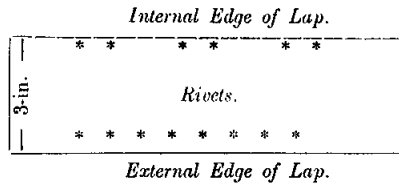

Conditions of Contract for General Stores, 1953-54, &c.

Published in the *Victoria Government Gazette*, No. 248, dated 1st April, 1953, pages 1418 to 1420.

CONDITIONS OF CONTRACT.

1. Except where definite quantities are specified the Government will not be bound to order from the contractor all the articles enumerated in the schedule, but only those articles, and such quantities of those articles, as it may be found necessary to order. Should the Government, however, require a larger supply of any article than the estimated quantity stated in the schedule, the contractor will nevertheless be bound to supply the same at contract rates. The Government reserves the right to purchase otherwise than from the contractor articles of any of the several kinds enumerated in the schedule the purchase of which is, in the opinion of the Tender Board, necessary in order to meet special circumstances or special requirements.

2. Under this contract goods may be ordered by any Department of the Commonwealth, but it shall be optional on the part of the contractor to supply.

3. The supplies are to be the same as sample where so stated, and of the particular manufacture indicated in the schedule. In the case of different makers' goods, the contractor will be required to supply the kind ordered. *The supplies are to be the best quality of their several kinds or manufacture.* In the event of the tender having been accepted for goods manufactured within the Commonwealth or within any other part of the British Empire (as the case may be), all such goods supplied shall, if required by the Government, bear evidence that they are of the particular manufacture tendered for and, in addition, the contractor may at any time during the currency of the contract be called on to furnish a statutory declaration as to the country of origin of the goods supplied.

4. Except where otherwise stated in the schedule, the value of all packages, cases, casks, &c., whether bulk be broken or not, must be included in the prices stated in the contractor's tender; all such packages, &c., shall be considered the property of the Government, and no charges or expenses whatsoever beyond the price tendered and set out in the schedule will be allowed to the contractor for any articles or packages, cases, casks, &c. The net weight or quantity only will be paid for. The contractor must provide, without extra charge, whatever labour may be required in the packing of stores.

5. All orders for supplies will emanate from the Departments requiring the goods, which shall be delivered as may be directed by the officer ordering the supply. At the time of delivering the supplies, the contractor shall produce the order for same to the officer authorized to accept delivery, and such officer shall acknowledge thereon the receipt of the stores accepted and return the order to the contractor, who will attach it to his claim for payment.

6. Supplies ordered for delivery in the Melbourne District are to be delivered free of all charges (whether cartage, freight, &c.) and, for the purposes of this contract, the Melbourne District will include a radius of 6 miles from the Elizabeth-street Post Office. For supplies outside that radius the goods must be delivered free on rails at Flinders-street or Spencer-street Railway Stations as required.

7. Arrangements as to time of delivery and inspection of goods will be made by the officer ordering the supply.

8. Orders must receive prompt execution; in the event of the goods not being delivered within forty-eight hours after the contractor shall have received the order or within such other time as the order may specify for delivery, it will be competent for the officer named in clause 7, or the head of the department to whom the goods are to be supplied, on giving the contractor twenty-four hours' notice, to purchase the supplies, or any like supplies that are suitable for the service, at the contractor's risk, and the extra expense incurred over and above the contract price (if any) will be deducted from the contractor's account or from the security money.

9. Delivery will not be deemed to have been made until the goods have been approved of. In the event of the rejection or return of any supplies, the contractor shall bear the whole cost of replacing the supplies rejected or returned, otherwise purchases will be effected at the contractor's risk and the extra expense deducted as provided in clause 8.

10. The contractor will be required to furnish his account in the prescribed form as soon as possible after the delivery of the goods, the account to be accompanied by the receipted delivery orders on which it is based. Where practicable, the use of more than one account form for each Department or sub-Department must be avoided. The rates and the quantities quoted in the orders cannot be increased.

11. The acceptance of the supplies shall be subject to the approval of the officer authorized to take delivery of the stores, or such other officer as shall be named in the schedule. The contractor may, however, claim a survey on any goods objected to; but in that case he must, within twenty-four hours after objection is made, give notice thereof, in writing, to the officer rejecting the goods. If, after the delivery of the supplies has been taken, any deficiency or defect is discovered therein, such deficient or defective stores may be returned to the contractor.

12. The members of Boards of survey will be appointed by the Treasurer of the State for the time being, and the decision of the Board is to be considered as final. If the Board shall decide that the article is not of proper quality it must be immediately replaced by the contractor, failing which it, or any like supply that is suitable for the service, will be procured elsewhere, and the survey fees and extra expense (if any) will be charged as provided in clause 8.

13. A refusal to execute orders, irregularity in the quantity or quality of the supplies, delay in delivering or replacing them when required, or non-compliance with the terms of clauses 15 and 16 of these Conditions respecting the forwarding of consignment notes, &c., will subject the contractor, upon report from the Tender Board, to such mulct not exceeding Fifty pounds as the Treasurer may direct, and the amount may be deducted as provided in clause 8. It will also be in the power of the said Treasurer upon such refusal, irregularity, or delay to terminate the contract forthwith and declare forfeit the whole or any portion of the security money; and, in addition, the contractor will be disqualified from tendering or holding any future contract or contracts for a period of twelve months from the date of such disqualification.

14. All goods forwarded under this contract shall, where railway facilities are available, be forwarded by rail, and all consignments shall bear the number of the consignment notes under which they are forwarded, and also the name of the contractor by whom consigned, on a legibly-written business label.

15. When the contractor is required to make delivery of goods at a railway station for transmission by rail for any Department excepting Departments of the Commonwealth, he shall obtain a receipt for the goods in duplicate on the Stores and Transport consignment note, at the same time handing in a triplicate and quadruplicate of the form as an authority for the Railways to act as agent for, and charge the freight to, the Stores and Transport Office or such other Department as shall be named therein. He shall as soon as possible, and not later than twenty-four hours thereafter, deliver the original at the Tender Board Offices, the duplicate to be forwarded to the consignee in accordance with clause 16, and the quintuplicate to be retained by himself. (In the case of Commonwealth Departments, however, the Commonwealth consignment note only, which accompanies the order, must be used.) Should the goods thus forwarded be rejected, the contractor must bear the cost of replacing such goods, for which

service the departmental consignment note must not be used. Any infringement of this condition will subject the contractor to such mulct as is provided in clause 13.

16. *Immediately after the consignment of the goods, the officer to whom they are forwarded shall be notified by the contractor, on the duplicate consignment note provided for the purpose, that the goods have been sent. On receipt of this document, the officer to whom it has been forwarded shall acknowledge thereon the receipt of the goods without delay to the Stores and Transport Office. In the event of loss through failure on the part of the contractor to comply with this condition he will be held responsible, and the amount of the loss incurred thereby will be deducted as provided in clause 8.*

17. Should the order on the contractor specially provide that goods of a fragile character, or such as are liable to suffer loss by leakage, shall be consigned at the risk of the Railways Commissioners, under special freight conditions, the contractor shall in such instance provide, in writing on the consignment note, an intimation to that effect, failing which, in the event of loss, he shall bear the whole cost of replacing the goods, the amount thereof to be deducted from the contractor's account or from the security money.

18. The contractor is not at liberty to transfer his contract under cover of power of attorney, coupled with an interest or otherwise, and no such transfer will be recognized by the Government. Should it be found during the currency of the contract that the contractor has not conformed to the condition of advertisement—which stipulates that if a tenderer be a member of a firm and such firm be interested in the contract, the tender shall be in the name of the firm, and not in that of the individual—then the Treasurer may, on the recommendation of the Tender Board, determine the contract and forfeit the security money.

19. The contract entered into under these conditions is not to be considered as being broken, infringed, or vitiated by the importation of stores for the Government service, or by any contracts or purchases made by the Agent-General for Victoria, or by any

contracts or agreements made for any works or supplies by the Department of Public Works through the Board of Land and Works, or by the State Rivers and Water Supply, Forests, and Electricity Commissioners, or the Country Roads Board, or for the Railways Department, or for supplies for Technical, High, or Higher Elementary Schools, or for connexions and fittings for Drills and Batteries, or by any article being made at and supplied for the use of any Government establishment, or by the consumption of the surplus stock of any Government establishment.

20. Notwithstanding anything to the contrary contained in section 152 of the *Customs Act 1901-36*, it is hereby expressly provided that upon any alteration of the duty collected affecting the goods included in this contract, the contract price shall not be altered, and the contract may be terminated at the option of either party by two months' notice, in writing, from the first day of the calendar month next ensuing and within the period for which the contract is made. The contract for the unaffected items shall remain in full force and effect. Any notice to be served under this condition shall be deemed to have been duly served if sent to the contractor in a registered letter to his last-known place of business or abode.

The foregoing provision shall not apply where the contract is for definite quantities of imported goods to be delivered at stated times, as stipulated in the schedule, and any alteration in the duty of Customs or Telegraphic Transfer rate of exchange affecting the goods included in such contract shall be to the accounts of the Government; adjustments to be based on the F.O.B. and C.I.F. prices of the goods, respectively, and the Telegraphic Transfer rate ruling at the time of delivery of the goods.

21. *Under no circumstances, other than those mentioned in clause 20, will the contractor be permitted to abandon his contract. In the event of the contractor failing to carry on the contract, the contract security money will in that case be absolutely forfeited and, in addition, the contractor will be held liable for any loss which the Government may sustain in consequence of such failure.*

PRICES REGULATION ORDER No. 560.

MALLEE ROOTS.

IN pursuance of the powers conferred upon me by the Prices Regulation Acts, I, John Francis Waldron, Prices Commissioner, hereby make the following Order:—

Citation.

1. This Order may be cited as Prices Regulation Order No. 560.

Revocation.

2. Prices Regulation Order No. 491 is hereby revoked.

Definitions and Interpretations.

3. (1) In this Order, unless the contrary intention appears—
“Melbourne area” means all that area comprised within a radius of 20 miles from the General Post Office, Melbourne, Victoria.
“Ballarat area” means all that area comprised within a radius of 5 miles from the principal post office at Ballarat, Victoria.
“Bendigo area” means all that area comprised within a radius of 5 miles from the principal post office at Bendigo, Victoria.
“Geelong area” means all that area comprised within a radius of 5 miles from the principal post office at Geelong, Victoria, and includes all that area comprised within a radius of 5 miles from the principal post office at Queenscliff, Victoria.
“By wholesale” means, in relation to any sale of mallee roots, that such sale is—
(a) a sale to a person who customarily purchases for resale;

(b) a sale to a Commonwealth or State Government Department;

(c) a sale to and for the use of an industrial undertaking.

“Cwt.” means 112 lb. weight avoirdupois.

“Ton” means 2,240 lb. weight avoirdupois.

“I.B. truck” means I.B. truck of the Victorian Railways.

(2) Where any mallee roots are sold other than by weight, the weight of those mallee roots shall be deemed to be that computed from the volume of those mallee roots by reckoning 1 ton weight as equivalent to 80 cubic feet.

Maximum Prices—Sales by Wholesale in Specified Area.

4. (1) Subject to the provisions of sub-clause (2) of this clause, I fix and declare the maximum price at which mallee roots may be sold by wholesale for delivery free by the seller in one of the areas specified in the First Schedule to this Order to be—

(a) where delivered by the seller to one of the areas specified by rail or otherwise, but not delivered into the purchaser's premises in that area—the price appearing opposite such area in that Schedule;

(b) where delivered into the purchaser's premises—the price specified in that Schedule for that area, plus an amount calculated at the rate of 7s. 6d. per ton.

(2) Where, in respect of any sale referred to in sub-clause (1) of this clause, railway freight is incurred in transport to any specified area at a rate per ton in excess of—

(a) £2 10s. in respect of transport to the Melbourne area;

(b) £2 10s. in respect of transport to the Geelong area;

(c) £2 7s. 6d. in respect of transport to the Ballarat area;

the maximum prices fixed shall be increased by an amount equal to half that excess.

Maximum Prices—Sales by Wholesale—Other Parts of Victoria.

5. Notwithstanding the foregoing provisions of this Order, I fix and declare the maximum price at which mallee roots may be sold by wholesale by any person for delivery outside any of the areas specified in the First Schedule to this Order to be the price specified in the First Schedule for the Melbourne area less the usual freight (but not in excess of 35s. per ton) for transporting by rail mallee roots from the railway siding nearest to the premises of the seller to the Windsor railway siding, plus the freight actually incurred in transporting such mallee roots from the railway siding nearest to the premises of the seller to the railway siding nearest to the premises of the purchaser.

Maximum Prices—Sales by Semi-Wholesale.

6. Notwithstanding the foregoing provisions of this Order, I fix and declare the maximum price at which mallee roots may be sold by a retail fuel merchant to any other person who sells mallee roots by retail to be the maximum prices for the area concerned by the foregoing provisions of this Order for the sale of mallee roots by wholesale, plus the following amounts:—

(a) For sales at destination siding in truck lots (i.e., when the contents of the truck have not been weighed for the sale, subsequent to arrival at the destination siding)—

(i) in I.B. truck lots—20s. per truck lot,

(ii) in other than I.B. truck lots—30s. per truck lot;

(b) for sales at destination siding in ton lots—an amount calculated at the rate of 4s. 6d. per ton;

(c) for sales at the vendor retailer's fuel yard—an amount calculated at the rate of 12s. per ton.

Maximum Prices—Sales by Retail—Specified Areas.

7. I fix and declare the maximum price at which mallee roots may be sold by retail in the areas specified in the Second Schedule to this Order to be—

- (a) Where delivery is made into the purchaser's premises in the area specified—the prices specified opposite such area in that Schedule;
- (b) where delivery is not made into the purchaser's premises in the area specified—the prices specified opposite such area in that Schedule less an amount in each case of 3d. per cwt.:

Provided that where such mallee roots, at the request of the purchaser, are split or broken to a size not exceeding 9 inches in length, the maximum prices so fixed shall be increased by an amount calculated at the rate of 9d. per cwt.

Maximum Prices—Sales by Retail—Outside Specified Areas.

8. Notwithstanding the foregoing provisions of this Order, I fix and declare the maximum price at which mallee roots may be sold by retail outside the areas specified in the Second Schedule to be the price calculated by clause 5 of this Order, plus 35s. 6d. per ton.

Delivery of Invoices.

9. Any person who sells by wholesale or by retail any mallee roots in Victoria shall deliver with such mallee roots an invoice or docket containing the following particulars:—

- (a) The name and address of the seller;
- (b) the name and address of the purchaser;
- (c) the date of the sale of the mallee roots;
- (d) a full description of the mallee roots sold;
- (e) the weight of the mallee roots sold;
- (f) the unit price at which the mallee roots are sold and the total price thereof.

Records.

10. Any person who sells by wholesale or by retail any mallee roots in Victoria shall keep the following records in respect of the purchase and sale of such mallee roots:—

- (a) A record, including invoices, of each purchase of mallee roots containing—
 - (i) the date of the invoice;
 - (ii) the name and full address of the supplier of the mallee roots;
 - (iii) the quantity of mallee roots purchased;
 - (iv) the purchase price per unit of the mallee roots;
 - (v) any charges paid or payable by him in addition to the purchase price of the mallee roots;
 - (vi) the total amount of each invoice;
- (b) a record of each sale of mallee roots, containing the same particulars of every sale as by clause 9 of this Order, are required to be shown on the invoice relating to such sale.

Fixation of Maximum Prices by Notice.

11. Notwithstanding the foregoing provisions of this Order, I declare the maximum price at which Mallee roots specified in a notice in pursuance of this clause may be sold in Victoria by any person to whom such notice is given to be such price as is fixed by the Commissioner by notice in writing to that person.

FIREWOOD.

IN pursuance of the powers conferred upon me by the Prices Regulation Acts, I, John Francis Waldron, Prices Commissioner, hereby make the following Order:—

Citation.

1. This Order may be cited as Prices Regulation Order No. 561.

Revocation.

2. Prices Regulation Order No. 490 is hereby revoked.

Application.

3. Nothing in this Order shall apply to the sale of mallee roots.

Definitions and Interpretations.

4. (1) In this Order, unless the contrary intention appears—
 - “Metropolitan area” means all that area comprised within a radius of 20 miles from the General Post Office, Melbourne.
 - “By wholesale” means, in relation to any sale of firewood, that such sale is—
 - (a) a sale to a person who customarily purchases for resale;
 - (b) a sale to a Commonwealth or State Government Department; or
 - (c) a sale to and for the use of an industrial undertaking.
 - “Retail fuel merchant” means, in relation to any sale of firewood, a person who is engaged in the conduct of a retail fuel business.
 - “I.B. truck” means an I.B. truck of the Victorian Railways.
 - “Ton” means 2,240 lb. weight avoirdupois.
 - “Cwt.” means 112 lb. weight avoirdupois.
- (2) Where any firewood is sold other than by weight, the weight of such firewood shall be computed from the volume thereof—
 - (a) in respect of boxwoods, mallee wood, belar, bulloak, ironbark, and yellow gum (white ironbark) in lengths not exceeding 30 inches—by reckoning 50 cubic feet of such firewood as equivalent to 1 ton weight;
 - (b) in respect of the firewood specified in paragraph (a) of this sub-clause in lengths exceeding 30 inches—by reckoning 62½ cubic feet of such firewood as equivalent to 1 ton weight;
 - (c) in respect of red gum, blue gum, messmate, stringybark, peppermint, mill offcuts, and firewood not otherwise specified in paragraph (a) of this sub-clause in lengths not exceeding 30 inches—by reckoning 60 cubic feet of such firewood as equivalent to 1 ton weight; and
 - (d) in respect of the firewoods specified in paragraph (c) of this sub-clause in lengths exceeding 30 inches—by reckoning 75 cubic feet of such firewood as equivalent to 1 ton weight.

Maximum Prices—Sales by Wholesale in Metropolitan Area.

5. I fix and declare the maximum price at which firewood of the kinds specified in the First Schedule to this Order may be sold by wholesale delivered in the metropolitan area to be the price shown in such Schedule.

Maximum Prices—Sales by Wholesale Other Than in Metropolitan Area.

6. I fix and declare the maximum price at which firewood of the kinds specified in the First Schedule to this Order may be sold by wholesale other than in the metropolitan area to be the maximum

price fixed by the foregoing provisions of this Order for the sale of that firewood by wholesale in the metropolitan area—

- (a) less the usual cost of transporting such firewood by rail from the railway station or siding nearest to the seller's premises to the Windsor railway siding in the metropolitan area; and
- (b) plus the actual cost (if any) of transporting such firewood by rail from the railway station or siding nearest to the seller's premises to the railway station or siding nearest to the place at which delivery of that firewood was made to the purchaser;

Provided that any amount deducted for rail transport under the provisions of paragraph (a) of this clause shall not in any case exceed—

- (a) in respect of belar, bulloak, mallee wood, ironbark, red gum, and all boxwoods—£1 14s. 6d. per ton; and
- (b) in respect of other firewood—£1 4s. 6d. per ton.

Maximum Prices—Sales by Wholesale Where Delivered by Road.

7. Notwithstanding the foregoing provisions of this Order, I fix and declare the maximum price at which firewood of the kinds specified in the First Schedule to this Order may be sold where delivery is made to the purchaser other than by rail to be the maximum price fixed for the sale of that firewood by the provisions of clause 5 or 6 of this Order, as the case may be, plus 7s. 6d. per ton.

Maximum Prices—Sales by Retail in Metropolitan Area.

8. I fix and declare the maximum price at which firewood of the kinds specified in the Second Schedule to this Order may be sold by retail in the metropolitan area to be—

- (a) where delivery is made free into the purchaser's premises—
 - (i) for lengths not exceeding 12 inches—the price as specified in such Schedule;
 - (ii) for lengths exceeding 12 inches and not exceeding 30 inches—the price as specified in sub-paragraph (i) of this paragraph less 1d. per cwt., or where such firewood is sold other than by weight less 1s. 4d. per 40 cubic feet;
 - (iii) for lengths exceeding 30 inches—the price as specified in sub-paragraph (i) of this paragraph less 3d. per cwt., or where such firewood is sold other than by weight less 4s. per 40 cubic feet;
- (b) where delivery is not made free into the purchaser's premises—the maximum price fixed by sub-paragraph (a) of this paragraph less 3d. per cwt., or where such firewood is sold other than by weight less 4s. per 40 cubic feet.

Maximum Prices—Sales by Retail Outside Metropolitan Area.

9. I fix and declare the maximum price at which firewood of any kinds specified in the Second Schedule to this Order may be sold by retail outside the metropolitan area to be the price paid or payable by the retail seller for the firewood under the provisions of clause 6 of this Order, plus—

- (a) in respect of box, mallee wood, belar, bulloak, and ironbark firewood—£1 15s. 6d. per ton where the wood is sold by weight, or £1 8s. 6d. per 40 cubic feet where the wood is sold by measurement, as the case requires; or
- (b) in respect of all other kinds of firewood—£1 15s. 6d. per ton where the wood is sold by weight, or £1 3s. 8d. per 40 cubic feet where the wood is sold by measurement, as the case requires.

Maximum Prices—Sales by Retail of Split Firewood.

10. Notwithstanding the foregoing provisions of this Order, I fix and declare the maximum price at which billets of firewood of the kinds specified in the Second Schedule to this Order and of not more than 4 inches in width may be sold by retail to be the maximum price fixed by the foregoing provisions of this Order for the sale of that kind and length of firewood by retail, plus in each case, an amount calculated at the rate of 9d. per cwt.

Inter-Retail Sales.

11. Notwithstanding the foregoing provisions of this Order, I fix and declare the maximum price at which firewood of the kinds specified in the First Schedule to this Order may be sold by a retail fuel merchant to any other person who sells firewood by retail to be the price paid or payable by such first-named retail fuel merchant for the firewood, but not in excess of the maximum price therefor fixed under the provisions of this Order for such firewood, plus—

- (a) where delivery is made at destination siding—
 - (i) for sales of I.B. truck lots—20s. per I.B. truck;
 - (ii) for sales of truck lots larger than I.B. truck lots—30s. per truck;
 - (iii) for sales other than truck lots—4s. 6d. per ton;
 and
- (b) where delivery is made at the vendor retailer's fuel yard—12s. per ton.

Delivery of Invoices.

12. Any person who sells by wholesale or by retail any firewood in Victoria shall deliver with such firewood an invoice or docket containing the following particulars:—

- (a) The name and address of the seller;
- (b) the name and address of the purchaser;
- (c) the date of the sale of that firewood;
- (d) a full description of the firewood sold;
- (e) the weight of the firewood sold;
- (f) the unit price at which that firewood is sold and the total price thereof.

Records.

13. Any person who sells by wholesale or by retail any firewood in Victoria shall keep the following records in respect of the purchase and sale of such firewood:—

- (a) A record, including invoices, of each purchase of firewood containing—
 - (i) the date of the invoice;
 - (ii) the name and full address of the supplier of that firewood;
 - (iii) the quantity of firewood purchased;
 - (iv) the purchase price per unit of that firewood;
 - (v) any charges paid or payable by him in addition to the purchase price of that firewood;
 - (vi) the total amount of each invoice;
- (b) a record of each sale of firewood containing the same particulars of every sale as by clause 12 of this Order are required to be shown on the invoice relating to such sale.

Fixation of Maximum Prices by Notice.

14. Notwithstanding the foregoing provisions of this Order, I declare the maximum prices at which any firewood specified in a notice given in pursuance of this clause may be sold by any person to whom such notice is given, to be such price as is fixed by the Commissioner by notice in writing to that person.

2. Prices Regulation Order No. 511 is hereby revoked.

Definitions and Interpretations.

3. In this Order, unless the contrary intention appears—
 - “Briquette” means a small brick consisting of compressed brown coal produced by the State Electricity Commission of Victoria.
 - “Melbourne area” means all that area comprised within a radius of 20 miles from the General Post Office, Melbourne.
 - “Geelong area” means all that area comprised within a radius of 5 miles from the principal post office at Geelong, Victoria.
 - “Ballarat area” means all that area comprised within a radius of 5 miles from the principal post office at Ballarat, Victoria.
 - “Bendigo area” means all that area comprised within a radius of 5 miles from the principal post office at Bendigo, Victoria.
 - “Cwt.” means a weight of 112 lb. avoirdupois.
 - “Ton” means a weight of 2,240 lb. avoirdupois.

Maximum Prices—Sales by Retail—Specified Areas.

4. I fix and declare the maximum price at which briquettes may be sold by retail in the areas specified in the Schedule to this Order to be—
 - (a) where delivery is made into the purchaser's premises in the area specified—the prices specified opposite such area in the Schedule;
 - (b) where delivery is not made into the purchaser's premises in the area specified—the prices specified opposite such area in the Schedule less an amount in each case calculated at the rate of 3d. per cwt.

SAFETY MATCHES.

IN pursuance of the powers conferred upon me by the Prices Regulation Acts, I, John Francis Waldron, Prices Commissioner, hereby make the following Order:—

Citation.

1. This Order may be cited as Prices Regulation Order No. 563.

Revocation.

2. Prices Regulation Order No. 390 is hereby revoked.

Definitions.

3. In this Order, unless the contrary intention appears—
“Geelong area” means all that area of Victoria comprised within a radius of 5 miles from the principal post office at Geelong.
“Metropolitan area” means all that area of Victoria comprised within a radius of 25 miles from the general post office at Melbourne.

Sales by Manufacturers.

4. I fix and declare the maximum price at which safety matches may be sold by any manufacturer thereof or his agent to be the price fixed by me by notice in writing to such manufacturer or agent.

Sales by Wholesale by Persons Other Than Manufacturers.

5. I fix and declare the maximum price at which safety matches may be sold by wholesale by any person other than the manufacturer thereof or such manufacturer's agent to be 20s. 3d. per gross.

Provided that where such safety matches are sold from stock purchased from the manufacturer thereof in “loose” gross packages, then the maximum price specified in the previous provisions of this paragraph shall be reduced to 20s. 2d. per gross.

Provided further that where payment of the purchase price of such safety matches is made—

- (i) before delivery, on delivery, or not more than ten days from date of delivery, such maximum price shall be reduced by 3 per centum thereof;
 - (ii) more than ten days after delivery, but not later than the last day of the calendar month following the month during which delivery is made, such maximum price shall be reduced by 2½ per centum thereof;
 - (iii) at any time during the second calendar month following the calendar month during which delivery is made, such maximum price shall be reduced by 1½ per centum thereof.
6. The maximum prices fixed by the previous provisions of this Order for the sale of safety matches are maximum prices for the sale of safety matches inclusive of delivery as follows:—
 - (a) Where the purchaser's place of business is situated in Geelong area or metropolitan area—delivery “free into store”;
 - (b) where the purchaser's place of business is not situated in Geelong area or metropolitan area—delivery “free on rail” Geelong area or Melbourne area as the case may be.

7. I declare the maximum price at which safety matches may be sold by wholesale by any person other than a manufacturer or manufacturer's agent on any other terms of delivery than those specified in paragraphs 5 and 6 of this Order to be such price as is fixed by me by notice in writing to such person, and until such notice in writing aforesaid is given, the maximum price at which any safety matches shall be sold by wholesale by such person shall be 18s. 4d. per gross.

Sales by Retail.

8. I fix and declare the maximum prices at which safety matches may be sold by retail to be the prices specified in the Schedule to this Order.

Factories and Shops Acts.

DETERMINATION OF THE SUGAR REFINERS BOARD.

NOTE.—This Determination applies to the whole of the State of Victoria.

IN accordance with the provisions of the Factories and Shops Acts, the Wages Board, which now has the power to determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any person or persons or classes of persons employed—

- (a) in connexion with the trade of sugar refining ;
(b) in the manufacture or treatment of the by-products of sugar ;

has made the following Determination, namely :—

1. That on the 11th June, 1953, the last previous Determination of this Board shall be revoked and replaced by this Determination.

ADULT RATE TO BE PAID.

4. Male juniors employed as automatic scale hands reaching the age of 20 years, having at least 2 years' experience, shall receive adult rates applicable to that class of work.

SHIFT WORKERS (OTHER THAN CONTINUOUS SHIFT WORKERS).

5. (a) The ordinary working hours of shift workers shall be as follows:—

Night Shift—

Time of Beginning—11 p.m. on Sunday, Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday.

Time of Ending—7 a.m. on Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday.

Day Shift—

7 a.m. to 3 p.m. on Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday.

Afternoon Shift—

3 p.m. to 11 p.m. on Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday.

(b) Except at his own request any employee required to change from any of the above shifts to a shift other than his normal shift shall be paid at overtime rates for the first shift, unless he receives 48 hours' notice of such change.

DAY WORKERS.

6. Day worker is an employee who ordinarily works between 7.30 a.m. and 4.30 p.m., except at the distillery where the employee ordinarily works between 8 a.m. and 5 p.m. with a break of one hour for a meal between 12 noon and 1 p.m. on Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday. When an employee is required to work between 12 noon and 1 p.m. he shall be paid time and a half for such work, and in addition shall be allowed time off for a meal. The provisions of this clause shall not apply to shift workers as defined in clauses 5 and 7.

CONTINUOUS SHIFT WORKERS.

7. For the purposes of this clause the expression "continuous work" means work carried on with consecutive shifts of men throughout the 24 hours of each of at least six consecutive days without interruption.

(a) The ordinary working hours of employees on continuous work shifts shall not exceed an average of 40 per week spread over a period of 1, 2, 3 or 4 weeks to be worked in shifts of eight hours, including such time as by mutual arrangement may be taken for meals.

(b) There shall be a roster of shifts which shall:—

- (i) provide for rotation unless all the employees concerned desire otherwise;
- (ii) provide for not more than eight shifts to be worked in any nine consecutive days; and
- (iii) not be changed until after four weeks' notice.

(c) For all time of duty outside the limits of the ordinary hours prescribed in clause (a) hereof, an employee on continuous work shifts shall be paid at double rates. But this shall not apply to arrangements between employees themselves or in cases due to rotation of shift or when the relief does not come on duty at the proper time.

(d) Employees on continuous work shifts working any Sunday or holiday shift shall be paid at the rate of time and a half for such shift.

(The provisions of clause 7 shall apply only to persons employed at the distillery of the Colonial Sugar Refining Co. Ltd. at Yarraville.)

TERMS OF ENGAGEMENT.

8. (a) Employees are to be engaged as weekly or casual employees. A weekly employee is one engaged by the week and paid by the week, and whose engagement shall be terminable by one week's notice on either side, such notice not to be continued from week to week.

(b) After one full week's work, such notice shall be given by either employer or weekly employee, or in lieu of such notice, one week's wages shall be paid or forfeited, as the case may be.

(c) A weekly employee to be entitled to the weekly wage shall be available and willing to perform such work as may be lawfully and reasonably required by the employer during the days and hours usually worked by such class of employee, provided that an employer may deduct payment for any day during which the employee cannot be usefully employed by reason of any strike, breakdown of machinery or any other cause for which the employer cannot reasonably be held responsible.

(d) "Casual Worker" means a worker employed for less than six (6) consecutive days, with a minimum of two (2) hours in any day. He shall be paid at the rate of ten per cent. (10%) in addition to the rate prescribed in this Determination on an hourly basis. The provisions of this sub-clause shall not apply to a casual worker storing raw sugar.

EXTRA RATES AND ALLOWANCES.

9. In addition to the wages prescribed herein, the following extra rates and allowances shall be paid to adult males:—

- (i) Any employee who works on shift shall be paid an additional allowance of 2s. 3d. for a day shift and 3s. 6d. for an afternoon or a night shift.
- (ii) Day workers, as defined in clause 6 hereof, required to work a night shift or night shifts shall be paid ordinary rates plus 5s. per shift whilst so required.
- (iii) Employees classified as "All others," who are directed to enter and clean tanks, viz.:—Carbonatation tanks, house syrup tanks on roof, black boil-out tanks, extension tanks, scrubbers, crystallizers, char dust towers and gibb driers shall receive an additional 1s. 3d. for each hour or part of an hour spent in such work.
- (iv) Employees classified as "All others" who are directed to handle dry lime, sulphuric acid, muriatic acid, super cel or bones shall receive an additional 1s. for each day or part of a day on such work.
- (v) Employees in the raw sugar store whilst engaged unstoring, cutting in, facing and/or turning bags shall be paid as special allowances the rate per week set out hereunder:—

Men unstoring, cutting in or facing bags	6s. per week
Men turning bags	5s. per week.

The allowances prescribed in this sub-clause are granted in consideration of and cover all disabilities associated with the handling of damaged, sweated and/or hard sugar from time to time.

DEFINITION OF JUVENILE WORKERS.

10. Persons under 21 years of age (other than apprentices or improvers) employed turning bags, sweeping trucks, receiving and placing sacks, packing sugar and sewing mouths of bags, trucking sugar, collecting samples, labelling, filling golden syrup and treacle tins.

OVERTIME (*other than continuous Shift Workers*).

11. All work done in excess of eight hours in any one day or in excess of 40 hours in any one week shall be paid for at the rate of time and a half for the first two hours and double time thereafter.

In computing overtime under this clause, each day's work shall stand alone.

Any employee who is required to work overtime shall be paid the overtime rate for a minimum of half an hour.

LATE ATTENDANCE.

12. Any employee arriving late to work shall have a deduction made of a quarter of an hours' pay for each quarter of an hour or portion thereof that he is late.

ANNUAL HOLIDAY.

13. The annual holiday shall be as prescribed by the provisions of the *Factories and Shops (Annual Holidays) Act 1946*, No. 5111, and any amendments which may be made thereto from time to time.

(In his or her own interests each employer of labour should obtain a copy of the above Act which may be purchased from the Government Printer, Melbourne.)

SICK PAY.

14. Any employee with not less than six months' service who does not attend for duty by reason of personal ill-health shall be allowed ordinary rates for the actual time of such non-attendance, provided he produces or forwards within 24 hours of the commencement of such absence evidence satisfactory to the management that his non-attendance was due to personal ill-health.

An employee shall not be entitled to any allowance on this ground for more than five days (the equivalent of 40 hours' pay) in each calendar year, but sick leave allowable under this clause may accumulate subject to continuous employment for a total of three years (the equivalent of 120 hours' pay).

No payment shall be made to employees on discharge or resignation in respect of accumulated sick leave.

Personal ill-health does not include ill-health which is the result of an accident or ill-health the result of misconduct.

MEAL ALLOWANCE.

15. Employees required to work a minimum of one and a half hours' overtime shall be entitled to 4s. tea money unless notified the previous day that they will be required to work overtime. If after having been notified accordingly and their services for overtime are not required the allowance of 4s. for tea money shall be payable. Provided that the meal allowance shall be payable in respect to the mid-day meal to employees working in the raw store receiving raw sugar on a Sunday whether or not they are notified the day before.

SPECIAL RATES FOR SUNDAYS AND HOLIDAYS (OTHER THAN CONTINUOUS SHIFT WORKERS).

16. (a) All time worked except between 11 p.m. and midnight on Sundays, New Year's Day, Australia Day, Good Friday, Easter Monday, Labour Day, Queen's Birthday, Melbourne Cup Day, Christmas Day, and Boxing Day shall be paid for at the rate of double time; but if any other day be by Act of Parliament or Proclamation substituted for any of the above-mentioned holidays, the special rate shall only be payable for work done on the day so substituted.

(b) Employees (other than casual employees and continuous shift workers) shall be paid at ordinary rates for Anzac Day and the holidays set out in the preceding sub-clause although they do not work.

PAYMENT OF WAGES.

17. Wages shall be payable weekly and not later than Thursday of each week. On pay day the finishing whistle shall be sounded five minutes earlier than the usual finishing time.

PIECEWORK.

18. The Board determines, under the provisions of section 150 of the *Factories and Shops Act 1928* (No. 3877), that any employer may fix and pay piecework prices to any person or persons or classes of persons employed at any work for which the Board has fixed the minimum wage, provided that such employer shall base such piecework prices on the earnings of an average worker working under like conditions, and such piecework prices shall be fixed so that an average worker can earn not less than the wages that are fixed by the Board for such work.

PERIODICAL ADJUSTMENT OF WAGES.

19. The wages rates for adult males set out in clause 3 are based upon the following basic wage, and, pursuant to the provisions of section 21 of the *Factories and Shops Act 1934*, the Board hereby determines that such rates shall be automatically adjusted as prescribed by clause 20.

ADJUSTMENT OF BASIC WAGE.

20. (a) For the purposes of this Determination, the expression "Commonwealth Statistician's 'all items' retail price index numbers" or any like expression means the numbers stated to be such index numbers in any document purporting, and not proved to be wrongly so purporting, to be printed by the Commonwealth Government Printer or to be signed by or on behalf of the Commonwealth Statistician.

(b) Until the beginning of the first pay period to commence in August, 1953, the amount of the Basic Wage shall be as prescribed in clause 19.

(c) During each future successive period beginning with the first pay period to commence in an August, a November, a February, or a May, the amount of the basic wage shall be adjusted by the following method, namely, by multiplying the last published Commonwealth Statistician's "all items" retail price index number by the factor .103 taken to one place of decimals, the resultant whole number being the amount of the basic wage expressed in shillings, but should the decimal number reach .5 or more the basic wage shall be taken to the next higher shilling.

(d) The wages rates for adult females are based on a basic wage being 75 per cent. of the basic wage for adult males calculated to the nearest 6d., half or less than half of 6d. to be disregarded. The wages rates for adult females shall be adjusted by increasing or decreasing such rates by the amount of the difference from time to time in the said basic wage for females.

(e) The wages of apprentices, improvers or juvenile workers shall be the appropriate percentages as set out in clause 2. Such wages shall be calculated to the nearest 6d., half or less than half of 6d. to be disregarded.

HOURS OF EMPLOYMENT (OTHER THAN SHIFT WORKERS).

3. The ordinary hours of employment shall be 40 per week to be worked in 5 days Monday to Friday inclusive between the hours of 7 a.m. and 6 p.m.

SHIFT WORK.

4. (a) (i) For the purposes of this clause—
 "Afternoon shift" shall mean a shift finishing after 6 p.m. and at or before midnight.
 "Night Shift" shall mean a shift finishing subsequent to midnight and at or before 8 a.m.
- (ii) A shift worker employed on an afternoon or night shift shall for work done during the ordinary working hours of any such shift, be paid ten per cent. more than the ordinary rates for such shifts.
- (iii) Shift workers who work on any afternoon or night shift which does not continue for at least five successive afternoons or nights in a five-day workshop or for at least six successive afternoons or nights in a six-day workshop shall be paid at the rate of time and a half.

Hours.

- (b) The ordinary hours of shift workers shall not exceed—
- (i) 40 in any week, to be worked in five shifts of 8 hours on Monday to Friday inclusive, or five shifts of not more than eight hours and one shift (Saturday) of not more than four hours; or
- (ii) 80 in 14 consecutive days, in which case an employee shall not, without payment for overtime, be required to work more than eight consecutive hours on any shift or more than six shifts in any week; or
- (iii) 120 in 21 consecutive days, in which case an employee shall not, without payment for overtime, be required to work more than eight consecutive hours on any shift or more than six shifts in any week.

Such ordinary hours shall be worked continuously except for meal breaks at the discretion of the employer. An employee shall not be required to work for more than six hours without a break for a meal.

Except at regular change-over of shifts, an employee shall not be required to work more than one shift in each 24 hours.

OVERTIME.

5. (a) All work done outside the hours fixed in clause 3 or in excess of 8½ hours on any day for day workers and all work done outside the hours fixed in clause 4 for shift workers shall be paid for at the rate of time and a half for the first three hours and double time thereafter.

(b) An employer may require any employee to work reasonable overtime at overtime rates and such employee shall work overtime in accordance with such requirement.

SUNDAYS AND HOLIDAYS.

6. (a) No employee shall be required to operate any laundry machinery or carry on any laundry process on a Sunday
- (b) Any weekly employee shall be entitled to be absent from his or her employment on any of the following holidays without deduction of pay:—New Year's Day, Australia Day, Good Friday, Easter Monday, Labour Day, Anzac Day, Melbourne Cup Day (provided that Queen's Birthday shall be substituted for Melbourne Cup Day for persons employed outside the Metropolitan District as defined in the Factories and Shops Act and the Orders in Council thereunder), Christmas Day, and Boxing Day or such other day as is generally observed in the locality as a substitute for any of the said days respectively.

Provided that the wage paid to a pieceworker under this sub-clause shall be that paid to a time worker engaged under the same classification.

(c) Where laundries close down for a period over Christmas and New Year, payments to employees prescribed in this Determination shall be made on a day prior to Christmas Day.

(d) Any employee absenting himself or herself from work on any portion of the working day either before or after a holiday provided for herein, without permission from the employer, shall not be entitled to payment for such holiday. Provided that this clause shall not apply to an employee if he or she within 24 hours of such holiday produces a medical certificate to show that such absence was due to personal ill-health.

(e) An employer shall not terminate the employment of an employee for the purpose of evading payment for any holiday prescribed by this Determination.

(f) Where an employee is dismissed within seven days prior to any such holiday the re-engagement of such employee within seven days after such holiday shall be prima facie evidence that the employment was terminated for the purpose of evading payment for such holiday.

SPECIAL RATES.

7. Double time shall be the rate for all work done on New Year's Day, Australia Day, Good Friday, Easter Monday, Labour Day, Melbourne Cup Day, Christmas Day, or Boxing Day; but if any other day be by Act of Parliament or Proclamation substituted for any of the above-mentioned holidays, the special rates shall only be payable for work done on the day so substituted. Provided that Queen's Birthday shall be substituted for Melbourne Cup Day for persons employed outside the Metropolitan District as defined in the Factories and Shops Act and the Orders in Council thereunder.

REST INTERVAL (OTHER THAN SHIFT WORKERS).

8. There shall be a rest interval of 10 minutes at a time convenient to the employer on each day (Monday to Saturday inclusive in each week) for each employee, such time to count as time worked.

MEAL INTERVAL (OTHER THAN SHIFT WORKERS).

9. (a) An interval of not less than three quarters of an hour between the hours of 12.15 p.m. and 1.45 p.m. shall be allowed for the midday meal unless a majority of the employees in any establishment desire it to be otherwise. In no circumstances shall less than 30 minutes be fixed.

(b) No work shall be performed during such meal time.

Provided however, that where the majority of employees in any establishment have agreed upon a meal hour of 30 minutes for any day the ceasing time in any such establishment shall be fifteen minutes earlier than the usual ceasing time on such day.

TEA MONEY.

10. (i) Any employee other than a shift worker who is required to work after 6.30 p.m. shall receive 3s. 6d. tea money.

(ii) A shift worker required to work overtime for more than two hours without being notified on the previous day or earlier that he will be so required to work shall receive 3s. 6d. meal money.

TERMINATION OF EMPLOYMENT.

11. Neither employer nor employee shall be required to give notice of termination of employment.

CONDITIONS OF EMPLOYMENT.

12. (a) No employee shall be employed other than as a weekly employee.

(b) A weekly employee to become entitled to the weekly wage prescribed by this Determination must be available and ready and willing to perform such work as the employer shall from time to time require on the days usually worked by such employees, and between the hours fixed as the times of beginning and ending work. This shall not effect the right of the employer to deduct payment for any day or part of a day the employee cannot be usefully employed because of any strike or through any breakdown in machinery or any stoppage of work by any cause for which the employer cannot reasonably be held responsible.

(c) A contract for weekly employment may be terminated by any employer, without liability to pay for more than time actually worked, for misconduct or for absence from work without reasonable excuse.

EMERGENCY PROVISIONS.

13. Notwithstanding anything elsewhere contained in this Determination, the following provisions shall apply in the case of an employer who is subjected to restriction or rationing in the use of electric energy and/or coal gas and/or the emergency disconnection thereof in accordance with orders or regulations approved by the appropriate lawful authority.

(i) If by reason of such restriction or rationing or emergency disconnection he is unable usefully to employ an employee for the whole or part of any day, he may deduct from the wages of that employee payment for any part of the day such employee cannot be usefully employed provided that—

(1) if an employer requires the employee to attend for work but is not able to employ him usefully the employee shall be entitled to be paid for two hours' work;

(2) where an employee commences work he shall be entitled to be paid for four hours' work;

(ii) He may require any day worker to perform his ordinary hours of work (or any such ordinary hours of work) at any time on any day other than on a Sunday on the basis of 40 hours per week. The following rates of pay shall apply for such work—

(1) for work performed on Mondays to Fridays from 7 a.m. to 5.30 p.m. and on Saturdays from 7 a.m. to noon—ordinary time;

(2) for work performed between noon and midnight on Saturdays—ordinary rates plus 25 per cent;

(3) for work performed at all other times other than on a Sunday—ordinary rates plus 10 per cent.

(iii) He may alter the time at which meal breaks are usually taken and/or the duration of them, in order to avoid or mitigate the effects of such interference, without being liable to pay penalty rates for work done during the normal meal breaks; provided that the commencing time of any meal break is not made more than one hour earlier or later than usual and that a meal break of at least twenty minutes is allowed; and provided also that the employer shall, whenever it is practicable, consult with the representative of the Union or Unions before acting under this paragraph.

Notwithstanding anything elsewhere contained in this Determination, the provisions of this clause shall also apply (*mutatis mutandis*) in the case of an employer who uses auxiliary power plant for the purpose of providing employment for his employees whilst such restriction or rationing or emergency disconnection is in force and who—

(i) is unable usefully to employ an employee for the whole of any day by reason of a breakdown in such plant through no fault of his own; or

(ii) because of the inability of the auxiliary power plant to meet the normal demands for power—

(1) finds it necessary to require any employee to perform his ordinary hours of work (or any of such ordinary hours of work) outside the hours normally worked by such employee; or

(2) finds it necessary to alter the time at which meal breaks are usually taken and/or the duration of them.

SICK LEAVE.

14. (a) Any employee who, having had at least three months' service with the same employer, is absent from duty as a result of personal ill health or accident, shall be entitled to sick pay as follows:—

(i) During the first year—3½ hours' ordinary pay for each complete month of service;

(ii) During any subsequent year of service—40 hours' ordinary pay.

Provided that in either case such employee produces or forwards within 48 hours of the commencement of such absence evidence satisfactory to the employer that his or her non-attendance was due to personal ill health or accident necessitating such absence.

(b) If the full period of sick leave as prescribed above is not taken in any year such portion as is not taken shall, provided an employee remains in the service of the one employer or any successor of such employer, be cumulative from year to year. For the purposes of this sub-clause service prior to the 1st May, 1950, shall be disregarded provided that any accumulated sick leave, not exceeding 80 hours of working time, standing to the credit of the employee on the 1st May, 1952, shall not be reduced by virtue of the provisions of this sub-clause.

No employer shall terminate the services of an employee during the currency of any period of sick leave with the object of avoiding his obligations under this sub-clause.

ANNUAL HOLIDAY.

15. The annual holiday shall be as prescribed by the provisions of the *Factories and Shops (Annual Holidays) Act 1946* and any amendments which may be made thereto from time to time.

TIME-BOOKS.

16. (a) The employer shall keep a time-book, or sheets, or cards with entries typed or perforated, or written in ink therein, showing the names of his employees, the number of hours worked by, and the wages payable and paid to, each employee.

(b) The secretary, or branch secretary, or any officer of the Federated Miscellaneous Workers' Union of Australia on production of an authority to the employer, his local manager, or the person who purports to be in charge, shall be allowed at all reasonable times to inspect such time-book, sheets or cards, and to make a copy of the same. Such time-book, sheets, or cards, for the last preceding three months shall be kept available for this purpose.

OVERALLS.

17. Where an employee is required by his employer to wear overalls such overalls shall be provided by the employee; but the employer shall launder such overalls weekly without cost to the employee.

WATERPROOF CLOTHING.

18. All employees working under wet conditions shall be provided by the employer with suitable protective clothing.

PIECE-WORK.

19. The Board determines that any employer and any employee may agree to fix and respectively pay and receive piece-work prices in respect of the work of such employee; but the piece-work prices so fixed shall be such that the employee can, in any week in which he works at least 40 hours, earn not less than 10 per cent. more than the minimum wages rate prescribed for the work done by such employee.

Provided that any such employee who in any week works less than 40 hours shall for such week be paid not less than the minimum wage rate prescribed by the Board for such work.

PERIODICAL ADJUSTMENT OF WAGES.

20. The wages rates for adult males set out in clause 2 are based upon the following basic wage, and, pursuant to the provisions of section 21 of the *Factories and Shops Acts 1934*, the Board hereby determines that such rates shall be automatically adjusted as prescribed by clause 21.

ADJUSTMENT OF BASIC WAGE.

21. (a) For the purposes of this Determination the expression "Commonwealth Statistician's 'all items' retail price index numbers" or any like expression means the numbers stated to be such index numbers in any document purporting, and not proved to be wrongly so purporting, to be printed by the Commonwealth Government Printer or to be signed by or on behalf of the Commonwealth Statistician.

(b) Until the beginning of the first pay period to commence in August, 1953, the amount of the basic wage shall be as prescribed in clause 20.

(c) During each future successive period beginning with the first pay period to commence in an August, a November, a February, or a May, the amount of the basic wage shall be adjusted by the following method, namely by multiplying the last published Commonwealth Statistician's "all items" retail price index number by the factor .103 taken to one place of decimals, the resultant whole number being the amount of the basic wage expressed in shillings, but should the decimal number reach .5 or more the basic wage shall be taken to the next higher shilling.

(d) The wages rates for adult females are based on a basic wage being 75 per cent. of the basic wage for adult males calculated to the nearest 6d., half or less than half of 6d. to be disregarded. The wages rates for adult females shall be adjusted by increasing or decreasing such rates by the amount of the difference, from time to time in the said basic wage for females.

(e) The wages of apprentices and improvers shall be the appropriate percentages as set out in clause 2, such wages shall be calculated to the nearest 6d., half or less than half of 6d. to be disregarded.

DETERMINATION OF THE HOSPITAL AND BENEVOLENT ASYLUM ATTENDANTS BOARD.

NOTE.—This Determination applies to the whole of the State.

IN accordance with the provisions of the Factories and Shops Acts, the Wages Board which now has power to determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any person or persons or classes of persons (not including professional employees and not including nurses subject to the Hospital Nurses Board) employed—

- (a) in or about a hospital, benevolent asylum or convalescent home doing any kind of work connected with the carrying on of a hospital, benevolent asylum, or convalescent home;
- (b) in or about a sanatorium for the treatment of persons suffering from any form of tuberculosis;
- (c) in or about a hospital or home for the treatment of the mentally afflicted doing any kind of work connected with the carrying on of such hospital or home;
- (d) in or about any laboratory attached to a hospital;
- (e) in or about a babies' home or a medical, dental, or nursing clinic or service;
- (f) as a first-aid attendant in connexion with an industrial or commercial undertaking;
- (g) as an ambulance driver or attendant.
- (h) in an ambulance service as a deputy superintendent or a station officer.

has made the following Determination, namely:—

1. That on the 6th July, 1953, the last previous Determination of this Board shall be revoked and replaced by this Determination.

- In charge of 8 or more employees—18s. per week above the "All others".

SPECIAL ALLOWANCE.

5. Female employees required to feed into or discharge from a laundry washing machine shall receive an allowance of 10s. per week, for each week or part thereof in addition to the rates prescribed.

MEAL INTERVAL.

6. A meal interval of not less than 30 minutes and not more than 60 minutes shall be allowed each employee during each shift. Such meal interval shall not be counted as time worked.

HOURS FOR A WEEK'S WORK.

7. The number of hours for a week's work shall be 40, which shall be worked—
- (i) in five days, or
 - (ii) in a fortnight of 80 hours in ten shifts of not more than 8 hours each.
 - (iii) With the exception of time occupied in having meals and one additional break if same is required by the institution, the work of each shift shall be continuous.

Provided that no employee shall be required to work more than six consecutive shifts without a day off duty.

For the purpose of this clause the working week shall commence at midnight on a Sunday.

OVERTIME.

8. The following overtime rates shall be paid for all work done :—
- (a) within a spread of 12 hours from the time of commencing work on any day in excess of the rostered hours for a day's work—time and a half.
 - (b) in excess of the number of hours fixed as a week's or a fortnight's work as the case may be—time and a half;
 - (c) outside a spread of 12 hours from the time of commencing work on any day—double time;
- Overtime worked shall be paid for, and an employee shall not be allowed or required to take time off in lieu thereof.
- (d) An employer may require any employee to work reasonable overtime at overtime rates and such employee shall work overtime in accordance with such requirement.

SPECIAL RATES FOR SATURDAYS AND SUNDAYS.

9. (i) All rostered time of ordinary duty performed between midnight on Friday and midnight on Saturday shall be paid for at the rate of time and a quarter.
- (ii) All rostered time of ordinary duty performed between midnight on Saturday and midnight on Sunday shall be paid for at the rate of time and a half.
- (iii) If the Saturday or Sunday duty involves duty in excess of the prescribed rostered hours, the excess period shall be paid for at the rate of time and three-quarters for Saturday and double time for Sunday.

A FULL WEEK'S WAGES TO BE PAID.

10. Any employee (other than a casual worker) willing to work who works for less than the full working week, shall be entitled to the payment of a full week's wage.

CASUAL LABOUR.

11. A casual employee, i.e., a person who is employed for not more than 16 hours to be worked in not more than two days, shall be paid per hour an amount equal to $\frac{1}{10}$ of the weekly rate prescribed by this Determination for the work performed divided by 40.

RISK RATE.

12. Persons (other than dressers doing venereal diseases work for whom provision is already made in clauses 3 or 4) shall in addition to the rates prescribed in clauses 3 or 4 be paid allowances as follows whilst :—

NAUSEOUS WORK.

13. All male employees not provided for in clause 12 who handle linen of a nauseous nature, other than linen bagged or packed in containers, shall be paid at the rate of 5s. per week in addition to the rates prescribed in clauses 3 or 4.

ANNUAL HOLIDAY.

14. The annual holiday shall be as prescribed by the provisions of the *Factories and Shops (Annual Holidays) Act 1946*, No. 5111, and any amendments which may be made thereto from time to time.

(In his or her own interests each employer of labour should obtain a copy of the above Act which may be purchased from the Government Printer, Melbourne, at a cost of 1s., plus postage.)

LONG SERVICE LEAVE.

15. (a) Subject to the provisions set out in sub-clause (b) hereof all male employees, after the completion of twenty years' continuous service, and all female employees after the completion of fifteen years' continuous service;

(i) in or about a hospital, benevolent asylum or convalescent home doing any kind of work connected with the carrying on of a hospital, benevolent asylum, or convalescent home;

(ii) in or about a sanatorium for the treatment of persons suffering from any form of tuberculosis;

(iii) in or about a hospital or home for the treatment of the mentally afflicted doing any kind of work connected with the carrying on of such hospital or home;

(iv) in or about any laboratory attached to a hospital;

shall be entitled to leave of absence as in the said sub-clause (b).

(b) (i) An employee who has been in the service of the same employer for the period specified in sub-clause (a) hereof shall be entitled to six months' leave of absence on full salary or wage.

(ii) Except by mutual agreement between the employer and the employee concerned the leave prescribed by sub-clause (b) (i) hereof shall not be taken until six months prior to the employee attaining 65 years in the case of males and 60 years in the case of females or on termination of employment if such termination takes place prior to the employee attaining the age hereinbefore referred to.

(iii) When an employee who has been in the service for at least the period prescribed in sub-clause (a) hereof resigns or is retired such employee shall be entitled to a retiring gratuity from the employer equivalent to the salary or wage for the period of leave to which the employee would have been entitled under sub-clause (b) (i) hereof, less the value of any leave granted under sub-clause (b) (ii) hereof, plus a *pro rata* amount for all service in excess of twenty years for males and fifteen years for females, provided that such resignation or retirement is not due to misconduct.

(iv) Upon the death from any cause of an employee, who, at the date of his death was eligible for the grant of long-service leave, the Board shall pay to the legal representative of the deceased employee the amount that the employee would have been entitled to receive had he retired immediately prior to the date of his death.

(c) For the purposes of this clause the following definitions shall apply:—

“Service” shall mean service calculated as from the date of entering the present employment with the hospital, benevolent home, convalescent home, sanatorium, home or laboratory (hereinafter called the employer) as an employee and shall include all periods during which an employee was serving in His Majesty's Forces or was made available by the employer for national duty or for other periods of absence approved by the employer.

“Salary or Wage” shall mean:—

- (i) the employee's salary or wage (exclusive of overtime or other allowance) at the time leave is taken and shall be subject to any variations occurring in the basic wage during the period from the commencement of the leave until the resumption of work; or
- (ii) the employee's salary or wage immediately prior to the employee leaving the service or death of the employee (as the case may be).

“Board” shall mean the Board or Controlling Authority of the Hospital, Benevolent Asylum, Convalescent Home, Sanatorium, Home or Laboratory in which the employee is employed.

Words importing the masculine gender only shall include the feminine gender.

Word importing the singular number only shall include the plural number and vice versa.

PUBLIC HOLIDAYS.

16. Employees shall be entitled to the following holidays without deduction of pay:—New Year's Day, Australia Day, Good Friday, Easter Monday, Labour Day, Anzac Day, Queen's Birthday, the first Tuesday in November, Christmas Day, and Boxing Day, but if any other day be by Act of Parliament or Proclamation substituted for any of these holidays employees shall be entitled to the days so substituted.

Provided that employees rostered to work on public holidays and fail to do so shall not be entitled to holiday pay for the said holiday.

Provided further that if an employee works on any of such holidays or such holiday occurs on his or her rostered day off or during his or her period of annual leave he or she shall be given—

(a) within four weeks following the date on which such holiday occurred—

- (1) one extra day's pay, or
- (2) equal time off in lieu thereof, or

(b) one day shall be added to his or her annual leave, or

(c) in the case of an employee not qualifying for annual leave and sub-clause (a) (1) and (2) hereof has not been applied, one day's pay shall be added to the payment in lieu of annual leave.

SICK LEAVE.

17. (a) In the event of an employee becoming sick and unfit for duty and such sickness is not due to misconduct and certified as such by the Medical Superintendent or by a Medical Practitioner approved by the institution or in an institution where there is no Medical Superintendent by a qualified Medical Practitioner approved by the institution, he or she shall be entitled to sick leave on full pay as follows:—

- (i) During the first year of service in an institution—one working day for each month of service.
- (ii) During the second, third, and fourth years of service in an institution—fourteen working days in each year.
- (iii) Thereafter—twenty-one working days in each year.

Sick leave shall be in addition to the annual leave provided in clause 14.

Provided that an employee may be absent through sickness for one day without furnishing evidence of such sickness as provided in sub-clause (a) hereof on not more than three occasions in any one year of service. An employee shall not be entitled to this benefit should he fail to notify the employer two hours before the time rostered to commence duty on the day of such absence: Provided that employees rostered for duty prior to 11 a.m. on the day of such absence shall not be required to give such notice before 9 a.m.

(b) If the full period of sick leave as prescribed in sub-clause (a) hereof is not taken in any year, such portion as is not taken shall be cumulative from year to year.

For the purposes of this sub-clause, service prior to the 1st July, 1948, shall be disregarded, providing that any accumulated sick leave (not exceeding sixty three working days) standing to the credit of the employee on the 1st July, 1951, shall not be reduced by virtue of this sub-clause.

(c) For the purposes of this clause a working day shall be one of 8 hours.

EMPLOYEES ENGAGED ON NIGHT DUTY.

18. (a) For any period of not less than three hours worked by any employee between the hours of 6 p.m. and 6 a.m. an amount of 2s. 6d. shall be paid in addition to the rates prescribed in clauses 2, 3 or 4 of this Determination.

(b) An employee required to be “on call” when off duty shall be paid an additional 2s. 6d. per night or per day as the case may be.

EARLY MORNING DUTY.

19. Employees (other than employees referred to in clause 18) who commence duty on any day between the hours of 5 a.m. and 6.30 a.m. shall be paid an amount of 1s. for each of such days in addition to the rates prescribed in clauses 2, 3 or 4 of this Determination.

TIME BOOK.

20. Every employer shall provide and cause to be kept a time book or other record in which each employee shall daily enter his or her starting and finishing times.

Such time book or other record shall be available for inspection to the General Secretary of The Hospital Employees' Federation of Australasia.

ROSTER.

21. A roster setting out employees' weekly and daily working hours, times of commencing duty, meal intervals, time off duty and time of ending duty shall be kept posted or affixed in some conspicuous part of the premises in which persons subject to this Determination are employed where it may be readily seen by such employees and the Secretary of the Hospital Employees' Federation of Australasia. At least three days' notice shall be given before any alteration is made to such roster.

DRESSING ROOMS, ETC.

22. Dressing rooms, rest rooms, bathrooms or shower rooms, and lunch rooms, shall be provided for non-resident employees and suitable healthy accommodation for resident employees.

REST INTERVAL.

23. At a time suitable to the employer two rest intervals of ten minutes each shall be given to all employees during each day or rostered shift, and shall be counted as time worked.

UNIFORMS, ETC.

24. (i) Male employees (other than clerks, gardeners, laboratory assistants, recording attendants, splint makers, splint makers assistants, telephone attendants, X-ray attendants, or X-ray technicians) shall be supplied with uniforms or overalls free of cost to employees. Provided that employees classified as “all others” shall be supplied with uniforms or overalls free of cost to employees if and when they are performing tasks for which uniforms or overalls are deemed to be necessary as herein provided.

(ii) Female employees (other than clerks, stenographers, and typists, telephone attendants, X-ray technicians, laboratory assistants or seamstresses) shall be supplied with uniforms, overalls, caps or aprons, appropriate to the occupation, free of cost to employees.

(iii) Uniforms, overalls, caps or aprons shall remain the property of the employer, and be laundered by such employer free of cost to the employee.

(iv) Provided that where uniforms, overalls, caps or aprons were already issued prior to the 1st January, 1947, to employees who appear in the excepted list herein they shall continue to be entitled to same.

MEAL TO BE PROVIDED.

25. Any employee not notified the day before that he or she is required to work overtime shall be provided with a suitable meal.

WITHHOLDING OF PAYMENT.

26. Not more than three days' pay shall be kept in hand by the employer, except when a public holiday as prescribed in clause 16 occurs on a Monday prior to the pay day, when an extra day's pay may be kept in hand.

Notwithstanding anything herein contained if a bank holiday occurs on a Wednesday payment of wages may be made on the next succeeding day.

RUBBER GLOVES, ETC.

27. Rubber gloves and all necessary safety appliances shall be provided free of cost for the use of employees and an adequate supply of same shall be maintained.

TERMINATION OF EMPLOYMENT.

28. Except where the conduct of an employee justifies instant dismissal, seven days' notice of termination of employment shall be given by either employer or employee, or one week's wages paid or forfeited as the case may be in lieu of such notice.

UNION INTERVIEWS.

29. During working hours employees of any establishment subject to this Determination may, with the consent of the person in charge of such establishment (which consent shall not be unreasonably withheld) be interviewed by the Secretary or Organizer of the Hospital Employees' Federation of Australasia, or have their Union contributions collected by the steward of the said organization.

DEFINITION.

30. For the purpose of this Determination "experience" referred to in clauses 3 and 4 means experience at such work in any hospital or institution subject to this Determination and "service" referred to in clause 4 (b) means continuous service (excluding any service whilst employed under Clauses 2 or 3) in the one hospital or institution where employed.

NOTE.—Section 174 of the Factories and Shops Act provides: Where any person is employed to perform two or more classes of work to which a rate fixed by a Wages Board is applicable then such person shall be paid in respect of the time occupied in each class of work at the rate fixed by the Board for such work.

PART II.

Hours.

2. (i) *Ordinary hours.*—The ordinary hours of work for all employees who are employed—

(a) at the Ambulance Headquarters' Stations at Ballarat, Bendigo, Geelong, Mildura, Shepparton, Morwell, Wangaratta, Warrnambool, Hamilton and Horsham shall be 40 a week, which shall be worked—

(1) in five days, or

(2) in a fortnight of 80 hours in ten shifts of not more than eight hours each.

(b) at any other Ambulance Station, shall be 44 a week, which shall be worked in six days.

Provided that no employee shall be required to work more than six consecutive shifts without a day off duty. For the purpose of this clause, the working week shall commence at midnight on a Sunday.

(ii) *Rosters.*—Such hours shall be worked according to rosters which shall be exhibited in each Station at least one week before the commencing date of the roster and shall show the periods of duty for a period of fourteen days. In emergency or in a case of the sickness of any employee or where time off is given pursuant to sub-clause (iii) of this clause the duty periods prescribed by the roster may be altered.

Saturday and Sunday duty shall be equitably distributed amongst transport staff.

(iii) *Employees on Call and Standing By.*

(a) Time on call means time during which, in accordance with the on-call roster, an employee who is rostered off duty is required to hold himself in readiness to answer a call.

Stand-by time means time during which an employee who does not reside on the station premises is required to remain on those premises during periods when he is not rostered for duty.

- (b) Time on call shall not be counted as time worked unless an employee is called out for duty, in which case, subject to the provisions of this sub-clause as to time off in lieu of payment, an employee shall be paid at appropriate rates (ordinary or overtime) for the actual period or periods of duty with a minimum payment of one hour for the time so worked in any day during which the employee is on call. In lieu of payment for time actually worked when called out, equivalent time off may be given in a current cycle of fourteen days. Where practicable, if an employee has been called out for duty at night during his normal sleeping hours and he is rostered for day duty on the next day, such time off shall be given at a time mutually arranged during that period of day duty. In other cases the employee shall be given at least two days' notice of when the time off is to be allowed.

Employees shall be free from "on call" duty every second week-end and for at least six days in every period of fourteen consecutive days.

- (c) Stand-by time shall be counted as time worked except in one-man branch stations.
- (d) As compensation for time on call, an employee who, during a period of his employment is required to be on call pursuant to paragraph (b) of this sub-clause, shall be paid for each and every week of such period of employment an additional sum of ten shillings. This paragraph shall not apply to employees in one-man branch stations.
- (e) One-man Branch Stations:—As compensation for time on call employees shall be given accommodation, rent free, and shall be supplied, without charge, with fuel and light. They shall be given relief from duty for one day in each seven days and shall be paid the rate prescribed by this Determination for station officers. Days of relief from duty may be accumulated by mutual arrangement between the employee and the superintendent-secretary up to a maximum of eight days. Nothing in this paragraph shall be deemed to prohibit an employee in a one-man branch station from temporarily leaving the station at times when he is rostered on duty after having made arrangements satisfactory to the superintendent-secretary, or in his absence his deputy, for a proper carrying on by him of the service during his temporary absence.

CASUAL LABOUR.

3. A casual employee, i.e., a person who is employed for not more than sixteen hours to be worked in not more than two days, shall be paid per hour an amount equal to $1\frac{1}{10}$ th of the weekly rate prescribed by this Determination for the work performed divided by 40.

OVERTIME.

4. Subject to sub-clause (iii) of clause 2 hereof all time worked in excess of the number of hours fixed for a week's or a fortnight's work as the case may be shall be paid for at the rate of time and a half, unless time off in lieu of payment for time actually worked is given in a current cycle of fourteen days.

An employer may require any employee to work reasonable overtime at overtime rates.

SPECIAL RATES FOR SATURDAY AND SUNDAY.

5. All rostered time of ordinary duty worked between midnight on Friday and midnight on Saturday shall be paid for at time and a quarter.

All rostered time of ordinary duty worked between midnight on Saturday and midnight on Sunday shall be paid for at time and a half.

If all time worked on Saturday or Sunday is in excess of the prescribed rostered hours of duty and/or stand by, the excess period shall be paid for at the rate of time and three quarters for Saturday and double time for Sunday.

ANNUAL HOLIDAY.

6. The annual holiday shall be as prescribed by the provisions of the *Factories and Shops (Annual Holidays) Act* 1946, No. 5111, and any amendments which may be made thereto from time to time.

(In his or her own interests each employer of labour should obtain a copy of the above Act which may be purchased from the Government Printer, Melbourne, at a cost of 1s., plus postage.)

LONG SERVICE LEAVE.

7. (a) Subject to the provisions set out in sub-clause (b) hereof, all full-time employees after the completion of twenty years' continuous service as a deputy superintendent, station officer or ambulance driver with the same employer, shall be entitled to six months' leave of absence on full salary or wage.

(b) (i) Except by mutual agreement between the employer and the employee concerned the leave prescribed by sub-clause (a) hereof shall not be taken until six months prior to the employee attaining 65 years or on termination of employment if such termination takes place prior to the employee attaining the age hereinbefore referred to.

(ii) When an employee who has been in the service for at least the period prescribed in sub-clause (a) hereof resigns or is retired such employee shall be entitled to a retiring gratuity from the employer equivalent to the salary or wage for the period of leave to which the employee would have been entitled under sub-clause (a) hereof, less the value of any leave granted under sub-clause (b) (i) hereof, plus a *pro rata* amount for all service in excess of twenty years provided that such resignation or retirement is not due to misconduct.

(iii) Upon the death from any cause of an employee who, at the date of his death, was eligible for the grant of long-service leave, the Committee shall pay the legal representative of the deceased employee the amount that the employee would have been entitled to receive had he retired immediately prior to the date of his death.

(c) For the purpose of this clause, the following definitions shall apply:—

"Service" shall mean service calculated as from the date of entering employment with the Ambulance Service as an employee and shall include all periods during which an employee was serving in His Majesty's Forces or was made available by the employer for national duty or for other periods of absence approved by the employer.

"Salary" or "Wage" shall mean—

(i) the employee's salary or wage (exclusive of overtime or other allowance) at the time leave is taken and shall be subject to any variations occurring in the basic wage during the period from the commencement of the leave until the resumption of work; or

(ii) the employee's salary or wage immediately prior to the employee leaving the service or death of the employee (as the case may be).

"Committee" shall mean the Committee or controlling authority of the Ambulance Service in which the employee is employed.

PUBLIC HOLIDAYS.

8. Employees shall be entitled to the following holidays without deduction of pay:—New Year's Day, Australia Day, Good Friday, Easter Monday, Labour Day, Anzac Day, Queen's Birthday, the first Tuesday in November, Christmas Day, and Boxing Day, but if any other day be by Act of Parliament or Proclamation substituted for any of these holidays employees shall be entitled to the days so substituted.

Provided that employees rostered to work on public holidays and fail to do so shall not be entitled to holiday pay for the said holiday.

Provided further that if an employee works on any of such holidays or such holiday occurs on his or her rostered day off or during his or her period of annual leave he or she shall be given—

(a) within four weeks following the date on which such holiday occurred—

- (1) one extra day's pay, or
- (2) equal time off in lieu thereof, or

(b) one day shall be added to his or her annual leave, or

(c) in the case of an employee not qualifying for annual leave and sub-clause (a) (1) and (2) hereof has not been applied, one day's pay shall be added to the payment in lieu of annual leave.

SICK LEAVE.

9. (a) In the event of an employee becoming sick and unfit for duty and certified as such by a Medical Practitioner approved by the Service, he shall be entitled to sick leave on full pay as follows:—

- (i) during the first year of service—one working day for each month of service;
- (ii) during the second, third and fourth years of service—14 working days in each year;
- (iii) thereafter—21 working days in each year.

Sick leave shall be in addition to the annual holiday proscribed in clause 6.

Provided that an employee may be absent through sickness for one day without furnishing evidence of such sickness as provided in sub-clause (a) hereof on not more than three occasions in any one year of service. An employee shall not be entitled to this benefit should he fail to notify the employer two hours before the time rostered to commence duty on the day of such absence. Provided that employees rostered for duty prior to 11 a.m. on the day of such absence shall not be required to give notice before 9 a.m.

(b) If the full period of sick leave as prescribed in sub-clause (a) hereof is not taken in any year, such portion as is not taken shall be cumulative from year to year.

For the purposes of this sub-clause service prior to the 1st May, 1952, shall be disregarded.

(c) For the purposes of this clause a working day shall be one of eight hours.

MEAL INTERVAL.

10. A meal interval of not less than 30 minutes shall be allowed each employee during each shift. Such meal interval shall not be counted as time worked.

DRESSING ROOM ETC.

11. Dressing room, luncheon room and conveniences shall be provided for all employees.

UNIFORMS.

12. Uniforms (one cap, one tunic, two pairs of trousers, three shirts, one tie, one pair of overalls), shall be supplied free of cost to all employees and shall remain the property of the employer. One raincoat and where reasonably necessary one dust-coat shall be supplied to each employee and shall remain the property of the employer and shall be returned to the employer if called upon. Replacement of items of uniform supplied shall be made as and when reasonably necessary as determined by the Committee.

RUBBER GLOVES, ETC.

13. Rubber gloves and all necessary safety appliances shall be provided free of cost for the use of employees and an adequate supply of same shall be maintained.

RELIEVING OTHER MEMBERS OF STAFF.

14. Where an employee is called upon to relieve a station officer in charge of a branch station on annual or sick leave and by so doing is required to live away from home, he shall be paid a living away from home allowance at the rate of forty-two shillings per week. This provision shall not apply in the case where the relieving officer is allowed to take over the premises attached to the branch station for holiday purposes for his family.

TRAVELLING TIME AND EXPENSES.

15. Where an employee is directed to report for duty to a branch or headquarters station, other than that to which he is posted, he shall travel to and from such station in the employer's time, and his fares and incidental expenses shall be paid by the employer.

TRAVELLING ON DUTY.

16. Where an employee is travelling on duty which involves more than ten hours' travelling, he shall be paid all travelling expenses actually incurred, including meals and sleeping accommodation where necessary.

TERMINATION OF EMPLOYMENT.

17. Except where the conduct of an employee justifies instant dismissal, seven days' notice of termination of employment shall be given by either employer or employee, or one week's wages paid or forfeited as the case may be in lieu of such notice.

UNION INTERVIEWS.

18. During working hours employees of any establishment subject to this Determination may, with the consent of the person in charge of such establishment (which consent shall not be unreasonably withheld) be interviewed by the Secretary or Organizer of the Hospital Employees' Federation of Australasia, or have their Union contributions collected by the steward of the said organization.

PART III.

(This Part applies to all employees.)

PERIODICAL ADJUSTMENT OF WAGES.

1. The wages rates set out in clause 2, 3, and 4 of Part I and clause 1 of Part II, are based upon the following basic wage, and, pursuant to the provisions of Section 21 of the *Factories and Shops Act 1934*, the Board has determined that such rates shall be automatically adjusted as prescribed by clause 2. Provided that for every increase of 1s per week in the basic wage for adult males, the wages of adult females shall be increased or decreased by 9d. per week and male and female junior employees shall be increased or decreased by 6d. per week. Provided also that for every increase or decrease of 1s. in the basic wage for males the weekly deductions for board and lodging shall be increased or decreased by 4d. for adult males and 3d. for adult females and all juniors.

ADJUSTMENT OF BASIC WAGE.

2. (a) For the purposes of this Determination the expression "Commonwealth Statistician's 'all items' retail price index numbers" or any like expression means the numbers stated to be such index numbers in any document purporting, and not proved to be wrongly so purporting to be printed by the Commonwealth Government Printer or to be signed by or on behalf of the Commonwealth Statistician.

(b) Until the beginning of the first pay period to commence in August, 1953, the amount of the basic wage shall be as prescribed in clause 1.

(c) During each future successive period beginning with the first pay period to commence in an August, a November, a February, or a May, the amount of the basic wage shall be adjusted by the following method, namely, by multiplying the last published Commonwealth Statistician's "all items" retail price index number by the factor '103 taken to one place of decimals, the resultant whole number being the amount of the basic wage expressed in shillings, but should the decimal number reach .5 or more the basic wage shall be taken to the next higher shilling.
