By His Excellency the Governor of the State of Victoria and its Dependencies in the Commonwealth of Australia, &c., &c., &c.

I, THE Governor of the State of Victoria in the Commonwealth of Australia by and with the advice of the Executive Council of the said State and in pursuance of the provisions contained in section 25 of the *Land Act 1928* do by this my Proclamation rescind the Proclamation dated 28th June 1886 defining certain areas of land as Townships in so far as it refers to the Township in the Parish of Tallandoon (see *Government Gazette* 1886 page 1914) and the Proclamation dated 10th April 1893 defining a certain area of land in the Parishes of Tallandoon and Dorchap, as a Township in extension of the Township of Eskdale (see *Government Gazette* 1893 page 1783) and in lieu thereof do hereby proclaim as a Township under the designation of Eskdale the area of land in the Parishes of Dorchap and Tallandoon, County of Bogong comprised of the area of the aforementioned Township in the Parish of Tallandoon as defined by Proclamation dated 28th June 1886 and the area of the aforementioned Township in extension of the Township of Eskdale as defined by Proclamation dated 10th April 1893.—(D.184(6) (E.112(2) (T.254(3) (C.95071).

I, THE Governor of the State of Victoria in the Commonwealth of Australia by and with the advice of the Executive Council of the said State and in pursuance of the provisions contained in section 25 of the *Land Act 1928* as amended by section 2 of the *Land Act 1933* do by this my Proclamation revoke the Order dated 8th November 1849 fixing the site for a Village at Colac, in the County of Polwarth, District of Port Phillip (see *New South Wales Government Gazette* 1849 page 1668) and rescind the Proclamation dated 18th February 1861 defining certain areas of land as Towns in so far as it refers to the Town of Colac (see *Government Gazette* 1861 page 403) and the Proclamation dated 20th August 1889 defining certain areas of land as Townships in so far as it refers to the Township adjoining the Town of Colac in the Parish of Elliminyt (see *Government Gazette* 1889 page 2889) and in lieu thereof do hereby proclaim as a Township under the designation of Colac the area of land in the Parish of Colac, County of Polwarth being the area of the aforementioned Town of Colac as defined by Proclamation dated 18th February 1861.—(C.279(3, 4) (E.35(3) (C.77777).

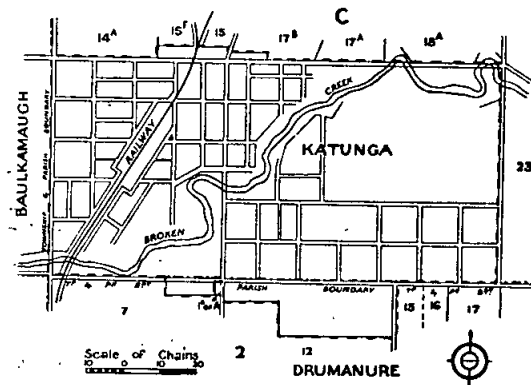

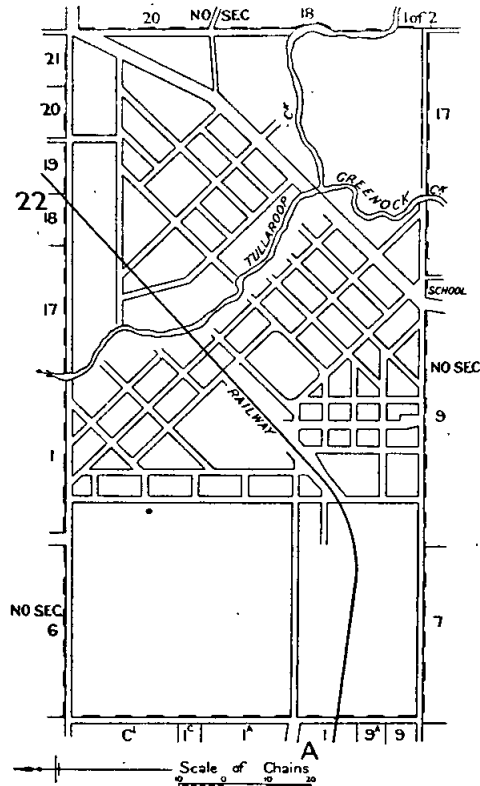

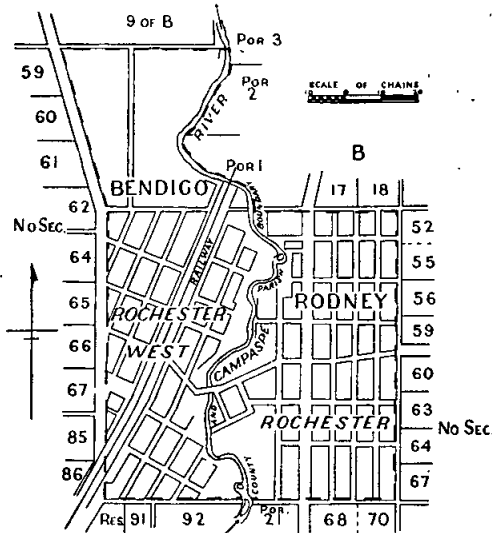

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Governor of the State of Victoria and its Dependencies in the Commonwealth of Australia, &c., &c., &c.

I, THE Governor of the State of Victoria, in the Commonwealth of Australia, by and with the advice of the Executive Council of the said State, and in pursuance of the provisions of the Game Acts and all other powers me enabling in that behalf, do by this Proclamation remove from the Third Schedule to the *Game Act 1928* the names of the following birds:—

Quails (*Phasianidae* and *Turnicidae*), all species;
Quail, Brown (*Synoicus australis*);
Quail, Painted (*Turnix varia*);

and the period of the close season set opposite the names of such birds, and I do hereby name the under-mentioned birds as birds which shall be included in the Third Schedule to the *Game Act 1928*, and do set opposite such names in the said Schedule the periods shown hereunder:—

Quail, Stubble (*Coturnix pectoralis*)—from the fifteenth day of June in each year to the last day preceding the second Saturday in March next following (both days inclusive);

Quail, Brown (*Synoicus australis*)—the whole year;
Quail, King (*Excalfactoria chinensis*)—the whole year;
Quail, Little (*Turnix velox*)—the whole year;
Quail, Painted (*Turnix varia*)—the whole year;
Quail, Red backed (*Turnix maculosa*)—the whole year;
Quail, Red chested (*Turnix pyrrhothorax*)—the whole year;

Quail, Swamp (*Synoicus ypsilophorus*)—the whole year.

I do further direct that this Proclamation shall come into operation after the expiration of a period of seven days from the date of its publication in the *Government Gazette*.

I THE Governor of the State of Victoria, in the Commonwealth of Australia, by and with the advice of the Executive Council of the said State, and in pursuance of the provisions of the Game Acts and all other powers me enabling in that behalf, do by this Proclamation remove from the Third Schedule to the *Game Act 1928* the names of the following birds:—

Snipe, all kinds (*Gallinago hardwicki* and *Rostratula australis*);

and the period of the close season set opposite the names of such birds, and I do hereby name the under-mentioned birds as birds which shall be included in the Third Schedule to the *Game Act 1928*, and do set opposite such names in the said Schedule the periods shown hereunder:—

Snipe, Australian (*Capella hardwickii*)—from the first day of June to the thirtieth day of June in each year.

Snipe, Australian Painted (*Rostratula benghalensis*)—the whole year.

I do further direct that this Proclamation shall come into operation after the expiration of a period of seven days from the date of its publication in the *Government Gazette*.

WHEREAS section 900 (2) of the *Local Government Act 1946* provides, *inter alia*, that the Governor in Council may, by Proclamation published in the *Government Gazette*, at the request of the council of any municipality (not being a city or town), extend the operation of the Regulations made under Part XLIX. of the Act to the municipal district of such municipality or any part thereof:

And whereas the Council of the Shire of Rutherglen has requested that the operation of the said Regulations be extended to the municipal district of such municipality:

Now, therefore, I, the Governor of the State of Victoria, by and with the advice of the Executive Council thereof, by this, my Proclamation, do hereby extend the operation of the Regulations made under Part XLIX. of the *Local Government Act 1946* to the municipal district of the Shire of Rutherglen.

And do further provide that the said Regulations (other than those contained in Parts I. and II. of chapter 8 thereof) shall come into operation in the above-mentioned municipal district of the Shire of Rutherglen on publication of this Proclamation in the *Government Gazette*, and that the Regulations contained in the said Parts I. and II. of chapter 8 shall come into operation therein on the 1st day of June, 1953.

2. Sub-Regulation 37, section IV. of Regulation No. 168 of the Principal Regulations is amended by deleting paragraphs (a) and (b) and re-lettering as (a) and (b) paragraphs (c) and (d).

THE PORTLAND HARBOR TRUST COMMISSIONERS.

REGULATIONS.—AMENDMENT No. 1.

IN pursuance of the *Portland Harbor Trust Act 1949* the Portland Harbor Trust Commissioners make the following Regulations:—

1. After sub-Regulation 12 of Regulation 97 the following new sub-Regulation is added:—

"97. (13) 1. The Licensed Wharfinger of a vessel from which goods in an aggregate amount exceeding 500 tons weight and/or measurement are unshipped or to be unshipped on to any wharf or wharves shall:—

(a) Keep in the delivery office a book to be called the Cargo Location Record Book.

(b) Forthwith upon the unshipping of any consignment of goods from such vessel enter in the Cargo Location Record Book:—

(i) The distinguishing marks or numbers of the goods and the number and type of packages comprising them.

(ii) The date or dates upon which the Consignment was unshipped.

(iii) The position on the wharf of the goods, such position being described by reference to the known divisions of the wharf.

(iv) If a Consignment is divided and stacked in different places the position (described as aforesaid) of each part of the Consignment.

(c) Permit any Consignee or agent of the Consignee of goods unshipped from such vessel or any Officer of the Commissioners to inspect the book during any hours within which the work of unloading ships is usually carried on. The entries in the Cargo Location Record Book shall as far as possible be in alphabetical order according to the first letter of the marks of the goods.

2. Where goods are unshipped on to two or more wharfs from the same vessel the Licensed Wharfinger shall cause to be entered up and made available a separate Cargo Location Record Book for each such wharf unless the Commissioners otherwise permit.

3. In this Regulation the words 'Delivery Office' mean the delivery office or the place used as a delivery office or depot on the wharf on to which the goods are unshipped."

2. Regulation No. 210 is repealed and in lieu thereof the following Regulation is substituted:—

"210. No person shall lay down or use any moorings therein or place any vessel on any wharf or other property of the Commissioners unless under license from the Commissioners and subject to the payment of the appointed rates, and no moorings shall be removed without the permission of the Commissioners."

3. Regulation No. 211 is repealed and in lieu thereof the following Regulation is substituted:—

“211. Every application for a licence to lay down moorings shall be accompanied by full particulars as to site and nature of moorings and vessel to be moored thereat, and no licence will be issued unless all the conditions set out on the application for Boat Mooring Licence are complied with to the satisfaction of the Commissioners.”

4. The charges relating to Boat Moorings in Regulation 244 and appearing in Schedule No. 7 are repealed and in lieu thereof the following charges are substituted:—

5. The first paragraph of sub-Regulation (2) of Regulation 265 is repealed and the following sub-Regulation is inserted in lieu thereof:—

“265. The driver or any person in charge of a vehicle on any Road Wharf Ramp or bridge shall in addition to conducting such vehicle in compliance with the other Regulations conduct such vehicle in accordance with directions of the Commissioners set out on notices displayed or marked on such Road Wharf Ramp or bridge.”

6. The charges under Regulation 274 relating to the hire of wire springs will appear in Schedule 9A and shall be:—

CITY OF PRESTON.

Interim Development Order.

WHEREAS by virtue of the powers conferred by the Town and Country Planning Acts, and every other power enabling them in that behalf the Council of the City of Preston (hereinafter referred to as the "Responsible Authority") having commenced the preparation of a planning scheme in accordance with the said Act, hereby makes the following Interim Development Order:—

1. The development of all land referred to in the Schedule and the erection, construction, and carrying out of any buildings, roads or other works on any of the said land is hereby prohibited.

2. Any person may apply to the Responsible Authority for permission to develop, subdivide or otherwise use any land or erect or construct any buildings, roads or other works, during the operation of this Order.

3. Any application for permission to develop, subdivide or otherwise use any land or erect or construct any building, roads or other works, may be granted by the Responsible Authority subject to such conditions as are specified in the permit, or may be refused.

4. Any owner of any land who, after the publication of a copy of this Order contravenes any of the provisions contained herein, shall, when directed by notice in writing, remove, pull down, take up or alter any building, road or other works, and, if any owner fails to do so within the time specified by the notice, the Responsible Authority may carry out all or any of such works, and recover all expenses incurred, after due notice has been given to the owner, lessee and/or occupier in accordance with the provisions of the Town and Country Planning Acts.

5. None of the provisions of this Order shall prohibit the continuance of the use of any land or buildings for the purpose for which it was lawfully used immediately before the coming into operation of this Order.

6. This Order shall remain in operation until the approval of the Planning Scheme in accordance with the Town and Country Planning Acts, or until this Interim Development Order is revoked by the Governor in Council.

7. *Schedule of Land Affected:* The whole of the Municipal District of the City of Preston.

(e) The period of apprenticeship shall not exceed four or five years, including any period of experience in the occupation to which the minor is being apprenticed prior to entering into the indenture of apprenticeship.

(f) An employer especially qualified to teach apprentices may, with the consent of the Wages Board, employ a greater proportion of apprentices to tradesmen than herein specified.

(g) Until further order any contract of apprenticeship may contain the following provision :—

If through lack of orders or through financial difficulties the employer is unable at any time to find employment and training for an apprentice, and if a transfer to another employer cannot be arranged, the obligations and duties imposed by the indenture may with the concurrence of the apprentice and his guardian be suspended for a period agreed upon or if no such agreement is arrived at may be cancelled by the employer. The onus of proof of circumstances justifying such cancellation shall be on the employer.

(h) Any apprentice who cannot complete his full term of apprenticeship before reaching his twenty-second birthday may by agreement with his master serve as an apprentice until he reaches the age of twenty-three years.

(i) All wages shall be paid without deduction for specified holidays or for unavoidable absences through sickness to the number of 40 hours of working time per annum.

(j) The apprentice at the end of the calendar period of any year in which he has actually given service to the master upon less than the ordinary working days prescribed in this Determination, or in which he has unlawfully absented himself without the master's consent shall, for every day short of the said number of working days, and for every day of such absence, serve one day, and the calendar period of the succeeding year of his service shall not be deemed to begin until the said additional day or days shall have been served.

(k) The ordinary hours of employment of apprentices shall be the same in each workshop as those of the journeymen.

(l) An apprentice under the age of eighteen years shall not be liable to work overtime unless he so desires.

(m) An apprentice shall not work under any system of piecework.

(n) An employer shall not, either directly or indirectly, or by any pretence or device receive from any person or require or permit any person to pay or give any consideration in the nature of a premium or bonus for the taking or binding of any probationer or apprentice.

(o) *Tools of Trade* :—All tools of trade necessarily required by an apprentice in the learning of his trade shall be supplied by the employer of the apprentice. Such tools of trade shall remain the property of the apprentice on completion of his indenture.

APPRENTICESHIP.

Work to be Taught.

3. (a) An apprentice shall be taught the work of each of the following occupations:—

- (1) Tool making;
- (2) Setting-up; and
- (3) Machining.

Contract of Apprenticeship.

(b) Every contract of apprenticeship hereinafter made shall contain—

- (i) the names of the parties;
- (ii) the date of birth of the apprentice;
- (iii) a statement of the trade or trades to which the apprentice is to be bound and which he is to be taught during the course and for the purpose of the apprenticeship;
- (iv) a covenant by the master to teach and instruct or cause the apprentice to be taught or instructed in the trade to which the apprentice is bound;
- (v) the date at which the apprenticeship is to commence or from which it is to be calculated;
- (vi) all other conditions of apprenticeship.

Cancellation or Suspension of Indenture.

(c) If through lack of orders or through financial difficulties an employer is unable at any time to find employment and training for an apprentice and if a transfer to another employer cannot be arranged, the obligations and duties imposed by the indenture may, with the concurrence of the apprentice and his guardian, be suspended for a period agreed upon, or if no such agreement is arrived at the indenture may with the approval of the Secretary for Labour be determined by the employer. The onus of proving circumstances justifying such determination shall be on the employer.

Proportion.

(d) (i) The proportion of apprentices who may be taken by an employer shall be one to every three or fraction of three tradesmen.

For the purpose of ascertaining the number of apprentices, the number of tradesmen shall be deemed to be the average number working during the immediately preceding six months, and, in ascertaining such proportion an employer actually working in any workshop shall be deemed to be a tradesman.

A person who is for a term not exceeding two years taking practical training in a workshop in continuance of a course of training for professional work shall not be taken into account in calculating the proportion of apprentices to tradesmen.

(ii) An employer specially qualified to teach apprentices may, with the consent of the Secretary for Labour, on the recommendation of the Wages Board, employ a greater proportion of apprentices to tradesmen than hereinbefore specified.

Until further order, apprentices so taken shall not be counted in future calculations of the proportion of apprentices to tradesmen authorized by this Determination.

Period of Apprenticeship.

If an apprentice is under the age of 16 years 6 months at the time of commencing—5 years; if 16 years and 6 months or over—4 years.

Probationary Period.

(e) Minors may be taken on probation for three months and if apprenticed such three months shall count as part of their period of apprenticeship.

Wages.

(f) The minimum weekly rates of wages for apprentices shall be the undermentioned percentages of the contemporaneous basic wage prescribed for the area in which they are employed, and in all contracts of apprenticeship hereafter made the employer shall covenant to pay wages of not less than such rates:—

The total wage of apprentices shall be calculated to the nearest sixpence, any broken part of sixpence in the result not exceeding threepence to be disregarded.

Provided that subject to the sub-clause relating to lost time herein an apprentice on attaining the age of 21 years shall thereafter, until he has completed his apprenticeship, be paid the appropriate tradesman's rate as set out in clause 2.

On the expiration of his apprenticeship an employee who produces satisfactory evidence that he has satisfactorily completed the full term set out in his indentures shall, irrespective of the work on which he may be employed, receive the rate provided for a nail or tack tool maker.

Hours.

(h) The ordinary hours of employment of apprentices shall not in each workshop exceed those of the tradesmen.

Overtime and Shift Work.

(i) No apprentice under the age of eighteen years shall be required to work overtime or shift work unless he so desires.

Payment by Results.

(j) An apprentice shall not work under any system of payment by results.

Lost Time.

(k) The apprentice at the end of the calendar period of any year in which he has actually given service to the master upon less than the ordinary working days prescribed in this Determination, or in which he has unlawfully absented himself without the master's consent shall, for every day short of the said number of working days, and for every day of such absence, serve one day, and the calendar period of the succeeding year of his service shall not be deemed to begin until the said additional day or days shall have been served.

Provided that in calculating the extra time to be so served the apprentice shall be credited with time which he has worked during the relevant year in excess of his ordinary hours.

Prohibition of Premiums.

(l) An employer shall not, either directly or indirectly, or by any pretence or device receive from any person or require or permit any person to pay or give any consideration in the nature of a premium or bonus for the taking or binding of any probationer or apprentice.

Attendance at Technical Schools.

(m) Apprentices attending technical colleges or schools and presenting reports of satisfactory conduct shall be reimbursed all fees paid by them.

Annual and Sick Leave.

(n) Apprentices shall be entitled to sick and annual leave in accordance with the provisions of clauses 14 and 15 hereof respectively.

In the above provisions as to work performed by females, "experience" means experience in a branch of the industry, including experience in the employ of more than one employer, and any female employee mentioned in such provisions on leaving or being discharged from her employment shall be entitled to a certificate from her employer stating the date when such employment began and the date of its termination duly signed or otherwise authenticated by the employer. Such certificate shall be the property of the employee and shall be returned to her by any subsequent employer within seven days of her engagement.	

Clauses, other than clauses 2, 3 and 4, of the said Determination shall remain in force, provided that the words "In addition to the piece-work rates set out in this Schedule a piece-worker shall be paid 77s. 6d. for each full week or a *pro rata* amount according to the time actually worked if less than a full week be worked" in the first paragraph of Schedule "A"—Machine Composition shall be amended by the substitution of the amount of 111s. 4d. for the said amount of 77s. 6d.
