall be paid at the rate of double time in addition to any amount payable in respect of the weekly wage.

CONTRACT OF EMPLOYMENT.

- 6. (a) Except as hereinafter provided, employment shall be by the week. An employee not specifically engaged as a casual employee shall be deemed to be employed by the week.
- (b) Employment shall be terminated by a week's notice on either side given at any time during the week or by the payment or forfeiture of a week's wages as the case may be. This shall not affect the right of the employer to dismiss any employee without notice for malingering, inefficiency, neglect of duty or misconduct, and in such cases the wages shall be paid up to the time of dismissal only.
- (c) An employee not attending for duty shall, except as provided by clause 9 hereof, lose his pay for the actual time for such non-attendance.

7. Any person employed other than on a weekly basis shall be paid 10 per centum in addition to the appropriate rate prescribed in clause 2.

HOLIDAYS.

8. A weekly employee shall be entitled to the following public holidays without deduction of pay, provided that where such employee is required to work he shall be paid time and a half for the work done:—Christmas Day, Boxing Day, New Year's Day, Australia Day, Labour Day, Good Friday. Easter Monday, Anzae Day, King's Birthday, and 13th November. 1951 (provided it is then a proclaimed holiday), but if any other day be by Act of Parliament or Proclamation substituted for any of the above-mentioned holidays the special rate shall be payable only for work done on the day so substituted. Provided further that any other day may be substituted as a holiday by mutual agreement between the employer and the employee.

ANNUAL HOLIDAY.

9. The Annual holiday shall be three weeks in the terms and conditions, with appropriate adjustments, in accordance with the provisions of the Factories and Shops (Annual Holidays) Act 1946 No. 5111, and any amendments which may be made thereto from time to time.

- 10. (a) When a weekly employee is disabled by personal ill health, proof of which sickness is given to the employer, by medical certificate or other satisfactory evidence within 24 hours of the employees' consequential absence, he shall, on account thereof, be entitled without deduction of pay to absent himself from work one day in each two months, or for a proportionate aggregate in a longer period, but not exceeding 48 hours of working time in any year of employment.
- (b) Notwithstanding anything contained in sub-clause (a) hereof, if the full period of sick leave as prescribed above is not taken in any year, such portion as is not taken shall be cumulative from year to year up to a period not exceeding 96 hours of working time, which shall be the maximum amount of leave to which an employee may be entitled in any year of service without deduction of pay. For the purposes of this sub-clause, service prior to the 1st September, 1951, shall be disregarded.

PROTECTIVE CLOTHING.

11. An employee shall receive an allowance of 3s. per week for the provision of protective waterproof clothing (e.g., oilskins, gum boots, and gloves).

CLEANSING MATERIAL.

12. A suitable solvent and cotton waste shall be provided by the employer where required by the employee in the course of his duties.

DRYING CONVENIENCES.

13. The employer shall provide adequate conveniences for employees to dry their clothes.

PROVISION OF AND DEDUCTION FOR KEEP.

- 14. (a) Where the employer provides an employee with board and lodging the standard thereof shall be reasonably adequate and the standard of accommodation provided shall be in accordance with the following, that is to say, there shall be a sufficiency of necessary furniture, bedding, blankets and bed-room and washing utensils and sufficient provision made for lighting, heating, bathing, ventilation and sanitation. The sleeping quarters provided shall contain not less than 480 cubic feet of air space for each person accommodated therein and not more than two persons shall be accommodated in any one sleeping apartment. The food provided shall be sufficient and well prepared and cooked.
- (b) Subject to compliance with the provisions of sub-clause (a) hereof the employer shall be entitled to deduct from the wages payable to an employee provided by him with board and lodging an amount to compensate himself for the cost thereof at the following rates:—

provided that such rates are adjustable by adding or subtracting, as the case may be, to or from the rates prescribed an amount of 4d. in the case of adult males, and 3d. in all other cases for each variation of 1s. in the male basic wage.

PROVISION OF LIVING PREMISES FOR EMPLOYEE.

15. Where an employer provides an employee with living premises for the use of the employee and his family as a perquisite of employment the employer shall be entitled to make a charge for the use of such premises and the employee shall pay each week the amount of such charge as agreed to in writing by both parties at the commencement of the employment. A copy of such agreement shall be lodged within seven days thereafter with the Secretary of the Australian Workers Union, Melbourne.

Within 24 hours of the termination of his employment an employee shall be required to vacate the said premises.

PAYMENT OF WAGES.

- 16. (a) The full amount of each employee's wage shall be paid each week in the employer's time.
- (b) A casual employee whose employment is terminated by the employer shall be paid all monies due to him at the termination of his employment. Where the employment is terminated by the employee such payment shall be made within 48 hours of such termination.
- (c) The employer shall pay at any time on the written order of the employee any obligatory contributions or charitable donations out of the amount for the time being due to the employee; provided that the employer shall not be required to make payment in respect of any such order which may be presented to him less than twenty-four hours prior to the time fixed for payment.

FIRST-AID OUTFIT.

17. The employer shall provide and continuously maintain at a place or places reasonably accessible to all employees an efficient first-aid outfit, which shall consist of the following articles and quantities:—

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TIME BOOK.

18. An employer shall supply each employee with a time-sheet or book and the employee shall record thereon in ink the hours worked on each day during a week and deliver same to the employer at the end of each working week. Upon delivery of this time-sheet or book the employer shall record the classification, actual wages paid and the deduction for keep in respect of such employee.

It shall be the responsibility of the employer to ensure that the provisions of this clause are complied with.

RIGHT OF ENTRY OF UNION OFFICIALS.

19. The Secretary, or any other Official of the Australian Workers Union authorized in writing by the secretary, shall not be prevented on production of such authority by any employer from visiting and conversing with any employee or employees at a time mutually agreed upon by the employer and the said Secretary or Official.

PERIODICAL ADJUSTMENT OF WAGES.

20. The wages rates set out in clause 2 are based upon the following basic wage rates, and pursuant to the provisions of section 21 of the Factories and Shops Act 1934, the Board hereby determines that such rates shall be automatically adjusted by the same amount and at the same time as such basic wage as prescribed by clause 21.

The female basic wage shall be 75 per cent. of the above male basic wage calculated to the nearest 6d., half or less than half of 6d. in a result to be disregarded.

ADJUSTMENT OF BASIC WAGE.

- 21. (a) For the purposes of this Determination, the expression "Commonwealth Statistician's 'all items' retail price index numbers" or any like expression means the numbers stated to be such index numbers in any document purporting, and not proved to be wrongly so purporting, to be printed by the Commonwealth Government Printer or to be signed by or on behalf of the Commonwealth Statistician.
- (b) Until the beginning of the first pay period to commence in February, 1951, the amount of the basic wage shall be as prescribed in clause 20.
- (c) During each future successive period beginning with the first pay period to commence in a February, a May, an August or a November, the amount of the basic wage shall be adjusted by the following method, namely, by multiplying the last published Commonwealth Statistician's "all items" retail price index number by the factor 103 taken to one place of decimals, the resultant whole number being the amount of the basic wage expressed in shillings, but should the decimal number reach 5 or more the basic wage shall be taken to the next higher shilling.

Factories and Shops Acts.

DETERMINATION OF THE HOSPITAL EXECUTIVES BOARD.

Note,-This Determination applies to the whole of the State of Victoria.

In accordance with the provisions of the Factories and Shops Acts, the Wages Board appointed to "determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any person or persons, or classes of persons, employed full time as an executive officer (namely, a scoretary, an assistant secretary, a chief clerk, or an accountant) in or in connexion with any hospital or benevolent home registered pursuant to the Hospital and Charities Act 1928, and any amendments thereto" has made the following Determination, namely:—

1. That on the 1st December, 1951, the last previous Determination of this Board shall be revoked and replaced by this Determination.

WAGES PER WEEK.

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ADJUSTED BED CAPACITY.

- 3. (1) For the purposes of this Determination the adjusted bed capacity shall be the bed capacity shown in the last nnual return furnished by the respective institution to the Hospitals and Charities Commission of Victoria or other statutory body and in the case of a Secretary, Assistant Secretary, and the Accountant where no Assistant Secretary is employed shall be further adjusted in respect to the number of out-patients' attendances and maternity beds as follows:—
 - (a) Out-patients' attendances-

 - (i) For the first 49,000 out-patients' attendances add one bed for each 700 or part thereof;
 (ii) For the second 49,000 out-patients' attendances add one bed for each 1,400 or part thereof;
 (iii) Thereafter add one bed for each 2,100 or part thereof.
 - (b) Maternity beds.—One-third or part thereof of the number of maternity beds as stated in the above return shall be added to the total number of beds.
 - (2) Officers in hospitals in which the chief and principal treatment is in connexion with-
 - (a) eyes, ears, nose, and throat, shall be paid for as 301 adjusted beds;
 - (b) dentistry, shall be paid for as 251 adjusted beds.
 - (c) after care, shall be paid for as 251 adjusted beds.

DEFINITIONS.

- 4. "Secretary" means any person mployed full time as-
 - (a) Secretary, Manager, or Business Manager; or
 - (b) the principal administrative officer however styled in any institution.
- "Assistant Secretary" means any person employed full time and appointed to act as first assistant to a Secretary as
- "Accountant" means any person who is a certificated member of a recognized Institute of Accountants, and who has been appointed to work full time as the Accountant at any institution. Provided that any person who has held the position of Accountant in any institution prior to 1st April, 1948, shall not be required to hold a certificate from a recognized Institute of Accountants.
- "Chief Clerk" means any person appointed to act full time as such, but does not include any person covered by the definitions of Secretary, Assistant Secretary, or Accountant.

WORKING WEEK.

5. A week's work shall be spread over five days provided that an officer shall work at other reasonable times as and when necessary.

SUBSIDIARY HOSPITAL OR ANNEXES.

6. For the purpose of determining the salary of a Secretary, Assistant Secretary, or the Accountant where no Assistant Secretary is employed, who are required to administer the affairs of or perform duties in connexion with one or more subsidiary hospitals or annexes, the adjusted bed capacity shall be the sum of the adjusted bed capacity of the parent hospital and the subsidiaries or annexes concerned.

PUBLIC HOLIDAYS.

- 7. (a) An officer shall be entitled to be absent without deduction of pay on the days observed as New Year's Day, Australia Day, Good Friday, Easter Monday, Labour Day, Anzac Day, King's Birthday, Melbourne Cup Day (within a radius of 20 miles of the General Post Office, Melbourne), Christmas Day, Boxing Day, and such other day or days as may be proclaimed as a holiday or holidays within the area in which the Institute concerned is situated.
- (b) An officer required to work on any day specified in sub-clause (a) hereof shall be entitled to time off in lieu of such day.

SICK LEAVE.

- 8. (a) An officer shall be entitled to be absent without loss of pay on account of personal ill-health or accident, proof of which shall be submitted in a manner satisfactory to the Committee of the Hospital, for a period not exceeding in the aggregate 28 working days for each 12 months of service.
- (b) Notwithstanding anything contained in sub-clause (a) hereof, if the full period of sick leave therein contained is not taken in any year such portion as is not taken shall be cumulative from year to year. No employer shall terminate the services of an employee during the currency of any period of sick leave with the object of avoiding his obligations under this sub-clause.

ANNUAL LEAVE.

9. (a) Officers shall be entitled to annual leave on completion of each year of service in any one institution without deduction of pay, as follows:—

Should any day or days specified in clause 7 as a Public Holiday occur during an officer's period of annual leave, an additional day shall be added to the period of annual leave for each such specified day so occurring.

- (b) Annual leave shall be granted within a period of six months after becoming due, and at a time suitable to the convenience of the Institution.
- (c) An officer whose employment is terminated with less than twelve months' service in any qualifying twelve-monthly period shall be granted pro rata annual leave or payment in lieu.

LONG SERVICE LEAVE.

- 10. (a) An officer who has been in the service of one or more Institutions (including any statutory body directly associated with such Institution or Institutions) for a cumulative period of 20 years shall be entitled to six months' long service leave or payment in lieu after having attained the age of 45 years in accordance with the following provisions:—
 - (i) If on retirement an officer has completed more than 20 years' service a pro rata amount of leave shall be added to the six months' leave prescribed for all service in excess of 20 years.
 - (ii) If on the resignation of an officer he has completed more than 20 years' service he shall be entitled only to six months' leave of absence or payment in lieu as if he had only completed a period of 20 years.
 - (iii) Upon the death from any cause of an officer, who, at the date of his death was eligible for the grant of long service leave, the Committee shall pay to the legal representative of the deceased officer the amount that the officer would have been entitled to receive had he retired immediately prior to the date of his death.
- (b) Any officer retiring or resigning after the 1st April, 1949, shall be entitled to the benefits of this clause provided he has had not less than 20 years service.
 - (c) For the purposes of this clause the following definitions shall apply:-
 - "Service" shall mean service calculated as from the date of entering the present employment with the Institution and shall include all periods during which an officer was serving in His Majesty's Forces or was made available by the employer for national duty or for other periods of absence approved by the Institution.
 - "Salary" shall mean the officer's salary or wage (exclusive of overtime or other allowance) at the time leave is taken, or immediately prior to the officer leaving the service or death of the officer (as the case may be).
 - "Committee" shall mean the Committee or Governing Body of the Hospital or Benevolent Home in which the officer is employed.

Words importing the masculine gender only shall include the feminine gender.

HIGHER DUTIES ALLOWANCE.

11. An officer required to take over all the duties of a senior officer shall be paid not less than the rate prescribed for such senior officer for such period as he so acts.

TRAVELLING ALLOWANCE.

- 12. (a) An officer required to travel on business in connexion with the Institution shall be re-imtursed all reasonable travelling expenses necessarily incurred.
- (b) Where an officer is required to use his own motor car in connexion with the business of an Institution, he shall be re-imbursed such sum as may be agreed upon between the Governing Body of the Institution and himself. In the absence of any such agreement, he shall be paid an allowance at the rate of is. per mile for each mile he is so required to use his motor car.

TERMINATION OF SERVICES.

13. To terminate employment, one month's written notice shall be given by the employee or the Committee or one month's wages paid or forfeited, as the case may be. This shall not affect the right of the Committee to dismiss any employee without notice for malingering, inefficiency, neglect of duty, or misconduct, in which case wages shall be raid up to the time of dismissal only.

ACCOMMODATION.

- 14. (a) Where an officer in a Benevolent Home is required to reside in quarters provided for him by the Institution, no deduction for the use of such quarters shall be made from his wages, and the officer shall be on call for institutional matters at all reasonable times.
- (b) Where an officer attached to a Hospital is required to reside in quarters provided for him by the Institution a deduction of not more than ten per cent, may be made from his wages as rental.

RATES AND CONDITIONS TO BE MAINTAINED.

15. Nothing in this Determination shall be deemed or construed to reduce the wage or allowance any officer was receiving prior to the date of operation of this Determination or after unfavourably the terms or conditions of employment operating at the date hereof.

PERIODICAL ADJUSTMENT OF WAGES.

16. The wages rates set out in clause 2 are based upon the following basic wage and, pursuant to the provisions of section 21 of the Factories and Shops Act 1934, the Board hereby determines that such rates shall be automatically adjusted by the same amount and at the same time as such basic wage as prescribed by clause 17.

# SUNDAY WORK.

- 14. No person shall be employed on Sunday before 12 midnight with the following exceptions:-

  - (a) Making fermented doughs, for which double time shall be paid;
    (b) One man per factory may be employed in the preparation of pie meat between the hours of 1 p.m. and 5 p.m. at double rates of pay, with a minimum payment of 10s. for this work.

#### TIME BOOK.

15. The correct times of beginning and ending work shall be recorded daily in a proper book or time card, or by mechanical means, to be furnished by the employer, such record shall be initialed by the employee at least once a week, and shall be open for inspection by the permanent Secretary-Treasurer of the Victorian Branch of the Pastrycooks Union of Australia and the Inspector of Factories.

# AUTHORIZED PERSON MAY ENTER FACTORY.

16. The permanent Secretary-Treasurer of the Pastrycooks Union of Australia, Victorian Branch, shall have power to enter and inspect during working hours any part of a pastrycook's factory or workshop in which any work is being carried on. The Secretary-Treasurer of the Pastrycooks Union shall have the right to interview employees in regard to conditions of employment as the employer's convenience.

# MEAL TIME.

17. A meal break of not less than 30 minutes and not more than one hour shall be allowed after a period of four hours' and not more than five hours' continuous work. Such meal break shall not be calculated as time worked.

# REST PERIODS.

18. A rest period of ten minutes in the forenoon and ten minutes in the afternoon shall be given all female workers without any deduction from wages.

# FEMALE EMPLOYEES.

19. No female of any age shall be employed prior to 6 a.m.

# ·LAUNDERING ALLOWANCE.

20. Any employee required to wear overalls shall receive a laundering allowance of three shillings per week.

# ANNUAL HOLIDAYS.

21. The annual holiday shall be as prescribed by the provisions of the Factories and Shops (Annual Holidays) Act 1946 (No. 5111), and any amendments which may be made thereto from time to time.

# SICK LEAVE.

- 22. (a) Any employee who, having had at least three months' service with the same employer, is absent from duty as a result of personal ill health or accident shall be entitled to sick pay as follows:—
  - (i) During the first year—3½ hours' ordinary pay for each complete month of service; (ii) During any subsequent year of service—40 hours' ordinary pay.

Provided that in either case such employee produces or forwards within 24 hours' of the commencement of such absence evidence satisfactory to the employer that his or her non-attendance was due to personal ill health or accident necessitating such

(b) If the full period of sick leave as prescribed above is not taken in any year, such portion as is not taken shall be cumulative from year to year.

For the purposes of this sub-clause service prior to the 1st August, 1949, shall be disregarded, providing that any accumulated sick leave (not exceeding 80 hours of working time) standing to the credit of the employee on the 1st August, 1951, shall not be reduced by virtue of the provisions of this sub-clause.

# DETERMINATION TO BE EXHIBITED.

23. A copy of this Determination shall be posted or hung up in a place where it is easily accessible to the employees.

# DEFINITION.

24. "Ovenman" shall mean an employee responsible for the baking of all kinds of cakes and pastry.

# ALLOWANCES, ETC.

Double time shall be the rate payable to all employees for all work done on Sundays, New Year's Day, Australia Day, Labour Day, Good Friday, Easter Monday, Anzac Day, King's Birthday, Christmas Day, and Boxing Day, but if any other day be by Act of Parliament or Proclamation substituted for any of the above-named holidays, the special rate shall be payable for work done only on the day so substituted.

#### HOLIDAYS.

8. (a) All employees shall be entitled to the holidays hereinafter mentioned without deduction of pay:—New Year's Day, Australia Day, Labour Day, Good Friday, Easter Monday Anzac Day, King's Birthday, Christmas Day, and Boxing Day, but if any other day be by Act of Parliament or Proclamation substituted for any of the above-named holidays, this condition shall apply only to the day so substituted.

Provided that an employee shall not be entitled to pay for any of the above holidays if absent from employment without leave on the working day immediately preceding and/or following a holiday or group of holidays unless he or she produces to the employer a certificate of a legally qualified medical practitioner, or failing the production of such certificate, such other evidence as shall be satisfactory to the employer.

# TERMINATING EMPLOYMENT IN RELATION TO A HOLIDAY.

(b) Where the employer terminates the employment of an employee within fourteen days of a day on which a holiday occurs, and such employee is re-employed by the same employer within a period of fourteen days after such holiday, the employee shall be paid for such holiday or holidays prescribed by this Determination, provided that such employee has been employed by the same employer for a period of at least one month immediately prior to the termination of employment.

# MIXED FUNCTIONS.

9. On any day or shift any employee (other than a burner) required to perform work of a higher grade, shall be paid, whilst so employed, the wages attaching to such higher grade, provided that in the case of any such employee being required to perform the work of a higher grade for more than one half the number of hours fixed for a week's work he shall be paid at the higher rate for the whole of the week. In the case of any employee being required to perform the work of a lower grade than that to which he is classed, he shall not suffer any reduction of pay by reason only of his working temporarily out of his grade. Such work shall not be considered temporary if it continues for more than one week.

#### ANNUAL HOLIDAY,

10. The annual holiday shall be as prescribed by the provisions of the Factories and Shops (Annual Holidays) Act 1946, No. 5111, and any amendments which may be made thereto from time to time.

#### SICK LEAVE.

- 11. (a) Where an employee has been in the industry for a period of not less than three months immediately prior to his or her becoming disabled by personal ill health, proof of which sickness is given to the employer by the production of a certificate from a legally qualified Medical Practitioner, statutory declaration, or other satisfactory evidence, within 48 hours of the employee's consequential absence, he or she shall, on account thereof, be entitled without deduction of pay at ordinary rates, to absent himself or herself from work for a period not exceeding in the aggregate four days in any year of employment in the
- (b) For the purpose of administering sub-clause (a) hereof an employer may, within two weeks of the employee entering his employment, require such employee to make a sworn declaration or provide other satisfactory evidence as to what paid sick leave of absence he or she has had from any employer within the industry during the previous twelve months.
- (c) Notwithstanding anything contained in sub-clause (a) hereof, if the full period of sick leave as prescribed therein is not taken any year, such portion as is not taken shall, provided an employer remains in the service of the one employer or any successor of such employer, be cumulative from year to year up to a period not exceeding twenty days, which shall be the maximum amount of leave to which an employee may be entitled in any year of service without deduction of pay.
  - (d) For the purpose of administering sub-clause (c) hereof, service prior to the 1st July, 1943, shall be disregarded.

# MORNING TEA INTERVAL.

12. A morning tea interval of seven minutes shall be allowed employees each morning during ordinary working hours without deduction of pay, and such interval shall be arranged by the employer so as to avoid the necessity of a stoppage of operations in the establishment.

# TEA MONEY.

13. An allowance of 2s, for tea money, shall be made where work extends for more than two hours beyond the usual time of ending work.

Any such allowance shall be made prior to the meal interval on the day on which such overtime is worked.

# WET PLACES.

14. An employee who is required to work in water and/or slurry of two inches or more in depth shall be paid an additional 3d. per hour whilst so required to work.

# CRIB TIME.

15. A crib time not exceeding 30 minutes in a working shift of 8 hours shall be allowed clay hole men working underground in shaft or tunnel at a depth of 100 feet or over from the surface. Such crib time shall be counted as time worked.

# PAYMENT OF WAGES.

16. Except where otherwise mutually agreed between an employer and an employee wages due shall be paid before the usual finishing hour for the day, and not later than Friday in each week.

# DIRTY WORK.

17. Where an employee is engaged on work which the employer, or in his absence his accredited representative, agrees is of an unusually dirty or offensive nature, he shall be allowed reasonable time off during working hours to enable him to cleanse himself by means of a shower, or other washing facilities reasonably sufficient to accomplish such purpose.

# DEFINITION.

18. Burner's assistant is an employee (exclusive of a regular burner) who works with and assists a burner in the operation of burning a kiln.

# PIECEWORK WHICH MAY BE FIXED BY AN EMPLOYER.

19. The Board determines, under the provisions of Section 150 of the Factories and Shops Act 1928 (No. 3677), that any employer may fix and pay piecework prices to any person provided that any such employer shall base such piecework prices on the earnings of an average worker working under like conditions, and such piecework prices shall be fixed so that an average worker can earn not less than the wages rates that are fixed by the Board for such work.

#### FIRST-AID ROOM.

20. In any establishment with more than five employees the employer shall provide a cubicle or room for the sole purposes of treating injuries. Such cubicle or room shall be equipped with adequate first-aid facilities, and a stretcher.

Clause 8 of Chapter 9 of the Regulations under the Factories and Shops Act 1928 requires that a first-aid ambulance chest shall be kept in some accessible place upon the premises, and that such chest shall be equipped and supplied with the following articles: following articles :-

21. The wages rates for adult males set out in clause 2 are based upon the following basic wage, and, pursuant to the provisions of Section 21 of the Factories and Shops Act 1934, the Board hereby determines that such rates shall be automatically adjusted as prescribed by clause 22. Rasic Wage

# ADJUSTMENT OF BASIC WAGE.

- 22. (a) For the purposes of this Determination, the expression "Commonwealth Statistician's 'all items' retail price index numbers" or any like expression means the numbers stated to be such index numbers in any document purporting, and not proved to be wrongly so purporting, to be printed by the Commonwealth Government Printer or to be signed by or on behalf of the Commonwealth Statistician.
- (b) Until the beginning of the first pay period to commence in February, 1952, the amount of the basic wage shall be as prescribed in clause 25.
- (c) During each future successive period beginning with the first pay period to commence in a February, a May, an August, or a November, the amount of the basic wage shall be adjusted by the following method, namely, by multiplying last published Commonwealth Statistician's "all items" retail price index number by the factor 103 taken to one place of decimals, the resultant whole number being the amount of the basic wage expressed in shillings, but should the decimal number reach 5 or more the basic wage shall be taken to the next higher shilling.
- (d) The adjustable wages of apprentices or improvers shall be the appropriate percentages as set out in clause 2, such wages shall be calculated to the nearest 6d., half or less than half of 6d. to be disregarded.
