Prices Regulation Acts.

PRICES REGULATION ORDER No. 390.

SAFETY MATCHES.

IN pursuance of the powers conferred on me by the Prices Regulation Acts, I, John Francis Waldron, Prices Commissioner, hereby make the following Order:—

*Citation.*

1. This Order may be cited as Prices Regulation Order No. 390.

*Revocation.*

2. Prices Regulation Order No. 308 is hereby revoked.

*Definitions.*

3. In this Order, unless the contrary intention appears—  
"Geelong Area" means all that area of Victoria comprised within a radius of 5 miles from the principal Post Office at Geelong.  
"Metropolitan Area" means all that area of Victoria comprised within a radius of 25 miles from the General Post Office at Melbourne.

*Sales by Manufacturers.*

4. I fix and declare the maximum price at which safety matches may be sold by any manufacturer thereof or his agent to be the price fixed by me by notice in writing to such manufacturer or agent.

*Sales by Wholesale by Persons other than Manufacturers.*

5. I fix and declare the maximum price at which safety matches may be sold by wholesale by any person other than the manufacturer thereof or such manufacturer's agent to be 19s. 4d. per gross.

Provided that, where such safety matches are sold from stock purchased from the manufacturer thereof in "loose" gross packages, then the maximum price specified in the previous provisions of this paragraph shall be reduced to 19s. 3d. per gross.

Provided further that, where payment of the purchase price of such safety matches is made—

- (i) before delivery, on delivery, or not more than ten days from date of delivery, such maximum price shall be reduced by 3 per centum thereof;
- (ii) more than ten days after delivery, but not later than the last day of the calendar month following the month during which delivery is made, such maximum price shall be reduced by 2½ per centum thereof;
- (iii) at any time during the second calendar month following the calendar month during which delivery is made, such maximum price shall be reduced by 1½ per centum thereof.

6. The maximum prices fixed by the previous provisions of this Order for the sale of safety matches are maximum prices for the sale of safety matches inclusive of delivery as follows:—

- (a) Where the purchaser's place of business is situated in Geelong Area or Metropolitan Area—delivery "free into store";
- (b) Where the purchaser's place of business is not situated in Geelong Area or Metropolitan Area—delivery "free on rail" Geelong Area or Melbourne Area as the case may be.

7. I declare the maximum price at which safety matches may be sold by wholesale by any person other than a manufacturer or manufacturer's agent on any other terms of delivery than those specified in paragraphs 5 and 6 of this Order to be such price as is fixed by me by notice in writing to such person and until such notice in writing aforesaid is given the maximum price at which any safety matches shall be sold by wholesale by such person shall be 17s. 5d. per gross.

*Sales by Retail.*

8. I fix and declare the maximum prices at which safety matches may be sold by retail to be the prices specified in the Schedule to this Order.

*Maximum Prices—Sugar.*

4. (1) I fix and declare the maximum price at which sugar, raw, may be sold by retail in any of the areas specified in the First Schedule to this Order to be the price specified in the second column of that Schedule opposite to such area.

(2) I fix and declare the maximum price at which sugar 1A or brown may be sold by retail in any of the areas specified in the first column of the Second Schedule to this Order to be the price specified in the second column of that Schedule opposite to such area.

(3) I fix and declare the maximum price at which sugar, castor, may be sold by retail in any of the areas specified in the first column of the Third Schedule to this Order to be the price specified in the second column of that Schedule opposite to such area.

(4) I fix and declare the maximum price at which sugar, in coffee crystals and loaf, may be sold by retail in any of the areas specified in the first column of the Fourth Schedule to this Order to be the price specified in the second column of that Schedule opposite to such area.

*Exhibition of Price List.*

5. Every retailer who sells or has for sale by retail in Victoria any of the goods specified in the Schedules to this Order, the maximum price of which is fixed by or under the provisions of the Order, shall exhibit and keep exhibited in a prominent position in his place of business or, if he has more than one place of business, in each of his places of business and in such a manner as to be easily legible to persons contemplating making any purchase or conducting any business at his place or places of business, particulars of the maximum prices fixed by or under the provisions of this Order for the sale by him of those goods.

*Fixation of Maximum Prices by Notice.*

6. Notwithstanding the foregoing provisions of this Order, I declare the maximum price at which any goods, a maximum price for the sale of which is fixed by the foregoing provisions of this Order, and which is specified in a notice given in pursuance of this clause, may be sold in Victoria by any person to whom such notice is given to be such price as is fixed by the Commissioner by notice, in writing, to that person.

PRICES REGULATION ORDER No. 393.  
BREAD—VICTORIA.

IN pursuance of the powers conferred upon me by the Prices Regulation Acts, I, John Francis Waldron, Prices Commissioner, hereby make the following Order:—

*Citation.*

1. This Order may be cited as Prices Regulation Order No. 393.

*Revocation.*

2. Prices Regulation Order No. 339 is hereby revoked.

*Definitions.*

3. (1) In this Order, unless the contrary intention appears:—

“Bread” includes white, brown, wholemeal, barley, rye or Vienna bread, whether or not containing fat or malt or sugar or milk or any product or by-product of malt or sugar or milk and whether or not made in accordance with the requirements of the *Bakers and Millers Act 1928* and whether in the form of loaves, buns or of rolls.

“Starch reduced bread” means starch reduced bread known and sold under any of the following trade descriptions or brands:—“Borina,” “Bon Era,” “Broadway,” “Cenera,” “Ceralia,” “Conway,” “Denera,” “Dieteen,” “Eclipse,” “Glyx,” “Golden Rayceri,” “Maltine,” “New Era,” “New Way,” “New Process,” “Nucera,” “Nutrena,” “Nutty Loaf,” “Nu Vitera,” “Peerless,” “Procera,” “Progress,” “Pro-lita,” “Promax,” “Provena,” “Provita,” “Rath’s Milk Loaf,” “Reform,” “Semola,” “Sta-fresh,” “Tricerum,” “Vita Loaf,” “Vitin.”

“Metropolitan Area” means—

(i) the municipal districts of the municipalities of Box Hill, Brighton, Brunswick, Camberwell, Caulfield, Chelsea, Coburg, Collingwood, Dandenong, Essendon, Fitzroy, Footscray, Hawthorn, Heidelberg (but not including the Greensborough ward), Kew, Malvern, Melbourne, Moorabbin, Mordialloc, Northcote, Oakleigh, Port Melbourne, Prahran, Preston, Richmond, Sandringham, South Melbourne, St. Kilda, Sunshine, Williamstown; and

(ii) that part of the municipal district of the Shire of Mulgrave which lies west of Bayview-road; and

(iii) that part of the municipal district of the Shire of Broadmeadows which lies within the following boundaries:—Commencing at a point on the easterly boundary at its intersection with Jukes-road; thence westerly along Jukes-road to its intersection with Sydney-road; thence southerly along Sydney-road to its intersection with Hilton-street; thence westerly along Hilton-street and a line to the Melbourne–Seymour railway line; thence along such railway line to its intersection with the Broadmeadows–Albion railway line; thence south-westerly along such railway line to its intersection with Anselm-grove; thence along Anselm-grove westerly to its intersection with Augustine-terrace; thence along Augustine-terrace southerly to its intersection with the Broadmeadows–Albion railway line; thence along that railway line south-westerly to its intersection with the Bulla-road; thence south-easterly, easterly, northerly, easterly and northerly by the municipal boundary back to the commencing point; and

(iv) the Shire of Keilor south-east of the Broadmeadows–Albion railway; and

(v) that portion of the municipal district of the Shire of Werribee known as Altona bounded by the Melbourne–Geelong railway on the north, the Williamstown municipal boundary on the east, Port Phillip Bay on the south, and Maidstone-street and the Explosives Reserve on the west.

“Provincial cities” means the Cities of Ballarat, Bendigo and Geelong.

“Main towns” means—

(i) the Towns or Cities of Ararat, Bayswater, Benalla, Boronia, Camperdown, Castlemaine, Colac, Croydon, Echuca, Eltham, Epping, Frankston, Hamilton, Horsham, Kyneton, Maryborough, Mildura, Moe, Montmorency, Morwell, Nunawading, Ringwood, Seaford, Shepparton, St. Arnaud, Stawell, Swan Hill, Thomastown, Wangaratta, Warragul, Warrnambool, Wonthaggi, Yallourn; and

(ii) the Greensborough ward of the City of Heidelberg, and (to the extent that they are excluded from the Metropolitan Area) the municipal districts of the Shires of Broadmeadows, Doncaster and Templestowe, Kellor, Mulgrave and Werribee; but excludes the Shire of Mildura.

“Mountain towns” means the Towns of Buchan, Cann River, Corryong, Cudgewa, Eskdale, Icy Creek, Nayook, Noojee, Nowa Nowa, Omeo, Orbst, Swift’s Creek, Tanjil Bren, Tintaldra, Walwa and Woods Point.

“By wholesale” includes, in relation to any sale of bread, a sale by a retailer to a person to whom that retailer has, on the day of sale, sold a quantity of bread (including that comprised in such first-mentioned sale) totalling not less than 12 lb. of bread; and, for the purposes of this definition, Vienna bread shall be reckoned as 2 lb. for each 24-oz. loaf and bread rolls as weighing 2 oz. each.

“Booked sale” means, in relation to any sale of bread, that such sale is not a cash sale as defined in this clause.

“Cash sale” means, in relation to any sale of bread, a sale where payment is made by the purchaser for the bread within 30 days of the date of delivery of that bread.

“Midget loaf” means—

- (i) a Vienna loaf weighing less than 12 oz.; or
- (ii) a loaf of any other bread weighing less than 1 lb.

“Midget roll” means a roll or bun weighing less than 2 oz.

(2) Premises fronting on either side of any road or street which forms a boundary of any part of the Metropolitan Area shall be deemed to be within the Metropolitan Area.

*Maximum Prices.*

4. I fix and declare the maximum price at which bread specified in the Schedule to this Order may be sold in Victoria by any person to be the appropriate price specified in that Schedule.

*Fixation of Maximum Price by Notice.*

5. Notwithstanding the foregoing provisions of this Order, I declare the maximum price at which bread specified in a notice given in pursuance of this clause may be sold in Victoria by any person to whom such notice is given to be such price as is fixed by the Commissioner by notice in writing to that person.

For the purposes of this Schedule—

- (a) a loaf (not being a Vienna loaf) which weighs 1 lb. or more, but less than 2 lb., shall be deemed to be a 1-lb. loaf;
- (b) a Vienna loaf weighing less than 24 oz. shall be deemed to be a 1-lb. loaf and a Vienna loaf weighing 24 oz. or more shall be deemed to be a 2-lb. loaf;

  - (ii) ½d. per 2-lb. loaf.

IN pursuance of the powers conferred upon me by the Prices Regulation Acts, I, Thomas Gerard Gleeson, Acting Prices Commissioner, hereby make the following Order:—

Citation.

1. This Order may be cited as Prices Regulation Order No. 394.

Revocation.

2. Prices Regulation Order No. 249 is hereby revoked.

Definitions.

3. In this Order, unless the contrary intention appears—  
“Metropolitan Area” means all that area comprised within a radius of 20 miles from the General Post Office, Melbourne.

*Fixation of Maximum Prices and Rates.*

4. (1) I fix and declare the maximum price at which any fibrous plaster products specified in the First Schedule to this Order may be sold by any person to be the price specified in that Schedule.

(2) I fix and declare the maximum rate at which any service specified in the Second and Third Schedules to this Order may be supplied by any person to be the rate specified in those Schedules.

*Delivery of Invoices.*

5. Any person who sells any fibrous plaster products or supplies any service in connexion therewith shall deliver with those fibrous plaster products or on completion of the service in connexion therewith an invoice or docket specifying the following particulars:—

- (a) The name and address of the seller or supplier;
- (b) the name and address of the purchaser;
- (c) the address at which those fibrous plaster products are delivered or at which the service in connexion therewith is supplied;
- (d) the date of the sale of those fibrous plaster products or the supply of such service;
- (e) a full description of those fibrous plaster products including thickness or width or dimensions as the case may be;
- (f) the quantity of each thickness, width or dimension of fibrous plaster products sold or used;
- (g) full particulars of any service supplied in connexion with the fixing of fibrous plaster products, including total measurements charged for and the rate at which such measurements are charged;
- (h) full particulars of any service of cartage supplied in connexion with the sale or supply of fibrous plaster products, including the rate at which such service is supplied and the total amount charged therefor.

*Fixation of Maximum Prices or Rates by Notice.—Specified Persons.*

6. Notwithstanding the foregoing provisions of this Order, I declare the maximum price or rate at which any fibrous plaster products specified in a notice in writing given in pursuance of this clause or any service in connexion with the sale of those fibrous plaster products so specified may be sold or supplied by any person to whom such notice is given to be such price or rate as is fixed by the Commissioner by notice in writing to that person.
