RECONSTITUTION OF A MEAT AREA.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Governor of the State of Victoria and its Dependencies in the Commonwealth of Australia, &c., &c., &c.

BY virtue of the powers conferred by the Health Acts, I, the Governor of the State of Victoria, in the Commonwealth of Australia, on the recommendation of the Commission of Public Health and by and with the advice of the Executive Council of the said State, do by this my Proclamation constitute as a meat area, to be known as the Corangamite Meat Area—

(a) All that part of the municipal district of the Shire of Hampden: Commencing at a point on the Mount Emu Creek, being the boundary between the Counties of Hampden and Heytesbury, at the north-east angle of the Parish of Laang; and bounded thence westerly and south-westerly by that creek to the road forming the west boundary of subdivision 1B of allotment 13B, Parish of Garvoc; thence north-westerly by that road to the Prince's Highway; thence north-easterly by that highway to the west boundary of the Parish of Terang; thence northerly by that boundary and the west boundary of the Parish of Glenormiston, and east by the north boundary of the last-named parish to the Mount Emu Creek aforesaid; thence northerly along that creek to the north-western corner of Crown allotment 29A, Parish of Caramballac South; thence easterly along the northern boundary of the said allotment 29A, and by a line across a road to the north-western corner of allotment 36A in the last-named parish; thence easterly along the northern boundaries of allotments 36A and 37A, Parish of Caramballac South, and by a line across a road to the north-western corner of allotment 45A in the last-named parish; thence south along the west boundaries of allotments 45A and 45B, Parish of Caramballac South, to the south-western corner of allotment 45B in the last-named parish; thence easterly along the northern boundaries of allotments 13A, 12A, 4A, 4B, 3A, and 3B, Parish of Caramballac South, allotments 24A, 24B, 21A, 13A, 12A, 5A, and 4A, Parish of Vite Vite, and allotments 105A, 106A, 107A, 108A, 123A, 124A, 125A, 122, 121, 120, and 118, Parish of Galla, to the intersection with the Gnarkeet Chain of Ponds Creek, being on the eastern boundary of the County of Hampden; thence southerly by the eastern boundary of the County of Hampden to the north boundary of the Parish of Pollah North, in the County of Grenville; thence east by that boundary and the north boundary of the Parish of Wilgul North to the Woody Yallock River; thence southerly by that river, and south-westerly and westerly by the southern margin of the Salt Lakes and Junction Creek to Lake Corangamite; thence southerly by

the eastern margin, and northerly by the western margin of the said lake to the boundary between the Counties of Hampden and Heytesbury; thence westerly by the said county boundary to the point of commencement.

(b) The whole of the municipal district of the Shire of Heytesbury.

(c) All that part of the municipal district of the Shire of Mortlake: Commencing at a point at the south-east corner of the Parish of Kellambete; and bounded thence westerly by the southern boundary of the said parish and the Parish of Framlingham East, to the Hopkins River at the south-western corner of the Parish of Framlingham East; thence northerly by the Hopkins River to the south-eastern corner of the Parish of Ballangeich; thence westerly and northerly by the boundaries of the said parish and the western boundary of the Parish of Yeth Youang to Muston's Creek; thence north-easterly by the said creek to the south-western corner of the Parish of Hexham West; thence northerly by the western boundary of the last-named parish to the north-western corner thereof; thence westerly and north-easterly by the boundaries of the Parish of Chatsworth West to the southern boundary of Patterson-street, in the Township of Chatsworth; thence easterly by the said street to the Hopkins River; thence northerly by the said river to the north-eastern corner of allotment 55A, Parish of Towanway; thence east by the road on the northern boundary of the said allotment, through the Parishes of Towanway, Woorndoo, Eilyar, and Terrinallum, to the junction with Mount Emu Creek, on the north-eastern corner of allotment 22A, Parish of Terrinallum; thence southerly by the said Mount Emu Creek to the south-eastern corner of the Parish of Wooriwyrite; thence westerly by the southern boundary of the last-named parish to the south-western corner thereof; thence southerly by the eastern boundaries of the Parishes of Kolora and Kellambete to the point of commencement.

(d) All that part of the municipal district of the Shire of Warrnambool: Commencing at a point at the north-eastern corner of allotment 31A, Parish of Garvoc; and bounded thence easterly by the southern boundary of the Parish of Kellambete to the intersection of the said boundary with the Prince's Highway; thence southerly and south-westerly by the said highway to the south-eastern corner of allotment 12B, Parish of Garvoc; thence southerly and south-easterly by a road to Mount Emu Creek; thence easterly by the said creek to the eastern boundary of the Parish of Laang; thence southerly and westerly by the eastern and southern boundaries of the last-named parish to a point at the south-western angle of allotment 65; thence northerly by the western boundaries of allotments 65, 30, 29, 28A, 23, 23A, 23B, 23C, 124, and 69 of the said parish to a point at the north-western angle of allotment 69; thence westerly by the southern boundary of allotment 97C to a point where the said boundary

intersects a prolongation of the north-eastern boundary of allotment 40B, Parish of Garvoc, and north-westerly by the said prolongation and boundary to the Prince's Highway; thence north-easterly along the said highway to a point at the south-western angle of allotment 38B, northerly by a road to a point at the north-eastern angle of Bostock's Pre-emptive Right, westerly by a road along the northern boundary of the said Pre-emptive Right to a point at the south-west corner of allotment 35A; and thence northerly by a road to the point of commencement.

(e) The whole of the municipal district of the Borough of Camperdown.

This Proclamation shall take effect on the 1st day of April, 1954.

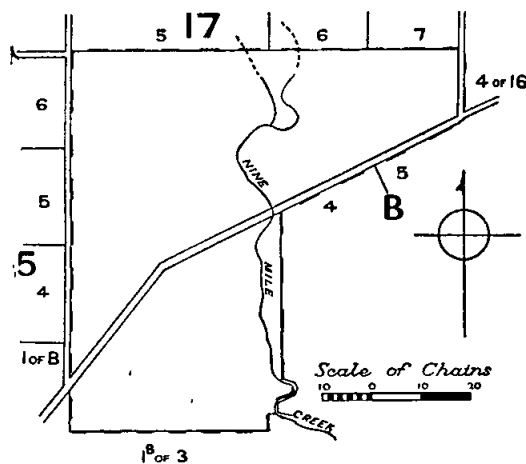

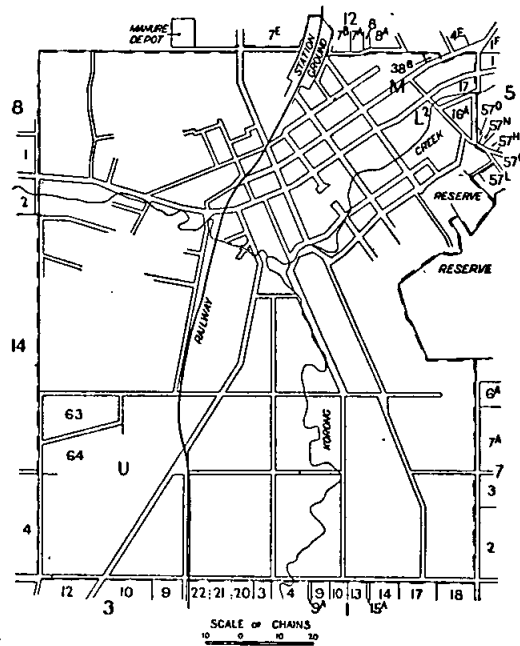

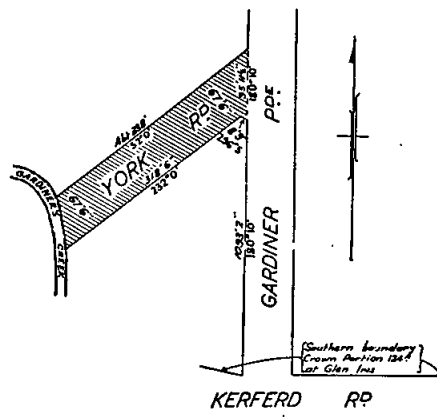

5. None of the provisions of this Order shall prohibit the continuance of the use of any land or building for the purpose for which it was used immediately before the coming into operation of this Order.

6. This Order shall remain in operation until the approval of the planning scheme, in accordance with the Town and Country Planning Acts, or until this Interim Development Order is revoked by the Governor in Council.

2. No subletting shall be allowed; all work must be carried out by the contractor, and every person engaged in the cartage tendered for in this schedule shall be paid such wages and employed subject to such labour conditions as are or may be determined by any Federal Arbitration Court award or any State Wages Board determination, and a copy of such labour conditions shall be kept conspicuously and continually posted, in legible Roman characters, on the premises of the contractor. Any infringement of this condition, in the opinion of the Treasurer, will subject the contractor, upon report from the Tender Board, to such mulct, not exceeding Fifty pounds (£50), as the Treasurer may direct, and the amount will be deducted from the contractor's account or from the security money; and the Treasurer's decision shall be binding, final, and conclusive as to the fact of infringement and in all other respects.

3. Accounts shall be rendered fortnightly, and shall be subject to any deductions for goods or parcels lost or damaged whilst in the custody of the contractor or for storage or demurrage charges which may accrue through delay or default by the contractor in taking delivery of the goods.

4. No claims for detention shall be entertained, but should the contractor be subjected to unreasonable delay, the cause of delay, if reported, shall be investigated.

5. The contractor must have an office connected by telephone, and within a radius of 6 miles of the Melbourne (Elizabeth-street) Post Office. Thirty minutes will be deemed sufficient notice, and in the event of the contractor failing to supply the vehicles when ordered, and to the satisfaction of the officer requiring his services, such services will be performed at his risk and expense, and the extra expense incurred will be deducted as provided in clause 2.

6. No services performed under these contracts shall be deemed to be of a special nature, provided that the contractor be given 30 minutes' notice that his services shall be required, and no increase in the contract rates shall be permitted.

7. All vehicles in which the goods or parcels are carried must be fitted with good waterproof covers, be in thorough working order and, in general, suitable for requirements.

8. SHIRE OF WINCHELSEA.

A By-law No. 45, made under Division (7) of Part IV. of the *Health Act 1928*, for—

- (1) the provision, use, and control of receptacles for deposit and collection of refuse and rubbish, and prescribing size, shape, and materials to be used in construction of such receptacles;
- (2) the removal, replacement, cleansing, and disinfecting of receptacles for rubbish, and the use of deodorants or disinfectants in such receptacles.

IN pursuance of the powers conferred by the *Health Act 1928*, the President, Councillors, and Ratepayers of the Shire of Winchelsea order as follows:—

1. The By-laws or provisions thereof (if any) referred to in the Schedule hereto are hereby repealed.

PART 1.

2. This By-law shall come into full force and operation on its approval by the Governor in Council and immediately after its publication in the *Government Gazette*.

3. This By-law shall apply to and have operation in the Township of Lorne, over the whole areas which are or may be from time to time declared Township area, and unless exempted by the Council shall apply to every house, building, and premises therein.

4. In this By-law, unless inconsistent with the context or subject-matter:—

"Proprietor" means the proprietor of any premises, and includes the owner, the occupier, or any other person having the management or control thereof.

"Refuse" includes all waste (except sewerage or manure) produced or accumulated in or about any house, building, or premises.

5. The proprietor of every house, building, or premises shall provide, keep, and maintain at all times upon his premises a properly-constructed receptacle in which he shall from time to time cause to be deposited all refuse produced or accumulated in or about such house, building, or premises.

6. Such a receptacle shall be constructed of galvanized iron of not less than 24 gauge or other approved material in such a manner as to prevent any absorption by any part of such receptacle of any offensive matter which may be deposited therein or any escape by leakage or otherwise of any other part of the contents of such receptacle.

7. Each such receptacle shall have a capacity of not more than three (3) cubic feet, and shall be so constructed as to be capable of being easily and conveniently carried by one man.

8. It shall be strongly constructed and provided with properly attached side-lifting handles.

9. Such receptacle shall be provided with a suitable close-fitting lid with a flange overlapping the top of such receptacle, and shall be kept constantly covered (except when such refuse is being deposited therein or discharged therefrom), and a sufficient quantity of some efficient deodorant shall be from time to time introduced therein when necessary to keep such refuse in an inoffensive condition.

10. No person shall place or cause or permit to be placed any slops or liquid waste in such receptacle, nor shall deposit any moist refuse in such receptacle unless such moist refuse has been previously strained and effectively wrapped in waste paper.

11. The proprietor shall cause such receptacle to be kept at all times in good repair and clean condition, and shall coat the inside of such receptacle with tar or other suitable substance when deemed necessary by the Council.

12. The proprietor shall cause at such hours and on such days as may be appointed by the Council for the removal of refuse such receptacle to be deposited close to and inside of the entrance of such house, building, or

premises from the street, lane, or right-of-way on which such house, building, or premises abut in order that the contents of such receptacle may be conveniently removed by the contractor or person authorized or employed in that behalf by the Council.

13. No person shall place or cause to be placed any such receptacle in or upon any street, lane, or right-of-way except in the case of business premises built on the street alignment where such premises do not abut on a suitable right-of-way or land on which such receptacle could be placed for collection and emptying.

PART 2.

14. The contractor or person authorized or employed by the Council for the removal of such refuse shall be responsible for the complete emptying (without spilling any of the contents) of such receptacle directly into a vehicle provided for its reception at such hours and on such days as may be appointed by the Council. Such contractor or person shall also be responsible for the replacement of such receptacle properly covered with its lid, and shall also close the gate or gates of the premises from which such receptacle is taken.

15. The contractor or person authorized or employed by the Council for the removal of such refuse shall at least once each week collect and remove such refuse in a suitably covered vehicle in such a manner as not to cause nuisance, danger to health, or offensiveness.

16. Such vehicle shall be provided with a cover and kept covered except when refuse is being put into or discharged from such vehicle.

17. Such vehicle shall, as far as practicable, be rendered watertight by means of an impervious lining or by painting the inside thereof with tar or by other suitable and effective means.

18. Such vehicle when full shall be taken by the quickest possible route to the tip, where, as soon as practicable, the refuse shall be rendered innocuous by means of fire (except during the proclaimed period), earth burial, or such other method as may be directed by the Health Inspector, and in such manner as not to create a nuisance.

19. The contractor or person authorized or employed by the Council for the removal of such refuse shall cause all vehicles used for the reception and removal of such refuse to be properly constructed, kept clean, and thoroughly disinfected with approved disinfectant and maintained in a proper state of repair.

20. If any refuse is authorized to be deposited or disposed of in or on any land, hole, quarry, or indenture, such refuse shall be deposited in a regular and orderly manner, and within 24 hours of each day's depositing, the contractor or the person or persons authorized or employed by the Council shall cover the surface with a layer of earth or other non-putrescible material so that no refuse is exposed, and to the satisfaction of the Health Inspector and the Shire Engineer.

21. Land upon which refuse has been deposited shall be seasonably planted or sown with seed of grass of any corage or cereal crops or other such vegetable life as the Council shall direct or approve.

22. The whole of the work under this By-law must be carried out in accordance with the provisions of the *Health Act 1928*.

23. The depot, which is situated in portion of the present sanitary depot off the Deans Marsh-road, will be open at such times as determined from time to time by the Council, and refuse must be deposited in such places and in such a manner during these hours as directed by the person authorized by the Council.

24. If any person or persons commits a breach of the By-law he or they shall for every such breach be liable to a penalty of not more than Twenty pounds, and in the case of a continuing offence a further daily penalty of not more than Five pounds.

25. If the contractor fails or neglects to carry out any of the works herein comprised within six (6) hours after notice duly given him by the Health Inspector or Shire Engineer, the Council shall be at liberty to carry out the work at the cost of the contractor, and such cost may be deducted from any money due or becoming due to him. This will be strictly enforced during the term of the contract.

Prices Regulation Acts.

PRICES REGULATION ORDER No. 523.

BOVINE HIDES AND SKINS.

IN pursuance of the powers conferred upon me by the Prices Regulation Acts, I, John Francis Waldron, Prices Commissioner, hereby make the following Order:—

Citation.

1. This Order may be cited as Prices Regulation Order No. 523.

Revocation.

2. Prices Regulation Order No. 223 as amended by Prices Regulation Order No. 418 is hereby revoked.

Application.

3. This Order shall apply to bovine hides and skins produced in Victoria or Tasmania.

Definition and Interpretations.

4. (1) "Meatworks" means an establishment at which stock is slaughtered and treated principally for export.

(2) The grades, classifications, terms, and descriptions appearing in the Schedule to this Order are those customarily used by persons trading in bovine hides and skins.

(3) Wherever the words and figures "Tare 4 per cent." appear in the Schedule to this Order in relation to any hides or skins, before calculating in respect of any such hides or skins the maximum permissible selling price fixed in relation thereto under this Order, the total weight of the lot of hides or skins the subject of the sale shall be reduced by 4 per cent.

Maximum Prices.

5. I fix and declare the maximum price in pence per pound at which any grade, class, type or weight of bovine hide or skin or lot thereof specified in the Schedule to this Order may be sold or offered for sale by any person to be the price in pence per pound specified therein.

Delivery of Invoices.

6. Any person who sells any bovine hides or skins of a grade, class, type or weight specified in the Schedule to this Order shall deliver with such bovine hides or skins an invoice or docket in relation thereto containing the following particulars:—

- (i) name and address of the seller;
- (ii) name and address of the purchaser;
- (iii) date of sale;
- (iv) lot number or sale list number;
- (v) description, in terms of the relevant description in the Schedule to this Order, of the grade, class, type or weight of the bovine hides or skins sold;
- (vi) price per pound of the hides or skins sold;
- (vii) total weight of the hides or skins sold;
- (viii) total price of the hides or skins sold;
- (ix) terms and conditions of sale;

and shall keep and preserve a duplicate or copy of such invoice or docket.

Exhibition of Price List.

7. Every person who sells or has for sale any bovine hides or skins shall exhibit in a prominent position in his place of business or, if he has more than one place of business, in each of his places of business, a notice or notices setting forth his maximum selling price per pound in relation to each grade, class, type or weight of bovine hides or skins, that is to say by exhibiting a copy of the Schedule to this Order.

Price Tickets.

8. Every person who sells or has for sale any bovine hides or skins shall exhibit in relation to each lot of such hides or skins displayed by him anywhere upon his place or places of business a separate price card—

- (i) describing such lot in terms of the relevant description or descriptions in the Schedule to this Order for that grade, class, type or weight of hides or skins comprised in such lot; and
- (ii) specifying the maximum selling in pence per pound of such lot, so as to properly associate such description and such price per pound with the bovine hides or skins to which that description and that price apply.

Auction Sales of Bovine Hides or Skins.

9. I hereby permit a sale by auction of any bovine hides or skins only insofar as the terms and conditions appearing in paragraphs 9 to 12 inclusive of this Order are complied with.

Catalogue.

10. (i) Any person who proposes to conduct any auction sale of any bovine hides or skins shall, except insofar as the exemption is granted by Notice in Writing by the Prices Commissioner to that person, prepare and deliver to the Prices Commissioner a complete catalogue of the bovine hides and skins to be offered for sale at such auction.

(ii) The catalogue referred to shall be delivered to the Prices Commissioner not less than 24 hours prior to the time of the auction.

(iii) Subject to the provisions of sub-paragraph (i) hereof such catalogue shall describe the bovine hides and skins to be offered at such auction in terms of the relevant description of the grade, class, type or weight in the Schedule to this Order applicable to those hides or skins and specify any identifying number to be used for the purpose of such auction and a proposed selling price per pound not exceeding the maximum selling price per pound in accordance with the provisions of paragraph 4 of this Order.

Records.

11. All persons who sell any bovine hides or skins by auction or otherwise shall keep a complete record of—

- (a) the names and addresses of the owner or owners of those bovine hides or skins;
- (b) the names and addresses of the purchasers of those bovine hides or skins;
- (c) the prices per pound at which those bovine hides or skins were sold—

and shall preserve that record until its destruction is authorized by the Prices Commissioner.

Bidding.

12. No bid of a price in excess of the maximum fixed in accordance with this Order shall be acknowledged by the auctioneer.

Announcement.

13. Immediately prior to the commencement of any auction the auctioneer, in addition to any other announcement which he is required by law to make, shall announce that no bid will be accepted of prices in excess of the maximum price fixed in accordance with this Order.

Fixation of Maximum Prices by Notice.

14. Notwithstanding the foregoing provisions of this Order, I declare the maximum price at which bovine hides and skins specified in a notice in pursuance of this paragraph may be sold by any person to whom such notice is given to be such price as is fixed by the Prices Commissioner by Notice in Writing to that person.

Prices Regulation Acts.

PRICES REGULATION ORDER No. 524.

BOVINE HIDES AND SKINS.

I N pursuance of the powers conferred upon me by the Prices Regulation Acts, I, John Francis Waldron, Prices Commissioner, hereby make the following Order:—

Citation.

1. This Order may be cited as Prices Regulation Order No. 524.

Revocation.

2. Prices Regulation Order No. 224 as amended by Prices Regulation Order No. 419 is hereby revoked.

Application.

3. This Order shall apply only to bovine hides and skins produced in States other than Victoria or Tasmania.

Definition and Interpretations.

4. In this Order unless the contrary intention appears—

“meatworks” means an establishment at which stock is slaughtered and treated principally for export;

the grades, classifications, terms, and descriptions appearing in this Order are those customarily used by persons trading in bovine hides and skins;

wherever the word and figures “Tare 4 per cent.” appear in this Order in relation to any hides or skins, before calculating in respect of any such hides or skins the maximum permissible selling price fixed in relation thereto under this Order, the total weight of the hides or skins sold shall be reduced by 4 per cent.

Maximum Prices.

5. I fix and declare the maximum price in pence per pound at which any grade, class, type or weight of bovine hides or skins or lot thereof specified in the Schedules to this Order may be sold or offered for sale by any person to be—

- (a) in respect of bovine hides and skins produced in New South Wales the price in pence per pound specified in the First Schedule to this Order;
- (b) in respect of bovine hides and skins produced in South Australia the price in pence per pound specified in the Second Schedule to this Order;
- (c) in respect of bovine hides and skins produced in Queensland the price in pence per pound specified in the Third Schedule to this Order;
- (d) in respect of bovine hides and skins produced in Western Australia the price in pence per pound specified in the Fourth Schedule to this Order.

Delivery of Invoices.

6. Any person who sells any bovine hides or skins of a grade, class, type or weight specified in the Schedules to this Order shall deliver with such bovine hides or skins an invoice or docket in relation thereto containing the following particulars:—

- (i) name and address of the seller;
- (ii) name and address of the purchaser;
- (iii) date of sale;
- (iv) lot number or sale list number;
- (v) description, in the terms of the relevant description in the Schedules to this Order, of the grade, class, type, or weight of the bovine hides or skins sold;
- (vi) price per pound;
- (vii) total weight;
- (viii) total price;
- (ix) terms and conditions of sale;

and shall keep and preserve a duplicate or copy of such invoice or docket.

Exhibition of Price List.

7. Every person who sells or has for sale any bovine hides or skins shall exhibit in a prominent position in his place of business or, if he has more than one place of business, in each of his places of business, a notice or notices setting forth his maximum selling price per pound in relation to each grade, class, type or weight of bovine hides or skins, that is to say by exhibiting a copy of the Schedule to this Order.

Price Tickets.

8. Every person who sells or has for sale any bovine hides or skins shall exhibit in relation to each lot of such hides or skins displayed by him anywhere upon his place or places of business a separate price card—

- (i) describing such lot in terms of the relevant description in the Schedules to this Order for that grade, class, type or weight of hides or skins comprised in such lot; and
- (ii) specifying the maximum selling price in pence per pound of such lot—

so as to properly associate such description and such price per pound with the bovine hides or skins to which that description and that price applies.

Auction Sales of Bovine Hides or Skins.

9. I hereby permit a sale by auction of any bovine hides or skins only insofar as the terms and conditions appearing in paragraphs 9 to 12 inclusive of this Order are complied with.

Catalogue.

10. (i) Any person who proposes to conduct any auction sale of any bovine hides or skins shall, except insofar as exemption is granted by Notice in Writing by the Prices Commissioner to that person, prepare and deliver to the Prices Commissioner a complete catalogue of the bovine hides and skins to be offered for sale at such auction.

(ii) The catalogue referred to shall be delivered to the Prices Commissioner not less than 24 hours prior to the time of the auction.

(iii) Subject to the provisions of sub-paragraph (i) hereof such catalogue shall describe the bovine hides and skins to be offered at such auction in terms of the relevant description of the grade, class, type or weight in the Schedule to this Order applicable to those hides or skins and specify any identifying number to be used for the purpose of such auction and a proposed selling price per pound not exceeding the maximum selling price per pound fixed in accordance with this Order.

Records.

11. Any person who sells any bovine hides or skins by auction or otherwise shall keep a complete record of—

- (a) the names and addresses of the owner or owners of those bovine hides or skins;
- (b) the names and addresses of the purchasers of those bovine hides or skins;
- (c) the price per pound at which those bovine hides or skins were sold—

and shall preserve the record until its destruction is authorized by the Prices Commissioner.

Bidding.

12. No bid of a price in excess of the maximum fixed in accordance with this Order shall be acknowledged by the auctioneer.

Announcements.

13. Immediately prior to the commencement of any auction the auctioneer, in addition to any other announcement which he is required by law to make, shall announce that no bid will be accepted of a price in excess of the maximum price fixed in accordance with this Order.

Fixation of Maximum Prices by Notice.

14. Notwithstanding the foregoing provisions of this Order, I declare the maximum price at which bovine hides and skins specified in a notice in pursuance of this paragraph may be sold by any person to whom such notice is given to be such price as is fixed by the Commissioner by Notice in Writing to that person.

PRICES REGULATION ORDER No. 529.

MILK—VICTORIA—COUNTRY AREAS.

IN pursuance of the powers conferred upon me by the Prices Regulation Acts, I, John Francis Waldron, Prices Commissioner, hereby make the following Order:—

Citation.

1. This Order may be cited as Prices Regulation Order No. 529.

Revocation.

2. Prices Regulation Order No. 469 is hereby revoked.

Definitions and Interpretation.

3. (1) In this Order, unless the contrary intention appears—
 - “By retail” or “by wholesale” means, in relation to any sale of milk, that such sale is a sale by retail or by wholesale, as the case may be, but is not a sale by semi-wholesale.
 - “By semi-wholesale” means, in relation to the sale of any milk—
 - (a) that such milk is sold by a retailer to a person to whom the retailer has, on the day of the sale, sold a quantity of milk (including that comprised in such first-mentioned sale) exceeding 2 gallons; or
 - (b) is a sale to a person who conducts a shop where milk is sold separately from any milk round.
 - “Central Area” means the area specified in Part I. of the Second Schedule to this Order.
 - “Gippsland Area” means the area specified in Part II. of the Second Schedule to this Order.
 - “Mallee Area” means the area specified in Part III. of the Second Schedule to this Order.
 - “Melbourne Milk Board Area” means the area which at the date of this Order constituted the Metropolis as defined for the purposes of the Milk Board Acts.
 - “North-Central Area” means the area specified in Part IV. of the Second Schedule to this Order.
 - “North-Eastern Area” means the area specified in Part V. of the Second Schedule to this Order.
 - “Northern Area” means the area specified in Part VI. of the Second Schedule to this Order.
 - “Treatment” includes the pasteurization, cooling, chilling, refrigerating of milk, and “treated” has a corresponding meaning.
 - “Western Area” means the area specified in Part VII. of the Second Schedule to this Order.
 - “Wimmera Area” means the area specified in Part VIII. of the Second Schedule to this Order.

(2) For the purpose of this Order, where any post office or principal post office of any place is situated within any Area to which this Order applies but less than 3 miles from any boundary line thereof, then all places within 3 miles of that post office, or principal post office, as the case may be, shall be deemed to be within the area in which that post office, or principal post office, is situated.

Maximum Prices—Specified Areas.

4. I fix and declare the maximum price at which milk may be sold for delivery in any of the areas specified in the first column of the First Schedule to this Order to be—

- (a) in respect of sales to retailers (excluding semi-wholesale sales)—
 - (i) where delivery is taken at the retailer's premises—the price specified in the second column of that Schedule opposite to such area; or
 - (ii) where delivery is taken at any other place—the price specified in sub-paragraph (i) of this paragraph less the cost which would be incurred in transporting the milk to the retailer's premises;

(b) in respect of sales by retail—

- (i) the price specified in the fourth column of that Schedule opposite such area; or
- (ii) the price paid or payable by the retail seller for such milk plus any cost incurred in transporting that milk to his premises, plus an amount computed at the rate of—

For bulk milk—2s. 3½d. per gallon;

For milk in sealed bottles—2s. 7½d. per gallon;

Whichever price is the lesser.

Provided that the maximum price for milk supplied to persons having milk delivered to them regularly in retail quantities of one quart or more per day shall be computed on a weekly basis by multiplying the total quartage delivered during such week by the maximum price per quart fixed by the foregoing provisions of this paragraph.

(c) in respect of sales by semi-wholesale—

- (i) the price specified in the third column of that Schedule opposite such area; or
- (ii) the price paid or payable for such milk by the semi-wholesaler, plus an amount computed at the rate of—

For bulk milk—1s. 3½d. per gallon;

For milk in sealed bottles—Pints—1s. 8½d. per gallon;

For milk in sealed bottles—Half Pints—1s. 11½d. per gallon;

Whichever price is the lesser.

Maximum Prices—Treatment Depots.

5. Notwithstanding the foregoing provisions of this Order, I fix and declare the maximum price at which milk may be sold to any person (other than a retailer) for treatment in any area specified in the Schedules to this Order to be the maximum price for the sale of that milk to a retailer in that area.

6. Notwithstanding the foregoing provisions of this Order, I fix and declare the maximum price at which milk may be sold to a retailer by any person who has purchased that milk and treated that milk in any area specified in the Schedules to this Order to be the maximum price fixed for the sale of that milk to a retailer in that area, plus an amount computed at the rate of 3d. per gallon.

Fixation of Maximum Prices by Notice.

7. Notwithstanding the foregoing provisions of this Order, I fix and declare the maximum price at which milk may be sold in any area specified in the Schedules to this Order by any person to whom a notice is given in pursuance of this clause to be the price fixed by the Prices Commissioner by notice in writing to that person.

Revocation.

2. Prices Regulation Order No. 437 is hereby revoked.

Definitions.

3. In this Order unless the contrary intention appears—
 - "Metropolitan Area" means all that area comprised within a radius of 25 miles from the General Post Office, Melbourne;
 - "12 oz. tin" means any tin holding 12 ounces or more but less than 16 ounces;
 - "16 oz. tin" means any tin holding 16 ounces or more but less than 20 ounces;
 - "20 oz. tin" means any tin holding 20 ounces or more but less than 30 ounces;
 - "30 oz. tin" means any tin holding 30 ounces or more but less than 4 pounds;
 - "4 lb. tin" means any tin holding 4 pounds or more but less than 6½ pounds;
 - "6½ lb. tin" means any tin holding 6½ pounds or more but less than 7 pounds;
 - "7 lb. tin" means any tin holding 7 pounds or more.

Maximum Prices.

4. I fix and declare the maximum prices at which canned fruits of any of the descriptions specified in the Schedule to this Order may be sold to wholesalers or to retailers to be the prices specified in the Schedule to this Order.

Provided that in respect of all sales where payment by the purchaser is made within seven days of the receipt of the invoice, a discount of 5 per cent. shall be allowed from the maximum prices specified in the Schedule to this Order.

Delivery of Invoice.

5. Any person who sells any canned fruits of any of the descriptions specified in the Schedule to this Order shall deliver with such canned fruit an invoice or docket containing the following particulars:—

- (i) Name and address of the seller;
- (ii) Name and address of the purchaser;
- (iii) Date of sale;
- (iv) The quantity and description of the canned fruit contained in the sale;
- (v) Price per unit charged;
- (vi) Total price charged; and
- (vii) That if payment is made within seven days, a discount of 5 per cent. is allowable.

6. Notwithstanding anything contained in the foregoing provisions of this Order, I declare the maximum price at which canned fruit, a maximum price for the sale of which is fixed by the foregoing provisions of this Order and which is specified in a notice given in pursuance of this clause, may be sold by any person to whom such notice is given, to be such price as is fixed by the Commissioner by notice in writing to that person.

SLAUGHTERING FOR EXPORT BOARD.

Clauses 2 to 8 inclusive and clauses 32 and 33 of the Determination published in *Government Gazette* No. 267 of the 28th April, 1953, shall be replaced by the following clauses:—

SECTION A.

SHEEP AND LAMBS.

2. (a) Rates of Pay—

(i) Chain System as hereinafter described—

To slaughtermen employed in Group A, 6s. 10-025d. plus 1½d. war loading (total 6s. 11-525d.) per 100 sheep or lambs slaughtered	}	Rams double rates, provided that rams 84 lb. or over shall be paid for at treble rates.
To slaughtermen employed in Group B, 72s. 2-355d. plus 1s. 1½d. war loading (total 73s. 3-855d.) per 100 sheep or lambs slaughtered	}	

To learners—

For the first 21 days of employment—

61s. 7-716d. plus 1s. 2½d. war loading (total 62s. 10-116d.) per day.

Thereafter until considered competent by the employer—

68s. 0-466d. plus 1s. 2½d. war loading (total 69s. 2-866d.) per day.

No person under the age of 18 years shall be employed as a learner.

When one team only is employed, the composite rate of 79s. 0-38d. plus 1s. 3d. war loading (total 80s. 3-38d.) per 100 sheep or lambs slaughtered shall be divided equally between the members of Groups A and B.

When two or more teams are employed, men employed in Group A shall divide 6s. 10-025d. plus 1½d. war loading (total 6s. 11-525d.) per 100 sheep or lambs slaughtered equally between them, and men employed in Group B shall divide 72s. 2-355d. plus 1s. 1½d. war loading (total 73s. 3-855d.) per 100 sheep or lambs slaughtered equally between them.

Rate and a half for piecework slaughtermen on the mutton and lamb chain is to be paid when treating in excess of 80 head per man per day.

The following employees shall not be included as members of the team and shall be paid as hereunder:—

To men employed as pointmen, washers, wipers, and stringers—

Such men shall be paid by the employer at the rate hereinafter prescribed for other labourers, and juvenile wipers, washers, and stringers shall be paid at the rate hereinafter prescribed for juvenile workers.

Employees engaged as trimmers on the chain shall be paid at "Other Labourers" rate for the first 2,000 sheep or lambs handled daily per employee and thereafter an additional daily rate of 9d. per 100 sheep or lambs per employee.

Employees engaged as pushers-in to chain or ring, i.e., feeding from the bleeding rail to the logging table, shall be paid at "Other Labourers" rate for the first 2,000 sheep or lambs handled daily per employee and thereafter an additional daily rate of 1s. 1½d. per 100 sheep or lambs.

Employees engaged inserting spreader on the chain shall be paid at "Other Labourers" rate for the first 2,000 sheep or lambs handled daily per employee and thereafter an additional daily rate of 1s. 1½d. per 100 sheep or lambs.

Employees engaged inserting spreader on the ring shall be paid at "Other Labourers" rate plus an additional daily rate of 3d. per 100 sheep or lambs handled daily per employee.

Employees engaged changing from long hook to gambrel and slide on the chain shall be paid at "Other Labourers" rate for the first 2,000 sheep or lambs handled daily per employee and thereafter an additional daily rate of 1s. 6d. per 100 sheep or lambs.

Employees engaged changing over on the ring shall be paid at "Other Labourers" rate for the first 2,000 sheep or lambs handled daily per employee and thereafter an additional rate of 6d. per 100 sheep or lambs.

Employees engaged changing to gambrel and slide on the ring shall be paid at "Other Labourers" rate when up to 2,000 sheep or lambs are handled daily on any one ring; when over 2,000 sheep or lambs are handled on any one ring an additional amount of 3d. per 100 shall be paid for all sheep or lambs handled and divided equally among all such employees.

Employees engaged as trimmers on the ring shall be paid at "Other Labourers" rate plus an additional daily rate of 1½d. per 100 sheep or lambs handled daily per employee.

Employees engaged on the removal of caul fats on either the ring or chain shall be paid at "Other Labourers" rate plus an additional daily rate of 1½d. per 100 sheep or lambs handled daily per employee.

In the event of more than one employee being engaged on one of the before-mentioned tasks, the additional daily rate above 2,000 or 3,000 per employee as the case may be shall be divided between those so employed on such task.

For the purpose of calculating payment in each instance 15 or over in each multiple of 25 sheep or lambs to be paid for as at 25 and under 15 to be disregarded.

(ii) Solo System as hereinafter described—

To slaughtermen employed on the solo system 79s. 0-38d. plus 1s. 3d. war loading (total 80s. 3-38d.) per 100 sheep or lambs slaughtered. Rams—double rates, provided that rams 84 lb. or over shall be paid for at treble rates.

(b) Duties of Slaughtermen—

Men employed slaughtering sheep or lambs may be employed upon either the chain system or the solo system.

(i) Chain System.—Slaughtermen slaughtering sheep or lambs upon the chain system shall be organized into a team or teams. Each team shall be divided into the following groups:—

Group A.—Men employed in catching, sticking, shackling.

Group B.—Men employed in skinning hind legs and removing hind trotters, placing long hooks and removing shackle, skinning fore legs, removing tongue and sweetbread, tying weasand, punching briskets, removing spreader, splitting skins, removing front trotters, flanking and thumbing up, clearing tail and rectum gut, punching off skins, scalping and removing heads, gutting, removing pluck, splitting down briskets.

(ii) Solo System.—A slaughterman may be employed in individually performing the complete process of slaughtering, trimming and dressing sheep or lambs. Such slaughterman shall perform, in addition to trimming, such of the duties referred to in the preceding paragraph as are applicable to a solo slaughterman.

(c) Daggy, Maggoty, Diseased Sheep and Lambs, Full Wool Sheep and Downer Sheep or Lambs:—

(i) Daggy and/or maggoty sheep and lambs shall be treated after being stuck and before being legged.

(ii) Double rates shall be paid for diseased sheep and/or lambs which are condemned by the Veterinary Officer or Chief Meat Inspector for diseases contagious to human beings.

(iii) Full wool sheep shall be paid for at rate and a half after 1st September.

(iv) Slaughtering of heavy sheep, woolly or shorn, over 64 lb. graded weight, shall be paid for at rate and a half.

(v) Downer Sheep or Lambs, i.e., sheep or lambs which cannot walk into the sticking pen and are treated by regular full time slaughtermen, shall be paid for at double rates.

Extra rates prescribed in this Determination shall not be cumulative.

NOTE.—Provided that if slaughtermen treat all stock required by the employer to be treated, the daily earnings of each pieceworker (other than learners) shall be increased by the sum of 23s. plus sick leave loading of 4-416d. in accordance with clause 44. If all stock required to be treated is not treated a pro rata amount only shall be added.

CATTLE.

3. (a) Rate of Pay to Slaughtermen.—

4s. 6-65d. plus 1d. war loading (total 4s. 7-65d.) per head of cattle slaughtered.

Bulls, 300 lb. or over freezer weight—double rates.

Downer cattle, i.e., cattle which are carted to the killing pen—double rates.

Double rates shall be paid for diseased cattle which are condemned by the Veterinary Officer or Chief Meat Inspector for diseases contagious to human beings.

(b) Duties of Slaughtermen—

Men slaughtering cattle shall be divided into the following classes—

Class A.—Men employed grounding, backing off, skinning tail.

Class B.—Men employed knocking down, shackling, hoisting to bleeding rail, sticking, cutting off heads, placing heads on slide or table, sawing horns, lowering, footing off, pritching, cutting brisket and aitch, lowering weasand, freeing heart fat, saving sweetbreads, removing caul fat, sawing brisket and aitch, placing rollers, hoisting, wiping, landing, necking off, dropping hide down chute, fronting out, chopping or machine sawing.

Class C.—Men employed spining, wiping hindquarters, washing chine bone, scrubbing ribs and brisket, wiping forequarters.

(c) Organization—

(i) Team System.—An employer may organize a team of employees consisting of not less than seven men in the proportion of 2 Class A, 4 Class B, 1 Class C or any multiple thereof. The total earnings shall be divided among the members of such team as follows:—Class A three ninths, Class B five ninths, Class C one ninth. The amount allotted to each class shall be divided equally among the members of such class.

(ii) Gang System.—An employer may permit any number of men, not exceeding six, to form themselves into a gang. The total earnings of such gang shall be divided between the members of such gang in such proportion as shall be mutually agreed upon between the employer and all of the members of such gang.

NOTE.—Provided that if slaughtermen treat all stock required by the employer to be treated, the daily earnings of each pieceworker shall be increased by the sum of 23s. plus sick leave loading of 4-416d. in accordance with clause 44. If all stock required to be treated is not treated a pro rata amount only shall be added.

CALVES.

4. Rates of pay to men slaughtering calves on the chain system or by the solo system—

Skin on—

Calves up to 60 lb. skin on .. 8-725d. plus 15d. war loading (total 8-875d.) per head.

Calves 61 lb. to 90 lb. skin on .. 1s. 1-297d. plus 15d. war loading (total 1s. 1-312d.) per head.

Calves 91 lb. to 120 lb. skin on .. 1s. 5-735d. plus 15d. war loading (total 1s. 5-750d.) per head.

Calves over 121 lb. skin on .. 2s. 2-61d. plus 15d. war loading (total 2s. 2-625d.) per head.

Skin Off—

Calves under 60 lb. skin off .. 1s. 0-35d. plus 15d. war loading (total 1s. 0-50d.) per head.

Calves 61 lb. to 90 lb. skin off .. 1s. 7-85d. plus 15d. war loading (total 1s. 8d.) per head.

Calves 91 lb. to 120 lb. skin off .. 2s. 3-85d. plus 15d. war loading (total 2s. 4d.) per head.

Calves 121 lb. to 200 lb. skin off .. 2s. 11-85d. plus 15d. war loading (total 3s.) per head.

NOTE.—Provided that if slaughtermen treat all stock required by the employer to be treated, the daily earnings of each pieceworker (except calf skimmers skinning cold calves), shall be increased by the sum of 23s. plus sick leave loading of 4.416d. in accordance with clause 44. If all stock required to be treated is not treated a pro rata amount only shall be added.

(b) Duties of slaughtermen slaughtering pigs.—Knocking down or stunning, shackling and hoisting to bleeding rail, sticking, handling into and in scald tank, handling out of scald tank into machine, handling out of machine, scraping, shaving and thoroughly cleaning, opening up and removing viscera, washing and hanging off, chopping or sawing down, washing and facking up.

NOTE.—Provided that if slaughtermen treat all stock required by the employer to be treated, the daily earnings of each pieceworker shall be increased by the sum of 23s. plus sick leave loading of 4.416d. in accordance with clause 44. If all stock required to be treated is not treated a pro rata amount only shall be added.

RATES OF PAY TO BONERS.

6. (a) Boners shall be employed at the daily rate prescribed in clause 8 hereof and shall be entitled to payment for all work done in excess of the daily quota as prescribed in sub-clause (c) of this clause. The following daily quotas shall apply:—

Beef 38 quarters.

Mutton 65 carcasses.

Veal 57 carcasses (to be ribbed out and birdcaged).

Pork 1,900 lb. when boned, derinded and defatted to the satisfaction of the employer or

2,490 lb. when previously derinded and only requires boning and defatting to the satisfaction of the employer.

(b) For the purposes of computing the daily pay the following sub-clause shall apply:—

Beef—

One hind quarter shall equal one quarter of beef.

One forequarter or horse's head over three ribs under 100 lb. shall equal one quarter of beef.

One forequarter or horse's head over three ribs 101 lb. or over shall be equivalent to one and a quarter quarters.

Five briskets shall equal one quarter of beef.

Two rumps and loins shall equal one quarter of beef.

(ii) Notwithstanding anything contained in this Determination, any person who at the date of the coming into force of this Determination is employed in the industry and whose engagement or continued employment as an improver is by this Determination forbidden shall be entitled to be employed and shall be paid the scale of wages prescribed for an apprentice or improver of like experience.

Where less than 40 hours is worked in any week by any piece-worker, a proportionate amount of such sum of one hundred and forty four shillings shall be added in lieu thereof.
