### PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Governor of the State of Victoria and its Dependencies in the Commonwealth of Australia, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by the *Land Act 1928* it is amongst other things enacted that the Governor in Council, may, by Proclamation to be published in the *Government Gazette*, at any time diminish or increase the area of land comprised in any of the classes mentioned in Part I., Division 1, section 5, of the said *Land Act 1928*, but that the area of lands which may be sold by auction (Class 6) shall not be increased except as in certain cases in the said Act provided: Now therefore I, the Governor of the State of Victoria, in the Commonwealth of Australia, by and with the advice of the Executive Council of the said State, and in accordance with the provisions of sections 94 and 117 of the *Land Act 1928* aforesaid, do hereby diminish or increase (as the case may be) the areas of Crown lands comprised in Classes 2, 3, 6, 7 and 8 respectively of the classes mentioned in section 5 of the *Land Act 1928* aforesaid to the extent set forth in the subjoined Schedule (that is to say):—

MILK PASTEURIZATION ACT 1949.

PROCLAMATION

WHEREAS by section 3 of the *Milk Pasteurization Act* 1949 (No. 5444) it is provided that a day be fixed by Proclamation of the Governor in Council published in the *Government Gazette* in relation to a prescribed district: And whereas the municipal district of the City of Essendon has been prescribed as a district for the purposes of the said Act: Now therefore I, the Governor of the State of Victoria, by and with the advice of the Executive Council thereof, do by this my Proclamation fix Wednesday, the thirteenth day of February, 1952, as the day after which no person shall in the prescribed district of the City of Essendon—

HENLEY ON THE MARIBYRNONG.

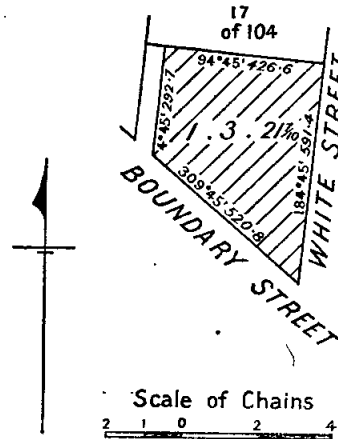

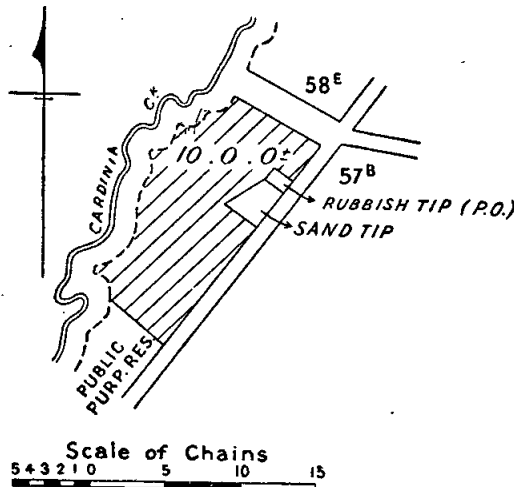

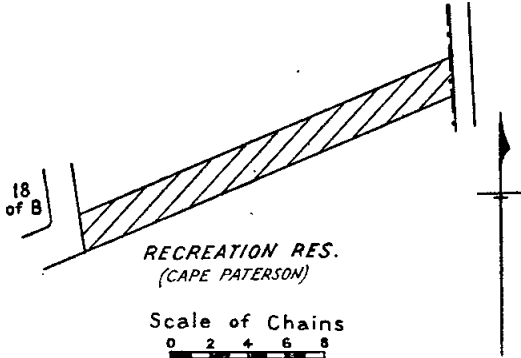

advice of the Executive Council of the said State, doth hereby approve of the application of the municipal council of the Shire of Bacchus Marsh for the constitution of the said Council as a local governing body, with full power and authority to construct and maintain waterworks and to take over from the State Rivers and Water Supply Commission all assets, liabilities, and properties in connexion with the Bacchus Marsh Urban Division within the Bacchus Marsh Irrigation and Water Supply District, subject to the provisions of the said Acts, and doth hereby order and direct as follows:—

1. That the Council of the municipality of the Shire of Bacchus Marsh shall be and the same is hereby constituted a local governing body with power to construct and maintain waterworks within the water supply district defined in the Schedule hereto.

2. That as on and from the 6th February, 1952, the said local governing body shall take over from the State Rivers and Water Supply Commission the service basin, main pipeline, and the reticulation works of the Bacchus Marsh Urban Division within the Bacchus Marsh Irrigation and Water Supply District, and for the purpose of supplying water by agreement, all existing extensions of such reticulation works outside the boundaries of such district.

3. That as on and from the 6th February, 1952, there shall be transferred in the books of the Treasury Department, Melbourne, from the said State Rivers and Water Supply Commission to the local governing body hereby constituted, the sum of Fourteen thousand eight hundred and seventy-six pounds thirteen shillings and nine pence (£14,876 13s. 9d), and the said local governing body shall be liable for the repayment of such sum and interest thereon, and shall in respect thereof make payments as required by the Water Acts.

4. That all the assets, liabilities, and properties of the State Rivers and Water Supply Commission in connexion with the Bacchus Marsh Urban Division within the Bacchus Marsh Irrigation and Water Supply District on the 6th February, 1952, shall be and do hereby become the assets, liabilities, and properties of such local governing body.

5. That the boundaries of such water supply district shall be those set out and described in the Schedule hereto.

6. That the name of such local governing body shall be Bacchus Marsh Shire Council.

**R**EGULATIONS made by the Council of the City of Melbourne, in pursuance of the provisions of section 6 of the *Police Offences Act 1928*, to amend the Regulations made by the Council on the 21st day of April, 1941, to amend and consolidate the Regulations made by the Council for the route to be observed by all carriages, carts, vehicles, and persons, and for keeping order in the carriage and footways and other public places and for preventing any obstruction thereof.

The Council of the City of Melbourne doth hereby, in pursuance of the powers conferred by the provisions of section 6 of the *Police Offences Act 1928* and by every other Act or power enabling it in that behalf, order as follows:—

1. These Regulations shall from and after the date of the same coming into operation be read and construed as one with the Regulations (hereinafter called "the Principal Regulations") made by the Council on the 21st day of April, 1941, intituled "Regulations made by the Council of the City of Melbourne, in pursuance of the provisions of section 6 of the *Police Offences Act 1928*, to amend and consolidate the Regulations made by the Council for the route to be observed by all carriages, carts, vehicles, and persons, and for keeping order in the carriage and footways and other public places, and for preventing any obstruction thereof" and any Regulations amending the same.

2. Clause 11 of the Principal Regulations is hereby repealed and the following clause is substituted therefor:—

"11. The driver of a vehicle (other than a tram car, or a vehicle standing in a parking area or a licensed motor car or hackney carriage standing on any stand duly fixed or appointed by the Council under any By-law) shall not leave such vehicle (whether unattended or not) standing except in obedience to the direction or signal of a member of the Police Force or officer of the Council or a traffic control signal—

(1) On any day at any time in any of the following places:—

- (a) within thirty feet of an intersection,
- (b) within thirty feet of any tramway notice "Cars Stop Here" or "Hail Cars Here,"
- (c) between a safety zone and the adjacent footway or within twenty feet of a point on the kerb immediately opposite either end of a safety zone,
- (d) within fifteen feet of a fire hydrant,
- (e) within fifteen feet of a postal pillar box,
- (f) within fifteen feet of a petrol pump erected on the kerb of any street, except whilst actually engaged in delivering or taking in petrol,
- (g) in front of a private driveway,
- (h) alongside or opposite any street excavation or obstruction.

(2) On any day at any time in any street in such manner or under such conditions as to leave less than ten feet of the width of the carriage way of such street available for the free movement of traffic or in such a position, notwithstanding that a greater width of carriageway than ten feet is so left, as to constitute an obstruction to traffic.

(3) On any day except Saturday and Sunday—

- (a) between the hours of 8.45 a.m. and 8 p.m. in the area bounded as follows, viz:  
On the south side of Flinders-street, on the west by the west side of Spencer-street, on the north by the north side of La Trobe-street, and on the east by the east side of Spring-street (hereinafter in this By-law referred to as the "prohibited area") except at the places and times and for the purposes hereinafter set out namely—

- (i) between the hours of 8.45 a.m. and 9.30 a.m. on the west side of Swanston-street between La Trobe-street and Flinders-street and the north side of Collins-street between Queen-street and a point opposite the western building alignment of Market-street whilst actually engaged in putting down or taking up passengers,

- (ii) between the hours of 4 p.m. and 6 p.m. on the north side of Flinders-street between Elizabeth-street and Russell-street whilst actually engaged in putting down or taking up passengers, and

- (iii) between the hours of 8.45 a.m. and 6 p.m. in any other place or at any other time in the prohibited area than those referred to in paragraphs (a) (i) and (ii) of this sub-clause whilst actually engaged in putting down or taking up passengers or (if such vehicle be a vehicle ordinarily used for the conveyance in the course of business of goods) whilst actually engaged in loading goods on to or unloading goods from such vehicle,

- (b) between the hours of 8.15 a.m. and 8.45 a.m. on the east side of Swanston-street between La Trobe-street and Flinders-street and between the hours of 8.15 a.m. and 6 p.m. on the east side of Swanston-street between Flinders-street and Batman-avenue except whilst actually engaged in putting down or taking up passengers or (if such vehicle be a vehicle ordinarily used for the conveyance in the course of business of goods) whilst actually engaged in loading goods on to or unloading goods from such vehicle,

- (c) between the hours of 8.15 a.m. and 8.45 a.m. on the west side of Swanston-street between La Trobe-street and Flinders-street and the north side of Collins-street between Queen-street and a point opposite the western building alignment of Market-street except whilst actually engaged in putting down or taking up passengers,

- (d) between the hours of 6 p.m. and 12 midnight in Swanston-street between La Trobe-street and Batman-avenue except whilst actually engaged in putting down or taking up passengers,

(4) On Saturdays—

- (a) between the hours of 9.15 a.m. and 12.30 p.m. on the east side of Swanston-street between La Trobe-street and Batman-avenue except whilst actually engaged in putting down or taking up passengers or (if such vehicle be a vehicle ordinarily used for the conveyance in the course of business of goods) whilst actually engaged in loading goods on to or unloading goods from such vehicle,

- (b) between the hours of 8.15 a.m. and 9.15 a.m. on the west side of Swanston-street between La Trobe-street and Flinders-street and the north side of Collins-street between Queen-street and a point opposite the western building alignment of Market-street except whilst actually engaged in putting down or taking up passengers,

- (c) between the hours of 9.15 a.m. and 12.30 p.m. on the west side of Swanston-street between La Trobe-street and Flinders-street except whilst actually engaged in putting down or taking up passengers or (if such vehicle be a vehicle ordinarily used for the conveyance in the course of business of goods) whilst actually engaged in loading goods on to or unloading goods from such vehicle,

- (d) between the hours of 11 a.m. and 1 p.m. in the prohibited area (excluding therefrom both sides of Swanston-street between La Trobe-street and Flinders-street and the north side of Flinders-street between Elizabeth-street and Russell-street) except whilst actually engaged in putting down or taking up passengers or (if such vehicle be a vehicle ordinarily used for the conveyance in the course of business of goods) whilst actually engaged in loading goods on to or unloading goods from such vehicle,

- (e) between the hours of 11 a.m. and 1 p.m. on the north side of Flinders-street between Elizabeth-street and Russell-street, except whilst actually engaged in putting down or taking up passengers,

- (f) between the hours of 11 a.m. and 12 midnight in Swanston-street between La Trobe-street and Batman-avenue except whilst actually engaged in putting down or taking up passengers,

(5) On any day between the hours of 8 a.m. and 10 a.m. on the west side of Punt-road between Alexandra-avenue and Toorak-road except whilst actually engaged in putting down or taking up passengers.

(6) On any day at any time in any street, but subject to the limitations with respect to specific days, times and places hereinbefore provided, except for a few minutes only.

DEATH OF HIS LATE MAJESTY KING GEORGE VI.

OFFICIAL intimation having been received by the Governor of the State of Victoria, in the Commonwealth of Australia, of the lamented death, yesterday, of His late Majesty King George VI., the Governor of the State, with the advice of the Executive Council thereof, has this day ordered and directed—

That the Union Jack and all other flags be forthwith hoisted half-mast high, from 8 a.m. and remain so hoisted until sunset and so on each succeeding day until and including the day of the Funeral, except on Friday, 8th February, the day of the Proclamation of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth the Second, when all flags will be hoisted at the masthead from 8 a.m. until sunset.

That all Civil Officers do go into Mourning, and all other subjects of Her Majesty the Queen, whose circumstances and situation enable them, are invited to put themselves into decent Mourning, and also to postpone until after the Funeral all festivities.

It is requested that the Colours on board the Ships in harbour be likewise displayed.

It is also requested that the Bells of the several Churches be tolled to-day and on each succeeding day until and including the day of the Funeral.

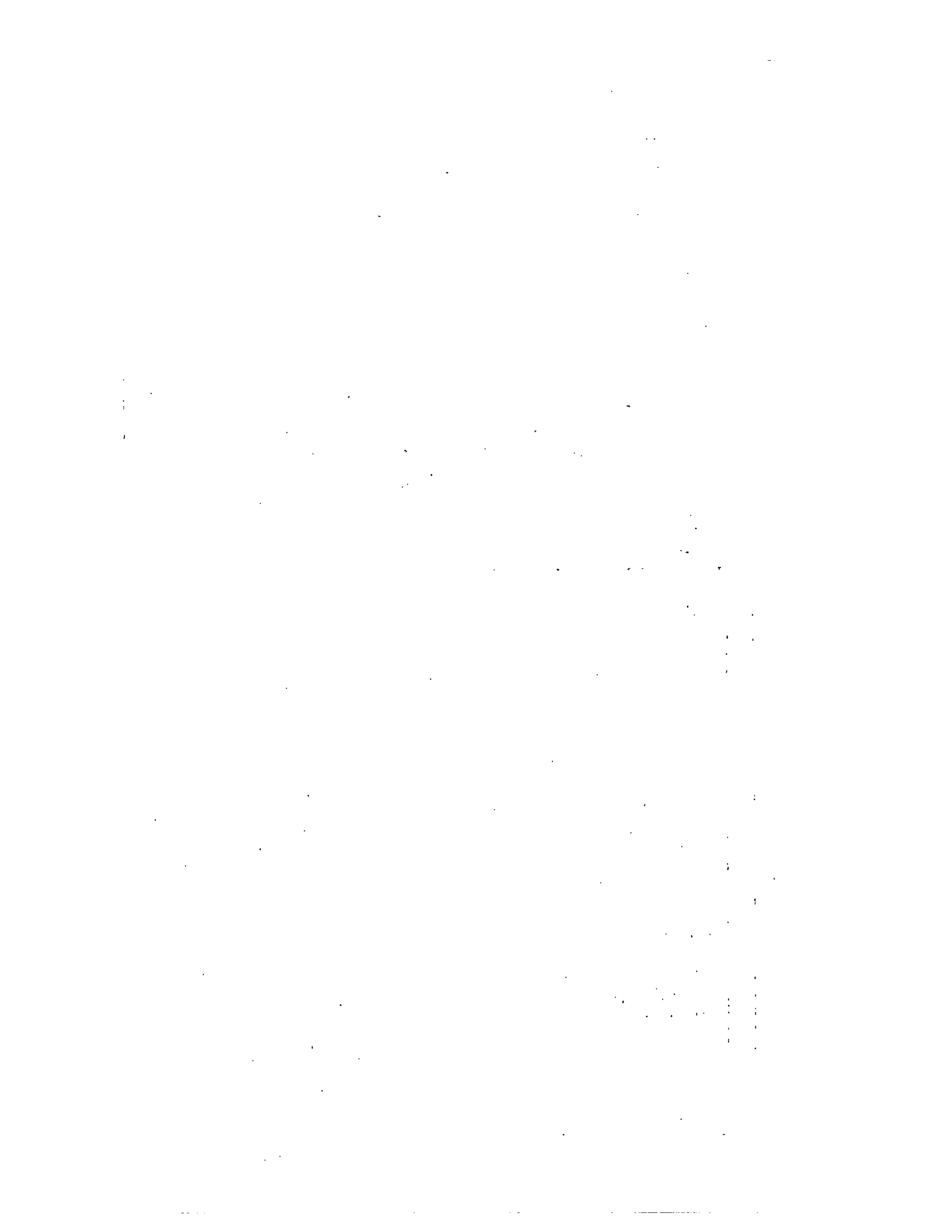

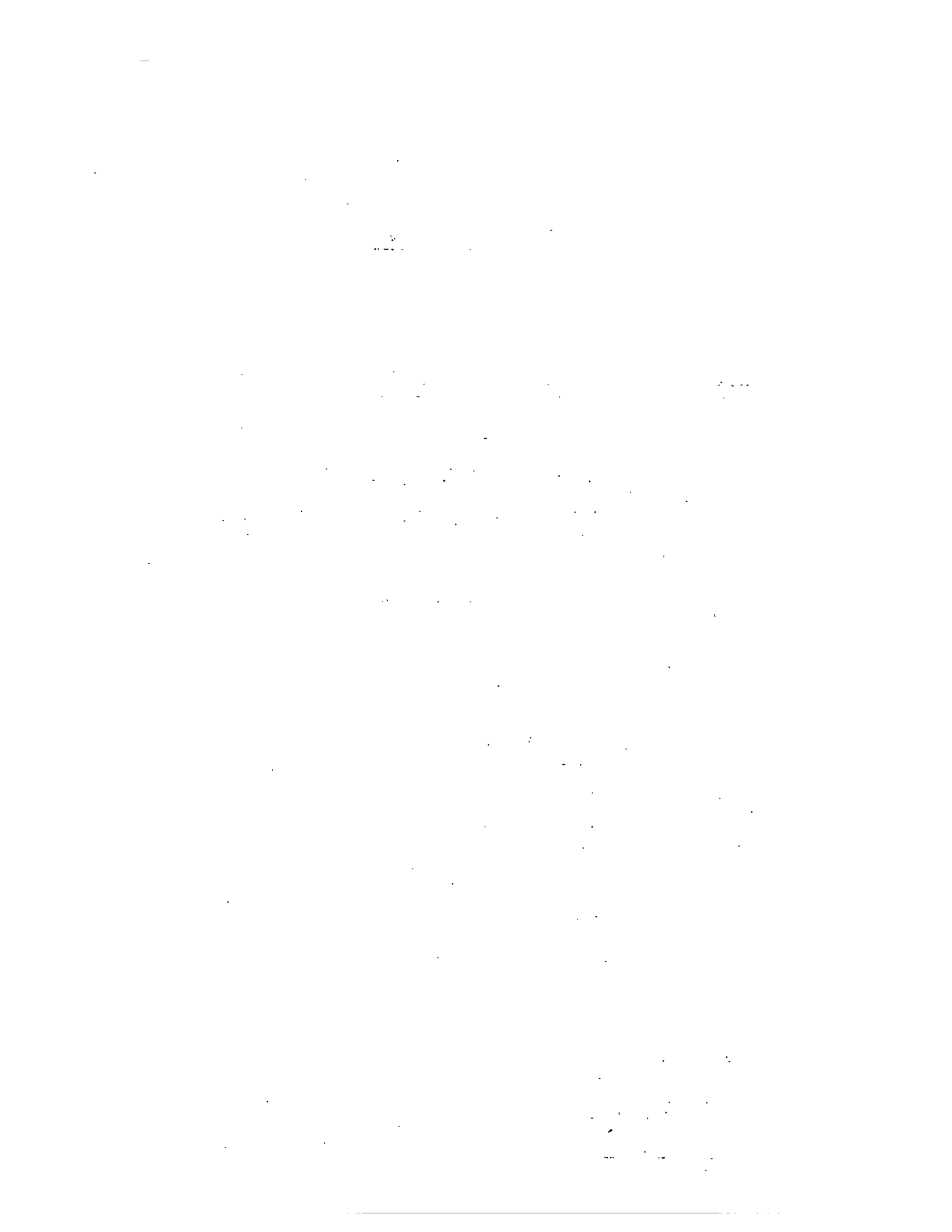

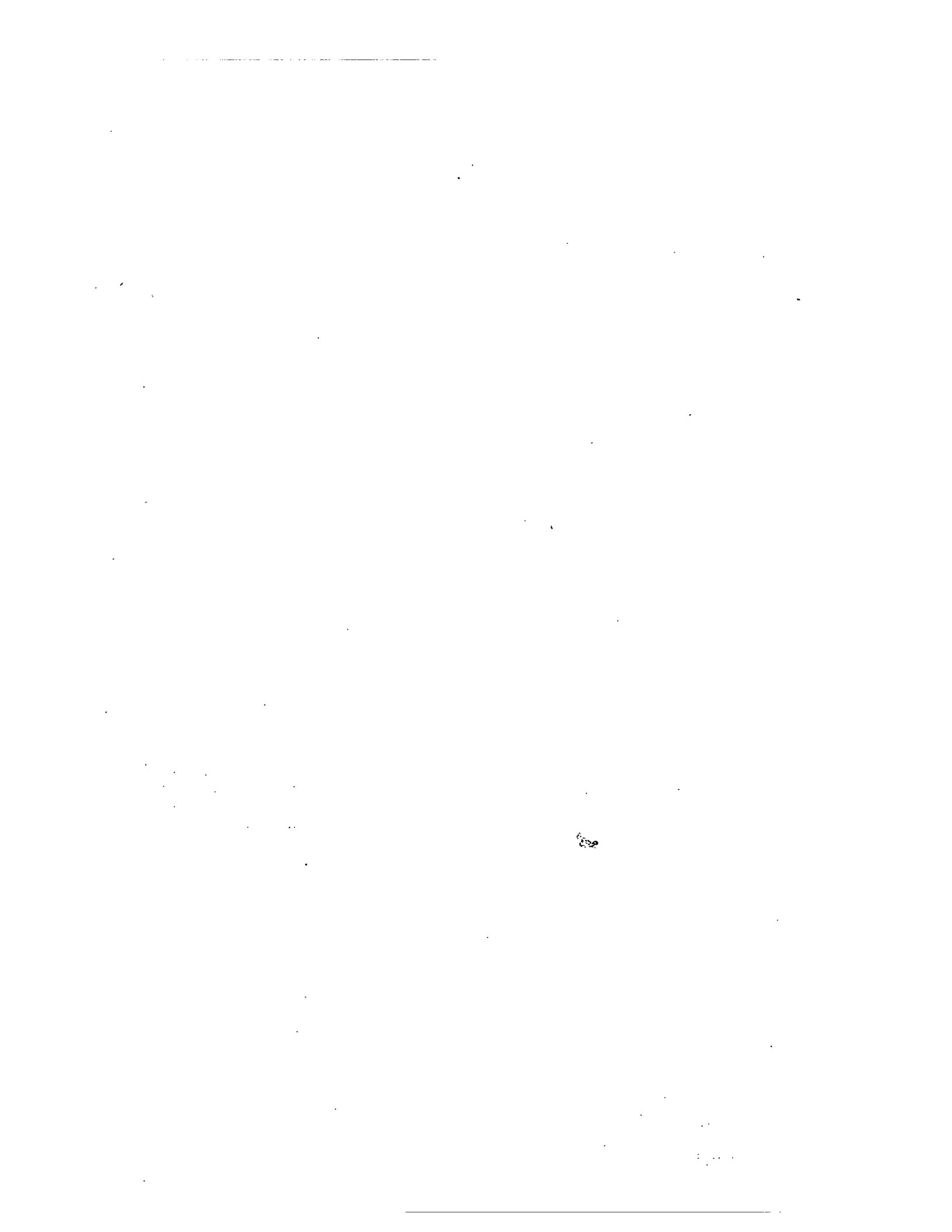
