One apprentice to every three or fraction of three workers receiving not less than the minimum wage.

An indenture of apprenticeship prescribed by the Board was approved on 18th June, 1924.

Improvers.

One improver to every five or fraction of five workers receiving not less than the minimum wage.

Clauses, other than clause 2, of the said Determination shall remain in force.
