ACTS OF PARLIAMENT.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Governor of the State of Victoria and its Dependencies in the Commonwealth of Australia, &c., &c., &c.

I, THE Governor of the State of Victoria, in the Commonwealth of Australia, do hereby declare that I have this day assented, in Her Majesty's name, to the Bills passed by the Parliament of the said State, the titles whereof are hereunder set forth, that is to say:—

No. 5650. "An Act to amend the Building Operations and Building Materials Control Acts."

No. 5651. "An Act to amend the Country Fire Authority Acts and for other purposes."

No. 5652. "An Act to amend the *Parliamentary Contributory Retirement Fund Act 1946*, and for other purposes."

No. 5653. "An Act to further amend the *Miners' Phthisis (Treasury Allowances) Act 1938*."

No. 5654. "An Act to incorporate the State Council of the Girl Guides Association, Victoria, Australia, to confer and impose upon that Body certain Powers Duties Rights and Liabilities, to provide for the vesting in that Body of certain Property, and for other purposes."

No. 5655. "An Act to apply out of the Consolidated Revenue the sum of Thirteen million nine hundred and fifty-four thousand six hundred and forty-five pounds to the service of the year One thousand nine hundred and fifty-two and One thousand nine hundred and fifty-three."

DATE OF COMING INTO OPERATION.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Governor of the State of Victoria and its Dependencies in the Commonwealth of Australia, &c., &c., &c.

RESTRICTIONS ON ELECTRICAL APPARATUS REGULATIONS.

Consent for Specified Apparatus or Appliances.

PURSUANT to the Restrictions on Electrical Apparatus Regulations, the Chief Electrical Inspector, Victoria, in exercise of the powers and authority conferred upon him, hereby consents to the installation, the connexion, and subject as hereunder set out, the use of the electrical elements of the apparatus or appliances referred to in the above-mentioned Regulations in the areas set out in the Schedule hereto, until further notice.

The consent herein referred to may be determined by at least one month's notice published in the *Government Gazette*.

This consent, so far as it relates to the use of elements, is given on the condition that all restrictions which may from time to time be imposed by virtue of or pursuant to the Restrictions on Use of Electricity Regulations, shall be observed in the use of such elements, and does not extend to the use of electricity in contravention of any such restrictions.

THE SCHEDULE ABOVE REFERRED TO.

The areas in which electricity is supplied by the Mayor, Councillors, and Citizens of the City of Mildura under the *Electric Light and Power Act 1928*.

SHIRE OF BACCHUS MARSH.

BACCHUS MARSH WATER SUPPLY.

Rating By-law for the Year ending 30th September, 1953.

THE Bacchus Marsh Shire Council, in pursuance and exercise of the powers conferred by the Water Acts, doth hereby make a rate for the supply of water for domestic purposes of Twenty-two pence in the pound on the annual municipal valuation of lands and tenements liable to be rated within the Bacchus Marsh Water Supply District.

Provided that in no case shall the amount of rate payable per annum in respect of any tenement (other than land on which there is no building) be less than Sixty shillings, and in respect of any land on which there is no building less than Fifteen shillings.

Such rates are made and shall be levied upon the occupiers or owners of the said lands and tenements for the year ending on the 30th day of September, 1953, and shall be payable on the 17th day of November, 1952, at the office of the said Council, Shire Hall, Bacchus Marsh.

The maximum quantity of water to be supplied in the said year without further charge to any property rated by the Council is hereby fixed at the quantity which, at a charge of Fifteen pence per 1,000 gallons, would produce an amount equal to the amount of rate levied on such property for the said year.

The charge for water supplied by measure to any property rated by the Council in excess of such maximum quantity, computed as in the last preceding clause, is hereby fixed at Fifteen pence per 1,000 gallons.

The charge for water supplied by measure to any property not rated by the Council is hereby fixed at Fifteen pence per 1,000 gallons, and the minimum quantity of water to be charged for in cases where water is so supplied is hereby fixed at 30,000 gallons.

The charge for water supplied by measure shall be payable, on demand, at the office of the Council.

The charge for a supply of water for watering gardens of unmetered tenements shall be at the rate of Ten shillings per square chain of garden, with a minimum annual charge of Ten shillings.

PETITION UNDER DRAINAGE AREAS ACT.

IN pursuance of the provisions of section 6 of the *Drainage Areas Act 1928* (as amended by the *Drainage Areas Act 1950*), the substance and prayer of a petition presented to His Excellency the Governor in Council, in accordance with section 4 of the said Act, are published, viz.:—

The petitioners purport to be a majority of the owners of at least half the land in the area described in their petition, such area being within the Parishes of Toora and Welshpool.

The petitioners pray that His Excellency the Governor in Council may be pleased to constitute the said area a drainage area within the meaning of the *Drainage Areas Act*.

A copy of such petition, together with a plan showing the proposed drainage area and a report by the Chief Engineer of the Public Works Department with regard thereto, has been lodged at the Shire Office, Foster, and will be open for inspection for a period of sixty (60) days from the 5th November, 1952, to the 3rd January, 1953.

A counter petition against the proposal may be forwarded to the Minister of Public Works, pursuant to the provisions of section 5 (5) of the *Drainage Areas Act 1928*, not later than the 31st January, 1953.

Notice to Boatmen and Others.

BOATMEN and others are hereby notified that permission has been granted to the Melbourne Amateur Regatta Association, in connexion with the Annual Regatta, to row races on the Henley Course on the Upper Yarra on the 22nd November, 1952, and that motor and other boats permitted to be on the river during the day must observe the following Regulations, viz.:—

Boat races must not be obstructed, nor public safety or order endangered.

Every motor boat must have a supply of dry sand with shovel or scoop, and carry—

(a) a bucket with rope attached; and
(b) an approved chemical fire extinguisher,
for fire extinguishing purposes, and no inflammable oil or spirit shall be exposed or transferred from one receptacle to another.

All non-competing boats must be kept off the course during the racing programme.

No boats (except racing boats) will be allowed to land or take up passengers at the boat stagings (south bank), or from the bank along the Henley Reserve except at the landing stage.

Passengers on any boat overcrowded or incompetently managed may be ordered to disembark.

No boat deemed by the River Officer or his Deputy to be too large or deemed to be offensive, dangerous, unsuitable, or unsightly shall remain on the river along the course or adjacent waters.

The direction of the officers in charge of the course must be strictly attended to.

All boats (except racing boats) must move up stream along the right hand (south) bank, and must move down stream along the opposite (north) bank.

No advertisement or objectionable device will be permitted to be shown on any boat.

No fireworks or firearms will be allowed to be discharged from any boat, except where permission of the River Officer or his Deputy has been given.

All motor boats shall hold a permit from the River Officer to enter or remain on that part of the River Yarra between Prince's-bridge and Como Park between the hours of 10 a.m. and 6 p.m. on Henley Day.

No motor or other boats will be allowed to ply for hire between Prince's-bridge and Como Park between the hours of 10 a.m. and 6 p.m. on Henley Day except under special permit from the Board.

All motor boats shall be moored in the positions allotted to them by 11 a.m., and shall remain moored until the finish of the racing programme.

All motor boats on south bank must moor bow up stream, and all motor boats on north bank must moor bow down stream.

An applicant for permit must apply at the office of the River Officer, 110 Spencer-street, Melbourne, and furnish the name and dimensions of the boat for which a permit is required; also the name and address of the owner, and of the person taking charge of the boat on Henley Day. If the boat is unnamed, some identification number must be affixed to each bow of the boat.

No permit shall be given to a motor boat exceeding a length of 35 feet from stem to stern, or with a beam exceeding 9 feet over all, unless the River Officer shall see fit to do so. It is recommended that row boats be in attendance on large motor boats for transporting passengers, also that a gangway be provided for each motor boat to enable passengers to reach the bank.

No permit shall be given for boats burning other than liquid fuel.

A permit shall not be transferable by the holder or in respect of motor boats.

A limited number of moorings will be available along the Henley Reserve landing stage, and early application to the River Officer for same is invited. An applicant must give name and dimensions of boat, and must provide his own mooring ropes. Pegs will be supplied.

Acceptance of a permit shall be a guarantee that its holder and the boat it is issued for will observe the regulations, whether general or special.

Motor boats not moored along the Henley Reserve landing stage must use the mooring pegs provided on the north or south side of the river, and must moor at post bearing same number as shown on permit.

Mooring or holding on to the booms or buoys will be strictly forbidden.

After sunset on Henley Day motor boats shall exhibit a red light and go slow in the centre of the river only. Motor boats shall not tow any boat.

On Henley Day the length of oars used by any boat, other than racing boats, between Como Park and Prince's-bridge shall not exceed 8 feet.

The use of paddles as a means of propulsion for rowing boats is preferred.

Boats over 25 feet in length, or boats with jibbooms or other objectionable projections, will not be permitted on the Yarra between Prince's-bridge and Como Park between the hours of 10 a.m. and 6 p.m. on Henley Day.

Rowing boats and canoes shall exhibit a white light after sunset on Henley Day.

All boats must give way to racing boats going up stream to the start of the course.

STATE RIVERS AND WATER SUPPLY COMMISSION.

BY-LAW No. 4734.—FOR THE SALE AND DISTRIBUTION OF WATER FOR IRRIGATION—RED CLIFFS—MERBEIN IRRIGATION AND WATER SUPPLY DISTRICT.

THE State Rivers and Water Supply Commission, in pursuance and exercise of the powers conferred by the Water Acts, doth hereby make the By-law following:—

1. This By-law shall apply to and have force in Red Cliffs-Merbein Irrigation and Water Supply District.

2. All previous By-laws and Regulations relating to the subject matter herein shall be and the same are hereby revoked; but not so as to relieve, discharge, or absolve any person from liability to pay any rate or charge made in accordance with the provisions of the revoked By-laws or Regulations for payment of which rate or charge such person may have become liable prior to or at the date of this By-law coming into operation; or to abrogate or diminish the power of the Commission to recover and enforce payment of any such rate or charge; or to annul or stay any proceedings taken or business initiated, as in conformity with the provisions of the By-laws or Regulations hereby revoked, prior to the date of this By-law coming into operation, but the same respectively may be continued and carried to completion.

3. All water supplied for irrigation from the works of the Commission shall be paid for by measure; all gauges or appliances for measurement shall be of a form and pattern approved by the Commission; and shall be installed under the supervision of the Commission; and all quantities of water supplied shall be recorded by the water bailiff or such other officer as may be appointed by the Commission for that purpose.

4. In the absence of any specific means of measurement the quantity of water supplied shall be ascertained by accounting a watering as being a volume of water 6 inches in depth over any area watered, and for the purposes of this By-law and any By-law making an irrigation charge a watering shall mean the application of water to land for the purpose of irrigation, and a watering shall be and is hereby deemed to be a volume of water 6 inches in depth over any area watered.

5. An acre-foot of water shall be and is for the purposes of this By-law and any By-law making an irrigation charge deemed to be such quantity of water as would cover an area of 1 acre to a depth of 1 foot.

6. The charge for the supply of water under water rights for irrigation of lands to which water rights have been apportioned, during the period beginning with the first day of August in every year and ending with the fifteenth day of May in each succeeding year (which period is hereinafter called the "irrigation season") shall be as set out in the By-law making the irrigation charge for such period.

7. The charge for water supplied for irrigation other than that under water rights during any irrigation season after the making of the By-law fixing the irrigation charge for that season shall be—

- (a) in respect of water supplied during ordinary watering periods for the delivery of water under water rights—at the same rate of payment per unit of volume as that in respect of water apportioned as water rights for that irrigation season; or
- (b) in respect of water supplied during periods other than ordinary watering periods for the delivery of water under water rights—at the rate of one and one-half times the charge per unit of volume in respect of water apportioned as water rights for that irrigation season.

8. The charge for water supplied for irrigation other than that under water rights during the period from the sixteenth day of May in every year, to the date of making of the By-law fixing the irrigation charge for the next ensuing season shall be—

- (a) in respect of water supplied during ordinary watering periods for the delivery of water under water rights—at the same rate of payment per unit of volume as that in respect of water apportioned as water rights for the irrigation season immediately preceding; or
- (b) in respect of water supplied during periods other than ordinary watering periods for the delivery of water under water rights—at the rate of one and one-half times the charge per unit of volume in respect of water apportioned as water rights for the irrigation season immediately preceding.

9. Applications for the supply of water for irrigation shall be made in writing to the water bailiff in charge of that portion of the district in which the land to be irrigated is situated, or to such other officer as may be authorized by the Commission to receive applications.

10. Charges for water supplied for irrigation, other than water supplied under a water right, shall be payable on demand at the office of the Commission at Red Cliffs or Merbein.

11. Such person or persons as the Commission may from time to time appoint for that purpose shall be and is or are hereby authorized to demand, receive, collect, and recover the said charges.

12. All persons taking water from the works of the Commission shall take delivery thereof through such outlets, at such times, in such order, and in such manner as the Commission or its authorized officers may direct; any person who wrongfully takes water from any such works shall be guilty of an offence.

13. The outlets for the delivery of water shall be operated only by the water bailiffs of the district, or such other officers as may be authorized by the Commission; any person not so authorized who interferes with the flow of water in any channel or with any works of the Commission, or with any registering appliance in connexion therewith, shall be guilty of an offence.

14. Any person guilty of an offence against this By-law shall be liable to the penalty provided in the Water Acts. Such penalty shall be recoverable summarily before any court of competent jurisdiction.

The foregoing By-law was made by the State Rivers and Water Supply Commission on the 22nd day of September, 1952, and the common seal of the said Commission was hereunto affixed the 28th day of October, 1952, in the presence of—

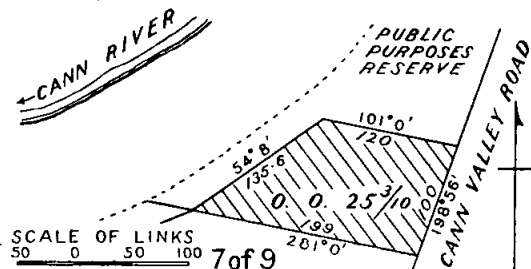

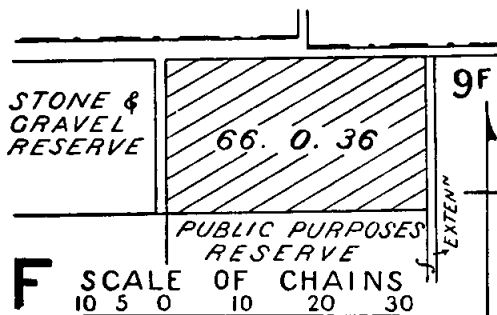

REGULATIONS FOR THE CARE, PROTECTION,
AND MANAGEMENT OF THE "WESTERN BAY
RESERVE," AT COLAC.

WHEREAS by section 181 of the *Land Act* 1928, as re-enacted by section 9 of the *Land Act* 1941, power is given to the Board of Land and Works to make Regulations in respect of the care, protection, and management of any Crown land which has been reserved under the *Land Acts* for any public purposes whatsoever and which has not been conveyed to or vested in trustees, and for the further purposes as enacted: Now therefore the Board of Land and Works, in pursuance of the powers conferred as aforesaid, doth hereby make the following Regulations in respect of the areas in the Town of Colac temporarily reserved as sites for Public Park and Public Recreation by Orders in Council dated the 13th November, 1947, and 10th April, 1951, and together known as the "Western Bay Reserve," hereinafter referred to as the "Reserve."

REGULATIONS.

1. The Reserve shall be open to the public, free of charge, from sunrise to sunset, except on such occasions, not exceeding twenty-six (26) in any one year, as the Reserve may be set apart for cricket, football, or other matches, shows, sports, fêtes, musical performances, outdoor gatherings, or holiday amusements, on any of which

occasions fees may be charged and taken for admission of persons and vehicles to the Reserve, as hereinafter provided.

2. The Committee of Management shall have power to let any portion of the Reserve to any club, association, person, or society for the purpose of holding entertainments, performances, shows, or sports, subject to the payment of such fees and on such terms as it may deem to be reasonable and consistent with these Regulations, and to authorize any club, association, society, or person to make a charge for admission thereto, as hereinafter provided in these Regulations.

3. The fees which may be charged and taken for admission to the Reserve, and to any buildings, erections, or enclosures for the time being thereon, on any occasion on which it is set apart for cricket, football, or other matches, shows, sports, fêtes, musical performances, outdoor gatherings, or holiday amusements as hereinbefore provided, shall be as follows:—

- (a) For admission of each adult person, a sum not exceeding Five shillings (5s.).
- (b) For admission of each motor car, motor cycle, or other vehicle, a sum not exceeding Two shillings (2s.).

Provided, however, that the Committee of Management may at any time and at its discretion refuse to admit to the Reserve any motor car, motor cycle, or other vehicle.

4. No person shall in the Reserve take part in any football or cricket match, entertainment, amusement, or meeting whatsoever without the written permission of the Committee of Management.

5. The Committee of Management shall have power to hold sports, entertainments, shows, performances, or ceremonies on the Reserve, and to make a charge for admission thereto as hereinbefore provided.

6. No person shall—

- (a) enter or remain in the Reserve who may offend against decency as regards dress, language, or conduct, or who may behave in a disorderly, unseemly, or offensive manner, or create or take part in any disturbance;
- (b) enter or remain in the Reserve whilst in a state of intoxication;
- (c) use indecent or offensive language in the Reserve;
- (d) bring any intoxicating liquor onto the Reserve without the consent of the Committee of Management first obtained;
- (e) exercise or train any horse or pony on the Reserve, or any part thereof, without the consent of the Committee of Management first obtained.

7. No club, association, society, or person shall hold any sport, entertainment, performance, show, or ceremony on any part of the Reserve without the authority of the Committee of Management first obtained.

8. No person, except the Committee of Management or its officers or employees on duty, shall enter any part of the Reserve on an occasion when a charge is made for admission thereto without first paying the fees chargeable for such admission.

9. No person shall park a motor car, vehicle, or motor cycle in the Reserve, except at such places as are set apart for the purpose by the Committee of Management.

10. No person shall spit or expectorate on the footpaths or on any structure, building, or erection in the Reserve.

11. No person shall damage in any way the footpaths, water pipes, drinking taps, tools, appliances, seats, buildings, fences, walls, or erections, trees, shrubs, or flowers in the Reserve, nor shall fires be lighted therein, without the written permission of the Committee of Management.

12. No person shall in the Reserve—

- (a) climb or jump over or upon the fences, gates, buildings, or trees;
- (b) place any bill, placard, pamphlet, or paper on or write or paint on or otherwise deface any gate, fence, structure, building, seat, wall, or tree;
- (c) distribute or give out to any person or persons, or scatter about or throw down hand bills, placards, notices, advertisements, books, pamphlets, papers, or like matter without the permission of the Committee of Management first obtained;
- (d) throw, place, or leave therein any glass, filth, dirt, paper, rubbish, or like matter;
- (e) roll, throw, or discharge any stone or other missile;
- (f) interfere with or in any way damage any notice, placard, sign, or regulation.

13. No person shall camp on the Reserve or erect thereon any building or any other structure without the consent of the Committee of Management first obtained.

14. No person shall put in the Reserve any cattle, horses, sheep, or other animals without the permission of the Committee of Management first obtained.

15. No person shall, without the authority of the Committee of Management, enter upon any portion of the Reserve set apart for cricket, football, or other games or sports during such time as such portion may be required or used for the purpose for which it has been so set apart, nor shall any person enter upon any portion of the Reserve set apart for tennis, croquet, bowls, or any like game, unless such person has authority from the Committee of Management so to do.

16. Any person renting or hiring the Reserve for any approved purpose and making a charge for admission of persons and vehicles thereto shall pay to the Committee of Management such amount as the Committee of Management shall deem to be fair and reasonable.

17. The Committee of Management may set apart any portion of the Reserve for any lawful game or sport and may from time to time grant to any club or combination of clubs the use of such portion so set apart upon such terms and conditions as the Committee of Management may consider reasonable and consistent with these Regulations and with the terms of the Reservation.

18. When any portion of the Reserve has been set apart as provided in Regulation No. 17, and the use of such portion has been granted to any club or combination of clubs, the bona fide members of such club or combination of clubs may have access to such portion at any time, free of charge, but under such conditions and reservations as may be imposed by the Committee of Management from time to time.

19. No person shall wilfully obstruct, interrupt, or annoy any other person in the proper and lawful use of the Reserve, or any part thereof, nor wilfully obstruct or interrupt any servant of the Committee of Management or any person appointed by it in the execution of anything for which such servant or person appointed by it is respectively empowered or required to do by the Committee of Management.

20. No person shall offer for sale within the Reserve any article or articles without the permission, in writing, of the Committee of Management first obtained.

21. The Committee of Management may set apart a portion of the Reserve as and for the purpose of a children's playground.

22. The children's playground shall be open daily from Eight o'clock a.m. until half an hour after sunset.

23. No person above the age of fourteen years shall enter upon the children's playground or use any of the swings or other appliances erected thereon; provided, however, that parents or others in charge of children shall be at liberty to enter upon the children's playground to watch over children who are in their charge.

24. Any person found within the children's playground, except during the hours the same is open to the public, shall be guilty of an offence against these Regulations.

25. The swings or other appliances erected in the children's playground shall not be used by the same child or children for a longer period than five minutes if any other child or children is or are waiting to use them.

26. No child shall use any of the swings or other appliances in the children's playground except for the purposes for which they are respectively provided.

27. Every person in the children's playground shall obey the lawful directions of any officer of the Committee of Management in respect of his or her conduct therein.

28. The Committee of Management shall not be responsible for any accident arising from the use of any of the swings or other appliances in the children's playground.

29. No person shall be permitted to bring any animal into the children's playground.

30. No person shall ride or drive any bicycle on any part of the children's playground.

31. Any bailiff of Crown lands, member of the Police Force, or duly appointed officer or servant of the Committee of Management shall have the right (in addition to any other penalty provided under these Regulations) to remove or exclude from the children's playground any person who commits a breach of these Regulations, or who wilfully damages any of the swings or other appliances or property in the children's playground.

Every person who contravenes or fails to comply with these Regulations shall, in accordance with the provision of section 181 of the *Land Act* 1928, as re-enacted by section 9 of the *Land Act* 1941, for each offence be liable to a penalty of not more than Five pounds (£5), and every person who contravenes or fails to comply with any such Regulation, and who, after he has been warned by any bailiff of Crown lands or by any member of the Police Force, does not desist therefrom, may be forthwith apprehended by such bailiff or member of the Police Force and taken before some justice to be dealt with according to law, and shall be liable to a penalty of not more than Ten pounds (£10).

NOTE.—This Determination applies to the whole of the State of Victoria.

IN accordance with the provisions of the Factories and Shops Acts, the Wages Board appointed "to determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any persons (other than persons under the jurisdiction of the Fibrous Plasterers Board) employed in the trade of making portable articles of cement or concrete," has made the following Determination, namely:—

1. That as from the beginning of the first pay period to commence on or after the 11th October, 1952, the last previous Determination of this Board shall be revoked and replaced by this Determination.

Apprentices and improvers operating a cement sprayer shall be paid 1s. 6d. per week extra in addition to the prescribed rate.

NOTE.—"Renderer" means a skilled employee facing concrete articles with float and trowel.

ALLOWANCES.

3. The following allowances in addition to the rates provided in clause 2 (b) shall be paid :—
- (a) Lumpers of cement or concrete articles (in and out of tanks) 3d. per hour in respect of such time actually spent in tanks containing water.
 - (b) For work done away from the employer's place of business—
 - (i) The fares, exceeding 3d. per day, necessarily expended in going from and to the employee's residence to and from his work.
 - (ii) For work done at a distance from the employer's place of business if the employee is unable to return to his home the same night and the employer does not provide board and lodging, 12s. 9d. per day extra for the first seven days, and thereafter 5s. 6d. per week extra.
 - (c) A "Leading hand" is one who is directed to control, supervise, and take responsibility for the work performed by two or more employees.
He shall, for the time so engaged, be paid the rate prescribed for the highest class of work so supervised with the following additions :—
 - (i) where the number of such employees does not exceed five, 9d. a day ;
 - (ii) where the number of such employees exceeds five, 1s. 6d. a day.
 - (d) Boot allowance—
Persons operating mixers and/or pipe spinning machines, strippers, assemblers, oilers, and/or moulders of concrete products, 2s. 6d. per week.

SHIFTS.

6. Where a person is employed on shift work outside the hours of beginning and ending work he shall for each hour while so employed be paid 3d. an hour in addition to above rates.
A shift/worker called upon to work overtime in excess of ordinary shift hours shall receive overtime at the rate set out in clause 5.

MIXED FUNCTIONS.

7. An employee engaged for not less than half of one day or shift on duties carrying a higher rate than his ordinary classification shall be paid the higher rate for such day or shift. If for less than half of one day or shift he shall be paid the higher rate for the time so worked.

SPECIAL RATES.

8. Double time shall be the rate payable for all work done on Sundays, New Year's Day, Australia Day, Good Friday, Easter Monday, Labour Day, Queen's Birthday, Christmas Day, or Boxing Day; but if any other day be by Act of Parliament or proclamation substituted for any of the above-named holidays, the special rate shall be payable only for work done on the day so substituted.

CONTRACT OF EMPLOYMENT.

Weekly Employment.

9. (a) Except as hereinafter provided employment shall be by the week.
(b) Employment shall be terminated by two clear days' notice on either side given at any time during the week or by the payment or forfeiture of two days' wages as the case may be. This shall not affect the right of the employer to dismiss an employee without notice for malingering, inefficiency, neglect of duty or misconduct, and in such cases the wages shall be paid up to the time of dismissal only, or to deduct payment for any day the employee cannot be usefully employed because of any strike or through any breakdown in machinery or any stoppage of work by any cause for which the employer cannot reasonably be held responsible.
(c) An employee not attending for duty shall except as provided by clause 10 of this Determination lose his pay for the actual time of such non-attendance.
Any employer may require any employee to work reasonable overtime at overtime rates and the employee shall work such overtime in accordance with such requirement.
(d) To obtain the benefit of weekly employment an employee must be ready, available, and willing to work on the days, and during the hours prescribed for an ordinary day's work less only prescribed or agreed upon remissions. *Pro rata* reductions of pay may be made for unauthorized omissions.

Casual Employment.

- (e) Any person employed other than on terms of weekly employment shall be paid 10 per centum in addition to the appropriate rate prescribed in clause 2.

SICK LEAVE.

10. (a) An employee on weekly hiring who is absent from his work on account of personal illness, or on account of injury, by accident arising out of and in the course of his employment, shall be entitled to leave of absence, without deduction of pay, subject to the following conditions and limitations :—
- (i) He shall not be entitled to paid leave of absence for any period in respect of which he is entitled to worker's compensation.
 - (ii) He shall, within 24 hours of the commencement of such absence, inform the employer of his inability to attend for duty and, as far as practicable, state the nature of the injury or illness, and the estimated duration of the absence.
 - (iii) He shall prove to the satisfaction of his employer that he was unable on account of such illness or injury to attend for duty on the day or days for which sick leave is claimed.
 - (iv) He shall not be entitled in his first year or service with any employer to sick leave in excess of 3½ hours of working time for each completed month of service.
 - (v) He shall not be entitled in any subsequent year to leave in excess of 40 hours of working time.
- (b) Notwithstanding anything contained in sub-clause (a) hereof, if the full period of sick leave as prescribed above is not taken in any year, such portion as is not taken shall be cumulative from year to year up to a period not exceeding 120 hours of working time, which shall be the maximum amount of leave to which an employee may be entitled in any year of service without deduction of pay.

HOLIDAYS.

11. All employees (other than casuals) shall be entitled to the holidays hereinafter mentioned without deduction of pay:—New Year's Day, Australia Day, Labour Day, Good Friday, Easter Monday, Anzac Day, Queen's Birthday, Christmas Day, and Boxing Day.

Should the 25th December, in any year occur on a Saturday or a Sunday the following Monday and Tuesday shall, for the purposes of this Determination, be deemed to be Christmas Day and Boxing Day respectively. Likewise should the 1st January, in any year occur on a Saturday or a Sunday the following Monday shall be deemed to be New Year's Day.

Provided that an employee shall not be entitled to pay for any of the above holidays if absent from employment without leave on the working day immediately preceding and/or following a holiday or group of holidays unless he or she produces to the employer a certificate of a legally qualified medical practitioner, or failing the production of such certificate, such other evidence as shall be satisfactory to the employer.

ANNUAL HOLIDAY.

12. The annual holiday shall be as prescribed by the provisions of the *Factories and Shops (Annual Holidays) Act 1946*, No. 5111, and any amendments which may be made thereto from time to time.

TEA MONEY.

13. An allowance of 4s. for tea money shall be made where work extends for more than two hours beyond the usual time of ending work provided the employer has not given notice the day before of intention to work overtime.

TOOLS, SPECIAL BOOTS, OVERALLS, ETC.

14. The employer shall supply the employee with all requisite tools and gloves for the performance of his duties, and when the employee is called upon to work in water he shall be provided with suitable boots or waders.

Where a man's place of work is outside the factory buildings and he is required to carry on such work in the rain, his employer shall furnish him with a waterproof overcoat whilst so employed.

An employee required to wear overalls or protective clothing in connexion with his work shall be paid the sum of 2s. 6d. per week whilst he is required to do so.

PAYMENT OF WAGES.

15. Wages shall be paid during working hours.

HEALTH PROVISIONS.

16. The employer shall provide and maintain in a satisfactory state—

- (a) proper latrine services;
- (b) suitable change house accommodation with provision for drying clothes;
- (c) suitable accommodation for employees to have their meals and, where the number of employees exceeds twenty, such accommodation shall be partitioned off or otherwise separated from the change house.

REST PERIOD.

17. All employees shall be allowed two rest intervals on each day as follows:—The first of five minutes to be allowed between the hours of 9.30 a.m. and 10 a.m., and the second of five minutes to be allowed between the hours of 2.30 p.m. and 3 p.m., or at such other times as may be agreed upon between the employer and the majority of the employees concerned. Such intervals are to be counted as time worked.

RIGHT OF ENTRY OF UNION OFFICIALS.

18. For the purpose of interviewing employees on legitimate union business, a duly accredited representative of the Australian Workers' Union shall have the right to enter, during the midday meal hour, the portion of any employer's establishment in which any of the classes of labour covered by this Determination are employed.

If any representative is unduly interfering with, or is creating disaffection amongst his employees, or is offensive in his methods, such employer may refuse the right of entry.

PERIODICAL ADJUSTMENT OF WAGES.

19. The wages rates for adults set out in clause 2 are based upon the following basic wage, and, pursuant to the provisions of Section 21 of the *Factories and Shops Act 1934*, the Board hereby determines that such rates shall be automatically adjusted by the same amount and at the same time as such basic wage as prescribed by clause 20.

ADJUSTMENT OF BASIC WAGE.

20. (a) For the purposes of this Determination the expression "Commonwealth Statistician's 'all items' retail price index numbers" or any like expression means the numbers stated to be such index numbers in any document purporting, and not proved to be wrongly so purporting, to be printed by the Commonwealth Government Printer or to be signed by or on behalf of the Commonwealth Statistician.

(b) Until the beginning of the first pay period to commence in November, 1952, the amount of the basic wage shall be as prescribed in clause 19.

(c) During each future successive period beginning with the first pay period to commence in a November, a February, a May, or an August, the amount of the basic wage shall be adjusted by the following method, namely, by multiplying the last published Commonwealth Statistician's "all items" retail price index number by the factor .103 taken to one place of decimals, the resultant whole number being the amount of the basic wage expressed in shillings, but should the decimal number reach .5 or more the basic wage shall be taken to the next higher shilling.

(d) The adjustable wages of Apprentices and Improvers shall be the appropriate percentages as set out in clause 2, such wages shall be calculated to the nearest 6d., half or less than half of 6d. to be disregarded.

EXTRA RATES.

2. (a) Within the Metropolitan Fire District constituted by the *Fire Brigades Act 1928*.

(i) Permanent Firemen :—

A licensed Brigade Driver shall receive an allowance of 6d. a shift, and if detailed, rostered, or required to drive on such shift shall receive an additional 6d.

A fireman or senior fireman being senior man in the absence of an Officer on a rostered shift, excepting when such Officer is answering a call from his duty station, shall be paid 9d. per hour whilst so employed. Provided that any absence or absences totalling two hours or less in any rostered shift shall be disregarded, and that the allowance shall be paid for a maximum of six hours in any such shift. In computing the amount payable under this clause calculations shall be made to the nearest hour.

(ii) Partially-paid Firemen—

Fire duty shall be paid for as follows :—

Partially-paid Firemen 5s. for the first hour or part thereof, and thereafter 2s. 6d. per hour or part thereof ;
Senior Partially-paid Fireman 6s. for the first hour or part thereof, and thereafter 3s. per hour or part thereof.

Theatre duty shall be paid for at 15s. per performance, plus fares if the theatre is situated more than one mile from the Fireman's home station.

For attendance at a weekly drill of one hour an allowance of 5s. per drill shall be paid to Partially-paid Firemen and 6s. to Senior Partially-paid Firemen.

A Partially-paid Fireman relieving a Permanent Fireman who is required to go on out duty shall receive an additional 2s. per hour whilst so required to relieve.

Watching Duty after fires shall be paid for at the rate of 2s. per hour or part thereof, including travelling time.

(b) Outside the said Metropolitan Fire District.

A Permanent Fireman for whom the Employing Authority pays a motor-driving licence fee shall receive an additional 6d. for each shift for which he is rostered for duty.

A fireman or senior fireman being senior man in the absence of an Officer on a rostered shift, excepting when such officer is answering a call from his duty station, shall be paid 9d. per hour whilst so employed. Provided that any absence or absences totalling two hours or less in any rostered shift shall be disregarded, and that the allowance shall be paid for a maximum of six hours in any such shift. In computing the amount payable under this clause calculations shall be made to the nearest hour.

At a station where a Permanent Officer is not normally on duty the Senior Permanent Fireman on duty shall receive an additional allowance of 3s. for the shift if :—

- (i) a Part-time Officer does not turn out in response to a call ;
- (ii) a Part-time Officer is not available within the Fire District for consultation during a shift.

HOURS OF WORK.

3. (a) The ordinary hours for a week's work for a Permanent Fireman shall be 40, to be worked with consecutive shifts of men throughout each of seven consecutive days without interruption in shifts of 8 hours each, and an employee concerned shall be entitled to at least 48 hours' notice of a rostered shift.

(b) The ordinary hours of such shift workers shall not exceed—

- (i) 8 on any one day ;
- (ii) 48 in any one week ;
- (iii) 88 in 14 consecutive days ;
- (iv) 160 in 28 consecutive days.

(c) A Partially-paid Fireman shall hold himself in readiness for such hours as may be required from time to time by the Employing Authority.

The roster is for 21 firemen in 4 (four) Platoons shown A to D, inclusive, and each having firemen 1 to 5 with a Relief man designated "Z".

This roster provides five men available for each shift on every day.

Shifts for twenty men :—

D. 7 a.m. to 3 p.m.

A. 3 p.m. to 11 p.m.

N. 11 p.m. to 7 a.m.

The Relief man "Z", works Day Shift on Friday, Saturday, Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday.

The roster is completed in 28 days.

(b) The following general conditions shall apply :—

- (i) The roster may be varied for firemen on special duties and to provide that during the first year of service a fireman may be rostered for up to five consecutive day duties.
- (ii) The roster when once compiled shall not be departed from except to meet emergency due to sickness or other unexpected or unavoidable cause. The roster may be departed from when a member of the band is requested by the Employing Authority provided that any time taken when off duty shall be made up as mutually arranged between the said Authority and the member concerned.
- (iii) In the event of an alarm requiring any station to stand by or turn out for a fire being received at the station during roll call the oncoming shift shall man the appliances, and if required, proceed to the fire, and the offgoing shift shall remain on duty if required until the other shift returns or until otherwise directed, when it shall be dismissed.
- (iv) If, when the oncoming shift reports at a station at the time prescribed for the change of shift, the other shift is proceeding to, or attending a fire or alarm, the oncoming shift, if so ordered, shall, after roll call, proceed to the fire; and the officer or senior member of the shift shall report the arrival of the shift to the Officer-in-charge of the fire without delay. The offgoing shift shall remain on duty at the fire until relieved. The Officer-in-charge at the fire may if in his judgment it is expedient, hold both the oncoming and offgoing shifts for duty at the fire. If the offgoing shift is not held at the fire or detailed at the fire for duty elsewhere, it shall report back to the station and remain available until the other shift returns or until otherwise directed, when it shall be dismissed.
- (v) In the event of one or more members of the oncoming shift being absent, an equal number of members in the shift on duty may be detained on duty until such time as he or they may be relieved. Nothing herein contained is to be deemed to sanction an unauthorized absence, or to relieve the absent member from a liability to be charged with being absent without leave and dealt with accordingly.
- (vi) Notwithstanding anything contained in this clause, in the case of fire, all firemen off duty shall be liable to be called upon to report for duty, and if called upon shall report for duty immediately.
- (vii) Subject to the provisions of this clause, every employee shall be dismissed punctually from his rostered shift.

OVERTIME.

5. All time worked by a Permanent Fireman in excess of the day's rostered shift shall be paid for at the rate of time and a half for the first four hours, and double time per hour thereafter, calculated to the nearest quarter of an hour.

Where overtime is worked for two hours or more before or after a rostered shift a meal allowance of 5s. shall be paid to each Permanent Fireman working the said overtime.

MEAL BREAKS.

6. (a) One hour shall be allowed to employees for a meal break during each shift, and for this time employees shall be paid and shall remain on duty.

(b) An employee working overtime shall be allowed a crib time of twenty minutes without reduction of pay after each four hours of overtime worked if the employee continues to work after such crib time.

(c) In all cases, where reasonably practicable, refreshments shall be provided for firemen performing fire duty for continuous period of three hours or more.

(d) Facilities for preparing a hot drink shall be provided for all employees performing watching duty.

EXPENSES.

7. (a) When a permanent fireman is ordered from one station to another and as a result it is reasonable for him to change his place of residence, the Employing Authority shall pay the expenses of removal reasonably incurred, except if the removal is ordered by way of punishment.

(b) When a permanent fireman is detailed for duty to a station other than his home station, he shall, except in the case of emergency, receive at least forty-eight hours' notice of such duty. During the period for which a fireman is so detailed he shall report to the duty station at the commencing time of each shift to which he is rostered and shall in addition to his wages be paid

(i) the appropriate fares between his place of residence and the duty station, and

(ii) a daily allowance equal to one hour's wages at overtime rate.

(c) When a permanent fireman, while on duty at his home station is required to perform duty at another station, he shall:—

(i) if returned to his home station during his duty shift be provided with reasonable transport, or the cost thereof, between his home station and the station at which he is required to perform duty, or

(ii) if he remains on duty at such other station until the end of his duty shift, he shall, in addition to his wages, be paid:—

(a) the appropriate single fare to his home station, and

(b) an allowance equal to one half-hour's (30 minutes) wages at overtime rates.

(d) When a permanent fireman is required to work in excess of one mile from his home station, he shall be entitled to reasonable transport, or the cost thereof, between his home station and the place where the work is to be performed, provided however that notwithstanding the foregoing a permanent fireman shall be entitled to transport to and from all fire duty, and reasonable transport from all watching duty.

(e) For the purposes of this clause reasonable transport means appropriate means of transport having regard to the state of the weather, the distance to be travelled and the availability of public transport, and shall not include a pedal cycle unless there is no form of public or brigade transport available.

(f) Where an employee is transferred from his home station to another station the Employing Authority shall indicate whether such transfer is permanent or temporary. If the transfer does not extend beyond a period equal to eight weeks such employee shall be paid all fares necessarily incurred by him in excess of those ordinarily incurred between his residence and his home station.

AMENITIES.

8. A dining room shall be provided at each station and shall contain washing facilities, and a stove or similar article for heating food.

A food cupboard shall be provided in the dining room.

At least one hot shower shall be installed in each station and shall be available at all times to firemen.

ANNUAL LEAVE.

9. (a) A Permanent Fireman shall be entitled to 28 days' annual leave, to be taken within the scope of a rostered month, every eleven months.

(b) A Partially-paid Fireman shall be entitled to a fortnight's leave annually without deduction of the appropriate ordinary wage prescribed in clause 1 of this Part, plus the extra rate prescribed for attendance at a weekly drill prescribed in clause 2.

(c) Where an employee leaves his employment before the completion of a full qualifying period for annual leave in any year of service, he shall be entitled to pro rata payment in lieu of annual leave for such broken period of service calculated on the basis of 1/11th of the ordinary wage payments received by him during such period.

SICK OR ACCIDENT PAY.

10. (a) A permanent fireman absent from his work on account of personal illness or on account of injury by accident shall be entitled to leave of absence without deduction of pay subject to the following conditions and limitations:—

(i) He shall at the commencement of such absence inform the Employing Authority of his inability to attend for duty and, as far as practicable, state the nature of his injury or illness and the estimated duration of his absence.

(ii) He shall prove to the reasonable satisfaction of the Employing Authority that he was unable on account of such illness or injury to attend for duty on the day or days for which sick leave is claimed, but he shall not be entitled at any one time to receive more than sixteen hours' sick leave without a medical certificate if such be required by the Employing Authority.

(iii) He shall not be entitled in any one year to paid sick leave in excess of 80 hours of duty time.

(iv) Notwithstanding anything contained in this clause the Employing Authority may grant such additional sick leave on full or reduced pay as it may think fit.

(b) (i) Sick leave which shall be available to permanent firemen on the first day of January of each year, shall accumulate from year to year so that, save as herein provided, any balance of the period specified in sub-clause (a) (iii) of this clause which has in any years not been allowed to a permanent fireman by the Employing Authority as paid sick leave and/or any period of sick leave due to him under a previous determination may be claimed by him and subject to conditions hereinbefore prescribed shall be allowed by that authority in a subsequent year without diminution of the sick leave prescribed in respect of that year. Provided that sick leave which accumulates pursuant to this clause shall at no time exceed in total equivalent of 26 duty weeks.

(ii) A permanent fireman who has joined or joins the brigade after the 1st January, 1951, shall on his admission be credited with 80 hours' sick leave, but such fireman shall on the 1st January, next after his appointment be credited only with that proportion of the balance of the sick leave credited on appointment which has not been allowed as paid sick leave which the period of his service in the year of joining bears to the whole of that year.

(iii) For the purposes of this clause "year" shall mean a calendar year and calculations shall be made to the nearest hour.

(iv) A permanent fireman absent from his work on account of any injury by accident arising out of or in the course of his employment shall be entitled to leave of absence for any period not exceeding six months in respect to which he is entitled to Workers' Compensation without diminution of the sick leave to which he may be entitled pursuant to the foregoing sub-clause and he shall be paid the difference between his normal wage and such compensation.

CLEANING MATERIAL.

11. The Employing Authority shall provide at each station an adequate supply of cleaning materials necessary for use by employees in the keeping clean of their uniforms.

TIME FOR A SHOWER AND CHANGE.

12. When an employee is engaged on any duty which entails a shower and change of clothes, ten minutes shall be allowed for such purpose.

FACILITIES FOR DRYING CLOTHES.

13. Facilities for drying clothes which an employee has used in connexion with his duties shall be provided at each station.

DEFINITIONS.

14. "Employing Authority" means the Metropolitan Fire Brigades Board, or the Country Fire Authority as the case may be.

"Union" means The United Firemen's Union of Victoria.

Factories and Shops Acts.

DETERMINATION OF THE HOTEL AND RESTAURANT BOARD.

NOTE.—This Determination applies to the whole of the State of Victoria.

NOTE.—On the 6th May, 1940, the following trade was proclaimed an Apprenticeship Trade as carried on in the Metropolitan District.

Cooking in hotels, clubs, restaurants, eating houses, coffee palaces in which three or more adults are permanently employed in the kitchen.

Full particulars of the Apprenticeship Regulations for this trade may be obtained on application to the Secretary, Apprenticeship Commission, 103 Russell Street, Melbourne.

IN accordance with the provisions of the Factories and Shops Acts, the Wages Board which now has the power to determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any person or persons or classes of persons—

- (a) employed in a restaurant, coffee palace, hotel, eating-house, or any premises for which an Australian wine licence or billiard table licence is in force or which are occupied as a club, but not including persons subject to the jurisdiction of any other Board heretofore appointed;
- (b) employed in the business of a caterer;
- (c) employed in connexion with the sale of aerated waters, fruit juice drinks, cordials, coffee, chocolate, cocoa, milk, or any other non-intoxicating beverage whatsoever consumed on the premises;
- (d) employed whole or part time selling confectionery, or pastry in any place in which the business of a restaurant is carried on—

has made the following Determination, namely:—

1. That on the 25th October, 1952, the last previous Determination of this Board shall be revoked and replaced by this Determination.

NOTE.—A copy of this Determination shall be displayed at or near the entrance of every establishment where the Determination of this Wages Board applies.

Under the provisions of Section 7 of the Factories and Shops Act 1936 (No. 4461) every employer of any employee in any hotel is required to keep a time-book in the prescribed form wherein each employee shall enter daily a record of the hours worked.

BOARD AND LODGING.

3. (a) Where board and residence is made available to employees the employer shall have the right to deduct from the pay of any employee residing on the premises an amount of 47s. per week.

(b) In the case of employees who do not reside on the employer's premises a deduction at the rate of 1s. 9d. for each meal supplied during the employee's spread of working hours may be deducted by the employer.

(c) Junior employees 18 years of age and over shall be subject to a deduction of 30s. per week for board.

TERMS OF ENGAGEMENT.

4. All employees (other than casual employees), shall be engaged by the week, and shall be paid weekly. Two days' notice shall be given by the employer or employee to terminate employment, or in lieu of such notice two days' wages shall be paid by the employer or forfeited by the employee, except in the case of misconduct by an employer. If an employer dismisses an employee without notice for any cause other than misconduct, he shall pay the employee two days' wages in lieu of notice. Provided that no employee shall be dismissed without notice for sickness, accident or other reasonable cause, if he informs his employer by 9 a.m. on any day, of his inability to take up his duty on that day, and also before that hour informs his employer of his whereabouts, and the reason for his absence. When notice of termination of service has been given, employees shall be paid within 24 hours from the expiry of such notice.

CASUAL WORK.

5. (a) "Casual employee" in this industry shall mean and be deemed to be any employee engaged for a less period than a working week of 40 hours on the class of employment for which the casual is employed. Casual work shall be paid for at the rate of 50 per cent. in advance of one-fortieth of the weekly rate prescribed in clause 2 hereof in respect of the position for which the worker is casually employed with a minimum of ten shillings for males and females in Part 1 and ten shillings for males and seven shillings for females in Part 2 for each engagement.

(b) All fares in excess of 3d. reasonably incurred in travelling to the place of work for the purpose of doing the work or in travelling from such place after doing the work in due course shall be paid by the employer.

(c) "Engagement" for the purposes of this clause shall be deemed to mean the period or periods for which the employer notifies the employee that he or she is so required to attend on any one day.

HOURS OF WORK.

6. (a) The hours of work of all employees engaged on weekly hiring in Part 1 shall be 40 per week to be worked within a spread of 9 hours per day from starting time, inclusive of meal breaks. Each employee shall be entitled to a full day off each week between Monday to Saturday inclusive in addition to Sunday.

(b) The hours of work of all employees engaged on weekly hiring in Part 2 shall be 40 per week to be worked within a spread of 12 hours per day from starting time inclusive of meal breaks. Each employee shall be entitled to a full day off each week.

(c) Two weeks' notice of such rostered day off shall be given but the day may be changed by mutual consent at any time or by absence through sickness or other circumstances over which the employer has no control.

(d) An employee shall not be required to take his rostered day-off on a holiday prescribed by this Determination.

(e) An employee in Part 1 who is required to work between the hours of 6.30 p.m. and 10 p.m. on any day Monday to Friday inclusive shall be paid an extra rate of 1s. 6d. per day.

DEFINITIONS.

7. "Barman" or "barmaid" shall mean any person usually employed for more than two hours in any one day or night in the sale of liquor over the public bar; the saloon, private or parlour bar; the lounge bar; the bar used to service a beer garden; and the bottle department of any hotel or wine saloon.

"Cellarman" shall mean in an hotel any person employed in charge of, responsible for, and/or substantially engaged in looking after the contents of a cellar.

"Assistant Cellarman" shall mean in an hotel any employee who is substantially engaged as an assistant to the cellarman in looking after the contents of a cellar.

"Spread of Hours" means the period of time elapsing from the time an employee commences duty to the time he ceases duty.

TRAVELLING FACILITIES.

8. Where an employee is detained at work until it is too late to travel by the last train, tram, vessel or other regular conveyance to his or her usual place of residence, the employer shall either provide proper conveyance or private accommodation for the night free of charge.

MIXED FUNCTIONS.

9. (a) Where an employee is put to work at a classification higher in respect of remuneration than that under which such employee was engaged or was deemed to have been working such employee shall be paid for the whole of the time during which such employee is employed at such work at the rate of remuneration prescribed for such higher classification. Provided that such employee shall be paid at the rate prescribed for such higher classification for the whole of the day if such work is performed continuously for over half of the day and for the whole of the week if such work is performed continuously for over half of the week.

(b) A higher paid employee, shall, when necessary, temporarily relieve a lower paid employee without loss of pay.

TIME BOOK.

10. The time book or other record shall be in the form prescribed under Section 7 of the *Factories and Shops Act* No. 4461, and shall be accessible to the Secretary of the Union at reasonable times.

PAYMENT OF WAGES.

11. All wages, including overtime, shall be paid by Thursday in each week or such other day as may be mutually agreed upon by an employer and his employees. Employees whose weekly holiday falls on pay day shall be paid their wages if they so desire prior to going off duty on the day prior to their day off. Employees who are paid their wages at any time other than during their working time, shall, if kept waiting more than fifteen minutes, be paid at overtime rates for all such waiting time.

EMPLOYEES ASSISTING IN BAR.

12. In any hotel where there are more than two persons regularly employed in the sale of liquor over the bar a male employee assisting in such sale for any period shall be paid the rate of wages prescribed for a barman.

HOLIDAYS.

13. Employees shall be entitled to the following public holidays without loss of pay as regards employees on weekly hiring:—New Year's Day, Australia Day, Good Friday, Easter Monday, Queen's Birthday, Labour Day, Union Picnic Day, Anzac Day, Christmas Day and Boxing Day, or such other day as is generally observed in the locality as a substitute for any of the said days respectively.

ANNUAL HOLIDAYS.

14. The annual holiday shall be as prescribed by the provisions of the *Factories and Shops (Annual Holidays) Act, 1946*—No. 5111, and any amendments which may be made thereto from time to time.

OVERTIME, HOLIDAY AND PENALTY RATES.

15. *Overtime*.—All time worked in excess of 8 hours per day Monday to Friday inclusive or 40 hours per week or outside the spread of hours prescribed by clause 6 of this Determination shall be paid for at the rate of time and a half.

Saturday.—All time worked on a Saturday shall be paid for at the rate of time and a half.

Sunday.—All time worked on a Sunday by employees in Part 1 shall be paid for at the rate of double time and all time worked on a Sunday by employees in Part 2 shall be paid for at the rate of time and a half.

Holiday.—All time worked on a holiday shall be paid for at the rate of double time.

Employee's Day-off.—An employee required to work on his or her rostered day off shall be paid at the rate of double ordinary time.

Compulsory Overtime.—An employer may require an employee to work reasonable overtime at overtime rates and such employee shall work overtime in accordance with such requirements.

SICK LEAVE.

16. (a) Any employee, other than a casual, who has been in the service of the same employer continuously, shall be allowed one week's sick leave on full pay annually. Such sick leave shall be inoperative for the first three months of employment. On completion of three months and up to six months of employment, three days' sick leave on full pay shall be allowed. After six months' service the full period of one week on full pay shall be operative; provided that not more than one week shall be allowed for each year of service.

(b) Provided further that any claim made for sick leave shall be supported by evidence satisfactory to the employer that the employee is unable to work because of personal ill-health; but in the event of a continuous period of six days' sick leave being required a medical certificate shall be furnished, the cost of such certificate to be borne by the employer.

(c) Any employer taking over a business shall be responsible for all sick leave covered by the period of employment of each employee who was employed by an immediate predecessor in the business.

(d) Sick leave shall accumulate for a period of three years.

BREAKAGES.

17. An employer shall not charge a sum against nor deduct any sum from the wages of an employee in respect of breakages of crockery or other utensils except in the case of wilful misconduct.

UNION OFFICIALS.

18. The Secretary and accredited officers of the Federated Liquor and Allied Trades Employees' Union of Australasia shall have the right to enter the premises of an employer at a convenient time for the purposes of interviewing members of the Union.

ACCOMMODATION AND MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS.

19. An employer shall provide a dressing-room adequately lighted and ventilated with suitable floor covering and floor space to be sufficiently roomy to accommodate all employees likely to use it at the one time; sufficient seating accommodation and lounge or settee and steel or vermin-proof lockers; adjacent thereto wash basins with hot and cold water and toilets for staff use. The provisions of this clause shall not apply to wine saloons.

(Note.—Any employer who is unable to provide the facilities herein stated may make application to the Chief Inspector of Factories for exemption from this clause of the Determination.)

FIRST-AID KIT.

20. A first-aid kit shall be provided and maintained by the employer for use on the premises.

UNIFORMS.

21. (i) Where special uniforms, including white coats and/or other uniform types of dress are required to be worn, they shall be supplied and laundered at the employer's expense and shall be and remain the property of the employer.

(ii) Ordinary white aprons, cuffs, collars, caps or facings usually worn by female employees shall either be laundered at the employer's expense or at the option of the employer, the employee shall be paid 3s. per week in addition to her weekly wage.

NOTE.—Attention is drawn to the employment of females as barmaids in hotels pursuant to National Security (Employment of Women) Regulations.

The Women's Employment Board on 8th September, 1942, on the application of the United Licensed Victuallers Association (Victorian Branch) approved and laid down the conditions in respect to the employment of females not under 35 years of age as barmaids in hotels.

Extracts of the decisions of the Board are given herein:—

That females may be employed on the said work.

That the hours during which females may be employed on such work shall be 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. six days per week but in no event shall the total hours per week exceed 40.

That there shall be no period of probation.

That this decision shall bind the applicant and the Federated Liquor and Allied Trades Employees' Union and its members.

That the period of employment of extra females in bars (excluding those at present employed and registered with the State Government) shall be for the duration of the war.

That these employees shall be paid the same rate of wage as men, and this condition shall apply to present registered barmaids as it would be impracticable to differentiate.

That in order to prevent any replacement of existing bar personnel, whether male or female, by the prospective new female employees, there shall be established a Committee comprising an equal number of representatives of employers and employees. The decision of this Committee as to whether an employer may be permitted to engage new female labour shall be final, so far as this Order is made.

All female personnel to be engaged, whether permanently or for casual work, shall before commencing employment become members of the Federated Liquor and Allied Trades Employees' Union.

CASUAL BAR ATTENDANTS ON RACECOURSES, RECREATION GROUNDS, SPORTS GROUNDS, SHOWGROUNDS, PICNIC GROUNDS AND ANY OTHER GROUNDS WHERE LIQUOR IS PERMITTED TO BE SOLD UNDER THE LICENSING LAWS OF THE STATE.

WAGE RATES.

Saturdays and Week Days.

22. (a) Casual barmen employed on racecourses, showgrounds, football grounds, cricket grounds, sports grounds, picnic grounds, recreation grounds and all social functions shall be paid at the rate of 9s. per hour with a minimum payment as for four hours' work on any one day.

(b) Full day men shall be paid at the rate of 60s. per day for 8 hours work or less, exclusive of the meal hour. If lunch is not provided 2s. 6d. shall be paid in lieu thereof.

Public Holidays and Sundays.

(c) Casual barmen employed on racecourses, showgrounds, football grounds, cricket grounds, sports grounds, picnic grounds, recreation grounds and all social functions shall be paid at the rate of 12s. per hour with a minimum payment as for four hours.

(d) Full day men shall be paid at the rate of 80s. per day of 8 hours' work or less, exclusive of the meal hour. If lunch is not provided 2s. 6d. shall be paid in lieu thereof.

PUBLIC HOLIDAYS.

23. Holidays for the purpose of this section of the Determination shall mean and be deemed to be New Year's Day, Australia Day, Good Friday, Easter Saturday, Easter Monday, Queen's Birthday, Labour Day, Anzac Day, Christmas Day, Boxing Day, Melbourne Cup Day, or such other day as is generally observed in the locality as a substitute for any of the said days respectively.

MEN IN CHARGE.

24. Men in charge of bar shall be paid 5s. per day extra.

POSTPONEMENT.

25. Where a man who is engaged to attend a function and so attends and the function is postponed he shall be paid one half of the minimum rate provided for a casual barman in clause 22 (a) hereof. Provided that no employee shall attend at the place of employment if public notice of the postponement has been given either by the Press or Radio or both, not less than two hours prior to the advertised starting time of the function.

SHOP DAYS.

26. Persons employed on a shop day, that is persons preparing for a function on the day before such function or cleaning up on the day after such function shall be paid at the rate of 7s. 6d. per hour on Saturdays or week days and 10s. per hour on Sundays and Public Holidays as prescribed in Clause 23 hereof. Lunch shall be provided by the employer.

FARES.

27. All fares from and to the principal post office at the centre of engagement shall be paid by the employer.

PERMANENT EMPLOYEES.

28. No man in permanent employment shall be engaged on casual work unless casual labour is unavailable.

PAYMENT OF WAGES.

29. Wages shall be paid at the end of each engagement and within fifteen minutes of the employee presenting himself for payment. An employee kept waiting for more than fifteen minutes after presenting himself shall be paid at ordinary rates for the additional time he is kept waiting.

TRAVELLING TIME.

30. Casual employees engaged to work outside a radius of ten miles from the principal post office in the locality where they are to be employed shall be paid 60s. per day of 8 hours exclusive of meal hours. Meals, fares and accommodation where necessary shall be provided by the employer. Travelling time before 9 a.m. on the forward journey shall be paid for at the rate of ordinary time, that is 5s. per hour and travelling time after 6 p.m. shall be paid for at the same rate. Where an employee travels on a day other than the day on which a function occurs he shall be paid at ordinary rates for all such travelling time.

EXHIBITION OF DETERMINATION.

31. This Determination shall be exhibited by each employer on his premises in a place accessible to all employees.

PICKING UP GLASSES.

32. Men picking up glasses shall be paid 30s. per day for Saturdays and week days and 40s. per day for holidays and Sundays.

Youths 18 years of age and over picking up glasses shall be paid 22s. 6d. per day for Saturdays and week days and 30s. per day for holidays and Sundays.

GRATINGS.

33. Where a booth is erected without flooring, on a recreation ground, race-course, showground, or picnic ground, gratings shall be provided by the employer, and shall be placed on the ground where the men are working.

UNIFORMS.

34. Where special uniforms including white coats or other types of dress are required to be worn they shall be supplied and laundered at the employer's expense and shall be and remain the property of the employer.

RIGHT OF ENTRY OF UNION OFFICIALS.

35. The Secretary or an accredited officer of the Federated Liquor and Allied Trades Employees' Union of Australasia shall have the right to enter the employer's premises at a convenient time for the purpose of interviewing members of the Union.

TIME AND WAGES BOOK OR SHEET.

35A. Each employer shall keep a time and wages book or sheet showing the number of hours worked each day by each employee and the rate of payment made to such employee. Such book or sheet shall be open for inspection by an accredited official of the Union at all reasonable times.

Notwithstanding any condition in this clause no deduction for meals shall be made for a public holiday when the employee is not required to work on such public holiday.

HOURS OF WORK.

37. The hours of work shall be 40 per week to be worked within a spread of 12 hours per day, including meal intervals and not more than two other breaks, which, in the aggregate, shall not exceed 3 hours each day.

TERMS OF EMPLOYMENT.

38. (a) Employees (other than casual employees, midday waitresses and midday kitchenmaids or pantrymaids) shall be engaged by the week and paid by the week.

(b) Employees (other than casual employees, midday waitresses and midday kitchenmaids or pantrymaids) ready, willing, and available to perform such work as the employer shall from time to time require on the days and during the hours usually worked by the class of employee affected, shall have no deduction made from the weekly wages prescribed except for time lost through sickness (vide clause 47, Sick Leave) or absence from work without permission of the employer.

(c) The provisions of sub-clauses (a) and (b) hereof shall not apply if there is a stoppage of work for which the employer cannot reasonably be held responsible through any strike, breakdown of machinery, or other cause, proof of which shall be on the employer.

CLUBS—*continued.*

OVERTIME.

39. Time and a half calculated on the rates fixed without any deductions for board and/or lodging shall be paid for all time worked in excess of 40 hours per week or in excess of 10 hours per day and/or outside a spread of 12 hours each day.

CASUAL LABOUR.

40. Casual employees (i.e., persons employed during any week for not more than one-half the maximum number of hours fixed in this Determination as a week's work) shall be paid at the rate of time and a third on the days Monday to Friday inclusive and time and a half on Saturdays and Sundays, with a minimum payment of three hours for work done on any one day: Provided that any employee who is employed within a club located on a football ground or a cricket ground shall be paid the rate prescribed by clause 57 (b) of the Restaurant Section.

SATURDAYS AND SUNDAYS.

41. The special rate to be paid to employees, other than casuals, for work done on Saturday up to 12 noon shall be time and a quarter and thereafter time and a half, and all work done on a Sunday shall be time and a half.

ROSTERED DAY OFF.

42. (a) An employee required to work on his or her rostered day off shall be paid at the rate of time and a half.
(b) An employee shall not be required to take his or her rostered day off on a holiday prescribed in clause 43.

SPECIAL RATES.

43. Employees, other than casual employees, required to work on New Year's Day, Australia Day, Good Friday, Easter Monday, Labour Day, Anzac Day, Queen's Birthday, Melbourne Cup Day, Christmas Day, and Boxing Day, or any other day which may be by Act of Parliament or Proclamation substituted for any of the above-named holidays shall be paid a minimum of seven hours at ordinary rates plus ordinary rates for the actual time worked up to seven hours and double time for all time worked in excess of seven hours.

HOLIDAYS.

44. Employees, other than casual employees, not required to work, shall be entitled to be absent on the holidays prescribed, in clause 43 without deduction of pay, provided that the employee does not absent himself or herself from work without the employer's permission or reasonable cause on the working day preceding or succeeding any such holiday.
For the purposes of this clause a holiday shall be deemed to be of 7 hours.

UNIFORMS.

45. Where any female employee is required by the employer to wear a uniform (other than a black uniform) such uniform shall be provided and laundered by the employer free of cost to the employee, or, if mutually agreed that the employee shall launder such uniform, the employer shall allow the employee 3s. per week for each uniform so laundered.

ANNUAL HOLIDAYS.

46. The annual holiday shall be as prescribed by the provisions of the *Factories and Shops (Annual Holidays) Act 1946*.—No. 5111, and any amendments which may be made thereto from time to time.

SICK LEAVE.

47. (a) Any employee who has been in the employment of the same employer for a period of not less than six months and who does not attend for duty shall lose his or her pay for the actual time lost unless such employee produces or forwards within 24 hours of the commencement of such absence evidence satisfactory to the employer that his or her non-attendance was due to personal ill-health or accident necessitating such absence, but such employee shall not be entitled to payment for non-attendance on the ground of personal ill-health or accident for more than 40 hours of working time in each year of service or a proportionately less time during any shorter period of employment.

(b) Notwithstanding the provisions of sub-clause (a) hereof, if the full period of sick leave as prescribed above is not taken in any year, such portion as is not taken shall be cumulative from year to year up to a period not exceeding 120 hours of working time, which shall be the maximum amount of leave to which an employee shall be entitled in any year of service without deduction of pay.

For the purposes of this sub-clause, service prior to the 4th July, 1946, shall be disregarded.

DEFINITIONS.

48. (a) "Sweets Cook" shall include any person manufacturing cakes or pastry for meals supplied by the employer.
(b) "Substantial Meal."—A substantial meal shall consist of food comprising soup, entrée, or joint, vegetables and sweets, and on Fridays, a choice of fish.
(c) "Full Pay" shall mean the rate prescribed in the Determination for the class of work performed, without any deductions whatever.
(d) Storeman shall mean an employee continuously engaged in storing, checking, tallying, or handling stores.
(e) Linen maid or seamstress shall mean a female employee who makes and/or repairs linen, uniforms, or furnishings for use in the club concerned.

RIGHT OF ENTRY.

49. Any official of the Federated Liquor and Allied Trades Employees Union of Australasia or the Victorian Chamber of Catering Industries authorized in writing by the Secretary for Labour shall have the right to enter any establishments or premises covered by this Determination in order to inspect time sheets and to interview employees on any matter connected with their employment. Such accredited official before entering such establishment or premises shall produce the authority in writing mentioned on a demand by an employer or his representative for such production.

TERMINATION OF EMPLOYMENT.

50. Employees (other than Casual Employees) shall, except in a case of misconduct by either employer or employee, give or receive two days' notice of termination of employment, or in lieu of such two days' notice one third of the weekly rate fixed for the class of work performed by the employee shall be paid by the employer or forfeited by the employee, but such notice shall not be required from an employee who terminates employment because of his or her illness or injury.

TRAVELLING FACILITIES.

51. Where an employee is detained at work until it is too late to travel by the last train, tram, vessel or other regular conveyance to his or her usual place of residence, the employer shall either provide proper conveyance or private accommodation for the night free of charge.

RESTAURANTS, COFFEE PALACES, EATING-HOUSES, AND ALL OTHER PLACES EXCEPT HOTELS, WINE SALOONS CLUBS, AND CASUAL BAR ATTENDANTS ON RACECOURSES, RECREATION GROUNDS, SPORTS GROUNDS, SHOWGROUNDS, PICNIC GROUNDS AND ANY OTHER GROUNDS WHERE LIQUOR IS PERMITTED TO BE SOLD UNDER THE LICENSING LAWS OF THE STATE.

55. Time and a half calculated on the rates fixed without any deductions for board and/or lodging shall be paid for all time worked in excess of 40 hours per week or in excess of 10 hours per day and/or outside a spread of 12 hours each day.

FEMALES EMPLOYED AFTER MIDNIGHT.

56. Females (other than casuals) required to do any work between midnight and 3 a.m. shall be paid for such work at the rate of double time.

CASUAL LABOUR.

57. Casual employees (i.e., persons employed during any week for not more than one-half the maximum number of hours fixed in this Determination as a week's work) shall be paid—

(a) All casual workers other than those employed by caterers—time and a third on the days Monday to Friday inclusive, and time and a half on Saturdays and Sundays, with a minimum payment of three hours for work done on any one day.

(b) Casual workers employed in the business of a caterer—

(c) Notwithstanding any provision in sub-clauses (a) and (b) hereof the minimum payment for employees who work during a theatre interval only, viz., between 8.45 p.m. and 10.15 p.m. for a period not exceeding one hour shall be 5s. 9d. for each day.

(d) The special rate of time and a third shall be paid to casual workers employed in the business of a caterer for work done on Sunday, New Year's Day, Australia Day, Good Friday, Easter Saturday, Easter Monday, Queen's Birthday, Labour Day, Anzac Day, Christmas Day, Boxing Day, Melbourne Cup Day, or such other day as is generally observed in the locality as a substitute for any of the said days respectively.

TRAVELLING.

58. The special rate to be paid to employees who work away from their employer's place of business for time occupied in travelling between the employer's place of business and work, or between the employee's residence and work, shall be at ordinary rates.

SATURDAYS AND SUNDAYS.

59. The special rate to be paid to employees, other than casuals, for work done on Saturday up to 12 noon shall be time and a quarter and thereafter time and a half, and all work done on a Sunday shall be time and a half.

ROSTERED DAY OFF.

- 60. (a) An employee required to work on his or her rostered day off shall be paid at the rate of time and a half.
- (b) An employee shall not be required to take his or her rostered day off on a holiday prescribed in clause 61.

SPECIAL RATES.

61. Employees, other than casual employees, required to work on New Year's Day, Australia Day, Good Friday, Easter Monday, Labour Day, Anzac Day, Queen's Birthday, Melbourne Cup Day, Christmas Day, and Boxing Day, or any other day which may be by Act of Parliament or Proclamation substituted for any of the above-named holidays, shall be paid a minimum of seven hours at ordinary rates plus ordinary rates for the actual time worked up to seven hours and double time for all time worked in excess of seven hours.

HOLIDAYS.

62. Employees, other than casual employees, not required to work, shall be entitled to be absent on the holidays prescribed in clause 61 without deduction of pay, provided that the employee does not absent himself or herself from work without the employer's permission or reasonable cause on the working day preceding or succeeding any such holiday.

For the purposes of this clause a holiday shall be deemed to be of seven hours.

UNIFORMS.

63. Where any female employee is required by the employer to wear a uniform (other than a black uniform) such uniform shall be provided and laundered by the employer free of cost to the employee.

ANNUAL HOLIDAYS.

64. The annual holiday shall be as prescribed by the provisions of the *Factories and Shops (Annual Holidays) Act 1946* (No. 5111) and any amendments which may be made thereto from time to time.

SICK LEAVE.

65. (a) Any employee who has been in the employment of the same employer for a period of not less than six months and who does not attend for duty shall lose his or her pay for the actual time lost unless such employee produces or forwards within 24 hours of the commencement of such absence evidence satisfactory to the employer that his or her non-attendance was due to personal ill-health or accident necessitating such absence, but such employee shall not be entitled to payment for non-attendance on the ground of personal ill-health or accident for more than 40 hours of working time in each year of service or a proportionately less time during any shorter period of employment.

(b) Notwithstanding the provisions of sub-clause (a) hereof, if the full period of sick leave as prescribed above is not taken in any year, such portion as is not taken shall be cumulative from year to year up to a period not exceeding 120 hours of working time, which shall be the maximum amount of leave to which an employee shall be entitled in any year of service without deduction of pay.

For the purposes of this sub-clause, service prior to the 4th July, 1946, shall be disregarded.

DEFINITIONS.

- 66. (a) "Sweets cook" shall include any person manufacturing cakes or pastry for meals supplied by the employer.
- (b) "Substantial meal" shall consist of food comprising soup, entrée, or joint, vegetables and sweets, and on Fridays, a choice of fish.
- (c) Full pay shall mean the rate prescribed in the Determination for the class of work performed without any deductions whatever.
- (d) Departmental store or emporium shall mean an establishment where more than one class of business is carried on, and where under section 83 of the *Factories and Shops Acts* such establishment is required to close at the hours prescribed by such section.
- (e) Linen maid or seamstress shall mean a female employee who makes and/or repairs linen, uniforms, or furnishings for use in connexion with a business covered by this Determination.
- (f) Fruit juice, flavour, or soda fountain hand shall mean a female employee who as required prepares fruit juices and/or flavours.
- (g) Storeman or storewoman shall mean an employee continuously engaged in storing, checking, tallying, or handling stores.

TERMINATION OF EMPLOYMENT.

67. Employees (other than casual employees) shall except in a case of misconduct by either employer or employee, give or receive two days' notice of termination of employment, or in lieu of such two days' notice one third of the weekly rate fixed for the class of work performed by the employee shall be paid by the employer or forfeited by the employee, but such notice shall not be required from an employee who terminates employment because of his or her illness or injury.

TRAVELLING FACILITIES.

68. Where an employee is detained at work until it is too late to travel by the last train, tram, vessel or other regular conveyance to his or her usual place of residence, the employer shall either provide proper conveyance or private accommodation for the night free of charge.

RIGHT OF ENTRY.

69. Any official of the Federated Liquor and Allied Trades Employees Union of Australasia or the Victorian Chamber of Catering Industries authorized in writing by the Secretary for Labour shall have the right to enter any establishments or premises covered by this Determination in order to inspect time-sheets and to interview employees on any matter connected with their employment. Such accredited official before entering such establishment or premises shall produce the authority in writing mentioned on a demand by the employer or his representative for such production.

ACCOMMODATION.

70. Adequate accommodation apart from rooms to which the public have access shall be provided for dressing, and reasonable accommodation shall be provided for employees to have their meals.

PERIODICAL ADJUSTMENT OF WAGES.

71. (a) The wages rates for adult males and barmaids set out in clause 2, and for adult males set out in clauses 36 and 52 (b) are based upon the following basic wage rates and pursuant to the provisions of section 21 of the *Factories and Shops Act 1934* shall be automatically adjusted as prescribed by clause 72.

ADJUSTMENT OF BASIC WAGE.

72. (a) For the purposes of this Determination, the expression "Commonwealth Statistician's 'all items' retail price index numbers" or any like expression means the numbers stated to be such index numbers in any document purporting, and not proved to be wrongly so purporting, to be printed by the Commonwealth Government Printer or to be signed by or on behalf of the Commonwealth Statistician.

(b) Until the beginning of the first pay period to commence in November, 1952, the amounts of the basic wage shall be as prescribed in clause 71.

(c) During each future successive period beginning with the first pay period to commence in a November, a February, a May, or an August, the amount of the basic wage shall be adjusted by the following method, namely, by multiplying the last published Commonwealth Statistician's "all items" retail price index number by the factor .103 taken to one place of decimals, the resultant whole number being the amount of the basic wage expressed in shillings, but, should the decimal number reach .5 or more, the basic wage shall be taken to the next higher shilling.

Tuition During Apprenticeship.

(c) (1) An apprentice butcher shall not be deemed to have been taught his trade by the employer unless during the period of apprenticeship he is taught the following work and brought to reasonable proficiency on such work:—

During the first year: Breaking up forequarters of beef and hanging same and naming the different cuts of beef, mutton, pork and veal.

During the second year: Breaking up hindquarter of beef and hanging same and boning.

During the third year: Cutting down sheep, pork and veal; arranging meat in chiller; making dripping; rolling spice beef.

During the fourth and fifth years: Making pickle; pumping meat; general shop work; serving and cutting meat; making of beef and pork sausages and smallgoods work usually done in a retail butchering establishment.

(2) An apprentice slaughterman shall not be deemed to have been taught his trade by the employer, unless, during the period of apprenticeship he is taught the following work and brought to reasonable proficiency on such work:—

During the first year: Gut running; skinning feet; fronting out; cleaning of tripes or calves' heads and feet.

During the second year: Pelting and legging sheep and necking off; dressing pigs and calves.

During the third year: Grounding; backing off; sawing down.

During the fourth and fifth years: Quartering; making tallow; caring for hides; care of yards generally.

- (3) An apprentice small goods maker shall not be deemed to have been taught his trade by the employer unless during the period of apprenticeship he is taught the following work and brought to reasonable proficiency on such work:—

First year: Learning qualities, quantities and grades of meat; grading and mixing; use of and care of knife.

Second year: Mixing meat and using silent cutters; learning ingredients; arranging meat in chiller.

Third year: Cooking and dyeing meats; linking sausages of all types; using filling and linking machines.

Fourth year: Making pickle; pumping meat; and to be thoroughly competent in all trades.

Period of Apprenticeship.

- (d) The period of apprenticeship shall be 5 years, but, if the apprentice has reached the age of 17 years, the period shall be four years.

Wages.

- (e) The minimum weekly rates of wage for apprentices shall be as set out in sub-clause (C) of this clause.

Conditions of Employment.

- (f) The hours and conditions of employment, shall, except as otherwise provided by this Determination, be the same as the journeyman covered by this Determination.
