PRICES REGULATION ORDER No. 664.

CORRUGATED AND PLAIN ZINCANEAL AND GALVANIZED IRON AND  
TERNE PLATE OF AUSTRALIAN MANUFACTURE.

**I**N pursuance of the powers conferred upon me by the Prices Regulation Acts, I, John Francis Waldron, Prices Commissioner, hereby make the following Order:—

*Citation.*

1. This Order may be cited as Prices Regulation Order No. 664.

*Revocation.*

2. Prices Regulation Order No. 483 is hereby revoked.

*Definitions.*

3. In this Order unless the contrary intention appears:—
  - "Point of delivery" means, in relation to the sale of specified goods, the place at which liability for payment of transport charges in conveying such goods to his place of business passed to the seller from the person from whom he purchased such goods.
  - "Prevailing rate" in relation to the cartage of specified goods by any person on any terms or conditions means the rate approved to the Victorian Road Transport Association at the time of sale.
  - "Sales by retail" means, sales to contracting plumbers, builders, and users.
  - "Sales by wholesale" means, sales to recognized resellers such as timber merchants, storekeepers, and hardware merchants, but does not include sales to plumbers, builders, or users.
  - "Sheets" means, sales of specified goods of less than one-half ton lots in any one size.
  - "Specified goods" means, Corrugated and Plain Zincaneal and Galvanized Iron and Terne Plate of Australian Manufacture.
  - "Ton" means, a weight of 2,240 lbs. avoirdupois.

*Maximum Prices—Sales by Wholesale.*

(4). (i) I fix and declare the maximum price at which specified goods may be sold by wholesale by any person to be such price as is specified in a notice in writing given by the Commissioner to that person.

(ii) All notices in writing given in pursuance of any Order and issued after 18th October, 1954, which operate to fix maximum prices for the sale by wholesale of specified goods by any person and which are in force at the commencement of this Order shall be deemed to have been given under this Order.

*Maximum Prices—Sales by Retail.*

5. I fix and declare the maximum price at which any of the specified goods set out in the Schedule to this Order may be sold by retail to be:—

(i) The appropriate price specified in that Schedule; plus

(ii) The cost actually incurred in respect of and properly attributable to the transport of such specified goods from the point of delivery to the retailer's place of business and which is clearly recorded in his books of account or records.

6. I fix and declare the maximum rate which may be charged for the cartage of specified goods to be the prevailing rate.

*Fixation of Maximum Prices by Notice in Writing.*

7. Notwithstanding the foregoing provisions of this Order, I declare the maximum price at which any specified goods may be sold by any person to whom a notice in pursuance of this clause is given to be such price as is fixed by the Commissioner by notice in writing to that person.

*Exhibition of Price Tickets.*

8. (i) Every person who sells or has for sale by retail any specified goods, the maximum price of which is fixed by or under the provisions of this Order, shall at all times whilst such goods are in his possession keep attached to or displayed with such goods, a ticket or label, setting forth his selling price thereof.

(ii) Any ticket or label required by sub-clause (i) of this clause to be attached to or displayed with any goods shall be in such form as to be easily legible to any person inspecting or viewing those goods and so as to be properly associated with such goods.

*Application for Maximum Prices.*

9. Any person who purchases for resale any specified goods for which a maximum price is not fixed by or under the provisions of this Order shall not sell those specified goods unless and until that person has made a written request to the Commissioner to fix the maximum price at which those specified goods may be sold and the Commissioner has fixed the maximum price accordingly.

*Delivery of Invoices.*

10. Every person who sells specified goods shall deliver with those goods an invoice or docket specifying the following particulars:—

- (i) Name of seller,
- (ii) Address of seller,
- (iii) Date of sale,
- (iv) Name of purchaser,
- (v) Address of purchaser,
- (vi) Quantity of specified goods sold,
- (vii) Full description of goods showing gauge, width, and length,
- (viii) Price at which those goods are sold.
