Country Fire Authority Acts. SUMMER PERIOD IN RESPECT OF SPECIFIED PARTS OF THE COUNTRY AREA OF VICTORIA.

PROCLAMATION

By His Excellency the Governor of the State of Victoria and its Dependencies in the Commonwealth of Australia, &c., &c., &c.

WHEREAS by sub-section (2) of section 4 of the Country Fire Authority Act 1944 it is enacted that the Governor in Council, after consultation by the Chief Secretary of

Victoria with the Minister of Forests, may from time to victoria with the Minister of Forests, may from time to time by proclamation published in the Government Gazette proclaim any period as the summer period in respect of the country area of Victoria or any specified part or parts thereof and, without affecting the generality of the fore-going, may proclaim different summer periods in respect of different parts of the said country area:

And whereas the Chief Secretary and the Minister of Forests have consulted accordingly:

Now therefore I, the Governor of the State of Victoria in the Commonwealth of Australia, by and with the advice of the Executive Council of the said State and in pursuance of the powers conferred by the Country Fire Authority Acts do by this my Proclamation proclaim:—

The period commencing on the ninth day of December, 1953, and ending on the thirty-first day of March next following to be the summer period in respect of the parts hereinafter specified of the country area of Victoria, that is to say:—

the Second Fire Control Region comprising the municipal districts of the City of Bendigo, the Borough of Eaglehawk and those portions of the Shires of Marong and Strathfieldsaye not included in the Twenty-first Fire Control Region; those portions of the Nineteenth Fire Control Region comprised by the municipal districts of the Town of St. Arnaud, the Borough of Inglewood and the Shires of Bet Bet, Kara Kara and Korong:

those portions of the Twenty-first Fire Control Region those portions of the Twenty-first Fire Control Region comprised by the municipal districts of the Town of Castlemaine, the Shires of East Loddon, Huntly, Maldon and Metcalfe and those portions of the Shires of Marong and Strathfieldsaye not included in the Second Fire Control Region; those portions of the Twenty-second Fire Control Region comprised by the municipal districts of the Shires of Euroa, Goulburn, McIvor, Pyalong, Seymour and Violet Town;

and the Twenty-fourth Fire Control Region comprising the municipal districts of the Shires of Beech-worth, Bright, Chiltern, Towong, Upper Murray, Wodonga and Yackandandah.

This By-law is to be read and construed as one with By-law No. 56, duly passed by the Board on the 7th day of October, 1952, and gazetted on the 17th day of December, 1952, as amended by By-law No. 58, duly passed by the Board on the 14th day of July, 1953, and gazetted on the 22nd day of July, 1953.

2. The said By-law No. 56, as amended by By-law No. 58 (hereinafter in this By-law referred to as "the said By-law") is hereby amended as follows:—

(a) In clause 24 of the said By-law there shall be substituted for paragraph (ii) of sub-clause (c) the following paragraph:—.

"(ii) Except where otherwise specifically permitted by the Chief Engineer of Water Supply, each meter shall be placed above the ground and connected to the service pipe, in accordance with the method, table, and diagram set forth in the First Schedule hereto appropriate to the diameter of the meter."

(b) In clause 43 of the said By-law, for sub-clause (a) there shall be substituted the following sub-

lause:—

"(a) That part of any service pipe (including any bend, elbow, or other fitting therefor), which extends in a thoroughfare from a main aqueduct or arterial main to and including the high-pressure screw-down stop tap required to be fixed, pursuant to clause 46 hereof, and all meter connexions shall, save where the Chief Engineer of Water Supply, in writing, may otherwise, permit, be of the materials hereinafter set forth, that is to say: is to sav:-

Preparation of Site.

Paths are to be boxed out to a depth of 3 inches and to a width of 4 ft. 6 in. from the building line; and to the same longitudinal grade as the top of existing kerbing.

Concrete.

The Council will supply all concrete for the completion of the works. The constituents of the concrete will be four parts of screenings, two parts of sand, and one part of cement, proportioned by volume. The paving shall be laid in slabs 4 ft. 6 in. square, alternate bays being constructed at each pouring. The concrete, after placing, is to be screeded off and rammed solid. Finish.

The material used for finishing shall be a basalt grit composition. The whole of the exposed surfaces shall be finished off with a steel float to produce an even non-slip surface, and all joints are to be made with an approved grooving tool.

All concrete is to be covered for at least three days after placing and maintained for a period of two months after completion.

WHEREAS by the Country Fire Authority Act 1944 it is amongst other things enacted that the Governor in Council may make Regulations for the provision grant or payment of superannuation allowances pensions or gratuities to officers and employees of the Authority or their wives families widows or dependants on the resignation retirement or death of such officers and employees; and for the creation and establishment or the continuation of any fund or funds for the purpose and for the joining or co-operating in any scheme for supporting aiding or subscribing to any association fund or trust for any of the said purposes: Now therefore His Excellency the Governor of the State of Victoria in the Commonwealth of Australia by and with the advice of the Executive Council of the said State and in pursuance of the powers conferred by the Country Fire Authority Acts, doth hereby make the Regulations following (that is to say):—

Citation and commencement. 1. These Regulations may be cited as the "Country Fire Authority Superannuation and Endowment Assurance Regulations 1953" and shall come into operation on the first day of January, 1954.

Interpretation.

- 2. In these Regulations, unless inconsistent with the context or subject matter— $\,$
 - "Authority" means the Country Fire Authority.
 - "Endowment assurance policy" means a policy which provides subject to the provisos and conditions stated therein for the payment of the amount assured and bonuses on survival of the life assured to maturity date or on his prior death.
 - "Financial year" means the year commencing on the first day of July and ending on the next succeeding thirtieth day of June.
 - "Fund" means the Country Fire Authority Superannuation and Endowment Assurance Fund.
 - "Legal personal representative" includes a person who appears to the Authority to be entitled to a grant of representation in respect of the estate of a deceased subscriber.
 - "Life assurance company" means The National Mutual Life Association of Australasia Limited or any other life assurance company selected by the Authority as the company with which policies for the purpose of these Regulations shall or may be effected.
 - "Subscriber" means a male person—
 - (i) who is performing duties of a permanent nature in the service of the Authority; and
 - (ii) who is declared by resolution of the Authority to be a subscriber.
 - "Wages" means all pecuniary emoluments received by an employee of the Authority in his capacity as such whether as salary or wages or as allowances granted in addition to salary or wages but does not include payments for overtime or in the form of bonuses or for travelling allowances or for incidental expenditure or payments of a temporary character.

Establishment of Fund.

- (1) A Fund entitled the Country Fire Authority Superannuation and Endowment Assurance Fund is hereby established.
 - (2) The Fund shall comprise-
 - (a) the contributions of subscribers thereto;
 - (b) the payments by the Authority thereto;
 - (c) the endowment assurance policies hereinafter referred to and any policy moneys arising by way of maturity or surrender thereof whilst such policies remain subject to these Regulations;

- (d) the investments in which any moneys of the Fund have been invested in manner hereinafter provided and the income arising therefrom.
- 4. Subject to these Regulations the Authority shall control the Fund Control of Fund. and in relation thereto the Authority shall have the following powers, that is to say:-
 - (1) To appoint and remove trustees in whom the Fund may be vested;
 - (2) to determine the manner of administration of the Fund including the mode of execution of deeds receipts and other documents;
 - (3) to determine finally and conclusively any question respecting the administration or application of these Regulations or respecting any matter or thing arising out of the same;
 - (4) to determine all claims upon the Fund.
- 5. (1) A subscriber shall from the date of his becoming a subscriber Contributions subscriber. Authority contribute to the by subscriber. and until he ceases to be employed by the Authority contribute to the by Fund an amount equal to 5 per centum of his wages.

Provided that if at any time the rate of the annual wages of a subscriber shall be less than twenty times the annual premium payable under the endowment assurance policy effected on his life pursuant to the regulations by-

- (a) an amount not exceeding Twenty-five pounds (£25) or
- (b) an amount exceeding Twenty-five (£25) and he does not make the election referred to in clause 10 (2) hereofhis contribution to the Fund shall be equal to the amount required for the premium payable on that policy.
- (2) Such amount shall be deducted by the Authority from the wages of the subscriber.
- 6. (1) The Authority shall in each financial year pay into the Fund Payments to an amount equal to the contributions made by each subscriber during Authority. that year.

(2) Such amount shall be paid in two approximately equal instalments on the thirty-first day of December and the thirtieth day of June respectively.

7. The Authority shall keep in the name of each subscriber a Ledger separate ledger account and to that account shall be credited all con-accounts in names of tributions made to the Fund by that subscriber and all payments made subscribers. by the Authority to the Fund in respect of him.

8. When a person becomes a subscriber he shall forthwith effect Subscribers with the life assurance company an endowment assurance policy on endowment the life assurance company an endowment assurance policy on endowment as having assurance. his life maturing at his sixtieth birthday for such amount as having assuran regard to his age shall then be purchasable by the contributions payable by him as hereinbefore provided.

9. Every endowment assurance policy effected as aforesaid shall Gustody of be either in the name of the Authority or in the name of the subscriber policies. and in the latter case it shall be assigned in statutory form by the subscriber to the Authority.

Each such policy shall be delivered by the life assurance company to the Authority and shall be held by it subject to the provisions of these Regulations. The policy in respect of any subscriber shall be available for inspection by him at any reasonable time. Every subscriber and any person claiming under or through him shall do all such things as are required by the life assurance company to effect any such policy or any increase or decrease in the sum assured and shall execute all such documents or writings as the Authority may require for transferring any such policy to it.

10. (1) If on the first day of July in any year the rate of the annual increase or wages of a subscriber shall be greater than twenty times the annual premium then payable under the endowment assurance policy effected cover. on his life pursuant to these Regulations by at least Fifty pounds (£50) then that part of his contribution to the Fund which is not then being applied in payment of such premium shall as from the said first day of July be applied in increasing the amount assured by that policy.

(2) If at any time the rate of the annual wages of a subscriber shall be less than twenty times the annual premium then payable under the endowment assurance policy effected on his life pursuant to these Regulations by an amount exceeding Twenty-five pounds (£25) that subscriber may elect to have his contributions to the Fund reduced to 5 per centum of the reduced wages and upon such election being made the amount assured by the policy shall be reduced accordingly.

Payment of contributions during

(3) If a subscriber is absent from the service of the Authority for any reason whatsoever with or without remuneration from the Authority he shall unless the Authority otherwise determines pay to remuneration the Authority his contribution and in default of him so doing the Authority may at its discretion treat the subscriber as if he had resigned from the staff of the Authority and his resignation had been accepted by it.

Payment of premiums by Authority.

11. The Authority shall out of the contributions by the subscriber to the Fund and standing to the credit of the ledger account kept in his name pay to the life assurance company as and when they become due the premium or premiums on the endowment assurance policy effected on his life.

Investment of Fund.

12. All moneys constituting the Fund (other than those applied or to be applied in the payment of premiums in manner aforesaid) notwithstanding that the same have been credited to the respective accounts of the separate subscribers as aforesaid, may be treated as one Fund for the purpose of investment, and may be invested by the Authority or the trustees in any securities which are or may be prescribed by any Act of the Parliament of Victoria then in force relating to investments by trustees, but the Authority shall not be responsible for any loss resulting from any such investment.

Allocation of income from investments.

13. At the end of each financial year, all income derived from the investment of the Fund, less the expenses (if any) incurred, shall be credited to the respective accounts in the proportion that the amount standing at credit in the account kept in the name of each subscriber bears to the total at credit in the accounts kept in the names of all subscribers at the end of the last preceding financial year.

Annual statement to subscribers.

14: Each subscriber shall be entitled to receive annually a statement of the amount standing at the credit of the account kept in his name at the end of the last preceding financial year.

Amounts received on maturity of policies to be paid into Fund.

15. Upon the maturity of a policy by death of a subscriber or by effluxion of time whilst that subscriber is in the service of the Authority the Authority shall receive from the life assurance company the policy moneys thereupon payable and pay the same into the Fund to the credit of the account in the name of that subscriber.

- 16. Subject to clause eighteen of these Regulations and to the exceptions hereinafter provided and to any advances or loans made to him from the Fund by way of investment of the Fund pursuant to these Regulations, a subscriber upon ceasing to be employed by the Authority (otherwise than by death) shall receive the total amount standing at credit in the account kept in his name at the date of his ceasing to be employed by the Authority provided that-
 - (1) if a subscriber having served for less than ten years from the date upon which he became a subscriber to this or any other similar Fund administered by the Authority or its predecessor the Country Fire Brigades Board leave the service of the Authority, not being totally incapable of performing his duties by reason of ill-health or physical or mental incapacity, or leave the service of the Authority for the purpose of engaging in other employment-
 - (a) he shall receive an amount equal to the balance (if any) of his contributions to the Fund remaining to his credit in the account kept in his name after the deductions therefrom of such sums as may have been applied in the payment of premiums on any policy effected on his life together with interest on such balance from time to time at the rate of Four pounds per centum per annum calculated in half-yearly rests and
 - (b) any policy effected on his life shall be assigned to him absolutely.
 - (2) If a subscriber having served for ten years or more from the date upon which he became a subscriber to this or any other similar Fund administered by the Authority or its predecessor the Country Fire Brigades Board leave the service of the Authority not being incapable of performing his duties by reason of ill-health or physical or mental incapacity nor for the purpose of engaging in other employment but before attaining the age of 50 years—
 - (a) he shall receive from the Fund for each completed year during which he subscribed thereto a sum equal to one-twentieth of the total amount

standing at credit at the time of leaving the service of the Authority in the account kept in his name but not exceeding the total thereof

- (b) any policy effected on his life shall be assigned to him absolutely.
- (3) Notwithstanding the limitations in paragraph (1) and paragraph (2) hereof, the Authority may, in its discretion, increase the amount payable thereunder to a sum not exceeding the full amount standing at credit in the account kept in the name of any subscriber.

- (4) Every subscriber who is dismissed by the Authority or who leaves the service of the Authority to escape dismissal shall be entitled-
 - (a) to receive from the Fund the amount (if any) of his own contributions then standing at credit in the account kept in his name and
 - (b) to have the policy effected on his life assigned to him absolutely.
- (5) In the event of a subscriber committing a breach of trust or other wrongful act, by reason of which the Authority suffers or may suffer pecuniary loss, the Authority shall surrender to the life assurance company for cash the policy effected on his life and pay the moneys so received to the credit of the account kept in the name of such subscriber and shall have full power to use the amount thus standing at credit of that account for the purpose of making good any such loss. The amount (if any) by which his contributions to the Fund may exceed such loss shall be paid to him and the amount remaining in the ledger account in his name shall be forfeited to the Authority.
- (6) Any balance standing at credit in the account kept in the name of any subscriber after payments pursuant to paragraphs (1), (2), (3), (4) or (5) of this clause have been made shall remain in the Fund and be credited to the accounts kept in the names of the remaining subscribers at the end of the financial year then current, in the same proportion as that referred to in clause fourteen of these Regulations.

17. Subject to clause eighteen of these Regulations and to the \underline{P}_{ayme} exception in paragraph (6) of the proviso to clause sixteen and to any from Fund advances or loans made to him from the Fund by way of investment of subscrit of the Fund pursuant to these Regulations the Authority shall upon the death of a subscriber pay to such one or more and to the exclusion of the other or others of them his widow children or other dependants and in such shares as the Authority in each case in its absolute discretion shall determine or at the option of the Authority to the legal personal representative of the deceased subscriber the total amount (including the proceeds of the policy effected on his life and paid into that account in manner aforesaid) standing at credit in the account kept in his name.

18. (1) Subject to clause nine of these Regulations no subscriber Interest in shall whilst he remains in the service of the Authority assign his p interest either absolutely or by way of mortgage charge or otherwise assigned. &c. in any policy effected on his life pursuant to these Regulations or in any benefit derivable from the Fund. If any subscriber-

- (a) becomes bankrupt or assigns or charges or attempts to assign or charge any of his rights or interest in any such policy or any other benefit derivable from the Fund without the consent in writing of the Authority or does or suffers anything by which his rights or interest under these Regulations or any part thereof through his act or default or by operation or process of law would or might become vested in or payable to any other person or corporation, or
- (b) becomes a lunatic or incapable of managing his own affairs of which last-mentioned disability the Authority shall be the sole judge,

the rights and interests of the subscriber thereby affected shall forthwith determine and the Authority shall be entitled upon such determination to surrender to the life assurance company for cash the policy effected on his life or if the Authority deems fit to continue the policy for the time being and surrender it later or to continue it until maturity or the prior death of the subscriber.

(2) Any moneys representing the subscriber's rights and interests thereby determined which may be received by the Authority whether by way of surrender or at the maturity of the policy or on the death of the subscriber and the moneys standing to the credit of the account in the name of that subscriber shall be applied at the option of the Authority either towards the maintenance or benefit of the subscriber or his dependants or of such one or more of them to the exclusion of the other or others as the Authority in its absolute discretion deems fit.

Discharge for proceeds of policies.

- 19. The receipt under the common seal of the Authority or any receipts signed on its behalf by a person or persons authorized by it for that purpose shall be a sufficient discharge to the life assurance company for any policy moneys payable hereunder upon the death of a subscriber or upon the maturity of the policy or upon its surrender or otherwise and the life assurance company shall not be concerned for any reason or purpose whatsoever—
 - (1) to inquire whether any right or powers conferred by these Regulations upon the Authority or the right to exercise them have arisen or are in existence at any time or from time to time when the Authority may claim to exercise them or
 - (2) to see to the application of any moneys received by the Authority;

and the life assurance company shall not in any way be affected by notice express or implied that any right or power as aforesaid is intended to be exercised for any purpose other than that for which it has been conferred.

Date of payment o 20. Any sum due or payable to any subscriber or his legal personal representative under these Regulations shall be paid only if the cash is available for the purpose; until paid, however, such sum shall carry its proportion of the interest earned by the Fund up to the date of payment.

Audit.

21. Once at least in every year the accounts of the Fund shall be examined by an auditor or auditors licensed under the Companies Act appointed by the Authority for the purpose which shall also fix his or their remuneration.

Winding up and distribution of Fund.

- 22. (1) With the consent of the Governor in Council the Authority may at any time wind up and distribute the Fund by paying to each subscriber the amount which bears the same proportion to the total amount to be distributed as the amount at credit in the account kept in the name of such subscriber bears to the total amount at credit in the accounts kept in the names of all subscribers at the date when contributions to the Fund ceased and shall assign to the subscribers the policy effected on their respective lives.
- (2) Upon receipt of a report from the Authority that the Fund has been wound up and distributed, the Governor in Council shall revoke these Regulations.
- (3) The Authority shall give at least six months' notice in writing to each subscriber of its intention to apply for the consent of the Governor in Council to wind up and distribute the Fund.

Notice to be given. 23. The Authority shall not submit to the Minister for approval of the Governor in Council any regulation revoking or amending these Regulations until the expiration of a period of fourteen days after notice in writing setting forth the substance and effect of such regulation has been posted or delivered by the Authority to every subscriber.

Expenses of administration.

24. Subject to the discretion of the Authority, the expenses of management and administration of the Fund shall be borne by the Authority: Provided that the Authority may at any time decide that the Fund shall bear the whole or any portion of the expenses of management and administration thereof.

 - "Ex-subscriber" means any person in the service of the Authority who was formerly a subscriber and who has become either an officer within the meaning of the Superannuation Acts of the State of Victoria or a subscriber to the Country Fire Authority Superannuation and Endowment Assurance Fund under the regulations pursuant to the Country Fire Authority Acts and in either case has thereupon ceased to contribute to the Fund.
- (2) Clause 10 (b) of the said Regulations is hereby revoked and the following paragraph substituted therefor:-

TERMS OF EMPLOYMENT.

6. All employees (other than casuals) willing, ready, and available for work shall be paid the full weekly wage fixed herein, irrespective of the number of hours worked not exceeding 40. To terminate employment one week's notice shall be given by either employer or employee, or in lieu of such notice one week's wages shall be paid or forfeited, as the case may be. The provisions of this clause shall not apply in any instance where an employee is dismissed for misconduct.

CASUAL LABOUR.

7. Casual hands, i.e., persons who are employed during any week for not more than one-half of the maximum number of hours fixed in the Determination as a week's work, shall be paid at the rate of time and a half on the hourly rate calculated pro rata by dividing the weekly rate by the number of hours fixed for a week's work.

SPECIAL RATE FOR SUNDAYS AND HOLIDAYS.

- 8. (a) Double time shall be paid for all work done on Sundays, New Year's Day, the day following New Year's Day, Australia Day, Good Friday, Easter Saturday, Easter Monday, Easter Tuesday, Labour Day, Anzac Day, Queen's Birthday, Show Day, Melbourne Cup Day, Christmas Day, and Boxing Day, but if any other day be substituted by local custom or by Act of Parliament or Proclamation for any of the holidays specified herein the special rate shall be payable only for work done on the day so substituted.
 - (b) No deduction shall be made from the wages of employees granted leave for the holidays mentioned in sub-clause (a) hereof.
- (c) In connexion with the visit to Australia of Her Majesty, Queen Elizabeth II., where a public holiday or public half-holiday is proclaimed by Order in Council throughout any municipality or part thereof, or within any defined area, such public holiday or public half-holiday shall, so far as such municipality or part thereof, or such defined area is concerned, be deemed to be included in the list of holidays herein prescribed.

Provided that an employee who fails to attend for work on the working days before and/or after such public holiday or public half-holiday without reasonable excuse shall not be entitled to be paid for such public holiday or public half-holiday.

MINIMUM OF WORK.

9. Any employee required to work on any day mentioned in clause 8 shall be entitled to not less than four hours' pay at special rates provided that he is available for work during such four hours.

ANNUAL HOLIDAY.

10. The annual holiday shall be as prescribed by the provisions of the Factories and Shops (Annual Holidays) Act 1946 (No. 5111), and any amendments which may be made thereto from time to time.

SICE LEAVE.

- 11. (a) Any employee who, having had at least three months' service with the same employer, is absent from duty as a result of personal ill health or accident shall be entitled to sick pay as follows:—
 - (i) During the first year-3; hours' ordinary pay for each complete month of service;
 - (ii) During any subsequent year of service-40 hours' ordinary pay.

Provided that in either case such employee produces or forwards within 48 hours of the commencement of such absence evidence satisfactory to the employer that his or her non-attendance was due to personal ill health or accident necessitating such

(b) If the full period of sick leave as prescribed above is not taken in any year such portion as is not taken shall be cumulative from year to year.

For the purposes of this sub-clause service prior to the 1st May, 1949, shall be disregarded, provided that any accumulated sick leave, not exceeding 120 hours of working time, standing to the credit of the employee on the 1st May, 1952, shall not be reduced by virtue of the provisions of this sub-clause.

No employer shall terminate the services of an employee during the currency of any period of sick leave with the object of avoiding his obligations under this sub-clause.

TIME AND WAGES RECORDS.

12. Each employer shall keep time and wages records showing the name of each employee, the number of hours worked each day, and the wages and overtime paid each week. The time and wages record shall be open for inspection to a duly-accredited official of the Federated Clerks' Union of Australia during the usual office hours at the employer's office, or other convenient place, provided that only one demand for such inspection shall be made at the same establishment in any one fortnight, and such demand shall not be made unless the Secretary of the Union suspects that a breach of this Determination has been committed.

MEAL ALLOWANCE.

13. Any employee who is required to work after the usual finishing hour of work, beyond one hour, shall be paid a meal allowance of 2s. 6d.

REST PERIOD.

14. All employees shall be allowed two rest intervals on each day as follows:—(a) The first of ten minutes to be allowed between the time of commencing work and the usual meal interval; (b) the second of ten minutes to be allowed between the usual meal interval and the time of ceasing work for the day. Such intervals are to be counted as part of time worked.

Note.—To the weekly earnings of each pieceworker the sum of 23s. shall be added, provided that where less than 40 hours are worked in any week a proportionate amount shall be added in lieu of such sum.

WIRING.

4. Where a pieceworker is called on to wire cases he shall be paid 1d. per case for all cases wired.

CONDITIONS OF PIECEWORK.

5. No pieceworker shall be called upon to pack more than one grade of fruit at a time. Every lug box or kero box of fruit presented to a packer for packing shall be deemed to contain one bushel of fruit; every full sized pineapple box of fruit presented to a packer for packing shall be deemed to contain one and one-third bushels of fruit; every five dump boxes of fruit presented to a packer for packing shall be deemed to contain four bushels of fruit, and the packer shall be paid 4d. per bushel for all fruit short packed, less 10 per cent. of the number of cases presented to 4im for packing.

Pieceworkers shall be paid rate and a quarter for all piecework done outside the times of beginning and ending work.

Hours for a Week's Work.

6. The number of hours to constitute an ordinary week's work shall be 40 to be worked in five days Monday to Friday (inclusive) between the hours of 7 a.m. and 5 p.m.

OVERTIME.

- 7. The following rates shall be paid for work done:-
 - (a) Outside the times of beginning and ending work as prescribed in clause 6 together with all time worked in excess of eight hours per day within such times—Time and a half for the first four hours and double time thereafter.
 - - (i) between 8 a.m. and 12 noon—Time and a half;
 - (ii) before 8 a.m. and after 12 noon-Double time.

TERMS OF ENGAGEMENT.

- 8. (a) Employees are to be engaged as weekly or casual employees. A weekly employee is one engaged by the week and paid by the week, and whose engagement shall be terminable by one week's notice on either side, such notice not to be continued from week to week.
- (b) After one full week's work, such notice may be given to a weekly employee at any time, but an employer may pay one week's wages in lieu of notice.
 - (c) Casual employees shall be guaranteed not less than two hours' engagement every start.
- (d) A weekly employee to be entitled to the weekly wage shall be available, ready, and willing to perform his or her usual work during the days and hours usually worked by such class of employee, and may be summarily dismissed for dishonesty, misconduct, neglect of duty, or for absence from work without reasonable cause, and in the event of such dismissal the employee shall be paid only for the time actually worked.

CASUAL WORK.

9. Casual work, i.e., work for less than two full weeks, shall be paid at the ordinary wages rate with an addition of thirty-three and one-third per centum.

SICK LEAVE.

- 10. (a) Any employee who, having had at least three months' service with the same employer, is absent from duty as a result of personal ill health or accident shall be entitled to sick pay as follows:—
 - (i) During the first year— $3\frac{1}{3}$ hours' ordinary pay for each complete month of service.
 - (ii) During any subsequent year of service-40 hours' ordinary pay.

Provided that in either case such employee produces or forwards within 48 hours of the commencement of such absence evidence satisfactory to the employer that his or her non-attendance was due to personal ill health or accident necessitating such absence.

(b) If the full period of sick leave as prescribed above is not taken in any year such portion as is not taken shall, provided an employee remains in the service of the one employer, or any successor of such employer, be cumulative from vear to year. . : _.

For the purposes of this sub-clause service prior to the 12th February, 1948, shall be disregarded.

No employer shall terminate the services of an employee during the currency of any period of sick leave with the object of avoiding his obligations under this sub-clause.

HOLIDAYS AND SPECIAL RATES FOR HOLIDAYS AND SUNDAYS.

11. (a) (i) Weekly employees shall be granted the following holidays without deduction of pay:-The days observed as New Year's Day, Australia Day, Good Friday, Easter Monday, Labour Day. Anzac Day, Queen's Birthday, Christmas Day, and Boxing Day.

In connexion with the visit to Australia of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II., where a public holiday or public half-holiday is proclaimed by Order in Council throughout any municipality or part thereof, or within any defined area, such public holiday or public half-holiday shall, so far as such municipality or part thereof, or such defined area, is concerned be deemed to be included in the list of holidays herein prescribed.

Provided that an employee who fails to attend for work on the working days before and/or after such public holiday or public half-holiday without reasonable excuse shall not be entitled to be paid for such public holiday or public half-holiday.

- (ii) When a weekly employee is required to work on one of the above-named holidays he shall be paid double time for all work done but shall not be entitled to any additional holiday pay for the hours worked.
 - (iii) Weekly employees shall be paid double time for all work done on a Sunday.
 - (b) (i) All employees working on piecework shall be granted the following holidays:-
 - The days observed as Christmas Day, Good Friday, and Anzac Day, and they shall be paid for such holidays, the amount for each holiday based on the minimum weekly wage as set out in this Determination for the class of work in which they would be normally employed.
- (ii) If a pieceworker is required to work on any of the above-named holidays he shall be paid rate and a half for all work done on such day, but shall not be entitled to holiday pay as set out in sub-clause 11 (δ) (i) hereof for the time
- (iii) A pieceworker shall be paid rate and a half for all work done on a Sunday or on the days observed as New Year's Day, Australia Day, Easter Monday, Labour Day, Queen's Birthday, and Boxing Day.

In connexion with the visit to Australia of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II., where a public holiday or public half-holiday is proclaimed by Order in Council throughout any municipality or part thereof, or within any defined area, such public holiday or public half-holiday shall, so far as such municipality or part thereof, or such defined area is concerned, be deemed to be included in the list of holidays herein prescribed.

ANNUAL HOLIDAY.

12. The annual holiday shall be as prescribed by the provisions of the Factories and Shops (Annual Holidays) Act 1946 (No. 5111), and any amendments which may be made thereto from time to time.

(In his or her own interests each employer of labour should obtain a copy of the above Act, which may be purchased from the Government Printer, Melbourne, at a cost of 1s., plus postage.)

REST PERIOD.

13. A rest period of ten minutes each morning and afternoon and, after each two hours of work (except where a meal interval occurs) performed outside the hours fixed in Clause 6, shall be allowed employees, other than pieceworkers, without deduction of pay.

TEA MONEY.

14. Any employee called upon to work for more than two hours after the usual knocking off time shall be paid 4s. tea money in addition to any overtime payment.

TIME BOOK OR OTHER RECORD.

15. Every employee shall indelibly record daily his or her correct times of beginning and ending work in a book, or on time cards, or by a mechanical contrivance, which shall be furnished by the employer.

RIGHT OF ENTRY OF UNION OFFICIAL.

- 16. A duly accredited representative of the Federated Storemen and Packers' Union of Australia shall have the right to enter employers' establishments for the purpose of interviewing employees on legitimate union business on the following
 - (a) That he produces his authority to the employer or his representative.
 - (b) That not more than one representative in all be in any establishment at any one time.
 - (c) That no one representative visit an establishment more than once a fortnight.
 - (d) That if an employer alleges that a representative is unduly interfering with his establishment or is creating disaffection amongst his employees or is offensive in his methods or is committing a breach of any of the previous conditions, such employer may refuse the right of entry, but the representative shall have the right to bring such refusal before this Wages Board.

DEFINITIONS.

- 17. "Grading" means sorting of fruit into respective grades, namely, extra fancy, fancy, good and domestic.
 - "Sizing" means sorting of fruit into respective sizes or counts.

FIRST-AID OUTSIT.

18. In each place where employees are regularly employed, the employer shall provide and continuously maintain, at a place or places reasonably accessible to all employees, an efficient first-aid outfit, consisting of the following articles:—

· Note.—(a) This Determination applies to the whole of the State of Victoria.

- (b) On the 7th March, 1950, the powers of the Jewellers Board and of the Non-ferrous Metals Board were adjusted by depriving the said Non-ferrous Metals Board of the power to determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any person employed in the process, trade, or business of a manufacturing jeweller at producing rods, bars, sections, angles, strips, ingots, tubes, or wire from brass, copper, or other non-ferrous metals, and conferring such power exclusively on the said Jewellers Board.
- (c) Until the date of coming into operation of this Determination the wages and conditions of persons now provided for herein, were provided for in the Determination of the Engineers and Brassworkers (Unskilled) Board.
- IN accordance with the provisions of the Factories and Shops Acts, the Wages Board which now has the power to "determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to-
- Any person or persons or classes of persons employed in the process, trade, or business of producing rods, bars, sections, angles, sheets, strips, ingots, tubes, or wire from brass, copper, or other non-ferrous metals;" has made the following Determination, namely-
- 1. That as from the 8th October, 1953, the last previous Determination of this Board shall be revoked and replaced by this Determination.

A junior employee of eighteen years or more shall be paid 3s. per week in addition to the rates prescribed herein while he is employed as a furnaceman or assistant to a furnaceman.

Provided that the rate payable to any employee shall not, excluding the constant loading, be less than 20s.

The total wage shall be calculated to the nearest sixpence, any broken part of sixpence in the result not exceeding threepence to be disregarded.

(b) Except in the case of employees in foundries, the minimum rate payable to a junior male of eighteen years or more with less than six months' experience under this Determination shall, until he has had six months' experience, be 10 per cent. less than the amount represented by the percentage of the basic wage hereby prescribed for a junior employee of his age and in addition thereto the constant loading prescribed for such an employee.

Prohibited Occupations.

- (c) Junior employees shall not be employed-
 - (i) if under the age of 16 years on oil or gas burners or fires used for heating of small articles; or
 (ii) if under 18 years as furnacemen or assistants to furnacemen; or
 (iii) if under 18 years as a roller or an extrusion press operator.

Clauses, other than clauses 2 and 3, of the said Determination shall remain in force.

SPECIAL RATES.

4. In addition to the wages prescribed in clauses 2 and 3 hereof, the following special rates and allowances shall be paid to employees, and unapprenticed juniors :-

Wet Places.

(a) An employee working in any place where his clothing or boots become saturated, whether by water, oil, or otherwise, shall be paid 4d. per hour extra: Provided that this extra rate shall not be payable to an employee who is provided by the employer with suitable and effective protective clothing and/or footwear: And provided further that any employee who becomes entitled to this extra rate shall be paid such extra rate for such part of the day or shift as he is required to work in wet clothing or boots.

Confined Spaces.

(b) Working in confined space (as defined)—6d. per hour extra.

Hot Places.

(c) Working for more than one hour in the shade in places where the temperature is raised y artificial means to between 115 and 130 degrees Fahrenheit, 4d. per hour extra; in places where the temperature exceeds 130 degrees Fahrenheit, 6d. per hour extra. Where work continues for more than two hours in temperatures exceeding 130 degrees Fahrenheit, employees shall also be entitled to twenty minutes' rest after every two hours' work without deduction of pay. The temperature shall be decided by the foreman of the work after consultation with the employees who claim the extra rate.

Dirty Work.

(d) Work which a foreman and workman shall agree is of an unusually dirty or offensive nature-4d, per hour extra. (a) Work which is torontal and workman state agree is of an unusually diety of robustive hours, per hours.

In case of disagreement between the foreman and workman, the workman, or a shop steward on his behalf, shall be entitled, within 24 hours, to ask for a decision on the workman's claim by the employer's industrial officer (if there be one), or otherwise by the employer or the executive officer responsible for theman agement or superintender of the plant concerned. In such case a decision shall be given on the workman's claim within 48 hours of its being asked for (unless that time expires on a non-working day, in which case it shall be given during the next working day), or else the said allowance shall be paid.

Special Rates not Cumulative.

(e) Where more than one of the disabilities entitling a workman to extra rates exist on the same job the employer shall be bound to pay only one rate, namely, the highest for the disabilities so prevailing.

Rates not Subject to Penalty Additions.

(f) The special rates herein prescribed shall be paid, irrespective of the times at which the work is performed, and shall not be subject to any premium or penalty additions.

Hours or Work.

Day Workers.

5. (a) The ordinary hours of work shall be 40 per week to be worked in five days of not more than 8 hours (Monday to Friday inclusive) and one day (Saturday) of not more than 4 hours; or five days (Monday to Friday inclusive) of 8 hours each continuously except for meal breaks at the discretion of the employer, between 7 a.m. and 5.30 p.m. on Monday to Friday inclusive, and 7 a.m. and noon on Saturday.

In localities where the recognized half-holiday is on a day other than Saturday, the day so recognized may be substituted for Saturday for all the purposes of this Determination

Provided that the spread of hours or the daily hours prescribed may be altered as to all or a section of the employees by mutual agreement between an employer and the representative of the union in that shop.

Five-Days' Week.

- (b) In any case in which the ordinary week's work of 40 hours can be performed in five days as aforesaid without—
 - (i) detriment to the public interest;
 - (ii) loss in the value of goods handled or to be handled;
 - (iii) reducing the efficiency of production; or
 - (iv) reducing the efficacy of the necessary service-

the employer shall allow those employees who so desire to do so to work their ordinary hours in five days as aforesaid.

This sub-clause shall not apply to employees engaged on the maintenance and servicing of plant.

It is a condition of the allowing of a five-days' week hereunder that if required employees shall comply with the reasonable and lawful orders of the employer as to working overtime, including the working of overtime on Saturday.

EMERGENCY PROVISIONS.

- 5. (a) Notwithstanding anything elsewhere contained in this Determination, the following provisions shall apply in the case of an employer who is subject to restriction or rationing in the use of electric energy and/or coal gas and/or the emergency disconnexion thereof in accordance with orders or regulations approved by the appropriate lawful authority.
 - (i) If by reason of such restriction or rationing or emergency disconnexion he is unable usefully to employ an employee for the whole or part of any day or shift, he may deduct from the wages of that employee payment for any part of the day or shift such employee cannot be usefully employed provided that—
 - (1) if an employer requires the employee to attend for work but is not able to employ him usefully the employee shall be entitled to be paid for two hours' work;
 - (2) where an employee commences work he shall be entitled to be paid for four hours' work;
 - (3) this sub-clause shall not apply to apprentices.
 - (ii) He may require any day worker to perform his ordinary hours of work (or any such ordinary hours of work) at any time on any day other than on a Sunday on the basis of 40 hours per week. The following rates of pay shall apply for such work—
 - (1) for work performed on Mondays to Friday from 7 a.m. to 5.30 p.m. and on Saturdays from 7 a.m. to noon-ordinary time;
 - (2) for work performed between noon and midnight on Saturdays-ordinary rates plus 25 per cent;
 - (3) for work performed at all other times other than on a Sunday-ordinary rates plus 10 per cent.

Provided that when a worker is required to commence work between the hours of 9.30 p.m. and 6 a.m., the amount he shall receive shall not be less than an amount of 5s. more than the amount he would receive if paid at ordinary day rates.

- (iii) He may require any shift worker to perform his hours of work at any time other than on a Sunday on the basis of 40 hours per week. The following rates of pay shall apply for such work:—
 - (1) for day work or day shift work-ordinary time;
 - (2) for work performed between noon and midnight on Saturdays-ordinary rates plus 25 per cent.;
 - (3) for afternoon and night shifts-ordinary rates plus 10 per cent.

Provided that when a shift worker is required to commence work between the hours of 9.30 p.m. and 6 a.m., the amount he shall receive shall not be less than an amount of 5s. more than the amount he would receive if paid at ordinary rates.

- (4) Nothing contained in this sub-clause shall operate so as to reduce the shift premiums payable to employees who were shift workers working on afternoon and night shifts only at the date of such interference as aforesaid and who continue to work on such shifts.
- (iv) He may alter the time at which meal breaks are usually taken and/or the duration of them, in order to avoid or mitigate the effects of such interference, without being liable to pay penalty rates for work done during the normal meal breaks; provided that the commencing time of any meal break is not made more than one hour earlier or later than usual and that a meal break of at least twenty minutes is allowed; and provided also that the employer shall, whenever it is practicable, consult with the representative of the Union or Unions before acting under this paragraph.
- (b) Notwithstanding anything elsewhere contained in this determination, the provisions of this clause shall also apply (mutatis mutandis) in the case of an employer who uses auxiliary power plant for the purpose of providing employment for his employees whilst such restriction or rationing or emergency disconnexion is in force and who—
 - (i) is unable usefully to employ an employee for the whole of any day or shift by reason of a breakdown in such plant through no fault of his own; or
 - (ii) because of the inability of the auxiliary power plant to meet the normal demands for power-
 - (1) finds it necessary to require any employee to perform his ordinary hours of work (or any of such ordinary hours of work) outside the hours normally worked by such employee; or
 - (2) finds it necessary to alter the time at which meal breaks are usually taken and/or the duration of them.

SHIFT WORK.

- 6. (a) For the purposes of this clause-

 - "Afternoon shift" means any shift finishing after 6 p.m., and at or before midnight.

 "Continuous work" means work carried on with consecutive shifts of men throughout the twenty-four hours of each of at least six consecutive days without interruption, except during breakdowns or meal breaks, or due to unavoidable causes beyond the control of the employer.
 - "Night shift" means any shift finishing subsequent to midnight, and at or before 8 a.m.
 - "Rostered shift" means a shift of which the employee concerned has had at least 48 hours' notice.

Hours-Continuous Work Shifts.

(b) This sub-clause shall apply to shift workers on continuous work as hereinbefore defined.

The ordinary hours of such shift workers shall not exceed-

(i) 8 in any one day; nor (ii) 48 in any one week; nor (iii) 88 in 14 consecutive days; nor (iv) 160 in 28 consecutive days.

Subject to the following conditions such shift workers shall work at such times as the employer may require-

- (i) a shift shall consist of not more than 8 hours, inclusive of crib time;
 (ii) except at the regular change-over of shifts an employee shall not be required to work more than one shift in each
 24 hours;
- (iii) twenty minutes shall be allowed to shift workers each shift for crib, which shall be counted as time worked.

Hours-Other Than Continuous Work,

- (c) This sub-clause shall apply to shift workers not upon continuous work as hereinbefore defined. The ordinary hours of such shift workers shall not exceed—

(i) 40 in any week to be worked in five shifts of 8 hours on Monday to Friday inclusive, or five shifts of not more than 8 hours and one shift (Saturday) of not more than 4 hours; or
(ii) 80 in 14 consecutive days, in which case an employee shall not, without payment for overtime, be required to work more than 8 consecutive hours on any shift or more than 6 shifts in any week.
(iii) 120 in 21 consecutive days, in which case an employee shall not, without payment for overtime, be required to work more than 8 consecutive hours on any shift or more than 6 shifts in any week.

Such ordinary hours shall be worked continuously, except for meal breaks, at the discretion of the employer. An employee shall not be required to work for more than six hours without a break for a meal.

Except at regular change-over of shifts an employee shall not be required to work more than one shift in each 24 hours.

Rostera.

(d) Shift rosters shall specify the commencing and finishing times of ordinary working hours of the respective shifts.

Variation by Agreement.

(c) The method of working shifts may in any case be varied by agreement between the employer and the accredited representative of the union to suit the circumstances of the establishment.

The time of commencing and finishing shifts once having been determined may be varied by agreement between the employer and the accredited representative of the union to suit the circumstances of the establishment, or in the absence of agreement by seven days' notice of alteration given by the employer to the employees.

Afternoon or Night Shift Allowances.

(f) Shift workers on continuous work whilst on afternoon or night shifts shall be paid 71 per cent. more than the ordinary rates for such shifts.

Shift workers on other than continuous work whilst on afternoon or night shifts shall be paid 10 per cent. more than the ordinary rates for such shifts.

Shift workers who work on any afternoon or night shift which does not continue for at least five successive afternoons or nights in a five-day workshop or for at least six successive afternoons or nights in a six-day workshop shall be paid at the rate of time and a half.

An employee who-

(i) during a period of engagement on shift works night shift only; or
(ii) remains on night shift for a longer period than four consecutive weeks; or
(iii) works on a night shift which does not rotate or alternate with another shift or with day work so as to give him
at least one-third of his working time off night shift in each shift cycle,
shall during such engagement, period or cycle, be paid at the rate of time and a quarter for all time worked during ordinary
working hours on such night shifts.

(fi) The minimum rate to be paid to any shift worker for work performed between midnight on Friday and midnight on Saturday shall be time and a quarter. Such extra rate to be in substitution for and not cumulative upon the shift premiums prescribed in the first and second paragraphs of sub-clause (f) hereof.

Overtime.

- (g) Shift workers for all time worked in excess of or outside the ordinary working hours prescribed by this Determination or on a shift other than a rostered shift shall-
 - (i) if employed on continuous work be paid at the rate of double time; or
- (ii) if employed on other shift work at the rate of time and a half for the first four hours and double time thereafter, except in each case when the time is worked-
 - (iii) by arrangement between the employees themselves;
 - (iv) for the purpose of effecting the customary rotation of shifts; or
 - (v) is due to the fact that the relief man does not come on duty at the proper time; or
 - (vi) on a shift to which an employee is transferred on short notice as an alternative to standing the employee off in circumstances which would entitle the employer to deduct payment for a day in accordance with clause 12 (b)

Provided that when not less than 8 hours' notice has been given to the employer by the relief man that he will be absent from work and the employee whom he should relieve is not relieved the unrelieved employee shall be paid at the rate of time and a half for the first 4 hours on duty after he has finished his ordinary shift and at the rate of double time thereafter except where the employee is required to continue to work on his rostered day off when he shall be paid double time.

Compulsory Overtime.

(gi) An employer may require any employee to work reasonable overtime at overtime rates and such employee shall work overtime in accordance with such requirement.

Sundays and Holidays.

(h) Shift workers on continuous work shifts for work done on a rostered shift the major portion of which is performed on a Sunday or holiday shall be paid at the rate of time and a half.

Shift workers on other than continuous work for all time worked on a Sunday or holiday shall be paid at the rates prescribed by clause 9 of this Determination. Where shifts commence between 11 p.m. and midnight on a Sunday or holiday the time so worked before midnight shall not entitle the employee to the Sunday or holiday rate; provided that the time worked by an employee on a shift commencing before midnight on the day preceding a Sunday or holiday and extending into a Sunday or holiday shall be regarded as time worked on such Sunday or holiday.

Where shifts fall partly on a holiday that shift the major portion of which falls on a holiday shall be regarded as the holiday shift.

Junior Employees.

(i) Juniors whilst on afternoon or night shifts shall be paid not less than the rates hereinbefore prescribed or ls. 6d. per shift whichever is the higher.

MIXED FUNCTIONS.

7. An employee engaged for more than half of one day or shift on duties carrying a higher rate than his ordinary classification shall be paid the higher rate for such day or shift. If for less than half of one day or shift, he shall be paid the higher rate for the time so worked.

OVERTIME.

8. (a) For all work done outside ordinary hours the rates of pay shall be time and a half for the first four hours and double time thereafter, such double time to continue until the completion of the overtime work; provided that in the case of an apprentice or a junior the rate for overtime shall be not less than the rate herein prescribed or 2s. 3d. per hour whichever is the higher.

Except as provided in this sub-clause or sub-clause (b) hereof in computing overtime each day's work shall stand alone.

Rest Period After Overtime.

(b) When overtime work is necessary it shall, wherever reasonably practicable, be so arranged that employees have at least eight consecutive hours off duty between the work of successive days.

An employee (other than a casual employee) who works so much overtime between the termination of his ordinary work on one day and the commencement of his ordinary work on the next day that he has not at least eight consecutive hours off duty between those times shall, subject to this sub-clause, be released after completion of such overtime until he has had eight consecutive hours off duty without loss of pay for ordinary working time occurring during such absence.

If on the instructions of his employer such an employee resumes or continues work without having had such eight consecutive hours off duty he shall be paid at double rates until he is released from duty for such period and he shall then be entitled to be absent until he has had eight consecutive hours off duty without loss of pay for ordinary working time occurring during such

Call Back.

(c) An employee recalled to work overtime after leaving his employer's business premises (whether notified before or after leaving the premises) shall be paid for a minimum of three hours' work at the appropriate rate for each time he is so recalled; provided that, except in the case of unforeseen circumstances arising, the employee shall not be required to work the full three hours if the job he was recalled to perform is completed within a shorter period. This sub-clause shall not apply in cases where it is customary for an employee to return to his employer's premises to perform a specific job outside his ordinary working hours, or where the overtime is continuous (subject to a reasonable meal break) with the completion or commencement of ordinary working time.

Overtime work in the circumstances specified in this sub-clause shall not be regarded as overtime for the purposes of sub-clause (b) of this clause where the actual time worked is less than three hours on such recall or on each of such recalls,

Saturday Work-Five-Days' Week.

(d) A day worker on a five-days' week required to work overtime on a Saturday shall be afforded at least three hours' work or paid for three hours at the appropriate rate except where such overtime is continuous with overtime commenced on the day previous.

Standing By.

(e) Subject to any custom now prevailing under which an employee is required regularly to hold himself in readiness for a call back, an employee required to hold himself in readiness to work after ordinary hours shall until released be paid standing-by time at ordinary rates from the time from which he is so to hold himself in readiness.

Meal Hours-General.

(f) For work done during meal hours and thereafter until a meal-hour break is allowed, time and a half rates shall be paid. An employee shall not be compelled to work for more than six hours without a break for a meal.

Meal Hours-Maintenance Employees.

(g) Subject to the provisions of the second part of sub-clause (f) of this clause an employee employed as a regular maintenance man shall work during meal breaks at the ordinary rates herein proscribed whenever instructed to do so for the purpose of making good breakdowns of plant or upon routine maintenance of plant which can only be done while such plant is idle.

Crib Time.

(h) An employee working overtime shall be allowed a crib time of twenty minutes without deduction of pay after each four hours of overtime worked if the employee continues work after such crib time.

Provided that where a day worker on a five-days' week is required to work overtime on a Saturday the first prescribed crib time shall, if occurring between 10 a.m. and 1 p.m., be paid at ordinary rates.

Unless the period of overtime is less than one and a half hours an employee before starting overtime after working ordinary hours shall be allowed a meal break of twenty minutes which shall be paid for at ordinary rates. An employer and employee may agree to any variation of this provision to meet the circumstances of the work in hand provided that the employer shall not be required to make any payment in respect of any time allowed in excess of twenty minutes.

Tea Money.

(i) An employee required to work overtime for more than two hours without being notified on the previous day or earlier that he will be so required to work shall either be supplied with a meal by the employer or paid 4s., and 2s. 8d. for each subsequent meal, but such payment need not be made to employees living in the same locality as their workshops who can reasonably return home for meals.

Unless the employer advises an employee on the previous day or earlier that the amount of overtime to be worked will necessitate the partaking of a second or subsequent meal (as the case may be) the employer shall provide such second and/or subsequent meals or make payment in lieu thereof as above prescribed.

If an employee pursuant to notice has provided a meal or meals and is not required to work overtime or is required to work less than the amount advised he shall be paid as above prescribed for meals which he has provided, but which are surplus.

Transport of Employees.

(j) When an employee, after having worked overtime, or a shift for which he has not been regularly rostered, finishes work at a time when reasonable means of transport are not available, the employer shall provide him with a conveyance to his home, or pay him his current wage for the time reasonably occupied in reaching his home.

Compulsory Overtime.

(k) An employer may require any employee to work reasonable overtime at overtime rates and such employee shall work overtime in accordance with such requirement.

HOLIDAYS AND SUNDAY WORK.

9. (a) Employees shall be entitled to the following public holidays, without loss of pay, as regards employees on weekly hiring:—New Year's Day, Australia Day, Good Friday, Easter Saturday, Easter Monday, Queen's Birthday, Labour Day, Anzac Day, Christmas Day, and Boxing Day, or such other day as is generally observed in the locality as a substitute for any of the said days respectively.

By agreement between any employer and his employees, other days may be substituted for the said days, or any of them,

as to such employer's undertaking.

(b) Except as provided in sub-clause (h) of clause (6) an employee not engaged on continuous work shall be paid at the rate of double time tor work done on Sundays and public holidays, such double time to continue until he is relieved from duty.

(c) An employee, other than a casual employee, not engaged in continuous work, who works on a Sunday or a public holiday and (except for meal breaks) immediately thereafter continues such work, shall on being relieved from duty be entitled to be absent until he has had eight consecutive hours off duty, without deduction of pay for ordinary time of duty occurring during

(d) Employees, other than on shift or engaged in maintaining the continuity of electric light and power, required to work on Sundays or public holidays shall be paid for a minimum of three hours work.

(e) Where an employee is absent from his or her employment on the working day before or the working day after a public holiday without reasonable excuse or without the consent of the employer, the employee shall not be entitled to payment for such a holiday.

EXTRA RATES NOT CUMULATIVE.

10. Extra rates in this Determination, except rates prescribed in clause 4, are not cumulative so as to exceed the maximum of double the ordinary rates.

PAYMENT OF WAGES.

11. (a) Wages shall be paid weekly or fortnightly.

(b) On the first pay day occurring during his employment, an employee shall be paid whatever wages are due to him up to the completion of his work on the previous day: Provided that this sub-clause shall not apply to employers who make a practice of allowing advances to employees approximating wages due.

(c) Upon termination of the employment, wages due to an employee shall be paid to him on the day of such termination, or forwarded to him by post on the next working day.

(d) An employee kept waiting for his wages on pay day for more than a quarter of an hour after the usual time for ceasing work, shall be paid at overtime rates after that quarter-hour, with a minimum of a quarter of an hour.

(e) On or prior to pay day, the employer shall state to each employee, in writing, the amount of wages to which he is entitled, the amount of deductions made therefrom, and the net amount being paid to him.

CONTRACT OF EMPLOYMENT.

Weekly Employment.

Weekly Employment.

12. (a) Except as hereinafter provided employment shall be by the week. 'Any employee not specifically engaged as a casual employee shall be deemed to be employed by the week.

(b) Employment shall be terminated by a week's notice on either side given at any time during the week, or by the payment or forfeiture of a week's wages, as the case may be. This shall not affect the right of the employer to dismiss any employees without notice for malingering, inefficiency, neglect of duty, or misconduct, and in such cases the wages shall be paid up to the time of dismissal only; or to deduct payment for any day the employee cannot be usefully employed because of any strike or through any breakdown in machinery, or any stoppage of work by any cause for which the employer cannot reasonably be held responsible. Where an employee has given or been given notice as aforesaid, without reasonable cause (proof of which shall lie on him) absents himself from work during such period, shall be deemed to have abandoned his employment and shall not be entitled to payment for work done by him within that period.

Casual Employment.

(c) A casual employee is one engaged and paid as such. A casual employee for working ordinary time shall be paid per hour one-fortieth of the weekly rate prescribed by this Determination for the work which he performs, plus 10 per cent.

Late Comers.

(d) Notwithstanding anything elsewhere contained in this Determination an employer may select and utilize for time-keeping purposes any fractional or decimal proportion of an hour (not exceeding a quarter of an hour) and may apply such proportion in the calculation of the working time of employees who without reasonable cause promptly communicated to the employer, report for duty after their appointed starting times or cease duty before their appointed finishing times.

An employer who adopts a proportion for the aforesaid purpose shall apply the same proportion for the calculation of

overtime.

SICK LEAVE.

- 13. (a) An employee on weekly hiring who is absent from his work on account of personal illness, or on account of injury by accident arising out of and in the course of his employment, shall be entitled to leave of absence, without deduction of pay, subject to the following conditions and limitations:—
 - (i) He shall not be entitled to paid leave of absence for any period in respect of which he is entitled to workers' compensation.
 - (ii) He shall, within 24 hours of the commencement of such absence, inform the employer of his inability to attend for duty and, as far as practicable, state the nature of the injury or illness and the estimated duration of the
 - (iii) He shall prove to the satisfaction of his employer that he was unable on account of such illness or injury to attend for duty on the day or days for which sick leave is claimed.

 (iv) He shall not be entitled in any year (whether in the employ of one employer or of several) to leave in excess

of 40 hours of working time.

For the purpose of administering paragraph (iv) of this sub-clause an employer may, within one month of this Determination coming into operation or within two weeks of the employee entering his employment, require an employee to make a sworn declaration or other written statement as to what paid leave of absence he has had from any employer during the then current year; and upon such statement the employer shall be entitled to rely and act.

Single Day Absences.

(b) In the case of an employee who claims to be allowed paid sick leave in accordance with this clause for an absence of one day only, such employee, if in the year he has already been allowed paid sick leave on more than one occasion for one day only, shall not be entitled to payment for the day claimed unless he produces to the employer a certificate of a duly-qualified medical practitioner that in his, the medical practitioner's, opinion the employee was unable to attend for duty on account of personal illness or on account of injury by accident. Nothing in this sub-clause shall limit the employer's rights under sub-clause (a) (iii) hereof.

Cumulative Sick Leave.

(c) Sick leave shall accumulate from year to year so that any balance of the period specified in sub-clause (a) (iv) of this clause which has in any year not been allowed to an employee by an employer as paid sick leave may be claimed by the employee and subject to the conditions hereinbefore prescribed shall be allowed by that employer in a subsequent year without diminution of the sick leave prescribed in respect of that year. Provided that sick leave which accumulates pursuant to this sub-clause shall be available to the employee for a period of two years, but for no longer from the end of the year in which it accrues.

6101 Attendance at Hospital, &c.

(d) Notwithstanding anything contained in sub-clause (a) hereof an employee suffering injury through an accident arising out of and in the course of his employment (not being an injury in respect of which he is entitled to workers' componsation) necessitating his attendance during working hours on a doctor, chemist, or trained nurse, or at a hospital, shall not suffer any deduction from his pay for the time (not exceeding four hours) so occupied on the day of the accident, and shall be reimbursed by the employer all expenses reasonably incurred in connexion with such attendance.

ANNUAL HOLIDAY.

14. The annual holiday shall be as prescribed by the provisions of the Factories and Shops (Annual Holidays) Act 1946, No. 5111, and any amendments which may be made thereto from time to time.

MISCELLANEOUS.

Accommodation and Conveniences-Boiling Water.

15. (a) (i) Employers shall provide boiling water for employees at meal times.

Drinking Water.

(ii) Employers shall provide for the use of employees in workshops a sufficient supply of wholesome cool drinking water from bubble taps or other suitable drinking fountains.

First-Aid Outfit.

(iii) In each workshop, and at other places where employees are regularly employed, the employer shall provide and continuously maintain, at a place or places reasonably accessible to all employees, an efficient first-aid outfit.

Clause 8 of Chapter 9 of the Regulations under the Factories and Shops Act 1928 requires that a first-aid ambulance chest shall be kept in some accessible place upon the premises, and that such chest shall be equipped and supplied with the following

Lockers.

(iv) An employer shall at some reasonable convenient place on his premises provide a suitable locker for each employee workshop, or hanging facilities which afford reasonable protection for employee's clothes.

(v) Employers shall provide for all workmen employed in foundries hot and cold shower baths, which shall be situated away from lavatories.

Washing and Sanitary Conveniences.

(vi) Employers shall provide proper and sufficient washing and sanitary conveniences.

Clothing, Equipment, and Tools-Damage to Clothing and Tools.

(b) (i) Compensation to the extent of the damage sustained shall be made where in the course of the work clothing or tools are damaged or destroyed by fire or molten metal or through the use of consiste austainces. Provided that the employer s liability in respect of tools shall be limited to such tools of trade as are ordinarily required for the performance of the employee's duties.

Goggles.

(ii) Suitable mica or other goggles shall be provided by the employer for each employee using emery wheels or where used by more than one employee such goggles shall be sterilized before being used by another employee. An employee when working on emery wheels shall wear the goggles provided for his protection.

Goggles containing celluloid shall not be considered suitable for the purposes of this provision.

(iii) Until further order the employer shall provide for each employee such tools as were customarily provided at the time of the making of this Determination. The employee shall replace or pay for any tools so provided if lost through his negligence.

Dressing Castings.

(c) Where practicable, the dressing of castings shall not be carried out in close proximity to employees not doing that

Ladles.

- (d) (i) All ladles of a holding capacity of 15 cwt. or more in use at the time of the making of this Determination shall be fitted with safety-worm gear or an equivalent safety fitting; and all ladles of a holding capacity of 10 cwt. or more hereafter brought into operation shall be fitted with safety-worm gear.
 - (ii) Where molten metal is carried in ladles by hand the weight of molten metal shall not exceed:—Single-handed ladles—60 lb., including the weight of the ladle. Other ladles - 1 cwt. per man.
 - (iii) Where molten metal is carried by hand, a clear passageway not less than 2 ft. 6 in. wide shall be made.

Ventilation.

- (e) While any work is being carried on in any confined or enclosed space in which-
 - (i) fumes, gases, dust, or vapours which may be dangerous or injurious are liable to be present or to be generated in the course of the work or
 - (ii) the atmosphere may otherwise become vitiated,

the employer shall install a suction exhaust apparatus, through which by means of a power-driven fan air is drawn from the vicinity of the work in relation to which it is installed.

Where it is impracticable to install such suction exhaust apparatus the employer shall take all such steps as are necessary to ensure safe working conditions in any such confined or enclosed space.

This sub-clause shall not be deemed to be inconsistent with the Harmful Gases, Vapours, Mists, Smokes and Dust Regulations 1945 (published in the Victorian Government Gazette No. 21, dated 7th February, 1945) and shall not apply to any processes or occupations to which those Regulations apply.

SHOP STEWARDS.

16. An employee appointed shop steward in the shop or department in which he is employed shall, upon notification thereof to his employer, be recognized as the accredited representative of the union of which he belongs, and he shall be allowed the necessary time during working hours to interview the employer or his representative on matters affecting employees whom he represents.

RIGHT OF ENTRY OF UNION OFFICIALS.

- 17. (a) For the purpose of interviewing employees on legitimate union business, a duly accredited union representative shall have the right to enter employers' premises during the midday meal break on the following conditions:—
 - (i) That he produces his authority to the gatekeeper or such other person as may be appointed by the employer.
 - (ii) That he interviews employees only at places where they are taking their meal.
 - (iii) That not more than one representative of each of not more than three unions be on the premises at any one time.
 - (iv) That no one representative visit the premises more than once in each week.
 - (v) That if any employer alleges that a representative is unduly interfering with his work or is creating dissatisfaction amongst his employees or is offensive in his methods, or is committing a breach of any of the previous conditions, such employer may refuse the right of entry.

Provided that, where certain employees are working under a system of shift work which precludes a representative from interviewing them during the midday meal break, the representative shall have the right to enter the employer's premises for the purpose of interviewing such employees at such time and under such conditions as to notice as may be mutually arranged by the representative and the employer.

- (b) For the purpose of investigating complaints concerning the application of this Determination, a duly accredited union representative shall be afforded reasonable facilities for entering an employer's workshop or plant during working hours, subject to the following conditions:—
 - (i) That he discloses to the employer or his representative the complaint which he desires to investigate.
 - (ii) That he makes his investigations in the presence of the employer or his representative (if the employer so desires).
 - (iii) That he does not interfere with work proceeding in the workshop or plant.
 - (iv) That he conducts himself properly.
- (c) A union representative shall be a duly accredited representative of an organization concerned if he be the holder for the time being of a certificate, signed by the general or State secretary of that organization and bearing the seal of that organization, in the following form, or in a form not materially differing therefrom:—

(Name of organization.) This is to certify that is a duly accredited representative of the abovenamed organization. (SEAL) Date Specimen signature of holder.

Strictly not transferable.

TIME AND WAGES BOOK.

- 18. (a) Each employer shall keep a record from which can be readily ascertained the name of each employee and his occupation, the hours worked each day, and the wages and allowances paid each week.
- (b) The time occupied by an employee in filling in any time record or eards or in the making of records shall be treated as time of duty, but this does not apply to checking in or out when entering or leaving the employer's premises.

 (c) The time and wages record shall be open for inspection to a duly accredited union official during the usual office hours at the employer's office or other convenient place: Provided that an inspection shall not be demanded unless the secretary of the union or the district secretary or organizer of any division suspects that a breach of the Determination has been committed: Provided also that only one demand for such inspection shall be made in one fortnight at the same establishment.
- (d) The official making such inspection shall be entitled to take a copy of entries in a time and wages record relating to the suspected breach of the Determination.

NOTICE BOARD.

19. The employer shall permit a notice board of reasonable dimensions to be erected in a prominent position in his establishment, upon which accredited union representatives shall be permitted to post formal union notices, signed or countersigned by the representative posting same.

- 20. "Confined Space" means a compartment, space, or place, the dimensions of which necessitate an employee working in a stooped or otherwise cramped position, or without proper ventilation.

 "Sunday" means all time between midnight Saturday and midnight Sunday.

 - "Year" means the period between the 1st day of June in each year and the next 31st day of May.
- "Furnace man" means an employee in charge of a furnace used for smelting metals or ores, boiler plate furnaces, case hardening and/or annealing furnaces, and such heating furnaces where the weight of individual pieces of material is 5 owt. or more or the area of the material exceeds 4 square feet.

BASIC WAGE.

21. The wages rates set out in clause 2 are based upon the following basic wage rates.

Contract of Apprenticeship.

- (b) Every contract of apprenticeship hereinafter made shall contain-

 - (i) the names of the parties;
 (ii) the date of birth of the apprentice;
 (iii) a statement of the trade or trades to which the apprentice is to be bound and which he is to be taught during
 - the course and for the purpose of the apprentices is to be bound and which he is to be taught during the course and for the purpose of the apprenticeship;

 (iv) a covenant by the master to teach and instruct or cause the apprentice to be taught or instructed in the trade to which the apprentices bound;

 (v) the date at which the apprenticeship is to commence or from which it is to be calculated;

 (vi) all other conditions of apprenticeship.

Cancellation or Suspension of Indenture,

(c) If through lack of orders or through financial difficulties an employer is unable at any time to find employment and training for an apprentice and if a transfer to another employer cannot be arranged, the obligations and duties imposed by the indenture may, with the concurrence of the apprentice and his guardian, be suspended for a period agreed upon, or if no such agreement is arrived at the indenture may with the approval of the Secretary for Labour be determined by the employer. The onus of proving circumstances justifying such determination shall be on the employer.

Proportion.

(d) (i) The proportion of apprentices who may be taken by an employer shall be one to every three or fraction of three

For the purpose of ascertaining the number of apprentices, the number of tradesmen shall be deemed to be the average number working during the immediately preceding six months, and, in ascertaining such proportion an employer actually working in any workshop shall be deemed to be a tradesman.

A person who is for a term not exceeding two years taking practical training in a workshop in continuance of a course of training for professional work shall not be taken into account in calculating the proportion of apprentices to tradesmen.

(ii) An employer specially qualified to teach apprentices may, with the consent of the Secretary for Labour, on the recommendation of the Wages Board, employ a greater proportion of apprentices to tradesmen than hereinbefore specified.

Until further order, apprentices so taken shall not be counted in future calculations of the proportion of apprentices to tradesmen authorized by this Determination.

Period of Apprenticeship.

If an apprentice is under the age of 16 years 6 months at the time of commencing—5 years; if 16 years and 6 months or over-4 years.

Probationary Period.

(e) Minors may be taken on probation for three months and if apprenticed such three months shall count as part of their period of apprenticeship.

Wages.

(f) The minimum weekly rates of wages for apprentices shall be the undermentioned percentages of the contemporaneous basic wage prescribed for the area in which they are employed, and in all contracts of apprenticeship hereafter made the employer shall covenant to pay wages of not less than such rates:—

The total wage of apprentices shall be calculated to the nearest sixpence, any broken part of sixpence in the result not exceeding threepence to be disregarded.

Hours.

(h) The ordinary hours of employment of apprentices shall not in each workshop exceed those of the tradesmen.

Overtime and Shift Work.

(i) No apprentice under the age of eighteen years shall be required to work overtime or shift work unless he so desires.

Payment by Results.

(j) An apprentice shall not work under any system of payment by results.

Lost Time.

(k) The apprentice at the end of the calendar period of any year in which he has actually given service to the master upon less than the ordinary working days prescribed in this Determination, or in which he has unlawfully absented himself without the master's consent shall, for every day short of the said number of working days, and for every day of such absence, serve one day, and the calendar period of the succeeding year of his service shall not be deemed to begin until the said additional day or days shall have been served.

Provided that in calculating the extra time to be so served the apprentice shall be credited with time which he has worked during the relevant year in excess of his ordinary hours.

Prohibition of Premiums.

(m) Apprentices attending technical colleges or schools and presenting reports of satisfactory conduct shall be reimbursed all fees paid by them.

Annual and Sick Leave.

(n) Apprentices shall be entitled to sick and annual leave in accordance with the provisions of clauses 14 and 15 hereof respectively.

The minimum rate payable to a junior female of any age or a junior male of eighteen years or more each with less than six months' experience under this Determination shall, until he or she has had such six months' experience, be 10 per cent. less than the amount represented by the percentage of the basic wage hereby prescribed for a junior employee of his or her age and in addition thereto the additional amount prescribed for such an employee.

A female or a junior employee, who on the date of this Determination coming into force, in his or her case was entitled under the previous Determination to a rate higher than that hereby prescribed for an employee of his or her age and experience, shall be paid at not less than the rate prescribed by such previous Determination for an employee of his or her age or experience, shall be paid at not less than the rate prescribed by such previous Determination for an employee of his or her age or experience, sat the case may be, until he or she completes the year or experience or of age in respect of which the last-mentioned rate is prescribed. Upon completion of such year the minimum rate of wage in his or her case shall be the rate hereby prescribed.

SPECIAL RATES.

5. In addition to the wages prescribed in clauses 2, 3, and 4 hereof, the following special rates and allowances shall be paid to employees including apprentices and unapprenticed juniors:-

Dirty Work.

(a) Work which a foreman and workman shall agree is of an unusually dirty or offensive nature, 4d. per hour extra.

In case of disagreement between the foreman and workman, the workman or a shop steward on his behalf shall be entitled within 24 hours, to ask for a decision on the workman's claim by the employer's industrial officer (if there be one), or otherwise by the employer or the executive officer responsible for the management or superintendence of the plant concerned. In such case a decision shall be given on the workman's claim which 48 hours of its being asked for (unless that time expires on a non-working day, in which case it shall be given during the next working day), or else the said allowance shall be paid.

Wet Places.

(b) An employee working in any place where his clothing or boots become saturated, whether by water, oil, or otherwise, shall be paid 4d. per hour extra: Provided that this extra rate shall not be payable to an employee who is provided by the employer with suitable and effective protective clothing and/or footwear: And provided further that any employee who becomes entitled to this extra rate shall be paid such extra rate for such part of the day or shift as he is required to work in wet clothing or boots.

Special Rates not Cumulative.

(c) Where more than one of the disabilities entitling a workman to extra rates exist on the same job, the employer shall be bound to pay only one rate, namely, the highest for the disabilities so prevailing.

Rates not Subject to Penalty Additions.

(d) The special rates herein prescribed shall be paid irrespective of the times at which the work is performed, and shall not be subject to any premium or penalty additions.

HOURS OF WORK.

Day Workers.

6.(a) The ordinary hours of work shall be 40 per week to be worked in five days of not more than 8 hours (Monday to Friday inclusive) and one day (Saturday) of not more than 4 hours; or five days (Monday to Friday inclusive) of 8 hours each continuously except for meal breaks at the discretion of the employer, between 7 a.m. and 5.30 p.m. on Monday to Friday inclusive, and 7 a.m. and noon on Saturday.

In localities where the recognized half-holiday is on a day other than Saturday the day so recognized may be substituted for Saturday for all the purposes of this Determination.

Provided that the spread of hours or the daily hours prescribed may be altered as to all or a section of the employees by mutual agreement between an employer and the representative of the union in that shop.

Five-Day Week.

- (b) In any case in which the ordinary week's work of 40 hours can be performed in five days as aforesaid without—
 - (i) detriment to the public interest;
 - (ii) loss in the value of goods handled or to be handled
 - (iii) reducing the efficiency of production; or
 - (iv) reducing the efficacy of the necessary service,

the employer shall allow those employees who so desire to do so to work their ordinary hours in five days as aforesaid.

This sub-clause shall not apply to employees engaged on the maintenance and servicing of plant.

It is a condition of the allowing of a five-day week hereunder that if required employees shall comply with the reasonable and lawful orders of the employer as to working overtime, including the working of overtime on Saturday.

EMERGENCY PROVISIONS.

6a. (a) Notwithstanding anything elsewhere contained in this Determination, the following provisions shall apply in the case of an employer who is subject to restriction or rationing in the use of electric energy and/or coal gas and/or the emergency disconnexion thereof in accordance with orders or regulations approved by the appropriate lawful authority.

(i) If by reason of such restriction or rationing or emergency disconnexion he is unable usefully to employ an employee for the whole or part of any day or shift, he may deduct from the wages of that employee payment for any part of the day or shift such employee cannot be usefully employed provided that—

- (1) if an employer requires the employee to attend for work but is not able to employ him usefully the employee shall be entitled to be paid for two hours' work;
 (2) where an employee commences work he shall be entitled to be paid for four hours' work;
 (3) this sub-clause shall not apply to apprentices.

- (ii) He may require any day worker to perform his ordinary hours of work (or any such ordinary hours of work) at any time on any day other than on a Sunday on the basis of 40 hours per week. The following rates of pay shall apply for such work—
 - (1) for work performed on Mondays to Fridays from 7 a.m. to 5.30 p.m. and on Saturdays from 7

 - a.m. to noon—ordinary time;

 (2) for work performed between noon and midnight on Saturdays—ordinary rates plus 25 per cent.;

 (3) for work performed at all other times other than on a Sunday—ordinary rates plus 10 per cent.

Provided that when a worker is required to commence work between the hours of 9.30 p.m. and 6 a.m., the amount he shall receive shall not be less than an amount of 5s. more than the amount he would receive if paid at ordinary day rates.

- (iii) He may require any shift worker to perform his hours of work at any time other than on a Sunday on the basis of 40 hours per week. The following rates of pay shall apply for such work:—

 - (1) for day work or day shift work—ordinary time;
 (2) for work performed between noon and midnight on Saturdays—ordinary rates plus 25 per cent.;
 (3) for afternoon and night shifts—ordinary rates plus 10 per cent.

- Provided that when a shift worker is required to commence work between the hours of 9.30 p.m. and 6 a.m., the amount he shall receive shall not be less than an amount of 5s. more than the amount he would receive if paid at ordinary rates.

 (4) Nothing continued in this sub-clause shall operate so as to reduce the shift premiums payable to employees who were shift workers working on afternoon and night shifts only at the date of such interference as aforesaid and who continue to work on such shifts.
- (iv) He may alter the time at which meal breaks are usually taken and/or the duration of them, in order to avoid to my after the time at which meal breaks are usually taken and/or the duration of them, in order to avoid to a commence or mitigate the effects of such interference, without being liable to pay penalty rates for work done during the normal meal breaks; provided that the commencing time of any meal break is not made more than one hour earlier or later than usual and that a meal break of at least twenty minutes is allowed; and provided also that the employer shall, whenever it is practicable, consult with the representative of the Union or Unions before acting under this paragraph.
- (b) Notwithstanding anything elsewhere contained in this Determination, the provisions of this clause shall also apply (mutatis mutandis) in the case of an employer who uses auxiliary power plant for the purposes of providing employment for his employees whilst such restriction or rationing or emergency disconnexion is in force and who—
 - (i) is unable usefully to employ an employee for the whole of any day or shift by reason of a breakdown in such plant through no fault of his own; or
 - (ii) because of the inability of the auxiliary power to meet the normal demands for power-

 - (1) finds it necessary to require any employee to perform his ordinary hours of work (or any of such ordinary hours of work) outside the hours normally worked by such employee; or (2) finds it necessary to alter the time at which meal breaks are usually taken and/or the duration

SHIFT WORK. Definitions.

7. (a) For the purposes of this clause:-

- "Afternoon shift" means any shift finishing after 6 p.m. and at or before midnight.

 "Continuous work" means any shift finishing after 6 p.m. and at or before midnight.

 "Continuous work" means work carried on with consecutive shifts of men throughout the 24 hours of each of at least six consecutive days without interruption except during breakdowns or meal breaks or due to unavoidable causes beyond the control of the employer.

 "Night shift" means any shift finishing subsequent to midnight and at or before 8 a.m.

 "Rostered shift" means a shift of which the employee concerned has had at least 48 hours' notice.

. Hours-Continuous Work Shifts.

- (b) This sub-clause shall apply to shift workers on continuous work as hereinbefore defined.
- The ordinary hours of such shift workers shall not exceed-

 - (ii) 8 in any one day; or (ii) 48 in any one week; or (iii) 88 in 14 consecutive days; or (iv) 160 in 28 consecutive days.
- Subject to the following conditions such shift workers shall work at such times as the employer may require:---

 - (i) a shift shall consist of not more than eight hours, inclusive of crib time; (ii) except at the regular change-over of shifts, an employee shall not be required to work more than one shift in each 24 hours
 - (iii) twenty minutes shall be allowed to shift workers each shift for crib, which shall be counted as time worked.

Hours-Other than Continuous Work.

- (c) This sub-clause shall apply to shift workers not upon continuous work as hereinbefore defined. The ordinary hours of such shift workers shall not exceed—
 - . 40 in any week to be worked in five shifts of 8 hours on Monday to Friday inclusive, or five shifts of not more than 8 hours and one shift (Saturday) of not more than 4 hours, or

- (ii) 80 in fourteen consecutive days in which case an employee shall not, without payment for overtime, be required to work more than eight consecutive hours on any shift or more than six shifts in any week, or
- (iii) 120 in 21 consecutive days, in which case an employee shall not, without payment for overtime, be required to work more than eight consecutive hours on any shift or more than six shifts in any week.

Such ordinary hours shall be worked continuously except for meal breaks at the discretion of the employer. An employee shall not be required to work for more than six hours without a break for a meal.

Except at regular change over of shifts an employee shall not be required to work more than one shift in each 24 hours.

Rosters.

(d) Shift rosters shall specify the commencing and finishing times of ordinary working hours of the respective shifts.

Variation by Agreement.

(e) The method of working shifts may in any case be varied by agreement between the employer and the accredited representative of the union to suit the circumstances of the establishment.

The time of commencing and finishing shifts once having been determined may be varied by agreement between the employer and the accredited representative of the union to suit the circumstances of the establishment, or in the absence of agreement by seven days' notice of alteration given by the employer to the employees.

Afternoon or Night Shift Allowances.

(f) Shift workers on continuous work whilst on afternoon or night shifts shall be paid $7\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. more than the ordinary rates for such shifts.

Shift workers on other than continuous work whilst on afternoon or night shifts shall be paid 10 per cent. more than the

Shift workers who work on any afternoon or night shift which does not continue for at least five successive afternoons or nights in a five-day workshop or for at least six successive afternoons or nights in a six-day workshop shall be paid at the rate of time and a half.

An employee who-

(i) during a period of engagement on shift works night shift only; or

(ii) remains on night shift for a longer period than four consecutive weeks; or
(iii) works on a night shift which does not rotate or alternate with another shift or with day work so as to give him
at least one-third of his working time off night shift in each shift cycle,

shall during such engagement, period or cycle, be paid at the rate of time and a quarter for all time worked during ordinary working hours on such night shifts.

(fi) The minimum rate to be paid to any shift worker for work performed between midnight on Friday and midnight on Saturday shall be time and a quarter. Such extra rate to be in substitution for and not cumulative upon the shift premiums prescribed in the first and second paragraphs of sub-clause (f) hereof.

Overtime.

- (g) Shift workers for all time worked in excess of or outside the ordinary working hours prescribed by this Determination or on a shift other than a rostered shift shall-
- (i) if employed on continuous work be paid at the rate of double time; or (ii) if employed on other shift work at the rate of time and a half for the first four hours and double time thereafter, except in each case when the time is worked-

(iii) by arrangement between the employees themselves;
(iv) for the purpose of effecting the customary rotation of shifts; or
(v) is due to the fact that the relief man does not come on duty at the proper time; or
(vi) on a shift to which an employee is transferred on short notice as an alternative to standing the employee off in circumstances which would entitle the employer to deduct payment for a day in accordance with clause 13 (b)

Provided that when not less than eight hours' notice has been given to the employer by the relief man that he will be absent from work and the employee whom he should relieve is not relieved, the unrelieved employee shall be paid at the rate of time and a half for the first four hours on duty after he has finished his ordinary shift and at the rate of double time thereafter except where the employee is required to continue to work on his rostered day off when he shall be paid double time.

Compulsory Overtime.

(gi) An employer may require any employee to work reasonable overtime at overtime rates and such employee shall work overtime in accordance with such requirement.

Sundays and Holidays.

(h) Shift workers on continuous work shifts for work done on a rostered shift the major portion of which is performed on a Sunday or holiday shall be paid at the rate of time and a half.

Shift workers on other than continuous work for all time worked on a Sunday or holiday shall be paid at the rates prescribed by clause 10 of this Determination. Where shifts commonce between 11 p.m. and midnight on a Sunday or holiday the time so worked before midnight shall not entitle the employee to the Sunday or holiday rate; provided that the time worked by an employee on a shift commencing before midnight on the day preceding a Sunday or holiday and extending into a Sunday or holiday shall be regarded as time worked on such Sunday or holiday.

Where shifts fall partly on a holiday that shift the major portion of which falls on a holiday shall be regarded as the holiday shift.

Junior and Female Employees.

(i) Female shift workers, apprentices or juniors whilst on afternoon or night shifts shall be paid not less than the rates hereinbefore prescribed or Is. 6d. per shift whichever is the higher.

8. An employee engaged for more than half of one day or shift on duties carrying a higher rate than his ordinary classification shall be paid the higher rate for such day or shift. If for less than half of one day or shift he shall be paid the higher rate for the time so worked.

9. (a) For all work done outside ordinary hours the rates of pay shall be time and a half for the first four hours and double time thereafter, such double time to continue until the completion of the overtime work. Provided that in the case of an apprentice or a junior the rate for overtime shall be not less than the rate herein prescribed or 2s. 3d. per hour, whichever is the higher.

Except as provided in this sub-clause or sub-clause (b) hereof in computing overtime each day's work shall stand alone.

Rest Period After Overtime.

(b) When overtime work is necessary it shall, wherever reasonably practicable, be so arranged that employees have at least eight consecutive hours off duty between the work of successive days.

An employee (other than a casual employee) who works so much overtime between the termination of his ordinary work on one day and the commencement of his ordinary work on the next day that he has not at least eight consecutive hours off duty between those times shall, subject to this sub-clause, be released after completion of such overtime until he has had eight consecutive hours off duty without loss of pay for ordinary working time occurring during such absence.

If on the instructions of his employer such an employee resumes or continues work without having had such eight consecutive hours off duty he shall be paid at double rates until he is released from duty for such period and he shall then be entitled to be absent until he has had eight consecutive hours off duty without loss of pay for ordinary working time occurring

Call Back.

(c) An employee recalled to work overtime after leaving his employer's business premises (whether notified before or after leaving the premises) shall be paid for a minimum of three hours' work at the appropriate rate for each time he is so recalled; provided that, except in the case of unforeseen circumstances arising, the employee shall not be required to work the full three hours if the job he was recalled to perform is completed within a shorter period. This sub-clause shall not apply in cases where it is customary for an employee to return to his employer's premises to perform a specific job outside his ordinary working hours, or where the overtime is continuous (subject to a reasonable meal break) with the completion or commencement of ordinary working time.

Overtime worked in the circumstances specified in this sub-clause shall not be regarded as overtime for the purposes of sub-clause (b) of this clause where the actual time worked is less than three hours on such recall or on each of such recalls.

Saturday Work-Five-Days' Week.

(d) A day worker on a five-days' week required to work overtime on a Saturday shall be afforded at least three hours' work or paid for three hours at the appropriate rate except where such overtime is continuous with overtime commenced on the day

Standing By.

(e) Subject to any custom now prevailing under which an employee is required regularly to hold himself in readiness for a call back, an employee required to hold himself in readiness to work after ordinary hours shall until released be paid standing-by time at ordinary rates from the time from which he is so to hold himself in readiness.

Meal Hours-General.

(f) For work done during meal hours and thereafter until a meal-hour break is allowed time and a half rates shall be paid. An employee shall not be compelled to work for more than six hours without a break for a meal.

Meal Hours-Maintenance Employees.

(g) Subject to the provisions of the second part of sub-clause (f) of this clause an employee employed as a regular maintenance man shall work during meal breaks at the ordinary rates herein prescribed whenever instructed to do so for the purpose of making good breakdowns of plant or upon routine maintenance of plant which can only be done while such plant is idle.

Crib Time.

(h) An employee working overtime shall be allowed a crib time of twenty minutes without deduction of pay after each four hours of overtime worked if the employee continues work after such crib time.

Provided that where a day worker on a five-days' week is required to work overtime on a Saturday the first prescribed crib time shall, if occurring between 10 a.m. and 1 p.m., be paid at ordinary rates.

Unless the period of overtime is less than one and a half hours an employee before starting overtime after working ordinary hours shall be allowed a meal break of twenty minutes which shall be paid for at ordinary rates. An employer and employee may agree to any variation of this provision to meet the circumstances of the work in hand provided that the employer shall not be required to make any payment in respect of any time allowed in excess of twenty minutes.

Tea Money.

(i) An employee required to work overtime for more than two hours without being notified on the previous day or earlier that he will be so required to work shall either be supplied with a meal by the employer or paid 4s., and 2s. 8d. for each subsequent meal, but such payment need not be made to employees living in the same locality as their workshops who can reasonably return home for meals.

Unless the employer advises an employee on the previous day or earlier that the amount of overtime to be worked will necessitate the partaking of a second or subsequent meal (as the case may be) the employer shall provide such second and/or subsequent meals or make payment in lieu thereof as above prescribed.

If an employee pursuant to notice has provided a meal or meals and is not required to work overtime or is required to work less than the amount advised he shall be paid as above prescribed for meals which he has provided, but which are surplus.

Transport of Employees.

(j) When an employee, after having worked overtime, or a shift for which he has not been regularly rostered, finishes work at a time when reasonable means of transport are not available, the employer shall provide him with a conveyance to his home, or pay him his current wage for the time reasonably occupied in reaching his home.

Compulsory Overtime.

(k) An employer may require any employee to work reasonable overtime at overtime rates and such employee shall work overtime in accordance with such requirement.

HOLIDAYS AND SUNDAY WORK.

10. (a) Employees shall be entitled to the following public holidays without loss of pay as regards employees on weekly hiring:—New Year's Day, Australia Day, Good Friday, Easter Saturday, Easter Monday, Queen's Birthday, Labour Day, Anzac Day, Christmas Day, and Boxing Day, or such other day as is generally observed in the locality as a substitute for any of the said days respectively.

By agreement between any employer and his employees, other days may be substituted for the said days or any of them as to such employer's undertaking.

(b) Except as provided in sub-clause (h) of clause 7 an employee not engaged on continuous work shall be paid at the rate of double time for work done on Sunday and public holidays, such double time to continue until he is relieved from duty:

Provided that where employees are necessarily engaged in repairs to or renewals of their employer's plant and machinery necessary for resumption of work the next following working day, work done on holidays shall be paid for at the rate of time and a half for the first eight hours and double time thereafter.

- (c) An employee, other than a casual employee, not engaged in continuous work who works on a Sunday or a public holiday and (except for meal breaks) immediately thereafter continues such work shall, on being relieved from duty be entitled to be absent until he has eight consecutive hours off duty, without deduction of pay for ordinary time of duty occurring during
- (d) Employees, other than on shift, required to work on Sundays or public holidays shall be paid for a minimum of three
- (c) Where an employee is absent from his or her employment on the working day before or the working day after a public by without reasonable excuse or without the consent of the employer, the employee shall not be entitled to payment for holiday such a holiday.

EXTRA RATES NOT CUMULATIVE.

11. Extra rates in this Determination, except rates prescribed in clause 5, are not cumulative so as to exceed the maximum of double the ordinary rates.

PAYMENT OF WAGES.

- 12. (a) Wages shall be paid weekly or fortnightly.
- (b) On the first pay day occurring during his employment, an employee shall be paid whatever wages are due to him up to the completion of his work on the previous day: Provided that this sub-clause shall not apply to employers who make a practice of allowing advances to employees approximating wages due.
- (c) Upon determination of the employment wages due to an employee shall be paid to him on the day of such determination, or forwarded to him by post on the next working day.
- (d) An employee kept waiting for his wages on pay day for more than a quarter of an hour after the usual time for ceasing work shall be paid at overtime rates after that quarter hour, with a minimum of a quarter of an hour.
 (e) On or prior to pay day, the employer shall state to each employee, in writing, the amount of wages to which he is entitled, the amount of deductions made therefrom, and the net amount being paid to him.

CONTRACT OF EMPLOYMENT.

Weekly Employment.

- 13. (a) Except as hereinafter provided, employment shall be by the week. Any employee not specifically engaged as a casual employee shall be deemed to be employed by the week.
- (b) Employeer shall be terminated by a week's notice on either side given at any time during the week or by the payment or forfeiture of a week's wages as the case may be. This shall not affect the right of the employer to dismiss any employees without notice for malingering, inefficiency, neglect of duty or misconduct, and in such cases the wages shall be paid up to the time of dismissal only or to deduct payment for any day the employee cannot be usefully employed because of any strike or through any breakdown in machinery or any stoppage of work by any cause for which the employer cannot reasonably be held responsible.

Where an employee has given or been given notice as aforesaid he shall continue in his employment until the date of the expiration of such notice. Any employee who having given or been given notice as aforesaid, without reasonable cause (proof of which shall lie on him) absents himself from work during such period, shall be deemed to have abandoned his employment and shall not be entitled to payment for work done by him within that period.

${\it Casual \ Employment.}$

(c) A casual employee is one engaged and paid as such. A casual employee for working ordinary time shall be paid per one-fortieth of the weekly rate prescribed by this Determination for the work which he or she performs, plus 10 per

Late Comers.

- (d) Notwithstanding anything elsewhere contained in this Determination an employer may select and utilize for time-keeping purposes any fractional or decimal proportion of an hour (not exceeding a quarter of an hour) and may apply such proportion in the calculation of the working time of employees who without reasonable cause promptly communicated to the employer, report for duty after their appointed starting times or cease duty before their appointed finishing times.
- An employer who adopts a proportion for the aforesaid purpose shall apply the same proportion for the calculation of

SICK LEAVE.

- 14. (a) An employee on weekly hiring who is absent from his work on account of personal illness, or on account of injury by accident arising out of and in the course of his employment, shall be entitled to leave of absence, without deduction of pay, subject to the following conditions and limitations:—
 - (i) He shall not be entitled to paid leave of absence for any period in respect of which he is entitled to workers' compensation.
 - compensation.

 (ii) He shall, within 24 hours of the commencement of such absence, inform the employer of his inability to attend for duty and, as far as practicable, state the nature of the injury or illness and the estimated duration of the
 - (iii) He shall prove to the satisfaction of his employer that he was unable on account of such illness or injury to attend for duty on the day or days for which sick leave is claimed.
 (iv) He shall not be entitled in any year (whether in the employ of one employer or of several) to leave in excess
 - of 40 hours of working time.

For the purpose of administering paragraph (iv) of this sub-clause an employer may, within one month of this Determination coming into operation or within two weeks of the employee entering his employment, require an employee to make a sworn declaration or other written statement as to what paid leave of absence he has had from any employer during the then current year; and upon such statement the employer shall be entitled to rely and act.

Single Day Absences.

(b) In the case of an employee who claims to be allowed paid sick leave in accordance with this clause for an absence of one day only such employee if in the year he has already been allowed paid sick leave on more than one occasion for one day only, shall not be entitled to payment for the day claimed unless he produces to the employer a certificate of a duly qualified medical practitioner that in his, the medical practitioner's, opinion the employee was unable to attend for duty on account of personal illness or on account of injury by accident. Nothing in this sub-clause shall limit the employer's rights under sub-clause (a) (iii) hereof.

Cumulative Sick Leave.

(c) Sick leave shall accumulate from year to year so that any balance of the period specified in sub-clause (a) (iv) of this clause which has in any year not been allowed to an employee by an employer as paid sick leave may be claimed by the employee and subject to the conditions hereinbefore prescribed shall be allowed by that employer in a subsequent year without diminution of the sick leave prescribed in respect of that year. Provided that sick leave which accumulates pursuant to this sub-clause shall be available to the employee for a period of two years, but for no longer from the end of the year in which it accrues.

Attendance at Hospital, &c.

(d) Notwithstanding anything contained in sub-clause (a) hereof an employee suffering injury through an accident arising out of and in the course of his employment (not being an injury in respect of which he is entitled to workers' compensation) necessitating his attendance during working hours on a doctor, chemist, or trained nurse, or at a hospital, shall not suffer any deduction from his pay for the time (not exceeding four hours) so occupied on the day of the accident, and shall be reimbursed by the employer all expenses reasonably incurred in connexion with such attendance.

ANNUAL HOLIDAY.

15. The annual heliday shall be as prescribed by the provisions of the Factories and Shops (Annual Holidays) Act 1946 No. 5111, and any amendments which may be made thereto from time to time.

MISCELLANEOUS.

Accommodation and Conveniences.

Boiling Water.

16. (a) (i) Employers shall provide boiling water for employees at meal times.

Drinking Water

(ii) Employers shall provide for the use of employees in workshops a sufficient supply of wholesome cool drinking water from bubble taps or other suitable drinking fountains.

First-Aid Outfit.

(iii) In each workshop, and at other places where employees are regularly employed, the employer shall provide and continuously maintain at a place or places reasonably accessible to all employees an efficient first-aid outfit.

Clause 8 of Chapter 9 of the Regulations under the Factories and Shops Act 1928 requires that a first-aid ambulance chest shall be kept in some accessible place upon the premises, and that such chest shall be equipped and supplied with the following articles:—

(iv) An employer shall at some reasonably convenient place on his premises provide a suitable locker for each employee in his workshop, or hanging facilities which afford reasonable protection for employees' clothes.

Washing and Sanitary Conveniences.

(v) Employers shall provide proper and sufficient washing and sanitary conveniences.

Clothing, Equipment, and Tools.

Damage to Clothing and Tools.

(b) (i) Compensation to the extent of the damage sustained shall be made where in the course of the work clothing or tools are damaged or destroyed by fire or molten metal or through the use of corrosive substances. Provided that the employer's liability in respect of tools shall be limited to such tools of trade as are ordinarily required for the performance of the employee's determined to the course of the employee's determined to the employee's determined to the course of the employee's determined to the employee's deter

Goggles.

(ii) Suitable mica or other goggles shall be provided by the employer for each employee using emery wheels or where used by more than one employee such goggles shall be sterilized before being used by another employee. An employee when working on emery wheels shall wear the goggles provided for his protection.

Goggles containing celluloid shall not be considered suitable for the purposes of this provision.

Protective Clothing-Galvanizing, &c.

(iii) Employers shall provide suitable protective aprons, rubber gloves, and rubber boots or clogs, to employees engaged in the manual handling of materials over hot galvanizing or tinning pots or pickling or plating baths.

Tools

(iv) Until further order the employer shall provide for each employee such tools as were customarily provided at the time of the making of this Determination. The employee shall replace or pay for any tools so provided if lost through his negligence.

Females-Rest Period and Seats.

(c) Female employees shall be allowed a rest period of not less than ton minutes during each day or shift, to be taken during the first or second half of the day or shift as may be decided by a majority of the female employees in a shop.

When requested by employees and where practicable suitable seats shall be provided by the employer for female employees.

Ventilation.

- (d) While any work is being carried on in any confined or enclosed space in which-
 - (i) fumes, gases, dust or vapours which may be dangerous or injurious are liable to be present or to be generated in the course of the work; or
 - (ii) the atmosphere may otherwise become vitiated,

the employer shall install a suction exhaust apparatus, through which by means of a power-driven fan air is drawn from the vicinity of the work in relation to which it is installed.

Where it is impracticable to install such suction exhaust apparatus the employer shall take all such steps as are necessary to ensure safe working conditions in any such confined or enclosed space.

This sub-clause shall not be deemed to be inconsistent with the Harmful Gases, Vapours, Mists, Smokes and Dust Regulations 1945 (published in the Victoria Government Gazette No. 21, dated 7th February, 1945) and shall not apply to any processes or occupations to which those Regulations apply.

SHOP STEWARDS.

17. An employee appointed shop steward in the shop or department in which he is employed shall, upon notification thereof to his employer, be recognized as the accredited representative of the union to which be belongs, and he shall be allowed the necessary time during working hours to interview the employer or his representative on matters affecting employees whom he represents.

RIGHT OF ENTRY OF UNION OFFICIALS.

- 18. (a) For the purpose of interviewing employees on legitimate union business, a duly accredited union representative shall have the right to enter employers' premises during the midday meal break on the following conditions:—
 - (i) That he produces his authority to the gatekeeper or such other person as may be appointed by the employer.
 - (ii) That he interviews employees only at places where they are taking their meal.
 - (iii) That not more than one representative of each of not more than three unions be on the premises at any one
 - (iv) That no one representative visit the premises more than once in each week.
 - (v) That if any employer alleges that a representative is unduly interfering with his work or is creating dissatisfaction amongst his employees, or is offensive in his methods, or is committing a breach of any of the previous conditions such employer may refuse the right of entry

Provided that where certain employees are working under a system of shift work which precludes a representative from interviewing them during the midday meal break the representative shall have the right to enter the employer's premises for the purpose of interviewing such employees at such time and under such conditions as to notice as may be mutually arranged by the representative and the employer.

- (b) For the purpose of investigating complaints concerning the application of this Determination, or the employment of females upon work which is alleged to be unsuitable for females, a duly accredited union representative shall be afforded reasonable facilities for entering an employer's workshop or plant during working hours, subject to the following conditions:—
 - (i) That he discloses to the employer or his representative the complaint which he desires to investigate.
 - (ii) That he makes his investigations in the presence of the employer or his representative (if the employer so desires).
 - (iii) That he does not interfere with work proceeding in the workshop or plant.
 - (iv) That he conducts himself properly.
- (c) A union representative shall be a duly accredited representative of an organization concerned if he be the holder for the time being of a certificate, signed by the general secretary of that organization and bearing the seal of that organization, in the following form, or in a form not materially differing therefrom:—

TIME AND WAGES BOOK.

- 19. (a) Each employer shall keep a record from which can be readily ascertained the name of each employee and his occupation, the hours worked each day, and the wages and allowances paid each week.
- (b) The time occupied by an employee in filling in any time record or cards or in the making of records shall be treated as time of duty, but this does not apply to checking in or out when entering or leaving the employer's premises.
- (c) The time and wages record shall be open for inspection to a duly accredited union official during the usual office hours at the employer's office or other convenient place: Provided that an inspection shall not be demanded unless the secretary of the union or the district secretary or organizer of any division suspects that a breach of the Determination has been committed: Provided also that only one demand for such inspection shall be made in one fortnight at the same establishment.
- (d) The official making such inspection shall be entitled to take a copy of entries in a time and wages record relating to the suspected breach of the Determination.

NOTICE BOARD.

20. The employer shall permit a notice board of reasonable dimensions to be erected in a prominent position in his establishment, upon which accredited union representatives shall be permitted to post formal union notices, signed or countersigned by the representative posting same.

GENERAL DEFINITIONS.

- 21. For the purposes of this Determination the following definitions shall apply:-

 - "Sunday" means all time between midnight Saturday and midnight Sunday.
 "Year" means the period between the 1st day of June in each year and the next 31st day of May.
 "Nail or tack tool maker" means an employee who makes and fits all tools used in nail, staple, or tack making

 - machines.

 "Nail or tack machinist" means an adult employee who is in charge of and sets up machines to produce the various types of nails and/or tacks. He is also responsible for the quality of the product.

 "Assistant to nail or tack machinist" is one who brings up wire to machines, and assists machinist in feeding machines and removing finished products.

 "Barbed wire tool maker or machinist" means an employee who makes, grinds, and fits tools used in, and is in charge of barbed wire making machines. He is also responsible for the quality of the product.

 "Assistant to barbed wire machinist" is one who feeds material and spools into barbed wire machines, stands by, adjusts tension, cuts off and removes finished products.

 "Tradesman" is a person employed as a toolmaker and/or a setter-up and/or a machinist, receiving not less than the appropriate rate set at the party of the product and proporties of the product of the
 - "Tradesman" is a person employed as a toolmaker and/or a setter-up and/or a machinist, receiving not less than the appropriate rate set out in clause 2.
 "Improver" is any junior employee other than an apprentice or a juvenile worker as defined.
 "Juvenile worker" means a male person under 21 years of age (other than an apprentice or an improver) employed in assisting rumbler, sawdusting, filling ladles, washing, serubbing, drying, brushing off, sorting, packing, watching nail machines or barbed wire machines, wiring nail machines or barbed wire machines, attending nail-rolling machines, attending horseshoe nail-pointing machines, attending roofing nail-heading machines.

DETERMINATION OF THE COMMERCIAL TRAVELLERS BOARD.

Note.—This Determination applies to the whole of the State of Victoria.

N accordance with the provisions of the Factories and Shops Acts, the Wages Board which, since the 19th October, 1942, has had the power "to determine the lowest prices or rates which may be paid to any person or classes of persons employed outside the employer's place of business in the process, trade, business, or occupation of—

- (a) Soliciting orders for articles, goods, wares, merchandise, or materials-

 - (i) in quantity for re-sale,
 (ii) to be used by the purchaser in the manufacture, production, preparation, or distribution of commodities for sale;
- (b) soliciting orders for articles, goods, wares, merchandise, or materials to be used by the purchaser or by the person from whom the order was solicited in his business, trade, or occupation, or (in the case of a public or semi-public body) for the purpose of its undertaking, but not including persons subject to the Determination of the Shops Board No. 16 (Hardware)" has made the following Determination, namely:—

1. That as from the 10th October, 1953, the last previous Determination of this Board shall be revoked and replaced by this Determination.

TERMS OF ENGAGEMENT.

- 3. (a) Subject to the limitations mentioned hereinafter and to the provisions of clause 6, the minimum weekly wage prescribed in clause 2 shall be paid, whether by salary and/or commission or otherwise, to a person covered by this Determination in respect of a week or part of a week in which he has been employed and has carried out his duties.
- (b) If an employee fails to attend to his duty for any portion of a week in which he has been employed, a sun proportionate to the time of such non-attendance may be deducted from his pay, i.e., one-sixth of the weekly wage for each day of absence. Provided that this sub-clause shall not apply in any case where failure to attend to duty has been due to a cause for which the employee cannot reasonably be held responsible.
- (c) An employee who has been in the service of an employer for not less than twelve months shall be entitled to payment when absent from duty through illness for not more than eight days in any one calendar year. Where an employee has been in the service of an employer for a period of less than twelve months he shall be entitled to payment when absent from duty through illness for a total number of days calculated pro rata on the basis of eight days for one year's service. Provided that in either case he produces satisfactory evidence of such illness to the employer.
- (d) Notwithstanding anything contained in sub-clause (c) hereof if the full period of sick leave as prescribed therein is not taken in any year such portion as is not taken shall be cumulative from year to year up to a period not exceeding 24 days, which shall be the maximum amount of leave to which an employee may be entitled in any year of service without deduction of pay. For the purposes of this sub-clause service prior to the 1st January, 1951, shall be disregarded.
- (e) An employee engaged for any portion of the week on work not subject to this Determination shall be paid, in respect of each day during which any work subject to this Determination is performed, a sum equal to one-sixth of the weekly amount fixed in this Determination as remuneration, plus 25 per cent. Provided that this sub-clause shall apply only when the employee is engaged by the same employer on all ordinary working days of the week.

EXPENSES AND ACCOMMODATION.

4. In addition to the remuneration payable under clause 2 all expenses actually and properly incurred by the traveller in the discharge of his duties shall be paid by the employer. First class hotel accommodation (as approved by the United Commercial Travellers Association of Australia) shall be allowed for or provided by the employer. Where rail travelling is necessarily involved first class rail ticket shall be allowed for or provided by the employer. Such expenses as can be reasonably anticipated shall be payable in advance.

LOCOMOTION.

- 5. All means of locomotion required shall be provided and maintained by the employer, but where a traveller by arrangement with his employer provides his own car, he shall be paid, in addition to the weekly wage prescribed in clause 2 hereof, the following minimum allowances:—
 - (a) Town traveller, as defined;
- win traveller, as defined;

 (i) For motor cars under 14 h.p. an overhead cost allowance of £4 15s. per week, plus a weekly amount calculated at the rate of 1½d, per mile for the actual mileage travelled by his car each week in connexion with his employment including that travelled to and from his place of residence for the purposes thereof. Provided that a Town Traveller within the Metropolitan District as defined in the Factories and Shops Acts who is required to use his own car for a part of a week only shall be paid not less than £1 10s. for any one day or portion thereof with a maximum of £5 for any one week.

 (ii) For motor cars 14 h.p. to 25 h.p. inclusive an overhead cost allowance of £5 13s. per week, plus a weekly amount calculated at the rate of 2d. per mile for the actual mileage travelled by his car each week in connexion with his employment including that travelled to and from his place of residence for the purposes thereof. Provided that a Town Traveller within the Metropolitan District as defined in the Factories and Shops Acts who is required to use his own car for a part of a week only shall be paid not less than £1 15s. for any one day or portion thereof with a maximum of £7 for any one week.
 - only shall be paid not less than £1 15s. for any one day or portion thereof with a maximum of £1 for any one week.

 (iii) For motor cars over 25 h.p. an overhead cost allowance of £5 13s. per week, plus a weekly amount calculated at the rate of 2½d, per mile for the actual mileage travelled by his car each week in connexion with his employment including that travelled to and from his place of residence for the purposes thereof. Provided that a Town Traveller within the Metropolitan District as defined in the Factories and Shops Acts who is required to use his own car for a part of a week only shall be paid not less than £1 15s. for any one day or portion thereof with a maximum of £7 for any one week.
 - (b) Country Traveller, as defined;
 - An overhead cost allowance of £8 15s. per week, plus a weekly amount calculated at the rate of 2d. per mile for cars up to and including 25 h.p., or 2½d. per mile for cars over 25 h.p. for the actual mileage travelled by his car each week in connexion with his employment including that travelled to and from his place of residence for the purposes thereof.

 - (c) Territory Traveller, as defined:

 An overhead cost allowance of £5 13s. per week, plus a weekly amount calculated at the rate of 2d. per mile for the actual mileage travelled by his car each week in connexion with his employment including that travelled to and from his place of residence for the purposes thereof.
 - (d) Provided that the mileage rates specified in sub-clauses (a), (b), and (c) hereof shall not apply when a traveller is absent from duty on account of annual leave, sickness or other causes, and that the overhead cost allowance prescribed in the said clause shall not be payable when a traveller—
 - (i) is, subject to placitum (iii) hereof, absent from duty for a period exceeding thirteen weeks in any one working year for any cause other than on Public Holidays and Annual Holiday as prescribed in this Determination;
 (ii) is unable in that period to use his motor-car in his employment through accident;
 (iii) is absent from duty at his own request where such absence exceeds one week.
 - (c) Provided further that the said mileage rates shall also not apply where and employer provides petrol, and oil, free of cost to a traveller.
 - (f) Notwithstanding anything contained in sub-clauses (a), (b), and (c) hereof the employer and employee may make any other arrangement as to car or car allowance not less favourable to the employee.

ENGAGEMENT BY MORE THAN ONE EMPLOYER.

- 6. Any employer who employs a commercial traveller, which traveller is at the same time also in the employ of one or more than one other employer, shall be deemed to comply with clauses 2, 4 and 5 of this Determination if and so long as the following provisions are observed:—

 - (1) that the said employer pays to the traveller a sum of not less than one-third part of the weekly amount fixed in this Determination as remuneration and expenses in respect of the work performed by such traveller;

 (2) that the said employer has been notified in writing by the traveller that the total amount of remuneration and expenses to be received by him in respect of his employment by all his employers is not less than the weekly amount fixed in this Determination as remuneration and expenses in respect of the work performed by such traveller. Provided that where notice in writing as required in this paragraph has been furnished to an employer, such notice shall be considered to apply to the employment of the said traveller until countermanded in writing by him. countermanded in writing by him.
- A written contract setting out the conditions of employment must in all cases be completed by the parties concerned and a signed copy of same retained by each for inspection

For the purposes of this clause, the term "expenses" shall include all payments and allowances to which the employee is entitled under clauses 4 and 5 of this Determination.

The provisions contained in clause 3 as to deduction for absence from duty and payment for periods of illness shall apply to travellers whose employment is subject to this clause.

CREDITING TRAVELLERS' RETURNS.

- 7. (i) All business canvassed for by a traveller and received by the employer as a result of such canvass from a territory worked by the traveller shall be credited to such traveller.
- (ii) Where a special traveller is sent out to sell on the territory of a regular traveller, any sales by the special traveller shall be credited to the regular traveller.

HOLIDAYS.

8. All work done by any person covered by this Determination in soliciting orders at the request of the employer on Sunday, New Year's Day, Australia Day, Good Friday, Easter Monday, Labour Day, Queen's Birthday, Anzac Day, Christmas Day, or Boxing Day shall be paid for at the rate of double time, but if any other day be by Act of Parliament or Proclamation substituted for any of the above-named holidays the special rate shall be payable only on the day so substituted. For the purpose of this provision "double time" shall mean one day's wages, being the of the minimum weekly wage in addition to the prescribed weekly rate.

ANNUAL HOLIDAY.

9. The annual holiday shall be as prescribed by the provisions of the Factories and Shops (Annual Holidays) Act 1946' (No. 5111), and any amendments which may be made thereto from time to time. and the transfer of the first of

TERMINATION OF EMPLOYMENT.

10. One week's notice of termination of employment shall be given by either employer or employee, or one week's wages shall be paid or forfeited in lieu thereof.

Provided that notwithstanding anything in this clause an employer may at any time forthwith dismiss an employee for refusal or neglect to obey orders, misconduct, or carelessness in the performance of his duties.

If an employee be justifiably dismissed for any reason set out herein he shall be entitled to payment proportionate to the days worked but to that only.

DEFINITIONS.

- 11. For the purpose of this Determination the following definitions shall apply:—
 - "Town traveller" means a commercial traveller who ordinarily returns each day to his home or head-quarters.

 "Territory traveller" means a commercial traveller who:—
 - - (i) ordinarily resides within a territory that is outside the Metropolitan District as defined in the Factories and Shops Acts;
 - (ii) operates within such a territory;
 - (iii) does not exceed an average of 325 miles per week in connexion with his employment;

 This average shall be calculated on the number of weeks actually worked by a Territory traveller as such in each six months of service.
 - (iv) does not ordinarily return to his home or headquarters each day.
 - "Country traveller" means a commercial traveller other than a "town traveller", or a "Territory traveller".
 - "Probationary" as applied to a traveller refers to a commercial traveller of less than twelve months' experience.
 - "Special traveller" means a salesman sent out as a commercial traveller and not in the company of a regular commercial traveller.

For the purpose of assessing overtime outside the spread of hours any work done prior to the time of beginning, and after the time of ending work, as prescribed in clause 3 of this Part, on any day shall be cumulative.

- (b) When excess duty is performed otherwise than in a consecutive extension before or after ordinary duty for the day the employee shall be entitled to a minimum payment as for three hours for each resumption provided that, except in the case of unforseen circumstances arising, the employee shall not be required to work the full three hours if the nominated work he was recalled to perform is completed within a shorter period, but if the employee has to resume duty on more than two occasions during the hours between the usual finishing and commencing times he shall be entitled to payment for the whole of the time from the commencement of the first to the termination of the last resumption.
- (c) In computing time worked or occupied each half hour or portion thereof, from the beginning of the time worked or occupied, shall be reckoned as a half hour.

SPECIAL CONDITIONS AS REGARDS EXCESSIVE OVERTIME.

4a. An employee who has done continuous duty for 24 hours shall not be required to do further duty on the tug until he has had, for the purpose of rest, a period of eight consecutive hours off duty exclusive of any meal time, provided that continuity of duty shall for the purpose of this clause be deemed to have been maintained despite the occurrence of meal times or of the employee being off duty during any period of not more than four hours including one of such meal times during the 24 hours in question.

Provided further that for each hour worked during the eight hours rest period aforesaid the employee shall be paid overtime at the rate of double time in addition to any other ordinary or overtime payment.

RAISING STEAM AND BANKING FIRES.

- 5. (a) Firemen shall be deemed to be occupied for one and a half hours raising steam on large tugs and for one hour on small tugs.
- (b) When a tug is returning from a job and fires are banked presumably for the night and the tug is immediately ordered out on another job, 3s. extra shall be paid to the fireman for breaking the bank.

MEAL HOURS.

(Exclusive of working time.)

6. (a) Meal breaks of one hour each shall be allowed as follow:--

Breakfast between 8 a.m. and 10 a.m.

Dinner between noon and 2 p.m.

(b) Where a meal break is not permitted within the prescribed hours one hour's payment at double time shall be paid, and a break shall be allowed for a meal as soon as practicable.

An employee shall not be compelled to work for more than six hours without a break for a meal.

(c) Where a tug is tied up to a wharf immediately prior to a meal hour it shall remain alongside the wharf until the completion of such meal hour and an employee shall be entitled to leave the tug for the duration of the meal hour.

HOLIDAY AND SUNDAY WORK.

7. (a) A full week's wages shall be paid for any week in which the following holidays occur or are observed notwithstanding such holidays are not worked :-

New Year's Day, Australia Day, Good Friday, Easter Monday, Anzac Day, Queen's Birthday, Labour Day, Melbourne Cup Day, Christmas Day, and Boxing Day, or such other day or days as by law or otherwise are observed in lieu of any of the said days.

(b) For work done on a tug boat on a Sunday or any of the holidays herein prescribed an employee shall be paid double time with a minimum payment as for four hours at such penal rate for each period of duty provided that where he is subjected to more than two call outs in any day he shall be so paid for the whole time from the first commencement till the final termination of the work.

ANNUAL LEAVE.

- 8. (a) An employee who has served his employer continuously for a period of one year shall be allowed 21 consecutive days' holiday on full pay.
- (b) For each holiday prescribed in clause 7 of this Part falling within the employee's annual leave another day shall be added to such leave.
- (c) An employee shall be paid all ordinary wages due to him, plus payment at ordinary rates for the holiday period, before going on leave.
- (d) Any employee who leaves his employment, or whose employment is terminated before the completion of any twelve monthly qualifying period shall for each completed month of service receive payment in lieu of annual leave consisting of 1/12 of three weeks' ordinary pay.

- 9. (a) An employee on weekly hiring who is absent from his work on account of personal illness, or on account of injury by accident arising out of and in the course of his employment, shall be entitled to leave of absence without deduction of pay, subject to the following conditions and limitations:—
 - (i) He shall not be entitled to paid leave of absence for any period in respect of which he is entitled to workers' compensation.
 - (ii) He shall, within 24 hours of the commencement of such absence, inform the employer of his inability to attend for duty and, as far as practicable, state the nature of the injury or illness and the estimated duration of the
 - (iii) He shall prove to the satisfaction of his employer (or in the event of dispute the Wages Board) that he was unable on account of such illness or injury to attend for duty on the day or days for which sick leave is claimed.
 - (iv) He shall not be entitled in any year (whether in the employ of one employer or of several) to leave in excess of 40 hours of working time.

For the purpose of administering paragraph (iv) of this sub-clause an employer may, within one month of this Determination coming into operation or within two weeks of the employee entering his employment, require an employee to make a sworn declaration or other written statement as to what paid leave of absence he has had from any employer during the then current year; and upon such statement the employer shall be entitled to rely and act.

Single Day Absences.

(b) In the case of an employee who claims to be allowed paid sick leave in accordance with this clause for an absence of one day only such employee if in the year he has already been allowed paid sick leave on more than one occasion for one day only, shall not be entitled to payment for the day claimed unless he produces to the employer a certificate of a duly-qualified medical practitioner that in his, the medical practitioner's, opinion the employee was unable to attend for duty on account of personal illness or on account of injury by accident. Nothing in this sub-clause shall limit the employer's rights under sub-clause (a) (iii) hereof.

Cumulative Sick Leave.

(c) Sick leave shall accumulate from year to year so that any balance of the period specified in sub-clause (a) (iv) of this clause which has in any year not been allowed to an employee by an employer as paid sick leave may be claimed by the employee and subject to the conditions hereinbefore prescribed shall be allowed by that employer in a subsequent year without diminution of the sick leave prescribed in respect of that year. Provided that sick leave which accumulates pursuant to this sub-clause shall be available to the employee for a period of two years, but for no longer from the end of the year in which it accrues.

Attendance at Hospital, &c.

(d) Notwithstanding anything contained in sub-clause (a) hereof an employee suffering injury through an accident arising out of and in the course of his employment (not being an injury in respect of which he is entitled to workers' compensation) necessitating his attendance during working hours on a doctor, chemist, or trained nurse, or at a hospital, shall not suffer any deduction from his pay for the time (not exceeding four hours) so occupied on the day of the accident, and shall be reimbursed by the employer all expenses reasonably incurred in connexion with such attendance.

WAITING FOR ORDERS.

10. If a tug boat employee is required or caused by his employer to wait at a time mutually agreed upon between the employer and employee, or attend in his own time at any other place than his home to receive any direction or instruction as to the time, locality, or nature of the work to be done for the employer by the tug in which he is employed, he shall be paid 2s. 6d.

TRAVELLING TIME AND EXPENSES.

- 11. (a) Where an employee is required to join or leave a tug at a place other than his port of engagement he shall be allowed second class fares and reasonable out-of-pocket expenses in addition to his ordinary wages.
- (b) When an employee, who, in the ordinary course of his employment, begins and finishes his work for the day at a particular time and place, is required to begin and/or finish work for the day at a place other than from that particular time and place, he shall be paid any reasonable extra travelling expenses and also at the overtime rate for any extra time thereby occasioned beyond his ordinary travelling expense and time.

TRIMMING COAL IN BUNKERS.

- 12. (a) When coal trimming is necessary when a tug is steaming an extra trimmer shall be engaged to perform this work.
- (b) Members of crews are not to participate in bunkering operations when coal trimmers are available. If upon to perform bunkering operations they shall be paid coal trimmers' rates in addition to their ordinary rates.

COMPENSATION FOR LOSS OF PERSONAL EFFECTS.

13. If an employee should sustain damage or loss of his personal effects or equipment by fire, explosion, foundering, shipwreck, collision, stranding, or by any other cause whatsoever not attributable to the employee's neglect, the employer shall compensate him for such damage or loss by a cash equivalent to the value thereof, to a maximum of £20.

CLEANING AND FUMIGATION.

- 14. (a) The quarters of employees shall be thoroughly fumigated and cleaned and painted at least once every year, and the date of the last fumigating and painting shall be stencilled or painted in the quarters.
- (b) Employees shall be given one clear day's notice before fumigation starts, and all bedding, clothing, &c., shall be loosened up and fumigated while in quarters.
 - (c) Employees shall not be called upon to occupy the quarters until the fumigation officer has certified they can safely do so.

ACCOMMODATION.

- 15. (a) Employees who, by the nature of their employment, are required to sleep on board shall be supplied by the employer with bedding consisting of a mattress and cover, pillowslips, sheets, a well-filled pillow, two blankets (a third blanket to be supplied in cold weather), towels, toilet soap, crockery, and cutlery.

 The mattress and pillow shall be of flax or other fibre, but not of straw
- (b) Pillow covers, sheets, and towels shall be changed weekly, mattress cover monthly, and blankets once in each four months. Mattresses shall be thoroughly renovated once every six months.
- (c) In the event of the failure by an employee to return in good order, reasonable wear and tear excepted, any of the bedding or towels issued to him, the employer, on the termination of his employment, shall deduct from any moneys due to the employee 75 per cent. of the cost of the articles not so returned.

Existing Customs and Practices.

16. Except in so far as altered expressly or by necessary implication this Determination is made on the understanding that all existing privileges and conditions shall continue.

WORKING CARGO.

17. Tug boat employees shall, in addition to their ordinary wage, be paid the difference between their own and Waterside Workers' rates when handling cargo.

MEDICINE CHESTS.

18. A medicine chest complying with the provisions of Scale D of the Scales of Medicine and Medical Stores, prescribed in accordance with Section 124 of the Commonwealth Navigation Act 1912-1933, shall be placed aboard each vessel.

ENGAGEMENT AND DISMISSAL.

- 19. (a) All employees shall be engaged through the recognized place of engagement for all seamen.
- (b) Subject to sub-clause (c) hereof the engagement of all employees shall be by the week, and one week's notice shall be given by either side to terminate employment excepting in cases which justify summary dismissal. Any employee leaving his employment without giving such notice shall forfeit one week's pay.
 - (c) Employees may be engaged by the day to fill the places of weekly employees temporarily absent.
- If an employee is engaged for less than fourteen consecutive working days he shall be paid at the appropriate rate prescribed in clause I of this Part with an addition of 25 per cent.

DEFINITION.

20. "Tug" means a vessel engaged in towing steam or sailing vessels or barges, lighters, punts, or other craft or floating material, or attending such vessels for towing on arrival or departure.

Hours of Work.

- 2. Subject to sub-clauses (a) and (b) hereof the ordinary hours for a week's work shall be 40.

Provided that any employee on a craft which is regularly engaged for less than 50 per cent. of its working time at commercial towing shall be paid at the appropriate rate prescribed in Part I of this Determination, with a minimum payment for two hours on any day whilst so employed.

- (b) A Diver's Assistant shall be paid, whilst engaged as such, at the rate prescribed for an A.B. plus an allowance at the rate of £1 per week.
- (c) Any person working inside a boiler or furnace, cleaning inside the casing of internal combustion engines, cleaning inside oil tanks in motor vessels, cleaning tubes, uptakes, or smokeboxes where doors have to be opened, or cleaning bilges—1s. 6d. per hour in addition to any other ordinary or overtime rate payable.
 - (d) A coal gang hand shall receive the following additional allowances:-

For the purposes of this Part of the Determination a shift worker shall be deemed to be an employee who is ordinarily required to commence work before 7.25 a.m., or to finish after 4.25 p.m.

EMPLOYEES TEMPORABILY TRANSFERRED FROM DAY WORK TO SHIFT WORK, OR FROM SHIFT WORK TO DAY WORK.

- 2. (a) An employee transferred from day work to shift work for less than five consecutive days shall be paid at the rate of time and a half for each shift.
- (b) An employee transferred temporarily from shift work to day work shall for the first two weeks at such temporary work be paid at the rate prescribed for his ordinary work as a shift worker.
- (c) After the first hour of a shift au employee is not to be moved or transferred from one craft to another except in the case of sickness or accident occurring during a shift.

CALL OUTS FOR DIVER.

3. A diver shall be paid for all "Call outs" at the rate of double time, with a minimum payment as for four hours' work at such penal rate.

LIMITATION ON DIPS, ETC.

- 4. (a) Where a Diver is required to do more than six dips in any week he shall be paid 8s. 6d. extra for each addit anal dip in such week. In computing the number of dips three hours shall be deemed to be the maximum duration of a dip, provided that where the duration of a dip exceeds three hours, such excess shall be deemed to be a second dip if work then ceases for the day, but if the diver is required to do any further diving work on that day the excess shall count towards the three-hour maximum for the next dip on that day.
 - (b) A Diver shall not be required to dive for more than six hours on any one day.

MIXED FUNCTIONS.

5. An employee required to do work for which a higher rate of wage is payable than that for the work on which he is ordinarily engaged, shall be paid at such higher rate for all work done on such day.

ORDINARY HOURS OF WORK.
